AN ACT Relating to bicycle safety; amending RCW 46.04.670 and 46.61.990; adding a new section to chapter 43.43 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 47.36 RCW; and adding new sections to chapter 47.04 RCW.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 43.43 RCW 7 to read as follows:

Bicycling is increasing in popularity as a form of recreation and 8 9 as an alternative mode of transportation. To make bicycling safer, the 10 various law enforcement agencies should enforce traffic regulations for 11 bicyclists. By enforcing bicycle regulations, law enforcement officers 12 are reinforcing educational programs. Bicycling takes more skill than Since bicyclists have a low profile in traffic 13 most people realize. 14 and are unprotected, they need more defensive riding skills than 15 motorists do.

A bicycle awareness program is created within the Washington state 1 2 patrol. In developing the curriculum for the bicycle awareness program the patrol shall consult with the traffic safety commission and with 3 4 bicycling groups providing bicycle safety education. The patrol shall conduct the program in conjunction with the safety education officer 5 6 program and may use other law enforcement personnel and volunteers to implement the program for children in grades kindergarten through six. 7 The patrol shall ensure that each safety educator presenting the 8 9 bicycle awareness program has received specialized training in bicycle 10 safety education and has been trained in effective defensive bicycle riding skills. 11

Sec. 2. RCW 46.04.670 and 1979 ex.s. c 213 s 4 are each amended to read as follows:

14 "Vehicle" includes every device capable of being moved upon a 15 public highway and in, upon, or by which any persons or property is or 16 may be transported or drawn upon a public highway, ((excepting)) including bicycles. The term does not include devices other than 17 18 bicycles moved by human or animal power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks((, except that)). Mopeds shall be 19 considered vehicles or motor vehicles only for the purposes of chapter 20 46.12 RCW, but not for the purposes of chapter 46.70 RCW. Bicycles 21 22 shall not be considered vehicles for the purposes of chapter 46.12, 46.16, or 46.70 RCW. 23

24 **Sec. 3.** RCW 46.61.990 and 1965 ex.s. c 155 s 92 are each amended 25 to read as follows:

Sections 1 through 52 and 54 through 86 of ((this amendatory act))
Chapter 155, Laws of 1965 ex. sess. are added to chapter 12, Laws of
1961 and shall constitute a new chapter in Title 46 of the Revised Code
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of Washington and sections 54, 55, and 63 as herein amended and RCW 1 2 46.48.012, 46.48.014, 46.48.015, 46.48.016, 46.48.023, 46.48.025, 46.48.026, 46.48.041, 46.48.046, 46.48.050, 3 46.48.060, 46.48.080, 46.48.110, 46.48.120, 46.48.150, 46.48.160, 46.48.340, 46.56.030, 4 46.56.070, 46.56.100, 46.56.130, 46.56.135, 46.56.190, 46.56.200, 5 б 46.56.210, 46.56.220, 46.56.230, 46.56.240, 46.60.260, 46.60.270, 46.60.330, and 46.60.340 shall be recodified as and be a part of said 7 chapter. The sections of the new chapter shall be organized under the 8 "OBEDIENCE TO AND EFFECT OF TRAFFIC LAWS", 9 following captions: "TRAFFIC SIGNS, SIGNALS AND MARKINGS", "DRIVING ON RIGHT SIDE OF 10 ROADWAY--OVERTAKING AND PASSING--USE OF ROADWAY", "RIGHT OF WAY", 11 12 "PEDESTRIANS' RIGHTS AND DUTIES", "TURNING AND STARTING AND SIGNALS ON STOPPING AND TURNING", "SPECIAL STOPS REQUIRED", "SPEED RESTRICTIONS", 13 14 "RECKLESS DRIVING, DRIVING WHILE INTOXICATED AND NEGLIGENT HOMICIDE BY VEHICLE", "STOPPING, STANDING AND PARKING", "MISCELLANEOUS RULES", and 15 "OPERATION OF ((BICYCLES AND PLAY)) NONMOTORIZED VEHICLES". Such 16 17 captions shall not constitute any part of the law.

18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 47.36 RCW 19 to read as follows:

20 The department of transportation shall, by January 1, 1992, adopt minimum pavement marking standards for the area designating the limits 21 of the vehicle driving lane along the right edge for arterials that do 22 23 not have curbs or sidewalks and are inside urbanized areas. In 24 preparing the standards, the department of transportation shall take 25 into consideration all types of pavement markings, including flat, raised, and recessed markings, and their effect on pedestrians, 26 27 bicycle, and motor vehicle safety.

The standards shall provide that a jurisdiction shall conform to these requirements, at such time thereafter that it undertakes to (1)

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1 renew or install permanent markings on the existing or new roadway, and
2 (2) remove existing nonconforming raised pavement markers at the time
3 the jurisdiction prepares to resurface the roadway, or earlier, at its
4 option. These standards shall be in effect, as provided in this
5 section, unless the legislative authority of the local governmental
6 body finds that special circumstances exist affecting vehicle and
7 pedestrian safety that warrant a variance to the standard.

8 For the purposes of this section, "urbanized area" means an area 9 designated as such by the United States bureau of census and having a 10 population of more than fifty thousand. Other jurisdictions that 11 install pavement marking material on the right edge of the roadway 12 shall do so in a manner not in conflict with the minimum state 13 standard.

14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 47.04 RCW 15 to read as follows:

16 (1) The department of transportation is responsible for the 17 initiation, coordination, and operation of a bicycle transportation 18 management program.

19 (2) To assist in the operation of the bicycle transportation 20 management program, a full-time staff position of state bicycle program 21 manager is established within the department of transportation.

22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 47.04 RCW 23 to read as follows:

24 The state bicycle program manager shall:

25 (1) Design programs that encourage the use of bicycling for 26 transportation;

(2) Coordinate bicycle safety related programs and bicycle tourism
programs in all state agencies;

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1 (3) Assist the department of transportation and the cities and 2 counties of the state in assigning priorities to, programming, and 3 developing bicycle-related projects;

4 (4) Serve as a clearinghouse for bicycle program information and5 resources;

6 (5) Provide assistance in revising and updating bicycle material of
7 the superintendent of public instruction and the state patrol;

8 (6) Promote the use of bicycle helmets of a type certified to meet 9 the requirements of standard Z-90.4 of the American National Standards 10 Institute or such subsequent nationally recognized standard for bicycle 11 helmet performance; and

12 (7) Promote bicycle safety equipment.

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
