1 AN ACT Relating to the use of physical force against intruders; 2 adding a new section to chapter 9A.16 RCW; and creating a new section.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature hereby recognizes that the 5 citizens of the state of Washington have a right to expect absolute 6 safety within their own homes.

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 9A.16 RCW 8 to read as follows:

9 (1) Notwithstanding RCW 9A.16.020 and 9A.16.050, an occupant of a 10 dwelling is justified in using any degree of physical force, including 11 deadly physical force, against another person when:

(a) That other person has made an unlawful entry into the dwelling;
(b) The occupant has a reasonable belief that such other person has
committed a crime in the dwelling in addition to the uninvited entry,

or is committing or intends to commit a crime against a person or
 property in addition to the uninvited entry; and

3 (c) The occupant reasonably believes that such other person might4 use any physical force, no matter how slight, against any occupant.

5 (2) An occupant of a dwelling using physical force, including 6 deadly physical force, in accordance with the provisions of subsection 7 (1) of this section shall be immune from criminal prosecution for the 8 use of such force.

9 (3) An occupant of a dwelling using physical force, including 10 deadly physical force, in accordance with the provisions of subsection 11 (1) of this section shall be immune from any civil liability for 12 injuries or death resulting from the use of such force.
