MISCELLANEOUS

NEW SECTION. **Sec. 901.** This act is subject to the provisions, definitions, conditions, and limitations of chapter 16, Laws of 1991 sp. sess., as amended by this act.

NEW SECTION. **Sec. 902.** SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.

NEW SECTION. **Sec. 903.** This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take effect immediately.
