1 AN ACT Relating to the center for international trade in forest 2 products; and amending RCW 76.56.020, 43.131.333, and 43.131.334.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 sec. 1. RCW 76.56.020 and 1987 c 195 s 16 are each amended to read 5 as follows:

6 The center shall:

7 (1) Coordinate the University of Washington's college of forest8 resources' faculty and staff expertise to assist in:

9 (a) The development of research and analysis for developing 10 policies and strategies which will expand forest-based international 11 trade, including ((trade in manufactured forest products)) <u>a major</u> 12 focus on secondary manufacturing;

(b) The development of technology for manufactured products thatwill meet the evolving needs of international customers; and

(c) The coordination, development, and dissemination of market and
 technical information relevant to international trade in forest
 products, especially secondary manufacturing;

4 (2) Further develop and maintain ((a)) computer ((based)) data 5 <u>bases on</u> world-wide forest products production and trade ((data base 6 <u>system</u>)) in order to monitor and report on trends significant to the 7 <u>Northwest forest products industry and support the center's research</u> 8 <u>functions;</u> and coordinate this system with state, federal, and private 9 sector efforts to insure a cost-effective information resource that 10 will avoid unnecessary duplication;

11 (3) Monitor international forest products markets and assess the 12 status of the state's forest products industry, including the 13 competitiveness of <u>small and medium-sized secondary manufacturing firms</u> 14 <u>in the forest products industry, which for the purposes of this chapter</u> 15 <u>shall be firms with annual revenues of twenty-five million or less,</u> and 16 including the increased exports of Washington-produced products <u>of</u> 17 <u>small and medium-sized secondary manufacturing firms;</u>

18 (4) Provide high-quality research and graduate education and 19 professional nondegree training in international trade in forest 20 products in cooperation with the University of Washington's graduate 21 school of business administration, the school of law, the Jackson 22 school of international studies, <u>the Northwest policy center of the</u> 23 <u>graduate school of public administration</u>, and other supporting academic 24 units;

(5) Develop cooperative linkages with the international marketing program for agricultural commodities and trade at Washington State University, the international trade project of the United States forest service, the department of natural resources, the department of trade and economic development, the small business export finance assistance center, and other state and federal agencies to avoid duplication of
 effort and programs;

3 (6) Provide for public dissemination of research, analysis, and 4 results of the center's programs through technical workshops, short 5 courses, international and national symposia, or other means, including 6 appropriate publications; ((and))

7 (7) Establish an executive policy board, including representatives 8 of small and medium-sized businesses, to provide advice on: Overall 9 policy direction and program priorities, state and federal budget 10 requests, securing additional research funds, identifying priority 11 areas of focus for research efforts, selection of projects for 12 research, and dissemination of results of research efforts; and

(8) Establish advisory or technical committees ((as necessary)) for 13 14 <u>each research program area</u>, to ((<del>develop policies, operating</del> 15 procedures, and)) advise on research program area priorities, consistent with the international trade opportunities achievable by the 16 17 forest products sector of the state and region, to help ensure projects 18 are relevant to industry needs, and to advise on and support effective dissemination of research results. Each advisory or technical 19 committee shall include representatives of forest products industries 20 that might benefit from this research. 21

22 Service on the committees <u>and the executive policy board</u> 23 <u>established in subsections (7) and (8) of this section</u> shall be without 24 compensation but actual travel expenses incurred in connection with 25 service to the center may be reimbursed from appropriated funds in 26 accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

27 Sec. 2. RCW 43.131.333 and 1988 c 288 s 15 are each amended to 28 read as follows:

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1 The center for international trade in forest products in the 2 college of forest resources at the University of Washington shall be 3 terminated on June 30, ((<del>1992</del>)) <u>1994</u>, as provided in RCW 43.131.334.

4 **Sec. 3.** RCW 43.131.334 and 1988 c 288 s 16 are each amended to 5 read as follows:
