1 AN ACT Relating to chiropractic; amending RCW 18.25.005 and 2 18.25.006; adding a new section to chapter 18.25 RCW; creating a new 3 section; and declaring an emergency.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. This act is intended to expand the scope 6 of practice of chiropractic only with regard to adjustment of 7 extremities in connection with a spinal adjustment.

8 Sec. 2. RCW 18.25.005 and 1974 ex.s. c 97 s 7 are each amended to 9 read as follows:

10 ((For the purpose of chapters 18.25 and 18.26 RCW, the term 11 "chiropractic" shall mean and include that practice of health care 12 which deals with the detection of subluxations, which shall be defined 13 as any alteration of the biomechanical and physiological dynamics of

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contiguous spinal structures which can cause neuronal disturbances, the 1 2 chiropractic procedure preparatory to, and complementary to the 3 correction thereof, by adjustment or manipulation of the articulations 4 of the vertebral column and its immediate articulations for the restoration and maintenance of health; it includes the normal regimen 5 б and rehabilitation of the patient, physical examination to determine the necessity for chiropractic care, the use of x-ray and other 7 analytical instruments generally used in the practice of chiropractic: 8 9 PROVIDED, That no chiropractor shall prescribe or dispense any medicine 10 or drug nor practice obstetrics or surgery nor use x-rays for therapeutic purposes: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That the term "chiropractic" 11 12 as defined in this act shall not prohibit a practitioner licensed under 13 chapter 18.71 RCW from performing accepted medical procedures, except 14 such procedures shall not include the adjustment by hand of any 15 articulation of the spine: AND PROVIDED FURTHER, That nothing herein 16 shall be construed to prohibit the rendering of dietary advice.))

17 (1) Chiropractic is the practice of health care that deals with the 18 diagnosis or analysis and care or treatment of the vertebral 19 subluxation complex and its effects, articular dysfunction, and 20 musculoskeletal disorders, all for the restoration and maintenance of 21 health and recognizing the recuperative powers of the body.

(2) Chiropractic treatment or care includes the use of procedures 22 involving spinal adjustments, and extremity manipulation insofar as any 23 24 such procedure is complementary or preparatory to a chiropractic spinal 25 adjustment. Chiropractic treatment also includes the use of heat, cold, water, exercise, massage, trigger point therapy, dietary advice 26 27 and recommendation of nutritional supplementation except for medicines of herbal, animal, or botanical origin, the normal regimen and 28 29 rehabilitation of the patient, first aid, and counseling on hygiene, sanitation, and preventive measures. such physiological therapeutic procedures as traction and light, but
 does not include procedures involving the application of sound,
 diathermy, or electricity.

4 (3) As part of a chiropractic differential diagnosis, a 5 chiropractor shall perform a physical examination, which may include 6 diagnostic x-rays, to determine the appropriateness of chiropractic 7 care or the need for referral to other health care providers. The 8 chiropractic disciplinary board shall provide by rule for the type and 9 use of diagnostic and analytical devices and procedures consistent with 10 this chapter.

(4) Chiropractic care shall not include the prescription or 11 dispensing of any medicine or drug, the practice of obstetrics or 12 surgery, the use of x-rays or any other form of radiation for 13 14 therapeutic purposes, colonic irrigation, or any form of venipuncture. (5) Nothing in this chapter prohibits or restricts any other 15 practitioner of a "health profession" defined in RCW 18.120.020(4) from 16 17 performing any functions or procedures the practitioner is licensed or permitted to perform, and the term "chiropractic" as defined in this 18 19 chapter shall not prohibit a practitioner licensed under chapter 18.71 20 RCW from performing medical procedures, except such procedures shall not include the adjustment by hand of any articulation of the spine. 21

22 **Sec. 3.** RCW 18.25.006 and 1991 c 3 s 36 are each amended to read 23 as follows:

24 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 25 this section apply throughout this chapter.

26 (1) "Department" means the department of health.

(2) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department of health orthe secretary's designee.

29 (3) "Chiropractor" means an individual licensed under this chapter.

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(4) "Board" means the Washington state board of chiropractic
 examiners.

3 (5) "Vertebral subluxation complex" means a functional defect or 4 alteration of the biomechanical and physiological dynamics in a joint 5 that may cause neuronal disturbances, with or without displacement 6 detectable by x-ray. The effects of the vertebral subluxation complex 7 may include, but are not limited to, any of the following: Fixation, 8 hypomobility, hypermobility, periarticular muscle spasm, edema, or 9 inflammation.

10 <u>(6)</u> "Articular dysfunction" means an alteration of the 11 biomechanical and physiological dynamics of a joint of the axial or 12 appendicular skeleton.

<u>(7) "Musculoskeletal disorders" means abnormalities of the muscles,</u>
 bones, and connective tissue.

15 <u>(8)</u> "Chiropractic differential diagnosis" means a diagnosis to 16 determine the existence of a vertebral subluxation complex, articular 17 dysfunction, or musculoskeletal disorder, and the appropriateness of 18 chiropractic care or the need for referral to other health care 19 providers.

20 <u>(9) "Chiropractic adjustment" means chiropractic care of a</u> 21 <u>vertebral subluxation complex, articular dysfunction, or</u> 22 <u>musculoskeletal disorder. Such care includes manual or mechanical</u> 23 <u>adjustment of any vertebral articulation and contiguous articulations</u> 24 beyond the normal passive physiological range of motion.

25 (10) "Extremity manipulation" means a corrective thrust or maneuver
26 applied to a joint of the appendicular skeleton. The use of extremity
27 manipulation shall be complementary and preparatory to a chiropractic
28 spinal adjustment to support correction of a vertebral subluxation
29 complex and is considered a part of a spinal adjustment and shall not
30 be billed separately from or in addition to a spinal adjustment.
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<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 18.25 RCW
 to read as follows:

All state health care purchasers shall have the authority to set service and fee limitations on chiropractic costs. The health care authority shall establish pilot projects in defined geographic regions of the state to contract with organizations of chiropractors for a prepaid capitated amount.

8 *<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. This act is necessary for the immediate 10 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 11 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 12 effect immediately.

13 *Sec. 5 was vetoed, see message at end of chapter.

Note: Governor's explanation of partial veto is as follows:

"I am returning herewith, without my approval as to section 5, Engrossed Senate Bill No. 6054 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to Chiropractic."

Section 5 of Engrossed Senate Bill No. 6054 implements this bill immediately. The language in the bill is ambiguous concerning the ability of chiropractors to treat problems originating in the extremities. The proponents of the bill assure me that the expansion in the scope of practice does not include disorders that originate in the extremities. I have asked the Chiropractic Disciplinary Board to clarify this issue in rule.

For these reasons, I have vetoed section 5 of Engrossed Senate Bill No. 6054.

With the exception of section 5, Engrossed Senate Bill No. 6054 is approved."
