- 1 AN ACT Relating to the commission on African-American affairs; and
- 2 adding a new chapter to Title 43 RCW.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature declares that it is the
- 5 public policy of this state to insure equal opportunity for all of its
- 6 citizens. The legislature finds that, for economic, social, and
- 7 historical reasons, a disproportionate number of African-Americans find
- 8 themselves disadvantaged or isolated from the benefits of equal
- 9 opportunity. The legislature believes that it is the duty of this
- 10 state to improve the well-being of African-Americans by enabling them
- 11 to participate fully in all fields of endeavor and by assisting them in
- 12 obtaining governmental services. The legislature further finds that
- 13 the development of public policy and the delivery of governmental
- 14 services to meet the special needs of African-Americans can be improved
- 15 by establishing a focal point in state government for the interests of

- 1 African-American citizens. Therefore, the legislature deems it
- 2 necessary to establish in statute the commission on African-American
- 3 affairs to further these purposes.
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** The Washington state commission on
- 5 African-American affairs is created. The commission shall be
- 6 administered by an executive director, who shall be appointed by, and
- 7 serve at the pleasure of, the governor. The governor shall set the
- 8 salary of the executive director. The executive director shall employ
- 9 the staff of the commission.
- 10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** The commission shall consist of nine
- 11 members, appointed by the governor. The commission shall make
- 12 recommendations to the governor on appointment of the chair of the
- 13 commission. The governor shall appoint the chair of the commission.
- 14 To the extent practicable, appointments to the commission shall be made
- 15 to achieve a balanced representation based on African-American
- 16 population distribution within the state, geographic considerations,
- 17 sex, age, and occupation. Members shall serve three-year terms.
- 18 However, of the initial appointees, one-third shall serve three-year
- 19 terms, one-third shall serve two-year terms, and one-third shall serve
- 20 a one-year term. In the case of a vacancy, appointment shall be for
- 21 the remainder of the unexpired term. No member shall serve more than
- 22 two full consecutive terms. Members shall be reimbursed for travel
- 23 expenses incurred in the performance of their duties in accordance with
- 24 RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060. Five members shall constitute a quorum
- 25 for the purposes of conducting business.
- 26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The commission shall have the following
- 27 powers and duties:

- 1 (1) Examine and define issues pertaining to the rights and needs of
- 2 African-Americans, and make recommendations to the governor and state
- 3 agencies for changes in programs and laws.
- 4 (2) Advise the governor and state agencies on the development and
- 5 implementation of policies, plans, and programs that relate to the
- 6 special needs of African-Americans.
- 7 (3) Acting in concert with the governor, advise the legislature on
- 8 issues of concern to the African-American community.
- 9 (4) Establish relationships with state agencies, local governments,
- 10 and private sector organizations that promote equal opportunity and
- 11 benefits for African-Americans.
- 12 (5) Receive gifts, grants, and endowments from public or private
- 13 sources that are made for the use or benefit of the commission and
- 14 expend, without appropriation, the same or any income from the gifts,
- 15 grants, or endowments according to their terms.
- 16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** Sections 1 through 4 of this act shall
- 17 constitute a new chapter in Title 43 RCW.
