PART IX

MISCELLANEOUS

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 901. APPLICABILITY OF OTHER PROVISIONS. This 4 act is subject to the provisions, definitions, conditions, and 5 limitations of chapter 16, Laws of 1991 sp. sess., as amended by 6 chapter 232, Laws of 1992, chapter 238, Laws of 1992, and this act.

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 902. A new section is added to chapter 16, Laws 8 of 1991 sp.s. to read as follows:

9 SPENDING CONTROLS. (1) All agencies, including those headed by 10 elected officials and appointed boards or commissions, shall control 11 costs to ensure that operating expenditures for capital outlays and 12 noncapitalized fixed assets for the period beginning April 1, 1993, and 13 ending June 30, 1993, will not exceed the sum of that agency's monthly 14 allotments for capital outlays and noncapitalized fixed assets for that 15 same time period.

(2) All agencies, including those headed by elected officials and appointed boards or commissions, shall control costs to ensure that expenditures of state general fund appropriations for the period beginning April 1, 1993, and ending June 30, 1993, will not exceed the sum of that agency's monthly allotments of state general fund expenditures for that same time period.

22 (3) All agencies over one hundred employees, including those headed 23 by elected officials and appointed boards or commissions, are directed 24 to place into reserve status one percent of their April through June allotments for salaries. It is intended that these savings be achieved 25 26 through the fiscal limitations imposed in the Governor's January 13, 1993, directive. Expenditure control mechanisms are assumed to include 27 attrition, administrative efficiencies, and reductions in nonessential 28 29 travel and purchases. The office of financial management shall issue agency savings targets and instructions for allotment amendment 30 31 submittals.

Exceptions for the limitations described in subsections (1) through (3) of this section may be granted by the office of financial management only in cases of preexisting legal obligations or emergency conditions.

For the purposes of this section, "allotments" are considered to be the January 31, 1993, office of financial management approved expenditure plan as revised for any 1993 supplemental appropriations.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 903. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this
act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid,
the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
persons or circumstances is not affected.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 904. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. This act is necessary 9 for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, 10 or support of the state government and its existing public 11 institutions, and shall take effect immediately.
