- 1 AN ACT Relating to preservice internship training for principals;
- 2 adding a new section to chapter 28A.405 RCW; adding a new section to
- 3 chapter 28A.305 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 28A.300 RCW;
- 4 creating a new section; and making an appropriation.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that:
- 7 (1) Public school restructuring is a process that best occurs
- 8 building by building, with the combined support and effort of staff,
- 9 students, parents, and the community at large. Critical to successful
- 10 restructuring at the building level is strong principal leadership.
- 11 (2) More than half of the K-12 principals currently active in
- 12 Washington have indicated an intent to retire within the next five or
- 13 six years. This creates an imperative to assure their replacements
- 14 will be appropriately trained to carry forward or initiate local
- 15 restructuring initiatives. At the same time, it is vital that these
- 16 new principals reflect the increasing diversity of the student
- 17 population.
- 18 (3) As the education system learns more about restructuring, the
- 19 leadership role for principals is changing. Throughout this decade and

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- l beyond, a principal must be skilled in new and different ways,
- 2 including consensus building and conflict resolution. Principal
- 3 leadership for positive transitional change will require training and
- 4 increased opportunities for preservice testing of skills.
- 5 (4) Research indicates clearly that the ideal locus for skill
- 6 development in training principals is the internship phase,
- 7 characterized by opportunities for the principal candidate to work
- 8 closely with a strong mentor for extended portions of the school day
- 9 and year.
- 10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.405
- 11 RCW to read as follows:
- 12 (1) The Washington state principal internship support program is
- 13 hereby created. The purpose of the program is to provide funds to
- 14 school districts to enable employees who are in a principal preparation
- 15 program to complete an internship with a mentor principal.
- 16 (2)(a) Beginning in the 1994-95 school year, a maximum of two
- 17 hundred principal internships shall be funded annually.
- 18 (b) The maximum amount of state funding for each internship shall
- 19 be based on the state-wide average cost of providing a substitute
- 20 teacher for the equivalent of ninety days of instruction, as determined
- 21 by the superintendent of public instruction.
- (c) Funds appropriated for the principal internship support program
- 23 shall be allocated by the superintendent of public instruction to the
- 24 educational service districts based on the percentage of full-time
- 25 equivalent public school students enrolled in school districts in each
- 26 educational service district.
- 27 (d) Once principal internship participants have been selected, the
- 28 educational service districts shall allocate the funds to the
- 29 appropriate school districts. The funds shall be used to pay for
- 30 replacement substitute staff while the school district employee is
- 31 completing the principal internship.
- 32 (e) Educational service districts may be reimbursed for costs
- 33 associated with implementing the program. Reimbursement rates shall be
- 34 determined by the superintendent of public instruction.
- 35 (3) The process for selecting participants in the principal
- 36 internship support program shall be as follows:
- 37 (a) The candidate must be enrolled in a state board-approved
- 38 principal preparation program;

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- 1 (b) The candidate must apply in writing to his or her local school 2 district;
- 3 (c) Each school district shall determine which applicants meet its 4 criteria for participation in the principal internship support program 5 and shall notify in writing its educational service district of the 6 school district's selected applicants. When submitting the names of 7 applicants, the school district shall identify a mentor principal for
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.305 10 RCW to read as follows:

each principal intern applicant.

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- 11 (1) The state board of education shall appoint a principal 12 internship advisory task force to develop and recommend to the board 13 performance-based standards for the principal internship support 14 program. Principal interns must complete all the standards in order to 15 successfully complete the internship program.
- 16 (2) Colleges, universities, and school districts may establish 17 additional standards.
- 18 (3) Task force membership shall include, but is not limited to, 19 persons representing the office of the superintendent of public 20 instruction, principals, school administrators, teachers, school 21 directors, higher education principal preparation programs, and 22 educational service districts.
- 23 (4) The state board shall adopt the standards by rule under chapter 24 34.05 RCW.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.300 RCW to read as follows:
- The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt rules as necessary under chapter 34.05 RCW to administer the principal internship support program. The state superintendent may not allocate funds to the educational service districts before the state board of education has adopted the standards under section 3 of this act.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. The sum of three million four hundred thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is

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- 1 appropriated for the biennium ending June 30, 1995, from the general
- 2 fund to the superintendent of public instruction for the purposes of
- 3 this act.

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
