- 1 AN ACT Relating to juvenile offenders; adding new sections to
- 2 chapter 28A.190 RCW; and creating new sections.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that juvenile crimes
- 5 are increasing significantly and at disproportionate rates in virtually
- 6 every county in Washington regardless of size or location. The
- 7 increasingly serious nature of the crimes these young offenders are
- 8 committing is resulting in a growing number of juvenile offenders being
- 9 committed for longer sentences in our juvenile institutions.
- 10 The legislature intends that, while young offenders are in the
- 11 custody of the department of social and health services, additional
- 12 measures should be used to successfully rehabilitate these young
- 13 offenders and provide them with the opportunity and give them the
- 14 responsibility to become useful and productive members of the
- 15 community.
- 16 The legislature recognizes that prevocational and vocational
- 17 education programs offered in juvenile institutions can provide
- 18 juvenile offenders with marketable work ethics and job skills, and that
- 19 the corresponding increase in self-esteem could facilitate their

- 1 successful reintegration into the community. In addition, meaningful
- 2 juvenile institution work programs can promote the development of job
- 3 readiness and lower the cost of incarceration by producing products and
- 4 services needed within the juvenile institutional system.
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.190
- 6 RCW to read as follows:
- 7 When providing educational programs for residential schools,
- 8 pursuant to RCW 28A.190.030, prevocational and vocational training
- 9 shall be provided by school districts as a regular part of the teaching
- 10 curriculum to residents in the following schools: Echo Glen children's
- 11 center, Green Hill school, Maple Lane school, Mission Creek Youth Camp,
- 12 and Naselle Youth Camp. Work-based learning opportunities, consisting
- 13 of live work, shall be offered in conjunction with the prevocational
- 14 and vocational juvenile rehabilitation education curriculum program in
- 15 all of the above institutions.
- 16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.190
- 17 RCW to read as follows:
- 18 The secretary of the department of social and health services, in
- 19 conjunction with local school districts, may develop vocational and
- 20 prevocational training programs and work-based learning programs in
- 21 accordance with section 2 of this act, with private sector
- 22 organizations, including but not limited to trade unions, trade
- 23 associations, and with appropriate governmental agencies.
- 24 All funds gained by the work-based learning programs shall be
- 25 deposited in a separate department of social and health services fund
- 26 and used by the department of social and health services to offset the
- 27 cost of developing and implementing the prevocational, vocational, and
- 28 work-based learning programs.
- 29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The department of social and health services
- 30 shall review the progress of the juvenile offender prevocational and
- 31 vocational training program and report to the legislature by December
- 32 12, 1995. The report shall also include an assessment of the impact of
- 33 expanding prevocational and vocational training to other juvenile
