- 1 AN ACT Relating to children with severe medical problems; adding a
- 2 new section to chapter 74.09 RCW; and creating a new section.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 The legislature finds that children with NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 5 severe medical problems receive care in hospitals which can exceed one hundred thousand dollars per month. The legislature further finds that 6 the same child can be cared for at a cost of twelve thousand dollars per month at the Ashley House facility in King county, Washington. The 8 legislature further finds that a component of the rapid rise in health 9 10 care costs is unnecessary or inappropriate care provided in hospitals when less high-quality, less-expensive care is available in the 11 12 community. The legislature further finds that the Pediatric Interim 13 Care Facility in King county, Washington was established in 1990 14 through legislative action to also care for children with severe 15 medical needs who do not require hospital care. The legislature further finds that through legislative action children received care in 16 17 a more appropriate and home-like setting and substantial savings were 18 realized by avoiding the inappropriate expenditure of limited state 19 resources.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 74.09 RCW to read as follows:

The department of social and health services shall contract with out-of-home care providers serving children with severe medical problems prospectively to ensure the availability of beds for children in need and to conserve scarce state funds through minimizing the inappropriate and unnecessary care these children currently receive in hospitals when that level of care is unnecessary. The department shall establish appropriate referral procedures to ensure the timely transfer of children with severe medical problems from hospitals to out-of-home service providers licensed for their care.
