- 1 AN ACT Relating to curfews for juveniles; adding a new chapter to
- 2 Title 13 RCW; creating a new section; prescribing penalties; and
- 3 declaring an emergency.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature specifically finds that:
- 6 (1) The related problems of juvenile runaways and juvenile prostitution
- have reached epidemic levels; (2) parents need support in setting
- 8 limits on the unsupervised late night activities of their children; and
- 9 (3) a state-wide curfew would address these areas of concern. The
- 10 adoption of a curfew is intended to protect our state's children from
- 11 others and themselves and is not criminal or punitive in nature.
- 12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** Unless the context clearly requires
- 13 otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout this
- 14 chapter.
- 15 (1) "Direct route" means the shortest path of travel selected to
- 16 reach the destination within an hour of departure without detours or
- 17 additional stops at other destinations along the way.

- 1 (2) "Emergency" means, but is not limited to fire, natural 2 disaster, an automobile accident, or obtaining immediate medical care 3 for the minor or a member of the minor's immediate family.
- 4 (3) "Legal guardian" means a person to whom legal custody of the 5 minor has been given by court order.
 - (4) "Minor" means a person under the age of sixteen years.
- 7 (5) "Operator" means, but is not limited to, an agent or employee 8 having control of the premises open for business.
- 9 (6) "Public place" means a street, alley, highway, park, or plaza, 10 used or open to members of the public or a public building, place of
- 11 business, amusement, or entertainment facility.

- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. No minor shall be in, on, or remain in, or remain on a public place open to the public between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. unless:
- 15 (1) The minor is accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or a 16 person twenty-one years or older who is authorized by the minor's 17 parent or legal guardian to accompany the minor;
- 18 (2) The minor is traveling by direct route to or from a religious 19 activity, political activity, or an event sponsored by a school;
- 20 (3) The minor is in a motor vehicle and engaged in interstate 21 travel with consent of the parent or legal guardian through the state;
- (4) The minor is traveling by direct route to or from his or her place of employment, provided employment shall not mean an activity or business conducted in violation of the laws of the state or its political subdivisions;
- 26 (5) The minor is on the sidewalk of his or her legal residence or 27 on the sidewalk of either next door neighbor; or
- 28 (6) The minor is involved in an emergency concerning his or her 29 safety or welfare or that of his or her family.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. (1) To determine if the minor is in violation of section 3 of this act, law enforcement officers may stop and detain a person they reasonably believe to be a minor to obtain his or her name, age, and the address of his or her parent or legal quardian.
- 35 (2) The law enforcement officer may take a minor in violation of 36 section 3 of this act into protective custody and either deliver or 37 arrange to deliver the minor to the residence of his or her parent or

- 1 legal guardian, or the officer may place the child in an overnight
- 2 youth shelter facility approved by the department of social and health
- 3 services.
- 4 (3) The minor who is placed in an overnight shelter may be released
- 5 to his or her parent or legal guardian at any time, or shall be
- 6 released at 8:00 a.m., unless the staff of the shelter determines that
- 7 the minor meets the conditions set forth in RCW 13.32A.050 or
- 8 13.32A.060(1)(b), in which case the minor shall be transported to a
- 9 designated crisis residential center as provided for in chapter 13.32A
- 10 RCW. A minor who has had a prior placement in an overnight youth
- 11 shelter during the previous twelve months shall not be released at 8:00
- 12 a.m., but shall be released directly to the minor's parent or legal
- 13 guardian.
- 14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** It is unlawful for an owner or operator of
- 15 a premises open for business to permit a minor on the premises in
- 16 violation of section 3 of this act.
- 17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** Violation of section 5 of this act is a
- 18 misdemeanor.
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** If any provision of this act or its
- 20 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
- 21 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
- 22 persons or circumstances is not affected.
- 23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** This act is necessary for the immediate
- 24 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
- 25 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take
- 26 effect immediately.
- 27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 9.** Sections 2 through 7 of this act shall
- 28 constitute a new chapter in Title 13 RCW.
