- 1 AN ACT Relating to fossil collection on state lands; amending RCW
- 2 79.01.651; adding a new section to chapter 43.51 RCW; and adding a new
- 3 section to chapter 77.32 RCW.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 79.01.651 and 1987 c 20 s 15 are each amended to read 6 as follows:
- 7 The department may issue permits for recreational mineral
- 8 prospecting in designated areas containing noneconomic mineral
- 9 deposits. The term of a permit shall not exceed one year. Designated
- 10 areas, equipment allowed, methods of prospecting, as well as other
- 11 appropriate permit conditions, shall be set in rules adopted by the
- 12 department. Fees shall be set by the board of natural resources.
- 13 The department shall administer paleontological resources in areas
- 14 managed by the department in consultation with paleontologists at the
- 15 state museum of natural history to ensure the protection of rare fossil
- 16 resources and their continued availability for enjoyment and research.
- 17 The department may issue permits for fossil collection in designated
- 18 areas managed by the department. It is unlawful to collect fossils in
- 19 designated lands managed by the department without a valid permit. In

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designing a permit system, the department shall distinguish between the 1 categories of recreational, scientific, and commercial fossil 2 collecting. Based on advice by paleontologists regarding the 3 4 scientific value and vulnerability of specific fossil resources, the department may restrict fossil collecting in a designated area to one 5 or more of these three categories. Permits shall be designed to be 6 simple, and the permit process shall not impede the legitimate 7 8 interests of collectors. Designated areas, equipment allowed, 9 collection methods, and other appropriate permit conditions shall be described in rules set forth by the department. The term of a permit 10 shall not exceed one year. Permit fees shall be set by the board of 11 natural resources. In setting fees, the board shall distinguish 12 between fossil collection for recreational, scientific, and commercial 13 14 purposes. Fees charged to commercial fossil collectors shall be higher 15 than fees charged to recreational or scientific fossil collectors and shall reflect the loss of nonrenewable resources. Fees charged to 16 recreational and scientific fossil collectors shall be low enough to 17 18 encourage the study of Washington state fossils by amateur and professional paleontologists. Recreational and scientific fossil 19 20 collectors are urged to designate the state museum of natural history or another appropriate museum or scientific institution in the state as 21 ultimate repository for unique, rare, and scientifically significant 22 fossils collected on state lands. To ensure consistency in the fossil 23 24 collection programs for lands managed by the state, the department and 25 the board of natural resources shall work with the state parks and 26 recreation commission and the department of fish and wildlife, and in consultation with paleontologists at the state museum of natural 27 28 history and the Northwest paleontological society, in setting fees and 29 adopting rules for fossil collection permits.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 43.51 RCW to read as follows:

The state parks and recreation commission shall administer paleontological resources in areas managed by the commission in consultation with paleontologists at the state museum of natural history to ensure the protection of rare fossil resources and their continuing availability for enjoyment and research. The commission may issue permits for fossil collection in designated areas managed by the commission. It is unlawful to collect fossils in designated lands

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managed by the commission without a valid permit. In designing a 1 2 permit system, the commission shall distinguish between the categories of recreational, scientific, and commercial fossil collecting. Based 3 4 on advice by paleontologists regarding the scientific value and vulnerability of specific fossil resources, the commission may restrict 5 fossil collecting in a designated area to one or more of these three 6 7 categories. Permits shall be designed to be simple, and the permit 8 process shall not impede the legitimate interests of collectors. 9 Designated areas, equipment allowed, collection methods, and other 10 appropriate permit conditions shall be described in rules set forth by the commission. The term of a permit shall not exceed one year. 11 Permit fees shall be set by the commission. In setting fees, the 12 13 commission shall distinguish between fossil collection for 14 recreational, scientific, and commercial purposes. Fees charged to 15 commercial fossil collectors shall be higher than fees charged to recreational or scientific fossil collectors and shall reflect the loss 16 17 of nonrenewable resources. Fees charged to recreational and scientific fossil collectors shall be low enough to encourage the study of 18 19 Washington state fossils by amateur and professional paleontologists. 20 Recreational and scientific fossil collectors are urged to designate the state museum of natural history or another appropriate museum or 21 22 scientific institution in the state as ultimate repository for unique, rare, and scientifically significant fossils collected on state lands. 23 24 To ensure consistency in the fossil collection programs for lands 25 managed by the state, the commission shall work with the department of 26 natural resources and the department of fish and wildlife, and in 27 consultation with paleontologists at the state museum of natural history and the Northwest paleontological society, in setting fees and 28 29 adopting rules for fossil collection permits.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 77.32 RCW to read as follows:

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The director of the department of fish and wildlife shall administer paleontological resources in areas managed by the department in consultation with paleontologists at the state museum of natural history to ensure the protection of rare fossil resources and their continuing availability for enjoyment and research. The director may issue permits for fossil collection in designated areas managed by the department. It is unlawful to collect fossils in designated lands

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managed by the department without a valid permit. In designing a 1 permit system, the director shall distinguish between the categories of 2 recreational, scientific, and commercial fossil collecting. 3 4 advice by paleontologists regarding the scientific value vulnerability of specific fossil resources, the director may restrict 5 fossil collecting in a designated area to one or more of these three 6 7 categories. Permits shall be designed to be simple, and the permit 8 process shall not impede the legitimate interests of collectors. 9 Designated areas, equipment allowed, collection methods, and other 10 appropriate permit conditions shall be described in rules set forth by the director. The term of a permit shall not exceed one year. Permit 11 fees shall be set by the director. In setting fees, the director shall 12 distinguish between fossil collection for recreational, scientific, and 13 14 commercial purposes. Fees charged to commercial fossil collectors 15 shall be higher than fees charged to recreational or scientific fossil collectors and shall reflect the loss of nonrenewable resources. Fees 16 charged to recreational and scientific fossil collectors shall be low 17 18 enough to encourage the study of Washington state fossils by amateur 19 and professional paleontologists. Recreational and scientific fossil 20 collectors are urged to designate the state museum of natural history or another appropriate museum or scientific institution in the state as 21 ultimate repository for unique, rare, and scientifically significant 22 fossils collected on state lands. To ensure consistency in the fossil 23 24 collection programs for lands managed by the state, the director shall 25 work with the department of natural resources and the state parks and 26 recreation commission, and in consultation with paleontologists at the 27 state museum of natural history and the Northwest paleontological 28 society, in setting fees and adopting rules for fossil collection 29 permits.

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
