Read first time 02/04/94.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to the development of integrated pesticide
- 2 management programs; amending RCW 70.104.010, 70.104.020, 70.104.030,
- 3 70.104.060, and 70.104.090; adding a new section to chapter 28A.335
- 4 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 27.12 RCW; adding a new section to
- 5 chapter 17.21 RCW; and making appropriations.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 7 **Sec. 1.** RCW 70.104.010 and 1991 c 3 s 356 are each amended to read 8 as follows:
- 9 <u>(1)</u> The department of health has responsibility to protect and
- 10 enhance the public health and welfare. As a consequence, it must be
- 11 concerned with both natural and artificial environmental factors which
- 12 may adversely affect the public health and welfare. Dangers to the
- 13 public health and welfare related to the use of pesticides require
- 14 specific legislative recognition of departmental authority and
- 15 responsibility in this area.
- 16 (2) To protect children and adults from unnecessary or
- 17 <u>inappropriate pesticide exposure in public schools and libraries, the</u>
- 18 <u>department of health has a responsibility to provide a model for</u>
- 19 developing integrated pest management programs in these areas.

- 1 Sec. 2. RCW 70.104.020 and 1971 ex.s. c 41 s 2 are each amended to 2 read as follows:
- 3 ((For the purposes of this chapter pesticide means, but is not
  4 limited to:
- 5 (1)) The words and phrases defined in this section shall have the 6 meanings indicated when used in this chapter unless the context clearly
- 7 <u>requires otherwise</u>.
- 8 (1) "Department" means the department of health.
- 9 (2) "Integrated pest management" means the selection and
- 10 implementation of the pest control strategy least hazardous to human
- 11 health and the environment, that is a long-term ecologically based
- 12 systems approach to controlling pest populations utilizing a needs
- 13 <u>assessment based on decision-making criteria</u>. <u>Integrated pest</u>
- 14 management maximizes reliance on natural pest controls. Integrated
- 15 pest management consists of:
- 16 <u>(a) Prevention of pest problems;</u>
- (b) Monitoring and evaluation of pests, damage, and results of
- 18 <u>treatment;</u>
- 19 <u>(c) Acknowledgement of population levels of pests that can be</u>
- 20 tolerated based on legal, economic, health, or aesthetic thresholds;
- 21 (d) Use of natural control agents in an ecosystem;
- 22 (e) Reliance to the maximum extent possible on nonhazardous
- 23 biological, mechanical, and cultural treatment of pests;
- 24 (f) Application of pesticides in a manner that minimizes damage to
- 25 the ecosystem's natural controls and integrity;
- 26 (g) Use of least toxic pesticides only after other methods have
- 27 <u>been evaluated; and</u>
- 28 (h) Selection of treatment methods that are most cost-effective in
- 29 the short and long-term.
- 30 (3) "Library" means a free public library supported in whole or in
- 31 part with money derived from taxation.
- 32 (4) "Pesticide" includes:
- 33 (a) Any substance or mixture of substances intended to prevent,
- 34 destroy, control, repel, or mitigate any insect, rodent, nematode,
- 35 snail, slug, fungus, weed and any other form of plant or animal life or
- 36 virus, except virus on or in living man or other animal, which is
- 37 normally considered to be a pest or which the director of agriculture
- 38 may declare to be a pest but not substances normally considered to be
- 39 <u>disinfectants</u>, such as common cleaning products; or

- 1  $((\frac{2}{2}))$  (b) Any substance or mixture of substances intended to be used as a plant regulator, defoliant or desiccant; or
- ((\(\frac{(3)}{)}\)) (c) Any spray adjuvant, such as a wetting agent, spreading agent, deposit builder, adhesive, emulsifying agent, deflocculating agent, water modifier, or similar agent with or without toxic properties of its own intended to be used with any other pesticide as an aid to the application or effect thereof, and sold in a package or container separate from that of the pesticide with which it is to be used; or
- 10  $((\frac{4}{}))$  (d) Any fungicide, rodenticide, herbicide, insecticide, and 11 nematocide.
- 12 <u>(5) "Public schools" shall have the definition under RCW</u> 13 <u>28A.150.010.</u>
- 14 **Sec. 3.** RCW 70.104.030 and 1991 c 3 s 357 are each amended to read 15 as follows:
- (1) The department of health shall investigate all suspected human cases of pesticide poisoning and such cases of suspected pesticide poisoning of animals that may relate to human illness. The department shall establish time periods by rule to determine investigation response time. Time periods shall range from immediate to forty-eight hours to initiate an investigation, depending on the severity of the case or suspected case of pesticide poisoning.
- In order to adequately investigate such cases, the department shall have the power to:
- (a) Take all necessary samples and human or animal tissue specimens for diagnostic purposes: PROVIDED, That tissue, if taken from a living human, shall be taken from a living human only with the consent of a person legally qualified to give such consent;
- (b) Secure any and all such information as may be necessary to adequately determine the nature and causes of any case of pesticide poisoning.
- 32 (2) The department shall, by rule adopted pursuant to the 33 Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW, with due notice and a 34 hearing for the adoption of permanent rules, establish procedures for 35 the prevention of any recurrence of poisoning and the department shall 36 immediately notify the department of agriculture, the department of 37 labor and industries, and other appropriate agencies of the results of 38 its investigation for such action as the other departments or agencies

- deem appropriate. The notification of such investigations and their results may include recommendations for further action by the appropriate department or agency.
- (3) The department shall develop a model integrated pest management 4 program to be adapted on a site-specific basis, in whole or in part, by 5 public school districts and libraries. The department shall consult 6 7 with the United States environmental protection agency, the center for 8 sustaining agriculture and natural resources of the Washington State 9 University, the Washington State University cooperative extension service, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the 10 state board of health, the department of agriculture, other agencies 11 with expertise in this area, and interested members of the public with 12 expertise in this area in the development of the model program. On or 13 before June 30, 1997, each public school district and each library 14 shall adopt an integrated pest management program, based on the model 15 developed by the department, to protect children and adults from 16 17 unnecessary or inappropriate pesticide exposure.
- 18 <u>(4) The department shall coordinate with any entity listed in</u>
  19 <u>subsection (3) of this section to provide technical assistance to all</u>
  20 <u>public school districts and libraries in the adoption of integrated</u>
  21 <u>pest management programs.</u>
- 22 <u>(5) Nothing in chapter . . ., Laws of 1994 (this act) affects</u>
  23 <u>existing authority of local health officers or the department to</u>
  24 protect public health.
- 25 **Sec. 4.** RCW 70.104.060 and 1991 c 3 s 362 are each amended to read 26 as follows:
- 27 In order effectively to prevent human illness due to pesticides and to carry out the requirements of this chapter, the department of health 28 29 authorized to provide technical assistance and consultation regarding health effects of pesticides to physicians, public schools, 30 libraries, and other agencies, and is authorized to operate an 31 analytical chemical laboratory and may provide analytical 32 33 laboratory services to physicians and other agencies to determine 34 pesticide levels in human and other tissues, and appropriate
- 35 environmental samples.
- 36 **Sec. 5.** RCW 70.104.090 and 1991 c 3 s 364 are each amended to read 37 as follows:

The responsibilities of the review panel shall include, but not be 1 2 limited to:

3 (1) Establishing guidelines for centralizing the receipt of 4 information relating to actual or alleged health and environmental incidents involving pesticides;

- (2) Reviewing and making recommendations for procedures for 6 7 investigation of pesticide incidents, which shall be implemented by the appropriate agency unless a written statement providing the reasons for 8 9 not adopting the recommendations is provided to the review panel;
- 10 (3) Monitoring the time periods required for response to reports of 11 pesticide incidents by the departments of agriculture, health, and labor and industries; 12
- (4) At the request of the chair or any panel member, reviewing 13 pesticide incidents of unusual complexity or those that cannot be 14 15 resolved;
- 16 (5) Identifying inadequacies in state and/or federal law that 17 result in insufficient protection of public health and safety, with specific attention to advising the appropriate agencies on the adequacy 18 19 of pesticide reentry intervals established by the federal environmental 20 protection agency and registered pesticide labels to protect the health and safety of farmworkers. The panel shall establish a priority list 21 22 for reviewing reentry intervals, which considers the following 23 criteria:
- 24 (a) Whether the pesticide is being widely used in labor-intensive 25 agriculture in Washington;
- 26 (b) Whether another state has established a reentry interval for 27 the pesticide that is longer than the existing federal reentry interval; 28
  - (c) The toxicity category of the pesticide under federal law;
  - (d) Whether the pesticide has been identified by a federal or state agency or through a scientific review as presenting a risk of cancer, birth defects, genetic damage, neurological effects, blood disorders, sterility, menstrual dysfunction, organ damage, or other chronic or subchronic effects; and
- 35 (e) Whether reports or complaints of ill effects from the pesticide have been filed following worker entry into fields to which the 36 pesticide has been applied; and 37
- (6) Reviewing and approving an annual report prepared by the 38 department of health to the governor, agency heads, and members of the 39

- 2 include, at a minimum:
- 3 (a) A summary of the year's activities;
- 4 (b) A synopsis of the cases reviewed;
- 5 (c) A separate descriptive listing of each case in which adverse

- 7 (d) A tabulation of the data from each case;
- 8 (e) An assessment of the effects of pesticide exposure in the 9 workplace;
  - (f) The identification of trends, issues, and needs; and
- 11 (g) Any recommendations for improved pesticide use practices.
- 12 (7) Reviewing and making recommendations on model programs
- 13 developed by the department for implementation of integrated pest
- 14 management programs by public school districts and libraries.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.335
- 16 RCW to read as follows:

- Within three years of the completion of the model program developed
- 18 under RCW 70.104.030 by the department of health, each school district
- 19 board of directors shall adopt an integrated pest management program to
- 20 protect children and adults from unnecessary or inappropriate pesticide
- 21 exposure in schools. The board may form an advisory committee to
- 22 assist in developing the integrated pest management program, and shall
- 23 hold a public hearing on the draft program.
- 24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** A new section is added to chapter 27.12 RCW
- 25 to read as follows:
- 26 Within three years of the completion of the model program developed
- 27 under RCW 70.104.030 by the department of health, the board of trustees
- 28 of a library or library district shall adopt an integrated pest
- 29 management program to protect children and adults from unnecessary or
- 30 inappropriate pesticide exposure in libraries. The board may form an
- 31 advisory committee to assist in developing the integrated pest
- 32 management program, and shall hold a public hearing on the draft
- 33 program.
- 34 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** A new section is added to chapter 17.21 RCW
- 35 to read as follows:

- Nothing in chapter . . ., Laws of 1994 (this act) shall affect the powers, authority, or rules of the department of agriculture for pest control on agricultural lands adopted pursuant to this chapter.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. The sum of one hundred seventy-five thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the biennium ending June 30, 1995, from the general fund to the department of health for the purposes of this act.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 10.** The sum of seventy-five thousand dollars, 9 or as much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the 10 biennium ending June 30, 1995, from the general fund to the Washington 11 State University cooperative extension service for the purposes of this 12 act.
