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## ENGROSSED SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2850

State of Washington 53rd Legislature 1994 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to education; amending RCW 28A.300.138,
- 2 28A.650.015, 28A.630.952, 28A.170.060, 28A.175.070, 28A.230.070,
- 3 28A.300.150, 28A.150.230, and 28A.150.210; amending 1993 c 336 s 704
- 4 (uncodified); amending 1993 c 336 s 1007 (uncodified); repealing RCW
- 5 28A.300.140, 28A.610.060, and 28A.615.050; providing an effective date;
- 6 and providing an expiration date.
- 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 8 **Sec. 1.** RCW 28A.300.138 and 1993 c 336 s 301 are each amended to 9 read as follows:
- 10 (1) To the extent funds are appropriated, the office of the
- 11 superintendent of public instruction shall provide student learning
- 12 improvement grants for the 1994-95 through 1996-97 school years. The
- 13 purpose of the grants is to provide funds for additional time and
- 14 resources for staff development and planning intended to improve
- 15 student learning for all students, including students with diverse
- 16 needs, consistent with the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210.
- 17 (2) To be eligible for student learning improvement grants, school
- 18 district boards of directors shall:

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- 1 (a) Adopt a policy regarding the sharing of instructional decisions 2 with school staff, parents, and community members;
- 3 (b) Submit school-based applications that have been developed by 4 school building personnel, parents, and community members. Each 5 application shall:
- 6 (i) Enumerate specific activities to be carried out as part of the 7 grant;
- 8 (ii) Identify the technical resources desired and availability of 9 those resources;
  - (iii) Include a proposed budget; and

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- 11 (iv) Indicate that the application was approved by the school 12 principal and representatives of teachers, parents, and the community.
- 13 (3) The school board shall conduct at least one public hearing on schools' plans for using the grants before the board approves the plans. Boards may hear and approve more than one school's plan at a hearing. The board shall only submit applications for grants to the superintendent of public instruction if the board has approved the plans.
- 19 (4) If the requirements of subsections (2) and (3) of this section 20 are met, the superintendent of public instruction shall approve the 21 grant application.
- (5) To the extent funds are appropriated, and for allocation 22 purposes only, the amount of grants for the 1994-95 school year shall 23 24 be based on time equivalent to no fewer than three days and not more 25 than five days depending upon the number of grant applications received 26 and on the number of full-time equivalent certificated staff((7 27 classified instructional aides, and classified secretaries)) who work in the school at the time of application. Funds from the grant may be 28 used to pay for planning and staff development for certificated and 29 classified staff, and for other activities consistent with the purpose 30 of the grant program. For the 1995-96 and 1996-97 school years, the 31 equivalent of five days annually shall be ((provided)) allocated. 32 Activities conducted pursuant to this section also may be conducted 33 34 during the months of July and August preceding each school year for 35 which the school has received a grant. Expenses incurred as a result of these summer activities may be paid from the following school year 36 ((The allocation per full-time equivalent staff shall be 37 determined in the biennial operating appropriations act.)) 38 districts shall use all funds received under this section solely for 39

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- 1 grants to schools and shall not use any portion of the funds for 2 indirect costs.
- 3 (6) The state schools for the deaf and blind may apply for grants 4 under this section.
- (7) The superintendent of public instruction shall adopt timelines 5 and rules as necessary under chapter 34.05 RCW to administer the 6 7 The superintendent may modify application requirements for 8 schools that have schools for the twenty-first century projects under 9 RCW 28A.630.100. A copy of the proposed rules shall be submitted to 10 the joint select committee on education restructuring established in RCW 28A.630.950 at least forty-five days prior to adoption of the 11 12 rules.
- 13 (8) Funding under this section shall not become a part of the 14 state's basic program of education obligation as set forth under 15 Article IX of the state Constitution.
- 16 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.650.015 and 1993 c 336 s 703 are each amended to 17 read as follows:
- 18 (1) The superintendent of public instruction, to the extent funds 19 are appropriated, shall develop and implement a Washington state K-12 education technology plan. The technology plan, which shall be 20 completed by ((December 15, 1993)) September 1, 1994, and updated on at 21 22 least a biennial basis, shall be developed to coordinate and expand the 23 use of education technology in the common schools of the state. 24 plan shall be consistent with applicable provisions of chapter 43.105 25 RCW. The plan, at a minimum, shall address:
- 26 (a) The provision of technical assistance to schools and school 27 districts for the planning, implementation, and training of staff in 28 the use of technology in curricular and administrative functions;
- 29 (b) The continued development of a network to connect school 30 districts, institutions of higher learning, and other sources of on-31 line information; and
- 32 (c) Methods to equitably increase the use of education technology 33 by students and school personnel throughout the state.
- 34 (2) The superintendent of public instruction shall appoint an 35 educational technology advisory committee to assist in the development 36 and implementation of the technology plan in subsection (1) of this 37 section. The committee shall include, but is not limited to, persons 38 representing: The state board of education, the commission on student

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- 1 learning, the department of information services, educational service
- 2 districts, school directors, school administrators, school principals,
- 3 teachers, classified staff, higher education faculty, parents,
- 4 students, business, labor, scientists and mathematicians, the higher
- 5 education coordinating board, the work force training and education
- 6 coordinating board, and the state library.
- 7 **Sec. 3.** 1993 c 336 s 704 (uncodified) is amended to read as 8 follows:
- 9 In conjunction with the plan required in section 703 of this act,
- 10 the superintendent of public instruction shall prepare recommendations
- 11 to the legislature regarding the development of a grant program for
- 12 school districts for the purchase and installation of computers,
- 13 computer software, telephones, and other types of education technology.
- 14 The recommendations shall address methods to ensure equitable access to
- 15 technology by students throughout the state, and methods to ensure that
- 16 school districts have prepared technology implementation plans before
- 17 applying for grant funds. The recommendations, with proposed
- 18 legislation, shall be submitted to the appropriate committees of the
- 19 legislature by ((December 15, 1993)) September 1, 1994.
- 20 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28A.630.952 and 1993 c 336 s 1003 are each amended to 21 read as follows:
- 22 (1) In addition to the duties in RCW 28A.630.951, the joint select
- 23 committee on education restructuring shall review all laws pertaining
- 24 to K-12 public education and to educator preparation and
- 25 certification((, except those that protect the health, safety, and
- 26 civil rights of students and staff,)) with the intent of identifying
- 27 laws that inhibit the achievement of the new system of performance-
- 28 based education. The select committee shall report to the legislature
- 29 by November 15, 1994. The laws pertaining to home schooling and
- 30 private schools shall not be reviewed in this study.
- 31 (2) The joint select committee on education restructuring shall
- 32 review current school district data reporting requirements for the
- 33 purposes of accountability and meeting state information needs. The
- 34 joint select committee shall report to the legislature by January 1995
- 35 on:
- 36 (a) What data is necessary to compare how school districts are
- 37 performing before the essential academic learning requirements and the

- 1 assessment system are implemented with how school districts are
- 2 performing after the essential academic learning requirements and the
- 3 assessment system are implemented; and
- 4 (b) What data is necessary pertaining to school district reports
- 5 under the accountability systems developed by the commission on student
- 6 learning under RCW 28A.630.885(3)(h).
- 7 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28A.170.060 and 1989 c 271 s 113 are each amended to 8 read as follows:
- 9 The superintendent of public instruction((, through the state
- 10 clearinghouse for education information,)) shall collect and
- 11 disseminate to all school districts and other interested parties
- 12 information about effective substance abuse programs and the penalties
- 13 for manufacturing, selling, delivering, or possessing controlled
- 14 substances on or within one thousand feet of a school or school bus
- 15 route stop under RCW 69.50.435 and distributing a controlled substance
- 16 to a person under the age of eighteen under RCW 69.50.406.
- 17 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28A.175.070 and 1987 c 518 s 219 are each amended to
- 18 read as follows:
- The superintendent of public instruction((<del>, through the state</del>
- 20 clearinghouse for education information,)) shall collect and
- 21 disseminate to all school districts and other interested parties
- 22 information about effective student motivation, retention, and
- 23 retrieval programs.
- 24 Sec. 7. RCW 28A.230.070 and 1988 c 206 s 402 are each amended to
- 25 read as follows:
- 26 (1) The life-threatening dangers of acquired immunodeficiency
- 27 syndrome (AIDS) and its prevention shall be taught in the public
- 28 schools of this state. AIDS prevention education shall be limited to
- 29 the discussion of the life-threatening dangers of the disease, its
- 30 spread, and prevention. Students shall receive such education at least
- 31 once each school year beginning no later than the fifth grade.
- 32 (2) Each district board of directors shall adopt an AIDS prevention
- 33 education program which is developed in consultation with teachers,
- 34 administrators, parents, and other community members including, but not
- 35 limited to, persons from medical, public health, and mental health
- 36 organizations and agencies so long as the curricula and materials

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developed for use in the AIDS education program either (a) are the 1 2 model curricula and resources under subsection (3) of this section, or (b) are developed by the school district and approved for medical 3 4 accuracy by the office on AIDS established in RCW 70.24.250. 5 district elects to use curricula developed by the school district, the district shall submit to the office on AIDS a copy of its curricula and 6 7 an affidavit of medical accuracy stating that the material in the 8 district-developed curricula has been compared to the model curricula 9 for medical accuracy and that in the opinion of the district the 10 district-developed materials are medically accurate. Upon submission of the affidavit and curricula, the district may use these materials 11 until the approval procedure to be conducted by the office of AIDS has 12 13 been completed.

- (3) Model curricula and other resources available from the superintendent of public instruction ((through the state clearinghouse for educational information)) may be reviewed by the school district board of directors, in addition to materials designed locally, in developing the district's AIDS education program. The model curricula shall be reviewed for medical accuracy by the office on AIDS established in RCW 70.24.250 within the department of social and health services.
- (4) Each school district shall, at least one month before teaching AIDS prevention education in any classroom, conduct at least one presentation during weekend and evening hours for the parents and guardians of students concerning the curricula and materials that will be used for such education. The parents and guardians shall be notified by the school district of the presentation and that the curricula and materials are available for inspection. No student may be required to participate in AIDS prevention education if the student's parent or guardian, having attended one of the district presentations, objects in writing to the participation.
- 32 (5) The office of the superintendent of public instruction with the 33 assistance of the office on AIDS shall update AIDS education curriculum 34 material as newly discovered medical facts make it necessary.
- 35 (6) The curriculum for AIDS prevention education shall be designed 36 to teach students which behaviors place a person dangerously at risk of 37 infection with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) and methods to 38 avoid such risk including, at least:

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1 (a) The dangers of drug abuse, especially that involving the use of 2 hypodermic needles; and

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- (b) The dangers of sexual intercourse, with or without condoms.
- 4 (7) The program of AIDS prevention education shall stress the lifethreatening dangers of contracting AIDS and shall stress that 5 abstinence from sexual activity is the only certain means for the 6 7 prevention of the spread or contraction of the AIDS virus through 8 sexual contact. It shall also teach that condoms and other artificial 9 means of birth control are not a certain means of preventing the spread 10 of the AIDS virus and reliance on condoms puts a person at risk for exposure to the disease. 11
- 12 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28A.300.150 and 1987 c 489 s 2 are each amended to 13 read as follows:
- The superintendent of public instruction shall collect and disseminate to school districts information on child abuse and neglect prevention curriculum ((through the state clearinghouse for education information)). The superintendent of public instruction and the departments of social and health services and community, trade, and economic development shall share relevant information.
- 20 **Sec. 9.** RCW 28A.150.230 and 1991 c 61 s 1 are each amended to read 21 as follows:
- 22 (1) It is the intent and purpose of this section to guarantee that 23 each common school district board of directors, whether or not acting 24 through its respective administrative staff, be held accountable for the proper operation of their district to the local community and its 25 electorate. In accordance with the provisions of Title 28A RCW, as now 26 27 or hereafter amended, each common school district board of directors 28 shall be vested with the final responsibility for the setting of 29 policies ensuring quality in the content and extent of its educational program and that such program provide students with the opportunity to 30 achieve those skills which are generally recognized as requisite to 31 32 learning.
- 33 (2) In conformance with the provisions of Title 28A RCW, as now or 34 hereafter amended, it shall be the responsibility of each common school 35 district board of directors to adopt policies to:

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- 1 (a) Establish performance criteria and an evaluation process for 2 its certificated personnel, including administrative staff, and for all 3 programs constituting a part of such district's curriculum;
  - (b) Determine the final assignment of staff, certificated or classified, according to board enumerated classroom and program needs;
  - (c) Determine the amount of instructional hours necessary for any student to acquire a quality education in such district, in not less than an amount otherwise required in RCW 28A.150.220, or rules and regulations of the state board of education;
- 10 (d) Determine the allocation of staff time, whether certificated or 11 classified;
- (e) Establish final curriculum standards consistent with law and rules and regulations of the state board of education, relevant to the particular needs of district students or the unusual characteristics of the district, and ensuring a quality education for each student in the district; and
- (f) Evaluate teaching materials, including text books, teaching aids, handouts, or other printed material, in public hearing upon complaint by parents, guardians or custodians of students who consider dissemination of such material to students objectionable.
  - (((3) In keeping with the accountability purpose expressed in this section and to insure that the local community and electorate have access to information on the educational programs in the school districts, each school district's board of directors shall annually publish a descriptive guide to the district's common schools. This guide shall be made available at each school in the district for examination by the public. The guide shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
- 29 (a) Criteria used for written evaluations of staff members pursuant 30 to RCW 28A.405.100;
- 31 (b) A summary of program objectives pursuant to RCW 28A.320.210;
- 32 (c) Results of comparable testing for all schools within the 33 district; and
- 34 (d) Budget information which will include the following:
- 35 (i) Student enrollment;

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(ii) Number of full time equivalent personnel per school in the district itemized according to classroom teachers, instructional support, and building administration and support services, including itemization of such personnel by program;

- (iii) Number of full time equivalent personnel assigned in the district to central administrative offices, itemized according to instructional support, building and central administration, and support services, including itemization of such personnel by program;
- 5 (iv) Total number of full time equivalent personnel itemized by 6 classroom teachers, instructional support, building and central 7 administration, and support services, including itemization of such 8 personnel by program; and
- 9 (v) Special levy budget request presented by program and
  10 expenditure for purposes over and above those requirements identified
  11 in RCW 28A.150.220.))
- 12 **Sec. 10.** RCW 28A.150.210 and 1993 c 336 s 101 are each amended to 13 read as follows:
- 14 <u>(1)</u> The goal of the Basic Education Act for the schools of the 15 state of Washington set forth in this chapter shall be to provide 16 students with the opportunity to become responsible citizens, to 17 contribute to their own economic well-being and to that of their 18 families and communities, and to enjoy productive and satisfying lives.
- Certain basic values and character traits are integral to achieving
  student learning goals and it is important that they be integrated
  throughout kindergarten through grade twelve curriculum and instruction
  as determined by consensus at the local level. While these basic
  values and character traits are not measurable as essential learning
  requirements or standards for graduation, they are essential for
  attaining individual liberty, fulfillment and happiness.
- 26 These basic values and character traits include the importance of:
- 27 (a) Honesty, integrity and trust;
- 28 (b) Respect for self and others;
- 29 <u>(c) Responsibility for personal actions and commitments;</u>
- 30 (d) Self-discipline and moderation;
- 31 (e) Diligence and a positive work ethic;
- 32 (f) Respect for law and authority;
- 33 (q) Healthy and constructive behavior; and
- (h) Family as the basis of society.
- 35 (2) To these ends, the goals of each school district, with the 36 involvement of parents and community members, shall be to provide 37 opportunities for all students to develop the knowledge and skills 38 essential to:

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- 1  $((\frac{1}{1}))$  (a) Read with comprehension, write with skill, and
- $2\,$  communicate effectively and responsibly in a variety of ways and
- 3 settings;
- 4  $((\frac{2}{2}))$  (b) Know and apply the core concepts and principles of
- 5 mathematics; social, physical, and life sciences; civics and history;
- 6 geography; arts; and health and fitness;
- 7 (((3))) (c) Think analytically, logically, and creatively, and to
- 8 integrate experience and knowledge to form reasoned judgments and solve
- 9 problems; and
- 10  $((\frac{4}{1}))$  (d) Understand the importance of work and how performance,
- 11 effort, and decisions directly affect future career and educational
- 12 opportunities.
- 13 Sec. 11. 1993 c 336 s 1007 (uncodified) is amended to read as
- 14 follows:
- 15 (1) A legislative fiscal study committee is hereby created. The
- 16 committee shall be comprised of three members from each caucus of the
- 17 senate, appointed by the president of the senate, and three members
- 18 from each caucus of the house of representatives, appointed by the
- 19 speaker of the house of representatives. In consultation with the
- 20 office of the superintendent of public instruction, the committee shall
- 21 study the common school funding system.
- 22 (2) By ((<del>January 16</del>)) <u>December 15</u>, 1995, the committee shall report
- 23 to the full legislature on its findings and any recommendations for a
- 24 new funding model for the common school system.
- 25 (3) This section shall expire ((<del>January 16</del>)) <u>December 31</u>, 1995.
- 26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 12.** The following acts or parts of acts are
- 27 each repealed:
- 28 (1) RCW 28A.300.140 and 1990 c 33 s 256 & 1987 c 119 s 1;
- 29 (2) RCW 28A.610.060 and 1987 c 518 s 109; and
- 30 (3) RCW 28A.615.050 and 1987 c 518 s 305.
- 31 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 13.** Section 10 of this act shall take effect
- 32 September 1, 1994.
