- AN ACT Relating to local government; amending RCW 14.08.304, 1 2 17.10.050, 17.28.140, 27.12.190, 28A.315.540, 28A.320.050, 35.17.108, 3 35.18.220, 35.22.200, 35.22.205, 35.23.220, 35.24.090, 35.27.130, 35.58.160, 35.61.150, 35.82.040, 35A.12.070, 35A.13.040, 36.62.200, 4 5 36.69.110, 36.70.310, 41.04.180, 43.52.374, 52.14.010, 53.08.170, 53.08.175, 53.08.176, 53.12.260, 54.12.080, 56.08.100, 56.12.010, 6 7 57.08.100, 57.12.010, 68.52.220, 70.44.050, 70.94.130, 70.94.240, 8 85.05.410, 85.06.380, 85.08.320, 85.24.080, 86.09.283, 87.03.160, 87.03.460, 89.08.200, and 89.30.298; reenacting and amending RCW 9 28A.400.350; adding a new section to chapter 17.04 RCW; adding a new 10 section to chapter 17.06 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 35.21 RCW; 11 12 adding a new section to chapter 35A.21 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 35.63 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 36.17 RCW; and 13 14 adding new sections to chapter 36.100 RCW.
- 15 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 16 **Sec. 1.** RCW 14.08.304 and 1979 ex.s. c 126 s 3 are each amended to 17 read as follows:
- 18 The board of airport district commissioners shall consist of three
- 19 members, who ((shall each be a)) are registered voters and ((actually))

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a)) residents of the district. The first commissioners shall be appointed by the county legislative authority. At the next general 2 district election, held as provided in RCW 29.13.020, three airport 3 4 district commissioners shall be elected. The term of office of airport district commissioners shall be two years, or until their successors 5 are elected and qualified and have assumed office in accordance with 6 7 RCW 29.04.170. Members of the board of airport district commissioners 8 shall be elected at each regular general election on a nonpartisan 9 basis. ((They shall be nominated by petition of ten registered voters 10 of the district.)) Vacancies on the board of airport district commissioners shall be filled by appointment by the remaining 11 commissioners. Members of the board of airport district commissioners 12 shall receive no compensation for their services, but ((shall be 13 reimbursed for actual necessary traveling and sustenance expenses 14 15 incurred while engaged on official business)) are entitled to 16 reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away 17 from each member's place of residence, and mileage for use of a 18 19 privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 17.04 RCW to read as follows:

22 The directors of a weed district shall receive no compensation for 23 their services, except that a director who is appointed to act as 24 secretary may be compensated in accordance with RCW 17.04.070. 25 directors are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including 26 27 subsistence and lodging while away from each director's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in 28 29 accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 17.06 RCW to read as follows:

The directors of an intercounty weed district shall receive no compensation for their services, except that a director who is appointed to act as secretary may be compensated in accordance with RCW 17.06.050. The directors are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away from each director's place

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of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.

3 **Sec. 4.** RCW 17.10.050 and 1987 c 438 s 4 are each amended to read 4 as follows:

- 5 (1) Each activated county noxious weed control board shall consist of five voting members ((who shall be)) appointed by the county 6 7 legislative authority. In appointing such voting members, the county legislative authority shall divide the county into five sections, none 8 9 of which shall overlap and each of which shall be of the same approximate area, and shall appoint a voting member from each section. 10 At least four of the voting members shall be engaged in the primary 11 12 production of agricultural products. There shall be one nonvoting member on such board who shall be the chief county extension agent or 13 14 an extension agent appointed by the chief county extension agent. Each 15 voting member of the board shall serve a term of four years, except 16 that the county legislative authority shall, when a board is first activated under this chapter, designate two voting members to serve 17 18 terms of two years. The board members shall not receive a salary but 19 ((shall be compensated for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties)) are entitled to 20 reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection 21 with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away 22 23 from each member's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW. 24
 - (2) The voting members of the board shall represent the same sections designated by the county legislative authority in appointing members to the board at its inception and shall serve until their replacements are appointed. New members of the board shall be appointed at least thirty days prior to the expiration of any board member's term of office.

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Notice of expiration of a term of office shall be published at least twice in a weekly or daily newspaper of general circulation in ((said)) the section with last publication occurring at least ten days prior to the nomination. All persons interested in appointment to the board and residing in the section with a pending nomination shall make a written application ((that includes the signatures of at least ten registered voters residing in the section supporting the nomination)) to the county noxious weed control board. After nominations close, the

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- 1 county noxious weed control board shall, after a hearing, send the
- 2 applications to the county legislative authority recommending the names
- 3 of the most qualified candidates, and shall post the names of those
- 4 nominees in the county courthouse and in three places in the section.
- 5 The county legislative authority, within ten days of receiving the list
- 6 of nominees, shall appoint one of those nominees to the county noxious
- 7 weed control board to represent that section during that term of
- 8 office.
- 9 (3) Within thirty days after all the members have been appointed,
- 10 the board shall conduct its first meeting. A majority of the voting
- 11 members of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of
- 12 business and shall be necessary for any action taken by the board. The
- 13 board shall elect from its members a chairperson and such other
- 14 officers as may be necessary.
- 15 (4) In case of a vacancy occurring in any voting position on a
- 16 county noxious weed control board, the county legislative authority of
- 17 the county in which such board is located shall appoint a qualified
- 18 person to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.
- 19 **Sec. 5.** RCW 17.28.140 and 1957 c 153 s 14 are each amended to read
- 20 as follows:
- 21 The members of the first district board shall meet on the first
- 22 Monday subsequent to thirty days after the filing with the secretary of
- 23 state of the certificate of incorporation of the district. They shall
- 24 organize by the election of one of their members as president and one
- 25 as secretary.
- The members of the district board shall serve without compensation;
- 27 but the ((necessary expenses of each member for actual traveling in
- 28 connection with meetings or business of the board may be allowed and
- 29 paid)) members are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses
- 30 actually incurred in connection with official business, including
- 31 subsistence and lodging while away from each member's place of
- 32 residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in
- 33 accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.
- 34 The secretary shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by
- 35 the district board.
- 36 Sec. 6. RCW 27.12.190 and 1982 c 123 s 8 are each amended to read
- 37 as follows:

The management and control of a library shall be vested in a board 1 of either five or seven trustees as hereinafter in this section 2 provided. In cities and towns five trustees shall be appointed by the 3 4 mayor with the consent of the legislative body. In counties, rural county library districts, and island library districts, five trustees 5 shall be appointed by the board of county commissioners. In a regional 6 7 library district a board of either five or seven trustees shall be 8 appointed by the joint action of the legislative bodies concerned. 9 intercounty rural library districts a board of either five or seven 10 trustees shall be appointed by the joint action of the boards of county commissioners of each of the counties included in a district. 11 first appointments for boards comprised of but five trustees shall be 12 for terms of one, two, three, four, and five years respectively, and 13 thereafter a trustee shall be appointed annually to serve for five 14 15 The first appointments for boards comprised of seven trustees 16 shall be for terms of one, two, three, four, five, six, and seven years 17 respectively, and thereafter a trustee shall be appointed annually to serve for seven years. No person shall be appointed to any board of 18 19 trustees for more than two consecutive terms. Vacancies shall be 20 filled for unexpired terms as soon as possible in the manner in which members of the board are regularly chosen. 21

A library trustee shall not receive a salary or other compensation for services as trustee, but ((necessary expenses actually incurred shall be paid from the library funds)) trustees are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away from each trustee's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.

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29 A library trustee in the case of a city or town may be removed only 30 by vote of the legislative body. A trustee of a county library, a rural county library district library, or an island library district 31 library may be removed for just cause by the county commissioners after 32 33 a public hearing upon a written complaint stating the ground for 34 removal, which complaint, with a notice of the time and place of hearing, shall have been served upon the trustee at least fifteen days 35 before the hearing. A trustee of an intercounty rural library district 36 37 may be removed by the joint action of the board of county commissioners of the counties involved in the same manner as provided herein for the 38 39 removal of a trustee of a county library.

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Sec. 7. RCW 28A.315.540 and 1987 c 307 s 2 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

Each member of the board of directors of a school district may receive compensation of ((fifty)) sixty-six dollars per day or portion thereof for attending board meetings and for performing other services on behalf of the school district, not to exceed ((four)) six thousand ((eight)) three hundred fifty dollars per year, if the district board of directors has authorized by board resolution, at a regularly scheduled meeting, the provision of such compensation. A board of directors of a school district may authorize such compensation only from locally collected excess levy funds available for that purpose, and compensation for board members shall not cause the state to incur any present or future funding obligation.

Any director may waive all or any portion of his or her compensation under this section as to any month or months during his or her term of office, by a written waiver filed with the district as provided in this section. The waiver, to be effective, must be filed any time after the director's election and before the date on which the compensation would otherwise be paid. The waiver shall specify the month or period of months for which it is made.

21 The compensation provided in this section shall be in addition to 22 any reimbursement for expenses paid to such directors by the school 23 district.

Sec. 8. RCW 28A.320.050 and 1977 c 73 s 1 are each amended to read 25 as follows:

((The actual expenses of)) School directors ((in going to, returning from and attending upon directors' meetings or other meetings called or held pursuant to statute shall be paid)) are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away from each director's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW. Likewise, the expenses of school superintendents and other school representatives chosen by the directors to attend any conferences or meetings or to attend to any urgent business at the behest of the state superintendent of public instruction or the board of directors shall be paid((. The board of directors may pay the actual and necessary expenses for travel, lodging and meals a superintendent candidate

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- incurs when he or she attends an employment interview in the school district. The school directors, school superintendents, other school representatives or superintendent candidates may be advanced sufficient sums to cover their anticipated expenses in accordance with rules and regulations promulgated by the state auditor and which shall substantially conform to the procedures provided in RCW 43.03.150 through 43.03.210)) in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.
- 8 Sec. 9. RCW 28A.400.350 and 1990 1st ex.s. c 11 s 3 and 1990 c 74 9 s 1 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- (1) The board of directors of any of the state's school districts 10 may make available liability, life, health, health care, accident, 11 12 disability and salary protection or insurance or any one of, or a combination of the enumerated types of insurance, or any other type of 13 14 insurance or protection, for the members of the boards of directors, 15 the students, and employees of the school district, and their dependents. Such coverage may be provided by contracts with private 16 carriers, with the state health care authority after July 1, 1990, 17 18 pursuant to the approval of the authority administrator, or through 19 self-insurance or self-funding pursuant to chapter 48.62 RCW, or in any other manner authorized by law. 20
- (2) Whenever funds are available for these purposes the board of directors of the school district may contribute all or a part of the cost of such protection or insurance for the employees of their respective school districts and their dependents. The premiums on such liability insurance shall be borne by the school district.
- After October 1, 1990, school districts may not contribute to any employee protection or insurance other than liability insurance unless the district's employee benefit plan conforms to RCW 28A.400.275 and 29 28A.400.280.
- 30 (3) For ((school board members and)) students, the premiums due on such protection or insurance shall be ((borne)) paid by the assenting 31 ((school board member or)) student: PROVIDED, That the school district 32 33 may contribute all or part of the costs, including the premiums, of 34 life, health, health care, accident or disability insurance which shall be offered to all students participating in interschool activities on 35 36 the behalf of or as representative of their school or school district. 37 The school district board of directors may require any student participating in extracurricular interschool activities to, as a 38

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- 1 condition of participation, document evidence of insurance or purchase
- 2 insurance that will provide adequate coverage, as determined by the
- 3 school district board of directors, for medical expenses incurred as a
- 4 result of injury sustained while participating in the extracurricular
- 5 activity. In establishing such a requirement, the district shall adopt
- 6 regulations for waiving or reducing the premiums of such coverage as
- 7 may be offered through the school district to students participating in
- 8 extracurricular activities, for those students whose families, by
- 9 reason of their low income, would have difficulty paying the entire
- 10 amount of such insurance premiums. The district board shall adopt
- 11 regulations for waiving or reducing the insurance coverage requirements
- 12 for low-income students in order to assure such students are not
- 13 prohibited from participating in extracurricular interschool
- 14 activities.
- 15 (4) School board members shall pay the premiums due on such
- 16 protection or insurance, except the school district shall pay the
- 17 premiums for liability insurance. The amount and type of insurance
- 18 made available to board members may not exceed the insurance made
- 19 available to the school district employees except for liability
- 20 <u>insurance</u>.
- 21 (5) All contracts for insurance or protection written to take
- 22 advantage of the provisions of this section shall provide that the
- 23 beneficiaries of such contracts may utilize on an equal participation
- 24 basis the services of those practitioners licensed pursuant to chapters
- 25 18.22, 18.25, 18.53, 18.57, and 18.71 RCW.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 10. A new section is added to chapter 35.21 RCW
- 27 to read as follows:
- 28 Until a salary ordinance can be passed and become effective as to
- 29 elective officers of a newly incorporated city or town, the first
- 30 councilmembers shall be entitled to compensation as follows:
- 31 (1) In cities with a population of twenty thousand or more
- 32 inhabitants, a councilmember shall receive a salary of four hundred
- 33 dollars per calendar month;
- 34 (2) In cities with a population of at least ten thousand but less
- 35 than twenty thousand inhabitants, a councilmember shall receive a
- 36 salary of one hundred fifty dollars per calendar month;

- 1 (3) In cities with a population of at least one thousand five 2 hundred but less than ten thousand inhabitants, a councilmember shall 3 receive a salary of seventy-five dollars per calendar month;
- 4 (4) In cities with a population of less than one thousand five 5 hundred inhabitants, a councilmember shall receive twenty dollars per 6 meeting for not more than two meetings per month; and
- 7 (5) The mayor, in addition to the compensation he or she receives 8 as a councilmember, is entitled to receive an additional amount per 9 calendar month equal to twenty-five percent of the councilmember's 10 salary.
- 11 Compensation provided under this section shall remain in effect 12 only until a salary ordinance is passed and becomes effective as to the 13 elective officers. The compensation provided in this section shall not 14 be construed as fixing the usual compensation of such officers.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 11.** A new section is added to chapter 35.21 RCW to read as follows:
- The mayor and members of the city or town council are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away from the councilmember's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 12.** A new section is added to chapter 35.21 RCW to read as follows:
- Any member of a city or town council may waive all or any portion of his or her compensation that is payable to the councilmember as to any month or months during his or her term of office, by filing a written waiver with the council. The waiver, to be effective, must be filed at any time after the member's selection and prior to the date on which the compensation would otherwise be paid. The waiver shall specify the month or period of months for which it is made.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 13.** A new section is added to chapter 35A.21 RCW to read as follows:
- Any member of a city council may waive all or any portion of his or her compensation that is payable to the councilmember as to any month or months during his or her term of office, by filing a written waiver with the council. The waiver, to be effective, must be filed at any

- 4 **Sec. 14.** RCW 35.17.108 and 1967 c 100 s 1 are each amended to read 5 as follows:
- 6 The annual salaries <u>or compensation</u> of the mayor and the
- 7 commissioners of any city operating under a commission form of
- 8 government shall be as fixed by ((charter or)) ordinance of ((said))
- 9 the city. Until a salary ordinance can be passed and become effective
- 10 in a newly incorporated city, the first councilmembers shall be
- 11 compensated in accordance with section 10 of this act. Councilmembers
- 12 <u>are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred</u>
- 13 in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging
- 14 while away from each councilmember's place of residence, and mileage
- 15 for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24
- 16 RCW. The power and authority conferred by this section shall be
- 17 construed as in addition and supplemental to powers or authority
- 18 conferred by any other law, and nothing contained herein shall be
- 19 construed as limiting any other powers or authority of any such city.
- 20 **Sec. 15.** RCW 35.18.220 and 1965 c 7 s 35.18.220 are each amended 21 to read as follows:
- 22 Each member of the council shall receive such salary or
- 23 compensation as may be provided by ((law to cities of the class to
- 24 which it belongs)) city ordinance. Until a salary ordinance can be
- 25 passed and become effective in a newly incorporated city, the first
- 26 councilmembers shall be compensated in accordance with section 10 of
- 27 this act. Councilmembers are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable
- 28 expenses actually incurred in connection with official business,
- 29 <u>including subsistence and lodging while away from each councilmember's</u>
- 30 place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle,
- 31 <u>in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW</u>. The city manager and other
- 32 officers or assistants shall receive such salary or compensation as the
- 33 council shall fix by ordinance and shall be payable at such times as
- 34 the council may determine.
- 35 **Sec. 16.** RCW 35.22.200 and 1965 ex.s. c 47 s 13 are each amended
- 36 to read as follows:

The legislative powers of a charter city shall be vested in a mayor 1 2 and a city council, to consist of such number of members and to have 3 such powers as may be provided for in its charter. The charter may 4 provide for direct legislation by the people through the initiative and 5 referendum upon any matter within the scope of the powers, functions, or duties of the city. The mayor and council and such other elective 6 7 officers as may be provided for in such charter shall be elected at 8 such times and in such manner as provided in Title 29 RCW, and for such 9 terms and shall perform such duties ((and receive such compensation)) 10 as may be prescribed in the charter.

11 **Sec. 17.** RCW 35.22.205 and 1965 c 7 s 35.22.205 are each amended 12 to read as follows:

13 The salary or compensation and the time to be devoted to the 14 performance of the duties of the mayor and elected officials of all 15 cities of the first class shall be as fixed by ordinance of ((said)) 16 the city irrespective of any city charter provisions. Until a salary ordinance can be passed and become effective in a newly incorporated 17 18 city, the first councilmembers shall be compensated in accordance with section 10 of this act. Councilmembers are entitled to reimbursement 19 for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official 20 business, including subsistence and lodging while away from each 21 councilmember's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately 22 23 owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.

24 **Sec. 18.** RCW 35.23.220 and 1969 ex.s. c 270 s 7 are each amended 25 to read as follows:

The city council shall fix the salary or compensation of all ((officials (except library trustees who shall serve without compensation and any other officer)) officers by ordinance except where provision is made by this title that such officer shall serve without compensation((+)). Until a salary ordinance can be passed and become effective in a newly incorporated city, the first councilmembers shall be compensated in accordance with section 10 of this act. Councilmembers are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away from each councilmember's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in

37 <u>accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.</u>

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- No officer shall be allowed any extra or additional compensation, either directly or indirectly, for the rendition of services that the city council have authority to require of him <u>or her</u> by virtue of his o<u>r her</u> office.
- Library trustees shall serve without compensation, but library trustees are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away from each trustee's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.
- 11 The salaries of all city officers shall be paid monthly.
- 12 **Sec. 19.** RCW 35.24.090 and 1990 c 212 s 1 are each amended to read 13 as follows:
- The mayor and the members of the city council may be reimbursed for 14 15 actual expenses incurred in the discharge of their official duties, ((upon presentation of a claim therefor, after allowance and approval 16 thereof, by resolution of the city council; and each city councilmember 17 18 may be paid for attending council meetings an amount which shall be 19 fixed by ordinance and may be revised from time to time by ordinance, but any increase or reduction in the compensation attaching to an 20 office shall not be applicable to the term then being served by the 21 incumbent)) including subsistence and lodging while away from the 22 23 councilmember's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW. 24
- The city attorney, clerk and treasurer, if elective, shall severally receive at stated times a compensation to be fixed by ordinance by the city council.
 - The mayor and other officers shall receive such <u>salary or</u> compensation as may be fixed by the city council ((at the time the estimates are made as provided)) by ((law)) ordinance. Until a salary ordinance can be passed and become effective in a newly incorporated city, the first councilmembers shall be compensated in accordance with section 10 of this act.
- Any city that provides a pension for any of its employees under a plan not administered by the state must notify the state auditor of the existence of the plan at the time of an audit of the city by the auditor. No city may establish a pension plan for its employees that is not administered by the state, except that any defined contribution

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- plan in existence as of January 1, 1990, is deemed to have been
- 2 authorized. No city that provides a defined contribution plan for its
- 3 employees as authorized by this section may make any material changes
- 4 in the terms or conditions of the plan after June 7, 1990.
- 5 **Sec. 20.** RCW 35.27.130 and 1990 c 212 s 2 are each amended to read 6 as follows:
- 7 The mayor and members of the town council may be reimbursed for
- 8 actual expenses incurred in the discharge of their official duties
- 9 ((upon presentation of a claim therefor and its allowance and approval
- 10 by resolution of the town council)), including subsistence and lodging
- 11 while away from the councilmember's place of residence, and mileage for
- 12 use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.
- 13 The mayor and members of the council may also receive such salary or
- 14 compensation as the council may fix by ordinance. Until a salary
- 15 <u>ordinance can be passed and become effective in a newly incorporated</u>
- 16 city, the first councilmembers shall be compensated in accordance with

- 18 The treasurer and treasurer-clerk shall severally receive at stated 19 times a compensation to be fixed by ordinance.

- 29 employees as authorized by this section may make any material changes

- 31 **Sec. 21.** RCW 35.58.160 and 1985 c 330 s 1 are each amended to read
- 32 as follows:
- The chairman and committee chairmen of the metropolitan council
- 34 except elected public officials serving on a full-time salaried basis
- 35 may receive such compensation as the other members of the metropolitan
- 36 council shall provide. Members of the council other than the chairman

Councilmembers are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses actually incurred in connection with official business, including subsistence and lodging while away from each councilmember's place of residence, and mileage for use of a privately owned vehicle, in accordance with chapter 42.24 RCW.
