Recognizing that the common school education system is 2 3 becoming more oriented toward a performance-based model of education, 4 the study shall identify: (a) The populations served by this program, (b) the extent of the program's overlap with other programs operating 5 in the common schools, including the federal chapter I program, (c) the 6 7 type and amount of instruction provided under the learning assistance 8 program, (d) the efficacy of the program, (e) the potential for inclusion of the learning assistance program within the state 9 apportionment program, and (f) how the learning assistance program 10 would operate in the performance-based education environment described 11 in chapter 336, Laws of 1993. The study shall also include an 12 assessment of progress by the superintendent of public instruction in 13 14 preparing a new formula as required by RCW 28A.165.070. The study may 15 include other related matters or recommendations and shall be presented to the fiscal committees of the legislature on or before December 15, 16 1994. 17 (4) The legislative budget committee shall prepare a study of the 18 19 common school special education program. As described in chapter 336, 20

Laws of 1993, common school education is in a state of transition, changing from a focus on inputs to emphasizing performance throughout the educational process. The extent to which the special education program should be included in this transition remains to be determined. To facilitate the legislature's deliberations in this matter, the study shall include a review of the current state special education funding formula, the need for the various categories of disability, and other state's special education funding formulas, laws, and regulations. The study shall consider the potential for funding and formula changes in some of the fourteen special education categories based on educational practices within Washington and the other states, and the potential for inclusion of some or all the categories within the state apportionment formula. To the extent possible, the study shall include an assessment of the efficacy of the special education program and the extent to which state laws, regulations, or funding formulas should be modified as a result of the transition to performance-based education and the need, if any, for waivers from the requirements of federal laws or regulations. The study may include other related matters or recommendations. A progress report shall be presented to the fiscal committees of the legislature on or before January 15, 1995.

3 **Sec. 901.** RCW 22.09.830 and 1989 c 354 s 52 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

- (1) All moneys collected as warehouse license fees, fees for weighing, grading, and inspecting commodities and all other fees collected under the provisions of this chapter, except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, shall be deposited in the grain inspection revolving fund, which is hereby established. The state treasurer is the custodian of the revolving fund. Disbursements from the revolving fund shall be on authorization of the director of the department of agriculture. The revolving fund is subject to the allotment procedure provided in chapter 43.88 RCW, but no appropriation is required for disbursements from the fund. The fund shall be used for all expenses directly incurred by the commodity inspection division in carrying out the provisions of this chapter and for departmental administrative expenses during the 1993-95 biennium. The department may use so much of such fund not exceeding five percent thereof as the director of agriculture may determine necessary for research and promotional work, including rate studies, relating to wheat and wheat products.
- (2) All fees collected for the inspection, grading, and testing of hops shall be deposited into the hop inspection fund, which is hereby established, and shall be retained by the department for the purpose of inspecting, grading, and testing hops. Any moneys in any fund retained by the department on July 1, 1963, and derived from hop inspection and grading shall be deposited to this hop inspection fund. For the purposes of research which would contribute to the development of superior hop varieties and to improve hop production and harvest practices, the department may expend up to twenty percent of the moneys deposited in the hop inspection fund during the fiscal year ending June 30th immediately preceding the year in which such expenditures are to be made. No expenditures shall be made under the provisions of this subsection when the hop inspection fund is, or the director may reasonably anticipate that it will be, reduced below twenty thousand dollars as the result of such expenditure or other necessary

- 1 expenditures made to carry out the inspection, grading, and testing of 2 hops.
- 3 **Sec. 902.** RCW 70.146.080 and 1993 sp.s. c 24 s 924 are each 4 amended to read as follows:
- Within thirty days after June 30, 1987, and within thirty days 5 after each succeeding fiscal year thereafter, the state treasurer shall 6 7 determine the tax receipts deposited into the water quality account for the preceding fiscal year. If the tax receipts deposited into the 8 9 account in each of the fiscal years 1988 and 1989 are less than forty 10 million dollars, the state treasurer shall transfer sufficient moneys from general state revenues into the water quality account to bring the 11 12 total receipts in each fiscal year up to forty million dollars.

- For fiscal year((s)) 1992 ((and 1993)) and for fiscal years 1995 and 1996 and thereafter, if the tax receipts deposited into the water quality account for each fiscal year are less than forty-five million dollars, the treasurer shall transfer sufficient moneys from general state revenues into the water quality account to bring the total revenue up to forty-five million dollars. Determinations and transfers shall be made by July 31 for the preceding fiscal year.
- 27 **Sec. 903.** RCW 88.44.020 and 1991 c 200 s 902 are each amended to 28 read as follows:
- There is created the Washington state maritime commission to be known and designated and declared a corporate body. The powers and duties of the commission shall include the following:
- 32 (1) To adopt, rescind, and amend rules and orders for the exercise 33 of its powers, which shall have the force and effect of the law when 34 not inconsistent with existing laws;
- 35 (2) To administer and enforce the provisions of this chapter, and 36 do all things reasonably necessary to effectuate the purposes of this 37 chapter;

- 1 (3) To employ, and at its pleasure discharge, a manager, secretary, 2 agents, attorneys, consultants, companies, organizations, and employees 3 as it deems necessary, and to prescribe their duties and powers and fix 4 their compensation;
- 5 (4) To establish offices, incur expenses, enter into contracts, and 6 create such liabilities as may be reasonable for the proper 7 administration and enforcement of this chapter;
- 8 (5) To assess vessels transiting the waters of this state, to 9 collect such assessments, investigate violations, and enforce the 10 provisions of this chapter, except for vessels which transit upon the 11 portion of the Columbia river that runs between the states of 12 Washington and Oregon;
- 13 (6) To keep accurate record of all of its dealings, which shall be 14 open to inspection and audit by the state auditor;
- 15 (7) To sue and be sued, adopt a corporate seal, and have all of the 16 powers of a corporation;
- 17 (8) To expend funds for commission-related education and training 18 programs as the commission deems appropriate;
 - (9) To borrow money and incur indebtedness;

- 20 (10) To establish an oil spill first response system, except for vessels which transit upon the portion of the Columbia river that runs 21 between the states of Washington and Oregon. This system will provide 22 a mandatory emergency response communications network for vessels 23 24 involved in commerce in Washington waters, and provide an immediate 25 response to such vessels which, for whatever reason, discharge oil into the state's waters. In the event of an oil spill or threatened oil 26 27 spill, the system must be able to provide a complete response for the first twenty-four hours after the initial report, which may include, 28 but not be limited to, as needed, response vessel or vessels, boom 29 30 equipment, skimmers, qualified personnel, and wildlife care centers.
- 31 The commission may establish, by or before July 1, 1992, an oil 32 spill first response system for vessels which transit upon the portion 33 of the Columbia river that runs between the states of Washington and 34 Oregon;
- 35 (11) To enter into contracts with cleanup contractors to provide 36 spill response, or with other organizations or companies for 37 communication services;

- 1 (12) To recover oil spill first response system costs from a 2 responsible vessel owner or operator in the event of a spill or 3 threatened release;
- 4 (13) To hold response readiness drills with state and federal 5 agencies;
- 6 (14) To work with other states' and countries' maritime 7 organizations, cleanup cooperatives, and governmental response 8 agencies;
- 9 (15) To develop an oil spill contingency plan to comply with state 10 statutes and rules for those vessels covered by the commission, except 11 for vessels operating on the portion of the Columbia river that runs 12 between the states of Washington and Oregon. The commission shall 13 develop an oil spill contingency plan for vessels which transit upon 14 the portion of the Columbia river that runs between the states of 15 Washington and Oregon, not later than January 1, 1993;
- (16) To develop a data base from existing information sources, of accidents, groundings, near misses, and oil discharges of all cargo and passenger vessels entering the waters of the state and to report any such information to the office of marine safety for the purposes of preparing a summary of accidents and near miss incidents; and
- 21 (17) To report annually to the governor, the office of marine 22 safety, and the appropriate standing committees of the legislature on 23 the commission's work and the number of incidents to which the 24 commission's first response system has responded, and make 25 recommendations to improve the safety of maritime transportation.
- The commission shall reimburse the oil spill administration account prior to July 1, 1995, from the assessments authorized under RCW 88.44.100 for the development and maintenance by the office of marine safety of a data base pursuant to subsection (16) of this section. The minimum reimbursement shall be one hundred fifty-two thousand dollars for costs incurred in the 1991-93 and the 1993-95 biennia by the office of marine safety.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 904. If any provision of this act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.
