By House Committee on Fisheries & Wildlife (originally sponsored by Representatives King, Fuhrman, Basich, Wood, Orr, Tate, Johanson and Foreman)

Read first time 02/17/93.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to commercial shrimp fishing licenses; amending RCW
- 2 75.28.125 and 75.30.050; adding new sections to chapter 75.28 RCW;
- 3 adding a new section to chapter 75.30 RCW; creating a new section; and
- 4 providing an effective date.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that the offshore
- 7 Washington, Oregon, and California commercial ocean pink shrimp fishery
- 8 is composed of a mobile fleet, fishing the entire coast from Washington
- 9 to California and landing its catch in the state nearest the area being
- 10 fished. The legislature further finds that the ocean pink shrimp
- 11 fishery currently uses the entire available resource, and has the
- 12 potential to become overcapitalized. The legislature further finds
- 13 that overcapitalization can lead to economic destabilization, and that
- 14 reductions in fishing opportunities from licensing restrictions imposed
- 15 for conservation needs and the economic well-being of the ocean pink
- 16 shrimp industry creates uncertainty. The legislature further finds
- 17 that it is the best interest of the ocean pink shrimp resource,
- 18 commercial ocean pink shrimp fishers, and ocean pink shrimp processors
- 19 in the state, to limit the number of fishers who make landings of ocean

- 1 pink shrimp into the state of Washington to those persons who have
- 2 historically and continuously participated in the ocean pink shrimp
- 3 fishery.
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** Unless the context clearly requires
- 5 otherwise, as used in this chapter "ocean pink shrimp" means the
- 6 species Pandalus jordani.
- 7 **Sec. 3.** RCW 75.28.125 and 1989 c 316 s 7 are each amended to read 8 as follows:
- 9 A delivery license is required to deliver shellfish other than
- 10 ocean pink shrimp or food fish other than salmon taken in offshore
- 11 waters and delivered to a port in the state. Unless adjusted by the
- 12 director pursuant to the director's authority granted in RCW 75.28.065,
- 13 the annual license fee is fifty dollars for residents and one hundred
- 14 dollars for nonresidents. Licenses issued under RCW 75.28.113 (salmon
- 15 delivery license), RCW 75.28.130(4) (crab pot, other than Puget Sound),
- 16 ((or)) RCW 75.28.140(2) (trawl, other than Puget Sound), section 4 of
- 17 this act (ocean pink shrimp delivery), or section 8 of this act (ocean
- 18 pink shrimp single delivery) shall include a delivery license.
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** An ocean pink shrimp delivery license is
- 20 required to deliver ocean pink shrimp taken in offshore waters and
- 21 delivered to a port in the state. Unless adjusted by the director
- 22 pursuant to the director's authority granted in RCW 75.28.065, the
- 23 annual license fee is one hundred fifty dollars for residents and three
- 24 hundred dollars for nonresidents. Ocean pink shrimp delivery licenses
- 25 are transferable.
- 26 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. After December 31, 1993, it is unlawful to
- 27 deliver into any Washington state port ocean pink shrimp caught in
- 28 offshore waters without an ocean pink shrimp delivery license issued
- 29 under section 4 of this act, or an ocean pink shrimp single delivery
- 30 license issued under section 8 of this act. An ocean pink shrimp
- 31 delivery license shall be issued to a vessel that:
- 32 (1) Landed a total of at least five thousand pounds of ocean pink
- 33 shrimp in Washington in any single calendar year between January 1,
- 34 1983, and December 31, 1992, as documented by a valid shellfish
- 35 receiving ticket; and

- (2) Can show continuous participation in the Washington, Oregon, or California ocean pink shrimp fishery by being eligible to land ocean pink shrimp in either Washington, Oregon, or California each year since the landing made under subsection (1) of this section. Evidence of such eligibility shall be a certified statement from the relevant state licensing agency that the applicant for a Washington ocean pink shrimp delivery license held at least one of the following permits:
- 8 (a) For Washington: Possession of a delivery permit or delivery 9 license issued under RCW 75.28.125 or a trawl license (other than Puget 10 Sound) issued under RCW 75.28.140;
- 11 (b) For Oregon: Possession of a vessel permit issued under Oregon 12 Revised Statute 508.880; or
- 13 (c) For California: A trawl permit issued under California Fish 14 and Game Code sec. 8842.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. An applicant who can show historical participation under section 5(1) of this act but does not satisfy the continuous participation requirement of section 5(2) of this act shall be issued an ocean pink shrimp delivery license if:
- 19 (1) The owner can prove that the owner was in the process on December 31, 1992, of constructing a vessel for the purpose of ocean 20 pink shrimp harvest. For purposes of this section, "construction" 21 means having the keel laid, and "for the purpose of ocean pink shrimp 22 23 harvest" means the vessel is designed as a trawl vessel. An ocean pink 24 shrimp delivery license issued to a vessel under construction is not 25 renewable after December 31, 1994, unless the vessel lands a total of at least five thousand pounds of ocean pink shrimp into a Washington 26 state port before December 31, 1994; or 27
- 28 (2) The applicant's vessel is a replacement for a vessel that is 29 otherwise eligible for an ocean pink shrimp delivery license.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. After December 31, 1994, an ocean pink shrimp delivery license may only be issued to a vessel that held an ocean pink shrimp delivery license in 1994, and each year thereafter. If the license is transferred to another vessel, the license history shall also be transferred to the transferee vessel.
- Where the failure to hold the license in any given year was the result of a license suspension, the vessel may qualify if the vessel

- 1 held an ocean pink shrimp delivery license in the year immediately
- 2 preceding the year of the license suspension.
- 3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** The owner of an ocean pink shrimp fishing
- 4 vessel that does not qualify for an ocean pink shrimp delivery license
- 5 issued under section 4 of this act shall obtain an ocean pink shrimp
- 6 single delivery license in order to make a landing into a state port of
- 7 ocean pink shrimp taken in offshore waters. The director shall not
- 8 issue an ocean pink shrimp single delivery license unless, as
- 9 determined by the director, a bona fide emergency exists. A maximum of
- 10 six ocean pink shrimp single delivery licenses may be issued annually
- 11 to any vessel. Unless adjusted by the director pursuant to the
- 12 director's authority granted in RCW 75.28.065, the fee for an ocean
- 13 pink shrimp single delivery license is one hundred dollars.
- 14 **Sec. 9.** RCW 75.30.050 and 1990 c 61 s 3 are each amended to read
- 15 as follows:
- 16 (1) The director shall appoint three-member advisory review boards
- 17 to hear cases as provided in RCW 75.30.060. Members shall be from:
- 18 (a) The salmon charter boat fishing industry in cases involving
- 19 salmon charter boat licenses or angler permits;
- 20 (b) The commercial salmon fishing industry in cases involving
- 21 commercial salmon licenses;
- 22 (c) The commercial crab fishing industry in cases involving Puget
- 23 Sound crab license endorsements;
- 24 (d) The commercial herring fishery in cases involving herring
- 25 validations;
- 26 (e) The commercial Puget Sound whiting fishery in cases involving
- 27 Puget Sound whiting license endorsements;
- 28 (f) The commercial sea urchin fishery in cases involving sea urchin
- 29 endorsements to shellfish diver licenses; ((and))
- 30 (g) The commercial sea cucumber fishery in cases involving sea
- 31 cucumber endorsements to shellfish diver licenses; and
- 32 (h) The commercial ocean pink shrimp industry (Pandalus jordani) in
- 33 cases involving ocean pink shrimp delivery licenses.
- 34 (2) Members shall serve at the discretion of the director and shall
- 35 be reimbursed for travel expenses as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and
- 36 43.03.060.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 10.** A new section is added to chapter 75.30 RCW
- 2 to read as follows:
- 3 The director may reduce the landing requirements established under
- 4 section 5 of this act upon the recommendation of an advisory review
- 5 board established under RCW 75.30.050, but the director may not
- 6 entirely waive the landing requirement. The advisory review board may
- 7 recommend a reduction of the landing requirement in individual cases if
- 8 in the board's judgment, extenuating circumstances prevented
- 9 achievement of the landing requirement. The director shall adopt rules
- 10 governing the operation of the advisory review board and defining
- 11 "extenuating circumstances."
- *NEW SECTION. Sec. 11. Sections 2 and 4 through 8 of this act are
- 13 each added to chapter 75.28 RCW.
- 14 *Sec. 11 was vetoed, see message at end of chapter.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 12.** This act shall take effect January 1, 1994.

- 1 Note: Governor's explanation of partial veto is as follows:
- "I am returning herewith, without my approval as to section 11 of 3 Substitute House Bill No. 1350, entitled:
- 4 "AN ACT Relating to commercial shrimp fishing licenses."
- Section 11 requires Sections 2 and 4 through 8 of this act to be codified in the Commercial Fishing chapter (75.28 RCW) of the Revised Code of Washington. However a number of these sections should be codified in the License Limitation chapter (75.30 RCW) of the Revised Code of Washington. I am therefore vetoing Section 11 and directing the Code Reviser to codify sections 2 and 4 in chapter 75.28 RCW and sections 5 through 8 in chapter 75.30 RCW.
- With the exception of section 11, Substitute House Bill No. 1350 is approved."
