1 AN ACT Relating to public health; adding new sections to chapter 2 43.20A RCW; and creating a new section.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that many homeless people in the state of Washington have impaired eyesight that reduces their chances of obtaining employment or training for employment. The legislature finds that it is in the public interest to facilitate ophthalmologists, optometrists, and opticians in providing free vision services to homeless people of the state.

10 The secretary of the department of social NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. 11 and health services shall coordinate the efforts of nonprofit agencies 12 working with the homeless, the Washington academy of eye physicians and 13 surgeons, the Washington optometric association, and the opticians 14 association of Washington to deliver vision services to the homeless 15 free of charge. The secretary shall enter into agreements identifying 16 cooperating agencies and the circumstances under which specified services will be delivered. 17

1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. To the extent consistent with the 2 department's budget, the secretary shall pay for the eyeglasses 3 hardware prescribed and dispensed pursuant to the program set up in 4 sections 2 through 6 of this act. The secretary shall also attempt to 5 obtain private sector funding for this program.

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** Ophthalmologists, optometrists, and 7 dispensing opticians may utilize used eyeglass frames obtained through 8 donations to this program.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** An ophthalmologist, optometrist, or 10 dispensing optician who provides:

11 (1) Free vision services; or

(2) Eyeglasses, or any part thereof, including used frames, at or below retail cost to homeless people in the state of Washington and who is not reimbursed for such services or eyeglasses as allowed for in section 6 of this act, is not liable for civil damages for injury to a homeless person resulting from any act or omission in providing such services or eyeglasses, other than an act or omission constituting gross negligence or intentional conduct.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. Nothing in sections 2 through 6 of this act 20 shall prevent ophthalmologists, optometrists, or dispensing opticians 21 from collecting for either their goods or services, or both from third-22 party payers covering the goods or services for homeless persons.

23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. The program created in sections 2 through 6 24 of this act shall be known as the eye care for the homeless program in 25 Washington.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** Sections 2 through 7 of this act are each 27 added to chapter 43.20A RCW.
