# State of Washington 53rd Legislature 1993 Regular Session

- AN ACT Relating to higher education; amending RCW 28B.15.515;
- 2 adding new sections to chapter 28B.10 RCW; creating a new section;
- 3 providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that the proportion of
- 6 the state budget dedicated to postsecondary educational programs has
- 7 decreased for two decades. At the same time, major technological,
- 8 economic, and demographic changes have exacerbated the need for
- 9 improved training and education to maintain a high-quality, competitive
- 10 work force, and a well-educated populace to meet the challenges of the
- 11 twenty-first century. Therefore, the legislature finds that there is
- 12 increasing need for postsecondary educational opportunities for
- 13 citizens of the state of Washington.
- 14 The legislature declares that the policy of the state of Washington
- 15 shall be to improve the access to, and the quality of, this state's
- 16 postsecondary educational system. The budgetary policy of the state of
- 17 Washington shall be to provide a level of protection and commitment to
- 18 the state's postsecondary educational system commensurate with the

- 1 responsibility of this state to the educational and professional
- 2 improvement of its citizens and work force.
- 3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** It is the policy of the state of Washington 4 the essential requirements level budget calculation for institutions of higher education include enrollment levels necessary to 5 maintain, by educational sector, the participation rate funded in the 6 7 1993 fiscal year. The participation rate shall be based on the state's estimated population ages seventeen and above by appropriate age 8 9 groups.
- 10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** It is the policy of the state of Washington that, for new enrollments provided under section 2 of this act, the 11 essential requirements level budget calculation for those enrollments 12 13 shall, each biennium, at a minimum, include a funding level per full-14 time equivalent student that is equal to the rate assumed in the 15 omnibus appropriations act for the last fiscal year of the previous biennium for the instructional, primary support, and library programs, 16 17 plus an inflation factor. The inflation factor should be equivalent to 18 the inflation factor used to calculate basic education in the common school system budget request submitted by the governor. 19
- 20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** It is the policy of the state of Washington 21 that the essential requirements level budget calculation for state 22 institutions of higher education include a funding level per full-time 23 equivalent student that is, each biennium, at a minimum, equal to the general fund--state and tuition fund rate per student assumed in the 24 25 omnibus appropriations act for the last fiscal year of the previous biennium for the state-funded programs, minus one-time expenditures and 26 27 plus an inflation factor. The inflation factor should be equivalent to 28 the inflation factor used to calculate basic education in the common 29 school system budget request submitted by the governor.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. It is the policy of the state of Washington that higher education enrollments be increased in increments each biennium in order to achieve, by the year 2010, the goals, by educational sector, adopted by the higher education coordinating board in its enrollment plan entitled "Design for the 21st Century:

1 Expanding Higher Education Opportunities in Washington, or subsequent 2 revisions adopted by the board.

Per student costs for additional students to achieve this policy shall be at the same rate per student as enrollments mandated in section 2 of this act.

For each public college and university, and for the community and 6 7 technical college system, budget documents generated by the governor 8 and the legislature in the development and consideration of the 9 biennial omnibus appropriations act shall display an enrollment target The enrollment target level is the biennial state-funded 10 enrollment increase necessary to fulfill the state policy set forth in 11 this section. The budget documents shall compare the enrollment target 12 level with the state-funded enrollment increases contained in the 13 biennial budget proposals of the governor and each house of the 14 15 legislature. The information required by this section shall be set forth in the budget documents so that enrollment and cost information 16 concerning the number of students and additional funds needed to reach 17 the enrollment goals are prominently displayed and easily understood. 18 19 For the governor's budget request, the information required by this 20 section shall be made available in the document entitled "Operating Budget Supporting Data" or its successor document. 21

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The participation rate used to calculate NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. enrollment levels under sections 2 and 5 of this act shall be based on fall enrollment reported in the higher education enrollment report as maintained by the office of financial management, fall enrollment as reported in the management information system of the state board for community and technical colleges, and the corresponding fall population forecast by the office of financial management. Formal estimates of the state participation rates and enrollment levels necessary to fulfill the requirements of sections 2 and 5 of this act shall be determined by the office of financial management as part of its responsibility to develop and maintain student enrollment forecasts for colleges and universities under RCW 43.62.050. Formal estimates of the state participation rates and enrollment levels required by this section shall be based on procedures and standards established by a technical work group consisting of staff from the higher education coordinating board, the public four-year institutions of higher education, the state board for community and technical colleges, the

fiscal and higher education committees of the house of representatives 1 and the senate, and the office of financial management. 2 estimates of the state participation rates and enrollment levels 3 4 required by this section shall be submitted to the fiscal committees of 5 the house of representatives and senate on or before November 15th of each even-numbered year. The higher education coordinating board shall 6 periodically review the enrollment goals set forth in sections 2 and 5 7 8 of this act and submit recommendations concerning modification of these goals to the governor and to the higher education committees of the 9 10 house of representatives and the senate.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** It is the policy of the state of Washington 11 12 that financial need not be a barrier to participation in higher education. It is also the policy of the state of Washington that the 13 14 essential requirements level budget calculation include funding for 15 state student financial aid programs. The calculation should, at a minimum, include a funding level equal to the amount provided in the 16 second year of the previous biennium in the omnibus appropriations act, 17 18 adjusted for the percentage of needy resident students, by educational 19 sector, likely to be included in any enrollment increases necessary to maintain, by educational sector, the participation rate funded in the 20 1993 fiscal year. The calculation should also be adjusted to reflect, 21 22 by educational sector, any increases in cost of attendance. 23 of attendance figures should be calculated by the higher education 24 coordinating board and provided to the office of financial management 25 and appropriate legislative committees by June 30th of each evennumbered year. 26

- 27 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28B.15.515 and 1991 c 353 s 1 are each amended to read 28 as follows:
- 29 (1) The boards of trustees of the community college districts may 30 operate summer schools on either a self-supporting or a state-funded 31 basis.
- If summer school is operated on a self-supporting basis, the fees charged shall be retained by the colleges, and shall be sufficient to cover the direct costs, which are instructional salaries and related benefits, supplies, publications, and records.
- 36 Community colleges that have self-supporting summer schools shall 37 continue to receive general fund state support for vocational programs

- that require that students enroll in a four quarter sequence of courses that includes summer quarter due to clinical or laboratory requirements and for ungraded courses limited to adult basic education, vocational apprenticeship, aging and retirement, small business management, industrial first aid, and parent education.
- 6  $(2)((\frac{a}{a}))$  The board of trustees of a community college district 7 may permit the district's state-funded, full-time equivalent enrollment 8 level, as provided in the operating budget appropriations act, to vary 9 ((by plus or minus two percent each fiscal year unless otherwise 10 authorized in the operating budget appropriations act)). variance is above the state-funded level, the district may charge those 11 students above the state-funded level a fee equivalent to the amount of 12 13 tuition and fees that are charged students enrolled in state-funded courses. These fees shall be retained by the colleges. 14
- 15 (((b) Any community college that in 1990-91 has an enrollment above 16 the state-funded level but below the authorized variance may increase 17 its excess enrollments to within the variance.
- (c) Community colleges that currently have excess enrollments more than the authorized variance, by means of enrollments that would have otherwise been eligible for state funding, shall reduce those excess enrollments to within the authorized variance by September 1, 1995, in at least equal annual reductions, commencing with the 1991-92 fiscal year.

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- (d) Except as permitted by (c) of this subsection, should the number of student-supported, full-time equivalent enrollments in any fiscal year fall outside the authorized variance, the college shall return by September 1st to the state general fund, an amount equal to the college's full average state appropriations per full-time equivalent student for such student-funded full-time equivalent outside the variance, unless otherwise provided in the operating budget appropriations act.))
- 32 (3) The state board for community <u>and technical</u> college<u>s</u> 33 ((<del>education</del>)) shall ensure compliance with this section.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** Sections 2 through 7 of this act are each added to chapter 28B.10 RCW.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 10. This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the

- 1 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take
- 2 effect July 1, 1993.
