- 29 (a) A student attending an institution with the aid of financial 30 assistance provided by another state or governmental unit or agency 31 thereof, such nonresidency continuing for one year after the completion 32 of such semester or quarter.
 - (b) A person who is not a citizen of the United States of America who does not have permanent or temporary resident status or does not hold "Refugee-Parolee" or "Conditional Entrant" status with the United States immigration and naturalization service or is not otherwise permanently residing in the United States under color of law and who does not also meet and comply with all the applicable requirements in

- 1 RCW ((28B.15.011 through 28B.15.014 and 28B.15.015, each as now or hereafter amended)) 28B.15.012 and 28B.15.013.
- 3 (4) The term "domicile" shall denote a person's true, fixed and 4 permanent home and place of habitation. It is the place where the 5 student intends to remain, and to which the student expects to return 6 when the student leaves without intending to establish a new domicile 7 elsewhere. The burden of proof that a student, parent or guardian has 8 established a domicile in the state of Washington primarily for 9 purposes other than educational lies with the student.
- 10 (5) The term "dependent" shall mean a person who is not financially independent. Factors to be considered in determining whether a person 11 is financially independent shall be set forth in rules and regulations 12 13 adopted by the higher education coordinating board and shall include, but not be limited to, the state and federal income tax returns of the 14 15 person and/or the student's parents or legal guardian filed for the calendar year prior to the year in which application is made and such 16 other evidence as the board may require. 17

- (4) For full time nonresident undergraduate students and such other full time nonresident students not in graduate study programs or enrolled in programs leading to the degrees of doctor of medicine, doctor of dental surgery, or doctor of veterinary medicine, the total tuition fees for the 1993-94 academic year shall be one hundred nine and three-tenths percent and thereafter total tuition fees shall be one hundred twenty-two and nine-tenths percent of the per student undergraduate educational costs at the state universities computed as provided in RCW 28B.15.067 and 28B.15.070: PROVIDED, That the building fees for each academic year shall be three hundred and fifty-four dollars.
