- 1 AN ACT Relating to accountability in state government; amending RCW
- 2 43.88.020, 43.88.090, 43.88.160, and 44.28.085; adding a new section to
- 3 chapter 44.28 RCW; and creating new sections.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that many of the
  - systems currently in place for assuring accountability in state
- 7 government programs are not operated comprehensively, do not take
- 8 advantage of modern management techniques, and do not contribute
- 9 adequately to the optimum use of scarce resources. Critical variables
- 10 that are not always taken into account include whether stated goals and
- 11 objectives are being achieved, and whether desired results are being
- 12 accomplished.

- 13 Agency executives need more accurate information for setting
- 14 policy, determining whether new or existing programs are effective, and
- 15 improving internal controls for agency management. These needs must be
- 16 met at all levels of operation, and must be clearly communicated to the
- 17 legislature and all interested parties.
- 18 Ensuring accountability in government involves a long-term
- 19 commitment to policy planning, quality management, and results-oriented

- 1 evaluation. It is the intent of the legislature to facilitate program
- 2 evaluations and performance audits of selected state agencies and
- 3 programs through the coordinated resources of the executive and
- 4 legislative branches of state government.
- 5 **Sec. 2.** RCW 43.88.020 and 1991 c 358 s 6 are each amended to read 6 as follows:
- 7 (1) "Budget" means a proposed plan of expenditures for a given 8 period or purpose and the proposed means for financing these 9 expenditures.
- 10 (2) "Budget document" means a formal, written statement offered by 11 the governor to the legislature, as provided in RCW 43.88.030.
- 12 (3) "Director of financial management" means the official appointed 13 by the governor to serve at the governor's pleasure and to whom the 14 governor may delegate necessary authority to carry out the governor's 15 duties as provided in this chapter. The director of financial 16 management shall be head of the office of financial management which 17 shall be in the office of the governor.
- 18 (4) "Agency" means and includes every state office, officer, each 19 institution, whether educational, correctional or other, and every 20 department, division, board and commission, except as otherwise 21 provided in this chapter.
- (5) "Public funds", for purposes of this chapter, means all moneys, including cash, checks, bills, notes, drafts, stocks, and bonds, whether held in trust, for operating purposes, or for capital purposes, and collected or disbursed under law, whether or not such funds are otherwise subject to legislative appropriation, including funds maintained outside the state treasury.
- (6) "Regulations" means the policies, standards, and requirements, stated in writing, designed to carry out the purposes of this chapter, as issued by the governor or the governor's designated agent, and which shall have the force and effect of law.
- (7) "Ensuing biennium" means the fiscal biennium beginning on July 1st of the same year in which a regular session of the legislature is held during an odd-numbered year pursuant to Article II, section 12 of the Constitution and which biennium next succeeds the current biennium.
- 36 (8) "Dedicated fund" means a fund in the state treasury, or a 37 separate account or fund in the general fund in the state treasury, 38 that by law is dedicated, appropriated or set aside for a limited

- 1 object or purpose; but "dedicated fund" does not include a revolving 2 fund or a trust fund.
- 3 (9) "Revolving fund" means a fund in the state treasury, 4 established by law, from which is paid the cost of goods or services 5 furnished to or by a state agency, and which is replenished through 6 charges made for such goods or services or through transfers from other 7 accounts or funds.
- 8 (10) "Trust fund" means a fund in the state treasury in which 9 designated persons or classes of persons have a vested beneficial 10 interest or equitable ownership, or which was created or established by 11 a gift, grant, contribution, devise, or bequest that limits the use of 12 the fund to designated objects or purposes.
- 13 (11) "Administrative expenses" means expenditures for: (a)
  14 Salaries, wages, and related costs of personnel and (b) operations and
  15 maintenance including but not limited to costs of supplies, materials,
  16 services, and equipment.
- 17 (12) "Fiscal year" means the year beginning July 1st and ending the 18 following June 30th.
- 19 (13) "Lapse" means the termination of authority to expend an 20 appropriation.
- 21 (14) "Legislative fiscal committees" means the legislative budget 22 committee, the legislative evaluation and accountability program 23 committee, the ways and means committees of the senate and house of 24 representatives, and, where appropriate, the legislative transportation 25 committee.
- 26 (15) "Fiscal period" means the period for which an appropriation is 27 made as specified within the act making the appropriation.
- (16) "Primary budget driver" means the primary determinant of a budget level, other than a price variable, which causes or is associated with the major expenditure of an agency or budget unit within an agency, such as a caseload, enrollment, workload, or population statistic.
- 33 (17) "Stabilization account" means the budget stabilization account 34 created under RCW 43.88.525 as an account in the general fund of the 35 state treasury.
- 36 (18) "State tax revenue limit" means the limitation created by 37 chapter 43.135 RCW.
- 38 (19) "General state revenues" means the revenues defined by Article 39 VIII, section 1(c) of the state Constitution.

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- (20) "Annual growth rate in real personal income" means the 1 2 estimated percentage growth in personal income for the state during the 3 current fiscal year, expressed in constant value dollars, as published 4 by the office of financial management or its successor agency.
- (21) "Estimated revenues" means estimates of revenue in the most 5 recent official economic and revenue forecast prepared under RCW 6 7 82.33.020, and prepared by the office of financial management for those 8 funds, accounts, and sources for which the office of the economic and 9 revenue forecast council does not prepare an official forecast 10 including estimates of revenues to support financial plans under RCW 44.40.070, that are prepared by the office of financial management in 11 consultation with the interagency task force. 12
- 13 (22) "Estimated receipts" means the estimated receipt of cash in 14 the most recent official economic and revenue forecast prepared under 15 RCW 82.33.020, and prepared by the office of financial management for 16 those funds, accounts, and sources for which the office of the economic 17 and revenue forecast council does not prepare an official forecast.
- (23) "State budgeting, accounting, and reporting system" means a 18 19 system that gathers, maintains, and communicates fiscal information. 20 The system links fiscal information beginning with development of agency budget requests through adoption of legislative appropriations 21 22 to tracking actual receipts and expenditures against approved plans.
- (24) "Allotment of appropriation" means the agency's statement of proposed expenditures, the director of financial management's review of that statement, and the placement of the approved statement into the 26 state budgeting, accounting, and reporting system.
- 27 (25) "Statement of proposed expenditures" means a plan prepared by each agency that breaks each appropriation out into monthly detail 28 29 representing the best estimate of how the appropriation will be 30 expended.
- 31 (26) "Undesignated fund balance (or deficit)" means unreserved and undesignated current assets or other resources 32 available for expenditure over and above any current liabilities which are expected 33 to be incurred by the close of the fiscal period. 34
- (27) "Internal audit" means an independent appraisal activity 35 within an agency for the review of operations as a service to 36 37 management, including a systematic examination of accounting and fiscal 38 controls to assure that human and material resources are quarded 39 against waste, loss, or misuse; and that reliable data are gathered,

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- maintained, and fairly disclosed in a written report of the audit 1 2 findings.
- (28) "Performance audit" means an audit that determines the 3 4 following: (a) Whether a government entity is acquiring, protecting,
- and using its resources economically and efficiently; (b) the causes of 5
- inefficiencies or uneconomical practices; (c) whether the entity has 6
- 7 complied with laws and rules applicable to the program; (d) the extent
- 8 to which the desired results or benefits established by the legislature
- 9 are being achieved; and (e) the effectiveness of organizations,
- programs, activities, or functions. 10
- (29) "Program evaluation" means the use of a variety of policy and 11
- fiscal research methods to (a) determine the extent to which a program 12
- is achieving its legislative intent in terms of producing the effects 13
- expected, and (b) make an objective judgment of the implementation, 14
- 15 outcomes, and net cost or benefit impact of programs in the context of
- their goals and objectives. It includes the application of systematic 16
- methods to measure the results, intended or unintended, of program 17
- activities. 18
- Sec. 3. RCW 43.88.090 and 1989 c 273 s 26 are each amended to read 19
- as follows: 20
- 21 (1) For purposes of developing budget proposals to the legislature,
- 22 the governor shall have the power, and it shall be the governor's duty,
- 23 to require from proper agency officials such detailed estimates and
- 24 other information in such form and at such times as the governor shall
- direct. The estimates for the legislature and the judiciary shall be 25
- transmitted to the governor and shall be included in the budget without 26
- revision. The estimates for state pension contributions shall be based 27
- on the rates provided in chapter 41.45 RCW.
- 28 Copies of all such
- 29 estimates shall be transmitted to the standing committees on ways and
- 30 means of the house and senate at the same time as they are filed with
- the governor and the office of financial management. 31
- 32 (((2) Estimates from each agency shall include goals and objectives
- 33 for each program administered by the agency. The goals and objectives
- 34 shall, whenever possible, be stated in terms of objective measurable
- results.)) 35
- 36 The estimates shall include statements or tables which indicate, by
- 37 agency, the state funds which are required for the receipt of federal
- 38 matching revenues. The estimates shall be revised as necessary to

- reflect legislative enactments and adopted appropriations and shall be included with the initial biennial allotment submitted under RCW 43.88.110.
- 4 ((\(\frac{(3)}{3}\))) (2) It is the policy of the state that each state agency
  5 define its mission and establish measurable goals for achieving
  6 desirable results for those who receive its services. This section
  7 shall not be construed to require an agency to develop a new mission or
  8 goals in place of identifiable missions or goals that meet the intent
  9 of this section. State agencies should involve affected groups and
  10 individuals in developing their missions and goals.
- 11 (3) For the purpose of assessing program performance, each state
  12 agency shall establish program objectives for each major program in its
  13 budget. The objectives shall be consistent with the missions and goals
  14 developed under this section. The objectives shall be expressed to the
  15 extent practicable in outcome-based, objective, and measurable form
  16 unless permitted by the office of financial management to adopt a
  17 different standard.
  - (4) In concert with legislative and executive agencies, the office of financial management shall develop a plan for using these outcome-based objectives in the evaluation of agency performance for improved accountability of state government. Any elements of the plan requiring legislation shall be submitted to the legislature no later than November 30, 1994.
  - (5) In the year of the gubernatorial election, the governor shall invite the governor-elect or the governor-elect's designee to attend all hearings provided in RCW 43.88.100; and the governor shall furnish the governor-elect or the governor-elect's designee with such information as will enable the governor-elect or the governor-elect's designee to gain an understanding of the state's budget requirements. The governor-elect or the governor-elect's designee may ask such questions during the hearings and require such information as the governor-elect or the governor-elect's designee deems necessary and may make recommendations in connection with any item of the budget which, with the governor-elect's reasons therefor, shall be presented to the legislature in writing with the budget document. Copies of all such estimates and other required information shall also be submitted to the standing committees on ways and means of the house and senate.

1 **Sec. 4.** RCW 43.88.160 and 1992 c 118 s 8 are each amended to read 2 as follows:

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This section sets forth the major fiscal duties and responsibilities of officers and agencies of the executive branch. The regulations issued by the governor pursuant to this chapter shall provide for a comprehensive, orderly basis for fiscal management and control, including efficient accounting and reporting therefor, for the executive branch of the state government and may include, in addition, such requirements as will generally promote more efficient public management in the state.

- (1) Governor; director of financial management. The governor, 11 through the director of financial management, shall devise and 12 13 supervise a modern and complete accounting system for each agency to 14 the end that all revenues, expenditures, receipts, disbursements, 15 resources, and obligations of the state shall be properly and systematically accounted for. The accounting system shall include the 16 development of accurate, timely records and reports of all financial 17 affairs of the state. The system shall also provide for central 18 19 accounts in the office of financial management at the level of detail 20 deemed necessary by the director to perform central financial The director of financial management shall adopt and 21 management. periodically update an accounting procedures manual. 22 23 maintaining its own accounting and reporting system shall comply with 24 the updated accounting procedures manual and the rules of the director 25 adopted under this chapter. An agency may receive a waiver from 26 complying with this requirement if the waiver is approved by the director. Waivers expire at the end of the fiscal biennium for which 27 they are granted. The director shall forward notice of waivers granted 28 29 to the appropriate legislative fiscal committees. The director of 30 financial management may require such financial, statistical, and other 31 reports as the director deems necessary from all agencies covering any period. 32
  - (2) The director of financial management is responsible for quarterly reporting of primary operating budget drivers such as applicable workloads, caseload estimates, and appropriate unit cost data. These reports shall be transmitted to the legislative fiscal committees or by electronic means to the legislative evaluation and accountability program committee. Quarterly reports shall include actual monthly data and the variance between actual and estimated data

- 1 to date. The reports shall also include estimates of these items for 2 the remainder of the budget period.
- (3) The director of financial management shall report at least 3 4 annually to the appropriate legislative committees regarding the status 5 all appropriated capital projects, including transportation projects, showing significant cost overruns or underruns. If funds are 6 7 shifted from one project to another, the office of financial management 8 shall also reflect this in the annual variance report. Once a project 9 is complete, the report shall provide a final summary showing estimated 10 start and completion dates of each project phase compared to actual dates, estimated costs of each project phase compared to actual costs, 11 12 and whether or not there are any outstanding liabilities or unsettled 13 claims at the time of completion.
- 14 (4) In addition, the director of financial management, as agent of 15 the governor, shall:
  - (a) Develop and maintain a system of internal controls and internal audits comprising methods and procedures to be adopted by each agency that will safeguard its assets, check the accuracy and reliability of its accounting data, promote operational efficiency, and encourage adherence to prescribed managerial policies for accounting and financial controls. The system developed by the director shall include criteria for determining the scope and comprehensiveness of internal controls required by classes of agencies, depending on the level of resources at risk.
  - Each agency head or authorized designee shall be assigned the responsibility and authority for establishing and maintaining internal audits following the standards of internal auditing of the institute of internal auditors;
- (b) Make surveys and analyses of agencies with the object of determining better methods and increased effectiveness in the use of manpower and materials; and the director shall authorize expenditures for employee training to the end that the state may benefit from training facilities made available to state employees;
- 34 ((<del>(b)</del>)) <u>(c)</u> Report to the governor with regard to duplication of 35 effort or lack of coordination among agencies;
- ((<del>(c)</del>)) <u>(d)</u> Review any pay and classification plans, and changes thereunder, developed by any agency for their fiscal impact: PROVIDED, That none of the provisions of this subsection shall affect merit systems of personnel management now existing or hereafter established

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- 1 by statute relating to the fixing of qualifications requirements for
- 2 recruitment, appointment, or promotion of employees of any agency. The
- 3 director shall advise and confer with agencies including appropriate
- 4 standing committees of the legislature as may be designated by the
- 5 speaker of the house and the president of the senate regarding the
- 6 fiscal impact of such plans and may amend or alter said plans, except
- 7 that for the following agencies no amendment or alteration of said
- 8 plans may be made without the approval of the agency concerned:
- 9 Agencies headed by elective officials;
- 10  $((\frac{d}{d}))$  <u>(e)</u> Fix the number and classes of positions or authorized
- 11 man years of employment for each agency and during the fiscal period
- 12 amend the determinations previously fixed by the director except that
- 13 the director shall not be empowered to fix said number or said classes
- 14 for the following: Agencies headed by elective officials;
- 15 ((<del>(e)</del>)) <u>(f)</u> Provide for transfers and repayments between the budget
- 16 stabilization account and the general fund as directed by appropriation
- 17 and RCW 43.88.525 through 43.88.540;
- 18 ((<del>(f) Promulgate regulations</del>)) <u>(g) Adopt rules</u> to effectuate
- 19 provisions contained in (a) through  $((\frac{e}{e}))$  of this subsection.
- 20 (5) The treasurer shall:
- 21 (a) Receive, keep, and disburse all public funds of the state not
- 22 expressly required by law to be received, kept, and disbursed by some
- 23 other persons: PROVIDED, That this subsection shall not apply to those
- 24 public funds of the institutions of higher learning which are not
- 25 subject to appropriation;
- 26 (b) Disburse public funds under the treasurer's supervision or
- 27 custody by warrant or check;
- 28 (c) Keep a correct and current account of all moneys received and
- 29 disbursed by the treasurer, classified by fund or account;
- 30 (d) Perform such other duties as may be required by law or by
- 31 regulations issued pursuant to this law.
- It shall be unlawful for the treasurer to issue any warrant or
- 33 check for public funds in the treasury except upon forms duly
- 34 prescribed by the director of financial management. Said forms shall
- 35 provide for authentication and certification by the agency head or the
- 36 agency head's designee that the services have been rendered or the
- 37 materials have been furnished; or, in the case of loans or grants, that
- 38 the loans or grants are authorized by law; or, in the case of payments
- 39 for periodic maintenance services to be performed on state owned

equipment, that a written contract for such periodic maintenance 1 services is currently in effect and copies thereof are on file with the 2 office of financial management; and the treasurer shall not be liable 3 4 under the treasurer's surety bond for erroneous or improper payments so 5 made: PROVIDED, That when services are lawfully paid for in advance of full performance by any private individual or business entity other 6 7 than as provided for by RCW 42.24.035, such individual or entity other 8 than central stores rendering such services shall make a cash deposit 9 or furnish surety bond coverage to the state as shall be fixed in an 10 amount by law, or if not fixed by law, then in such amounts as shall be fixed by the director of the department of general administration but 11 in no case shall such required cash deposit or surety bond be less than 12 13 an amount which will fully indemnify the state against any and all losses on account of breach of promise to fully perform such services: 14 15 AND PROVIDED FURTHER, That no payments shall be made in advance for any 16 equipment maintenance services to be performed more than three months 17 after such payment. Any such bond so furnished shall be conditioned that the person, firm or corporation receiving the advance payment will 18 19 apply it toward performance of the contract. The responsibility for 20 recovery of erroneous or improper payments made under this section shall lie with the agency head or the agency head's designee in 21 accordance with regulations issued pursuant to this chapter. Nothing 22 23 in this section shall be construed to permit a public body to advance 24 funds to a private service provider pursuant to a grant or loan before 25 services have been rendered or material furnished.

- (6) The state auditor shall:
- 27 (a) Report to the legislature the results of current post audits that have been made of the financial transactions of each agency; to 28 this end the auditor may, in the auditor's discretion, examine the 29 30 books and accounts of any agency, official or employee charged with the receipt, custody or safekeeping of public funds. Where feasible in 31 conducting examinations, the auditor shall utilize data and findings 32 from the internal control system prescribed by the office of financial 33 34 management. The current post audit of each agency may include a 35 section on recommendations to the legislature as provided in (c) of this subsection. 36
- 37 (b) Give information to the legislature, whenever required, upon 38 any subject relating to the financial affairs of the state.

(c) Make the auditor's official report on or before the thirty-1 first of December which precedes the meeting of the legislature. 2 3 report shall be for the last complete fiscal period and shall include 4 ((at least the following:)) determinations as to whether agencies, in making expenditures, complied with the laws of this state(( : PROVIDED, 5 That nothing in this section may be construed to grant)). The state 6 7 auditor ((the right)) is authorized to perform or participate in 8 performance audits only as expressly authorized by the legislature in 9 the omnibus biennial appropriations acts. A performance audit for the 10 purpose of this section is the examination of the effectiveness of the administration, its efficiency, and its adequacy in terms of the 11 programs of departments or agencies as previously approved by the 12 13 legislature. ((The authority and responsibility to conduct such an 14 examination shall be vested in the legislative budget committee as 15 prescribed in RCW 44.28.085.)) The state auditor, upon completing an audit for legal and financial compliance under chapter 43.09 RCW, may 16 report to the legislative budget committee or other appropriate 17 18 committees of the legislature, in a manner prescribed by the 19 legislative budget committee, on facts relating to the management or performance of governmental programs where such facts are discovered 20 incidental to the legal and financial audit. The auditor may make such 21 a report to a legislative committee only if the auditor has determined 22 23 that the agency has been given an opportunity and has failed to resolve 24 the management or performance issues raised by the auditor. If the auditor makes a report to a legislative committee, the agency may 25 submit to the committee a response to the report. This subsection (6) 26 shall not be construed to authorize the auditor to allocate other than 27 de minimis resources to performance audits except as expressly 28 29 authorized in the appropriations acts.

30 (d) Be empowered to take exception to specific expenditures that 31 have been incurred by any agency or to take exception to other practices related in any way to the agency's financial transactions and 32 to cause such exceptions to be made a matter of public record, 33 34 including disclosure to the agency concerned and to the director of It shall be the duty of the director of 35 financial management. 36 financial management to cause corrective action to be taken promptly, 37 such action to include, as appropriate, the withholding of funds as provided in RCW 43.88.110. 38

(e) Promptly report any irregularities to the attorney general.

- 1 (f) Investigate improper governmental activity under chapter 42.40 2 RCW.
  - (7) The legislative budget committee may:

- 4 (a) Make post audits of the financial transactions of any agency 5 and management surveys and program reviews as provided for in RCW 6 44.28.085 as well as performance audits and program evaluations. To 7 this end the committee may in its discretion examine the books, 8 accounts, and other records of any agency, official, or employee.
- 9 (b) Give information to the legislature or any legislative 10 committee whenever required upon any subject relating to the 11 performance and management of state agencies.
- 12 (c) Make a report to the legislature which shall include at least 13 the following:
- (i) Determinations as to the extent to which agencies in making expenditures have complied with the will of the legislature and in this connection, may take exception to specific expenditures or financial practices of any agencies; and
- (ii) Such plans as it deems expedient for the support of the state's credit, for lessening expenditures, for promoting frugality and economy in agency affairs and generally for an improved level of fiscal management.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 44.28 RCW to read as follows:
- (1) In conducting program evaluations as defined in RCW 43.88.020, the legislative budget committee may establish a biennial work plan that identifies state agency programs for which formal evaluation appears necessary. Among the factors to be considered in preparing the work plan are:
- 29 (a) Whether a program newly created or significantly altered by the 30 legislature warrants continued oversight because (i) the fiscal impact 31 of the program is significant, or (ii) the program represents a 32 relatively high degree of risk in terms of reaching the stated goals 33 and objectives for that program;
- 34 (b) Whether implementation of an existing program has failed to 35 meet its goals and objectives by any significant degree.
- 36 (2) The project description for each program evaluation shall 37 include start and completion dates, the proposed research approach, and 38 cost estimates.

- 1 (3) The overall plan may include proposals to employ contract 2 evaluators. As conditions warrant, the program evaluation work plan 3 may be amended from time to time. All biennial work plans shall be 4 transmitted to the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the 5 senate and the house of representatives.
- 6 **Sec. 6.** RCW 44.28.085 and 1975 1st ex.s. c 293 s 15 are each 7 amended to read as follows:

8 The legislative budget committee shall make management surveys and program reviews as to every public body, officer or employee subject to 9 the provisions of RCW 43.09.290 through 43.09.340. 10 The legislative budget committee may also make management surveys and program reviews 11 of local school districts, intermediate school districts, and other 12 units of local government receiving state funds as grants-in-aid or as 13 14 shared revenues. Management surveys for the purposes of this section 15 shall be an independent examination for the purpose of providing the legislature with an evaluation and report of the manner in which any 16 public agency, officer, administrator, or employee has discharged the 17 18 responsibility to faithfully, efficiently, and effectively administer 19 any legislative purpose of the state. Program reviews for the purpose of this section shall be an examination of state or local government 20 programs to ascertain whether or not such programs continue to serve 21 22 their intended purposes, are conducted in an efficient and effective 23 manner, or require modification or elimination((: PROVIDED, That)). 24 Nothing in this section shall limit the power or duty of the state 25 auditor to report to the legislature as directed by ((subsection (3) of)) RCW 43.88.160 ((as now or hereafter amended. The authority in 26 27 this section conferred excludes a like authority in the state 28 auditor)).

- The legislative budget committee shall receive a copy of each report of examination issued by the state auditor under RCW 43.09.310, shall review all such reports, and shall make such recommendations to the legislature and to the state auditor as it deems appropriate.
- 33 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** This act may be known and cited as the 34 performance-based government act of 1993.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** If specific funding for the purposes of this act, referencing this act by bill number, is not provided by June 30,

1 1993, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act shall be null and 2 void.
