- 5 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 6 following:
- 7 "Sec. 1. RCW 28A.630.885 and 1995 c 335 s 505 and 1995 c 209 s 1 8 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- 9 The Washington commission on student learning is hereby 10 established. The primary purposes of the commission are to identify the knowledge and skills all public school students need to know and be 11 12 able to do based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210, to 13 develop student assessment and school accountability systems, to review 14 current school district data reporting requirements and 15 recommendations on what data is necessary for the purposes of 16 accountability and meeting state information needs, and to take other 17 steps necessary to develop a performance-based education system. commission shall include three members of the state board of education, 18 19 three members appointed by the governor before July 1, 1992, and five 20 members appointed no later than June 1, 1993, by the governor elected in the November 1992 election. The governor shall appoint a chair from 21 the commission members, and fill any vacancies in gubernatorial 22 23 appointments that may occur. The state board of education shall fill 24 any vacancies of state board of education appointments that may occur. 25 In making the appointments, educators, business leaders, and parents shall be represented, and nominations from state-wide education, 26 27 business, and parent organizations shall be requested. Efforts shall 28 be made to ensure that the commission reflects the racial and ethnic diversity of the state's K-12 student population and that the major 29 30 geographic regions in the state are represented. Appointees shall be qualified individuals who are supportive of educational restructuring, 31 who have a positive record of service, and who will devote sufficient 32 time to the responsibilities of the commission to ensure that the 33 34 objectives of the commission are achieved.
- 35 (2) The commission shall establish advisory committees. Membership 36 of the advisory committees shall include, but not necessarily be 37 limited to, professionals from the office of the superintendent of

1 public instruction and the state board of education, and other state 2 and local educational practitioners and student assessment specialists.

- 3 (3) The commission, with the assistance of the advisory committees, 4 shall:
- 5 (a) Develop essential academic learning requirements based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210. Essential academic learning 6 7 requirements shall be developed, to the extent possible, for each of 8 the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210. Goals one and two shall 9 be considered primary. Essential academic learning requirements for RCW 28A.150.210(1), goal one, and the mathematics component of RCW 10 28A.150.210(2), goal two, shall be completed no later than March 1, 11 1995. Essential academic learning requirements that incorporate the 12 13 remainder of RCW 28A.150.210 (2), (3), and (4), goals two, three, and four, shall be completed no later than March 1, 1996. To the maximum 14 15 extent possible, the commission shall integrate goal four and the 16 knowledge and skill areas in the other goals in the development of the 17 essential academic learning requirements;
  - (b)(i) The commission shall present to the state board of education and superintendent of public instruction a state-wide academic assessment system for use in the elementary, middle, and high school years designed to determine if each student has mastered the essential academic learning requirements identified in (a) of this subsection. The academic assessment system shall include a variety of assessment methods that are criterion-referenced, including performance-based measures ((that are criterion-referenced)). Performance standards for determining if a student has successfully completed an assessment shall be initially determined by the commission in consultation with the advisory committees required in subsection (2) of this section.

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- (ii) The assessment system shall be designed so that the results under the assessment system are used by educators as tools to evaluate instructional practices, and to initiate appropriate educational support for students who have not mastered the essential academic learning requirements at the appropriate periods in the student's educational development.
- (iii) Assessments measuring the essential academic learning requirements developed for RCW 28A.150.210(1), goal one, and the mathematics component of RCW 28A.150.210(2), goal two, shall be ((initially implemented by the state board of education and superintendent of public instruction no later than the 1996-97 school

year,)) developed and initially implemented by the commission before 1 transferring the assessment system to the superintendent of public 2 instruction. For goal one and the mathematics component of goal two, 3 4 the elementary assessment shall be available for use by districts no later than the 1996-97 school year, the middle grades assessment no 5 later than the 1997-98 school year, and the high school assessment no 6 later than the 1998-99 school year unless the legislature takes action 7 8 to delay or prevent implementation of the assessment system and 9 essential academic learning requirements. The assessment system shall be transferred to the superintendent of public instruction no later 10 than June 30, 1999, for continued implementation. 11 measuring the essential academic learning requirements developed for 12 RCW 28A.150.210 (2) except mathematics, (3), and (4), goals two, three, 13 14 and four, shall be ((initially implemented by the state board of 15 education and)) developed and initially implemented by the commission before transferring the assessments to the superintendent of public 16 instruction, unless the legislature takes action to delay or prevent 17 18 implementation of the assessment system and essential academic learning 19 requirements. The assessments shall be transferred to the superintendent of public instruction no later than ((the 1998-99 school 20 year, unless the legislature takes action to delay or prevent 21 implementation of the assessment system and essential academic learning 22 requirements)) June 30, 1999, for continued implementation. 23 24

The assessments in history, geography, civics, health, fitness, and the arts shall not include state-level assessments in the elementary grades, but shall include classroom-based assessments for voluntary use. However, by December 1, 2001, the state board of education shall make recommendations to the legislature regarding whether state-level assessments should be required for history, geography, civics, health, fitness, and the arts in the elementary grades.

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The commission shall work closely with the superintendent of public instruction and the state board of education during the development and initial implementation of the assessment system. To the maximum extent possible, the commission shall integrate knowledge and skill areas in development of the assessments.

(iv) Before the 2000-2001 school year, participation by school districts in the assessment system shall be optional. School districts that desire to participate before the 2000-2001 school year shall notify the commission on student learning or the superintendent of

- public instruction, as appropriate, in a manner determined by the commission or superintendent. Beginning in the 2000-2001 school year, all school districts shall be required to participate in the assessment system.
- (v) The commission on student learning may modify the essential 5 academic learning requirements and the assessments, as needed, on or 6 7 before June 30, 1999. The state board of education ((<del>and</del> 8 superintendent of public instruction)) may modify the essential 9 academic learning requirements ((and academic assessment system)), as 10 needed, ((in subsequent school years)) after June 30, 1999, and the superintendent of public instruction may modify the academic assessment 11 system, as needed, after June 30, 1999. 12
  - (vi) The commission shall develop assessments that are directly related to the essential academic learning requirements, and are not biased toward persons with different learning styles, racial or ethnic backgrounds, or on the basis of gender;

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17 (c) After a determination is made by the state board of education that the high school assessment system has been implemented and that it 18 19 is sufficiently reliable and valid, successful completion of the high school assessment shall lead to a certificate of mastery. 20 The certificate of mastery shall be obtained by most students at about the 21 age of sixteen, and is evidence that the student has successfully 22 mastered the essential academic learning requirements during his or her 23 24 educational career. ((The certificate of mastery shall be required for 25 graduation but shall not be the only requirement for graduation. The 26 commission shall make recommendations to the state board of education 27 regarding the relationship between the certificate of mastery and high school graduation requirements.)) The state board of education and the 28 29 commission shall make recommendations to the legislature regarding 30 whether the certificate of mastery should be a graduation requirement. The certificate of mastery shall not be implemented as a state-wide 31 graduation requirement until legislation is enacted directing the state 32 board of education to make it a state-wide requirement. Upon achieving 33 34 the certificate of mastery, schools shall provide students with the 35 opportunity to continue to pursue career and educational objectives through educational pathways that emphasize integration of academic and 36 37 vocational education. Educational pathways may include, but are not 38 limited to, programs such as work-based learning, school-to-work 39 transition, tech prep, vocational-technical education, running start,

1 and preparation for technical college, community college, or university
2 education;

- 3 (d) Consider methods to address the unique needs of special 4 education students when developing the assessments in (b) and (c) of 5 this subsection;
- 6 (e) Consider methods to address the unique needs of highly capable 7 students when developing the assessments in (b) and (c) of this 8 subsection;
- 9 (f) Develop recommendations on the time, support, and resources, 10 including technical assistance, needed by schools and school districts 11 to help students achieve the essential academic learning requirements. 12 These recommendations shall include an estimate for the legislature, 13 superintendent of public instruction, and governor on the expected cost 14 of implementing the academic assessment system;
- 15 (g) Develop recommendations for consideration by the higher 16 education coordinating board for adopting college and university 17 entrance requirements for public school students that are consistent 18 with the essential academic learning requirements and the certificate 19 of mastery;
- (h) Review current school district data reporting requirements for the purposes of accountability and meeting state information needs. The commission on student learning shall report recommendations to the joint select committee on education restructuring by September 15, 1996, on:

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- (i) What data is necessary to compare how school districts are performing before the essential academic learning requirements and the assessment system are implemented with how school districts are performing after the essential academic learning requirements and the assessment system are implemented; and
- (ii) What data is necessary pertaining to school district reports under the accountability systems developed by the commission on student learning under this section;
- 33 (i) By June 30, 1999, recommend to the legislature, governor, state 34 board of education, and superintendent of public instruction:
- 35 (i) A state-wide accountability system to monitor and evaluate 36 accurately and fairly the level of learning occurring in individual 37 schools and school districts. The accountability system shall be 38 designed to recognize the characteristics of the student population of 39 schools and school districts such as gender, race, ethnicity,

- 1 socioeconomic status, and other factors. The system shall include 2 school-site, school district, and state-level accountability reports;
- 3 (ii) A school assistance program to help schools and school 4 districts that are having difficulty helping students meet the 5 essential academic learning requirements;
- 6 (iii) A system to intervene in schools and school districts in 7 which significant numbers of students persistently fail to learn the 8 essential academic learning requirements; and
- 9 (iv) An awards program to provide incentives to school staff to 10 help their students learn the essential academic learning requirements, 11 with each school being assessed individually against its own baseline. 12 Incentives shall be based on the rate of percentage change of students 13 achieving the essential academic learning requirements. School staff 14 shall determine how the awards will be spent.
- It is the intent of the legislature to begin implementation of programs in this subsection (3)(i) on September 1, 2000;
- (j) Report annually by December 1st to the legislature, the governor, the superintendent of public instruction, and the state board of education on the progress, findings, and recommendations of the commission; and
- 21 (k) Make recommendations to the legislature and take other actions 22 necessary or desirable to help students meet the student learning 23 goals.
- 24 (4) The commission shall coordinate its activities with the state 25 board of education and the office of the superintendent of public 26 instruction.
- (5) The commission shall seek advice broadly from the public and all interested educational organizations in the conduct of its work, including holding periodic regional public hearings.
- 30 (6) The commission shall select an entity to provide staff support and the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 31 provide administrative oversight and be the fiscal agent for the 32 commission. The commission may direct the office of the superintendent 33 34 of public instruction to enter into subcontracts, within the commission's resources, with school districts, teachers, higher 35 education faculty, state agencies, business organizations, and other 36 37 individuals and organizations to assist the commission in its 38 deliberations.

- 1 (7) Members of the commission shall be reimbursed for travel 2 expenses as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
- 3 (8) This section expires June 30, 1999.
- 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) By December 15, 1996, the commission on
- 5 student learning shall recommend to the appropriate committees of the
- 6 legislature a revised timeline for the implementation of the middle and
- 7 high school assessments for science, history, geography, civics,
- 8 health, fitness, and the arts, and the elementary assessment for
- 9 science.
- 10 (2) By December 15, 1996, the state board of education and the
- 11 commission on student learning shall make initial recommendations to
- 12 the appropriate committees of the legislature regarding the
- 13 implementation timeline for the certificate of mastery, including
- 14 whether it should be a graduation requirement. The board and
- 15 commission shall consider other or additional methods in which the
- 16 assessments could be used to raise the standards in schools and of
- 17 students, and how these methods should be phased-in.
- 18 (3) This section shall expire December 31, 1996.
