- 32 waters of Puget Sound, featuring accessible recreational opportunities,
- 33 world-class port facilities and water transportation systems, harvest
- 34 of marine food resources, shoreline-oriented life styles, water-
- 35 dependent industries, tourism, irreplaceable aesthetics and other

1 activities, all of which to some degree depend upon a clean and healthy 2 marine resource.

((The legislature further finds that the consequences of careless husbanding of this resource have been dramatically illustrated in inland waterways associated with older and more extensively developed areas of the nation. Recent reports concerning degradation of water quality within this region's urban embayments raise alarming possibilities of similar despoliation of Puget Sound and other state waterways. These examples emphasize that the costs of restoration of aquatic resources, where such restoration is possible, greatly exceed the costs of responsible preservation.

The legislature declares that utilization of the Puget Sound resource carries a custodial obligation for preserving it. The people of the state have the unique opportunity to preserve this gift of nature, an understanding of the results of inattentive stewardship, the technical knowledge needed for control of degradation, and the obligation to undertake such control.))

The legislature further finds that the large number of governmental entities that now affect the ((water quality)) health of Puget Sound have diverse interests and limited jurisdictions which cannot adequately address the cumulative, wide-ranging impacts which contribute to the degradation of Puget Sound. ((It is therefore the policy of the state of Washington to create a single entity with adequate resources to develop a comprehensive plan for water quality protection in Puget Sound to be implemented by existing state and local government agencies.))

These entities can benefit by better coordination among themselves with state agencies and citizen organizations, and efficiencies of effort can be obtained from such coordination. Further, the legislature finds that positive incentives and technical assistance can foster a cooperative spirit that will lead to better protection of Puget Sound.

It is therefore the policy of the state of Washington that protection of Puget Sound, including continued economic and recreational uses, can be best achieved by establishing an entity to periodically revise the Puget Sound water quality management plan, and to focus its efforts on helping other state and federal agencies, local and tribal governments, businesses, and citizen organizations to implement the plan. The legislature declares that this entity, in its

Attached to the budget message shall be such supporting schedules, exhibits and other 14 15 explanatory material in respect to both current operations and capital 16 improvements as the governor shall deem to be useful The budget document or documents shall set forth a 17 legislature. proposal for expenditures in the ensuing fiscal period, or six-year 18 19 period where applicable, based upon the estimated revenues as approved by the economic and revenue forecast council or upon the estimated 20 revenues of the office of financial management for those funds, 21 22 accounts, and sources for which the office of the economic and revenue forecast council does not prepare an official forecast, including those 23 24 revenues anticipated to support the six-year programs and financial 25 plans under RCW 44.40.070. In estimating revenues to support financial 26 plans under RCW 44.40.070, the office of financial management shall rely on information and advice from the interagency revenue task force. 27 Revenues shall be estimated for such fiscal period from the source and 28 29 at the rates existing by law at the time of submission of the budget 30 document, including the supplemental budgets submitted in the evennumbered years of a biennium. However, the estimated revenues for use 31 in the governor's budget document may be adjusted to reflect budgetary 32 revenue transfers and revenue estimates dependent upon budgetary 33 assumptions of enrollments, workloads, and caseloads. All adjustments 34 35 to the approved estimated revenues must be set forth in the budget document. The governor may additionally submit, as an appendix to each 36 37 supplemental, biennial, or six-year agency budget or to the budget 38 document or documents, a proposal for expenditures in the ensuing

fiscal period from revenue sources derived from proposed changes in 1 2 existing statutes.

Supplemental and biennial documents shall reflect a six-year expenditure plan consistent with estimated revenues from existing sources and at existing rates for those agencies required to submit six-year program and financial plans under RCW 44.40.070. additional revenue resulting from proposed changes to existing statutes shall be separately identified within the document as well as related expenditures for the six-year period.

The budget document or documents shall also contain:

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- (a) Revenues classified by fund and source for the immediately past 11 fiscal period, those received or anticipated for the current fiscal 12 13 period, those anticipated for the ensuing biennium, and those anticipated for the ensuing six-year period to support the six-year 15 programs and financial plans required under RCW 44.40.070;
  - (b) The undesignated fund balance or deficit, by fund;
- 17 Such additional information dealing with expenditures, revenues, workload, performance, and personnel as the legislature may 18 19 direct by law or concurrent resolution;
- 20 (d) Such additional information dealing with revenues and expenditures as the governor shall deem pertinent and useful to the 21 22 legislature;
- 23 (e) Tabulations showing expenditures classified by fund, function, 24 activity and object;
- 25 (f) A delineation of each agency's activities, including those 26 activities funded from nonbudgeted, nonappropriated sources, including funds maintained outside the state treasury; 27
- (g) Identification of all proposed direct expenditures to implement 28 the Puget Sound water quality plan under chapter 90.70 RCW, shown by 29 30 agency and in total. At the same time the authority provides the work 31 plan and associated budget to the office of financial management according to the budget instructions required in subsection (1) of this 32 section, the authority shall provide a copy to the appropriate policy 33 34 and fiscal committees of the legislature; and
- 35 (h) Tabulations showing each postretirement adjustment by retirement system established after fiscal year 1991, to include, but 36 not be limited to, estimated total payments made to the end of the 37 previous biennial period, estimated payments for the present biennium, 38 39 and estimated payments for the ensuing biennium.

- 1 (2) The budget document or documents shall include detailed 2 estimates of all anticipated revenues applicable to proposed operating 3 or capital expenditures and shall also include all proposed operating 4 or capital expenditures. The total of beginning undesignated fund 5 balance and estimated revenues less working capital and other reserves 6 shall equal or exceed the total of proposed applicable expenditures.
- 8 (a) Interest, amortization and redemption charges on the state 9 debt;
- 10 (b) Payments of all reliefs, judgments and claims;

The budget document or documents shall further include:

11 (c) Other statutory expenditures;

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- (d) Expenditures incident to the operation for each agency;
- (e) Revenues derived from agency operations;
- (f) Expenditures and revenues shall be given in comparative form showing those incurred or received for the immediately past fiscal period and those anticipated for the current biennium and next ensuing biennium, as well as those required to support the six-year programs and financial plans required under RCW 44.40.070;
- 19 (g) A showing and explanation of amounts of general fund and other 20 funds obligations for debt service and any transfers of moneys that 21 otherwise would have been available for appropriation;
  - (h) Common school expenditures on a fiscal-year basis;
- (i) A showing, by agency, of the value and purpose of financing contracts for the lease/purchase or acquisition of personal or real property for the current and ensuing fiscal periods; and
- (j) A showing and explanation of anticipated amounts of general fund and other funds required to amortize the unfunded actuarial accrued liability of the retirement system specified under chapter 41.45 RCW, and the contributions to meet such amortization, stated in total dollars and as a level percentage of total compensation.
- 31 (3) A separate capital budget document or schedule shall be 32 submitted that will contain the following:
- 33 (a) A statement setting forth a long-range facilities plan for the 34 state that identifies and includes the highest priority needs within 35 affordable spending levels;
- 36 (b) A capital program consisting of proposed capital projects for 37 the next biennium and the two biennia succeeding the next biennium 38 consistent with the long-range facilities plan. Insomuch as is 39 practical, and recognizing emergent needs, the capital program shall

- reflect the priorities, projects, and spending levels proposed in previously submitted capital budget documents in order to provide a reliable long-range planning tool for the legislature and state agencies;
- 5 (c) A capital plan consisting of proposed capital spending for at 6 least four biennia succeeding the next biennium;
  - (d) A statement of the reason or purpose for a project;
- 8 (e) Verification that a project is consistent with the provisions 9 set forth in chapter 36.70A RCW;
- 10 (f) A statement about the proposed site, size, and estimated life 11 of the project, if applicable;
- 12 (g) Estimated total project cost;

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- (h) For major projects valued over five million dollars, estimated costs for the following project components: Acquisition, consultant services, construction, equipment, project management, and other costs included as part of the project. Project component costs shall be displayed in a standard format defined by the office of financial management to allow comparisons between projects;
- 19 (i) Estimated total project cost for each phase of the project as 20 defined by the office of financial management;
  - (j) Estimated ensuing biennium costs;
    - (k) Estimated costs beyond the ensuing biennium;
  - (1) Estimated construction start and completion dates;
  - (m) Source and type of funds proposed;
- 25 (n) Estimated ongoing operating budget costs or savings resulting 26 from the project, including staffing and maintenance costs;
- 27 (o) For any capital appropriation requested for a state agency for 28 the acquisition of land or the capital improvement of land in which the primary purpose of the acquisition or improvement is recreation or 29 30 wildlife habitat conservation, the capital budget document, or an 31 omnibus list of recreation and habitat acquisitions provided with the governor's budget document, shall identify the projected costs of 32 operation and maintenance for at least the two biennia succeeding the 33 34 next biennium. Omnibus lists of habitat and recreation land acquisitions shall include individual project cost estimates for 35 operation and maintenance as well as a total for all state projects 36 37 included in the list. The document shall identify the source of funds 38 from which the operation and maintenance costs are proposed to be 39 funded;

- 1 (p) Such other information bearing upon capital projects as the 2 governor deems to be useful;
- 3 (q) Standard terms, including a standard and uniform definition of 4 maintenance for all capital projects;
- 5 (r) Such other information as the legislature may direct by law or 6 concurrent resolution.

7 For purposes of this subsection (3), the term "capital project" 8 defined subsequent to the analysis, findings, 9 recommendations of a joint committee comprised of representatives from 10 the house capital appropriations committee, senate ways and means committee, legislative transportation committee, legislative evaluation 11 and accountability program committee, and office of financial 12 13 management.

- 14 (4) No change affecting the comparability of agency or program 15 information relating to expenditures, revenues, workload, performance 16 and personnel shall be made in the format of any budget document or 17 report presented to the legislature under this section or RCW 43.88.160(1) relative to the format of the budget document or report 18 19 which was presented to the previous regular session of the legislature during an odd-numbered year without prior legislative concurrence. 20 Prior legislative concurrence shall consist of (a) a favorable majority 21 vote on the proposal by the standing committees on ways and means of 22 23 both houses if the legislature is in session or (b) a favorable 24 majority vote on the proposal by members of the legislative evaluation 25 and accountability program committee if the legislature is not in 26 session.
