- 7 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. FINDINGS. (1) The legislature finds that:
- 8 (a) Puget Sound and related inland marine waterways of Washington
- 9 state represent a unique and unparalleled resource. A rich and varied
- 10 range of marine organisms, comprising an interdependent, sensitive
- 11 communal ecosystem reside in these sheltered waters. Residents of this
- 12 region enjoy a way of life centered around the waters of Puget Sound,
- 13 featuring accessible recreational opportunities, world-class port
- 14 facilities and water transportation systems, harvest of marine food
- 15 resources, shoreline-oriented life styles, water-dependent industries,
- 16 tourism, irreplaceable aesthetics, and other activities, all of which
- 17 to some degree depend upon a clean and healthy marine resource;
- 18 (b) The Puget Sound water quality authority has done an excellent
- 19 job in developing a comprehensive plan to identify actions to restore
- 20 and protect the biological health and diversity of Puget Sound;
- 21 (c) The large number of governmental entities that now have
- 22 regulatory programs affecting the water quality of Puget Sound have
- 23 diverse interests and limited jurisdictions that cannot adequately
- 24 address the cumulative, wide-ranging impacts that contribute to the
- 25 degradation of Puget Sound; and
- 26 (d) Coordination of the regulatory programs, at the state and local
- 27 level, is best accomplished through the development of interagency
- 28 mechanisms that allow these entities to transcend their diverse
- 29 interests and limited jurisdictions.
- 30 (2) It is therefore the policy of the state of Washington to
- 31 coordinate the activities of state and local agencies by establishing
- 32 a biennial work plan that clearly delineates state and local actions
- 33 necessary to protect and restore the biological health and diversity of
- 34 Puget Sound. It is further the policy of the state to implement the
- 35 Puget Sound water quality management plan to the maximum extent
- 36 possible.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** DEFINITIONS. Unless the context clearly
- 2 requires otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout
- 3 this chapter.
- 4 (1) "Action team" means the Puget Sound water quality action team.
- 5 (2) "Chair" means the chair of the action team.
- 6 (3) "Council" means the Puget Sound council created in section 4 of this act.
- 8 (4) "Puget Sound management plan" means the 1994 Puget Sound water
- 9 quality management plan as it exists June 30, 1996, and as subsequently
- 10 amended by the action team.
- 11 (5) "Support staff" means the staff to the action team.
- 12 (6) "Work plan" means the work plan and budget developed by the
- 13 action team.
- 14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** PUGET SOUND ACTION TEAM. (1) The Puget
- 15 Sound action team is created. The action team shall consist of: The
- 16 directors of the departments of ecology; agriculture; natural
- 17 resources; fish and wildlife; and community, trade, and economic
- 18 development; the secretaries of the departments of health and
- 19 transportation; the director of the parks and recreation commission;
- 20 the director of the interagency committee for outdoor recreation; the
- 21 administrative officer of the conservation commission designated in RCW
- 22 89.08.050; one person representing cities, appointed by the governor;
- 23 one person representing counties, appointed by the governor; and the
- 24 chair of the action team. The members representing cities and counties
- 25 shall each be reimbursed for travel expenses as provided in RCW
- 26 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
- 27 (2) The action team shall:
- 28 (a) Prepare a Puget Sound work plan and budget for inclusion in the
- 29 governor's biennial budget;
- 30 (b) Coordinate monitoring and research programs as provided in
- 31 section 7 of this act;
- 32 (c) Work under the direction of the action team chair as provided
- 33 in section 5 of this act;
- 34 (d) Coordinate permitting requirements as necessary to expedite
- 35 permit issuance for any local watershed plan developed pursuant to
- 36 rules adopted under this chapter;
- 37 (e) Identify and resolve any policy or rule conflicts that may
- 38 exist between one or more agencies represented on the action team;

- 1 (f) Periodically amend the Puget Sound management plan;
- 2 (g) Enter into, amend, and terminate contracts with individuals, 3 corporations, or research institutions for the purposes of this 4 chapter;
- 5 (h) Receive such gifts, grants, and endowments, in trust or 6 otherwise, for the use and benefit of the purposes of the action team.
- 7 The action team may expend the same or any income therefrom according 8 to the terms of the gifts, grants, or endowments;
- 9 (i) Promote extensive public participation, and otherwise seek to 10 broadly disseminate information concerning Puget Sound;
 - (j) Receive and expend funding from other public agencies;

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- (k) To reduce costs and improve efficiency, review by December 1, 13 1996, all requirements for reports and documentation from state agencies and local governments specified in the plan for the purpose of eliminating and consolidating reporting requirements; and
- (1) Beginning in December 1998, and every two years thereafter, submit a report to the appropriate policy and fiscal committees of the legislature that describes and evaluates the successes and shortcomings of the current work plan relative to the priority problems identified for each geographic area of Puget Sound.
- 21 (3) By July 1, 1996, the action team shall begin developing its 22 initial work plan, which shall include the coordination of necessary 23 support staff.
- 24 (4) The action team shall incorporate, to the maximum extent 25 possible, the recommendations of the council regarding amendments to 26 the Puget Sound plan and the work plan.
- 27 (5) All proceedings of the action team are subject to the open 28 public meetings act under chapter 42.30 RCW.
- 29 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. PUGET SOUND COUNCIL. (1) There is established the Puget Sound council composed of nine members. 30 members shall be appointed by the governor. In making these 31 appointments, the governor shall include representation from business, 32 the environmental community, agriculture, the shellfish industry, 33 34 counties, cities, and the tribes. One member shall be a member of the senate selected by the president of the senate and one member shall be 35 a member of the house of representatives selected by the speaker of the 36 house of representatives. The legislative members shall be nonvoting 37 38 members of the council. Appointments to the council shall reflect

- 1 geographical balance and the diversity of population within the Puget
- 2 Sound basin. Members shall serve four-year terms. Of the initial
- 3 members appointed to the council, two shall serve for two years, two
- 4 shall serve for three years, and two shall serve for four years.
- 5 Thereafter members shall be appointed to four-year terms. Vacancies
- 6 shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the original
- 7 appointment for the remainder of the unexpired term of the position
- 8 being vacated. Nonlegislative members shall be reimbursed for travel
- 9 expenses as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060. Legislative
- 10 members shall be reimbursed as provided in RCW 44.04.120.
- 11 (2) The council shall:
- 12 (a) Recommend to the action team projects and activities for 13 inclusion in the biennial work plan;
- 14 (b) Recommend to the action team coordination of work plan
- 15 activities with other relevant activities, including but not limited
- 16 to, agencies' activities other than those funded through the plan,
- 17 local plan initiatives, and governmental and nongovernmental watershed
- 18 restoration and protection activities; and
- 19 (c) Recommend to the action team proposed amendments to the Puget
- 20 Sound management plan.
- 21 (3) The chair of the action team shall convene the council at least
- 22 four times per year and shall jointly convene the council and the
- 23 action team at least two times per year.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE. (1) By June 1, 1996, the
- 25 governor shall appoint a person in the governor's office to chair the
- 26 action team. The chair shall serve at the pleasure of the governor.
- 27 (2) The chair shall be responsible for:
- (a) Organizing the development of the council recommendations;
- 29 (b) Organizing the development of the work plan required under
- 30 section 6 of this act;
- 31 (c) Presenting work plan and budget recommendations to the governor
- 32 and the legislature;
- 33 (d) Overseeing the implementation of the elements of the work plan
- 34 that receive funding through appropriations by the legislature; and
- 35 (e) Serving as chair of the council.
- 36 (3) The chair of the action team shall be a full-time employee
- 37 responsible for the administration of all functions of the action team
- 38 and the council, including hiring and terminating support staff, budget

- 1 preparation, contracting, coordinating with the governor, the
- 2 legislature, and other state and local entities, and the delegation of
- 3 responsibilities as deemed appropriate. The salary of the chair shall
- 4 be fixed by the governor, subject to RCW 43.03.040.
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** WORK PLANS. (1)(a) Each biennium, the
- 6 action team shall prepare a Puget Sound work plan and budget for
- 7 inclusion in the governor's biennial budget. The work plan shall
- 8 prescribe the necessary federal, state, and local actions to maintain
- 9 and enhance Puget Sound water quality, including but not limited to,
- 10 enhancement of recreational opportunities, and restoration of a
- 11 balanced population of indigenous shellfish, fish, and wildlife.
- 12 (b) In developing a work plan, the action team shall meet the 13 following objectives:
- 14 (i) Use the plan elements of the Puget Sound management plan to
- 15 prioritize local and state actions necessary to restore and protect the
- 16 biological health and diversity of Puget Sound;
- 17 (ii) Consider the problems and priorities identified in local
- 18 plans; and
- 19 (iii) Coordinate the work plan activities with other relevant
- 20 activities, including but not limited to, agencies' activities that
- 21 have not been funded through the plan, local plans, and governmental
- 22 and nongovernmental watershed restoration activities.
- 23 (2) In addition to the requirements identified under section
- 24 3(2)(a) of this act, the work plan and budget shall:
- 25 (a) Identify and prioritize the local and state actions necessary
- 26 to address the water quality problems in the following locations:
- 27 (i) Area 1: Island and San Juan counties;
- 28 (ii) Area 2: Skagit and Whatcom counties;
- 29 (iii) Area 3: Clallam and Jefferson counties;
- 30 (iv) Area 4: Snohomish, King, and Pierce counties; and
- 31 (v) Area 5: Kitsap, Mason, and Thurston counties;
- 32 (b) Provide sufficient funding to characterize local watersheds,
- 33 provide technical assistance, and implement state responsibilities
- 34 identified in the work plan. The number and qualifications of staff
- 35 assigned to each region shall be determined by the types of problems
- 36 identified pursuant to (a) of this subsection;
- 37 (c) Provide sufficient funding to implement and coordinate the
- 38 Puget Sound ambient monitoring plan pursuant to section 7 of this act;

- 1 (d) Provide funds to assist local jurisdictions to implement 2 elements of the work plan assigned to local governments and to develop 3 and implement local plans;
- 4 (e) Provide sufficient funding to provide support staff for the 5 action team; and
 - (f) Describe any proposed amendments to the Puget Sound plan.

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- 7 (3) The work plan shall be submitted to the appropriate policy and 8 fiscal committees of the legislature by December 20th of each even-9 numbered year.
- 10 (4) The work plan shall be implemented consistent with the 11 legislative provisos of the biennial appropriation acts.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. PUGET SOUND RESEARCH AND MONITORING. In addition to other powers and duties specified in this chapter, the action team shall ensure implementation and coordination of the Puget Sound ambient monitoring program established in the Puget Sound management plan. The program shall include, at a minimum:
- 17 (1) A research program, including but not limited to methods to 18 provide current research information to managers and scientists, and to 19 establish priorities based on the needs of the action team;
- including baselines, protocols, 20 monitoring program, quidelines, and quantifiable performance measures. 21 In consultation 22 with state agencies, local and tribal governments, and other public and 23 private interests, the action team shall develop and track quantifiable 24 performance measures that can be used by the governor and the legislature to assess the effectiveness over time of programs and 25 actions initiated under the plan to improve and protect Puget Sound 26 water quality and biological resources. The performance measures shall 27 be developed by June 30, 1997. The performance measures shall include, 28 29 but not be limited to a methodology to track the progress of: Fish and 30 wildlife habitat; sites with sediment contamination; wetlands; shellfish beds; and other key indicators of Puget Sound health. 31 32 agencies shall assist the action team in the development and tracking of these performance measures. The performance measures may be limited 33 34 to a selected geographic area.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 8. WORK PLAN IMPLEMENTATION. (1) Local governments are required to implement local elements of the work plan

- 1 subject to the availability of appropriated funds or other funding 2 sources.
- 3 (2) The council shall review the progress of work plan 4 implementation. Where prescribed actions have not been accomplished in 5 accordance with the work plan, the responsible agency shall submit to 6 the council written explanations for the shortfalls, together with 7 proposed remedies.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 9.** PUBLIC PARTICIPATION. The chair of the 9 action team shall hold public hearings to solicit public comment on the 10 work plan.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 10. RULE MAKING. By January 1, 1997, the action team shall adopt chapter 400-12 WAC with revisions that:
- 13 (1) Direct counties to develop a prioritized list of watershed 14 improvement projects; and
- 15 (2) Identify all funding sources that can be used to implement 16 local plans.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 11. (1) The powers, duties, and functions of the Puget Sound water quality authority pertaining to the cleanup and protection of Puget Sound are transferred to the Puget Sound action team. All references to the executive director or the Puget Sound water quality authority in the Revised Code of Washington shall be construed to mean the chair of the action team or the action team when referring to the functions transferred in this section.
- (2)(a) All reports, documents, surveys, books, records, files, 24 25 papers, or written material in the possession of the authority pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall be 26 27 delivered to the custody of the action team. All cabinets, furniture, office equipment, motor vehicles, and other tangible property employed 28 by the authority in carrying out the powers, functions, and duties 29 transferred shall be made available to the action team. All funds, 30 credits, or other assets held in connection with the powers, functions, 31 and duties transferred shall be assigned to the action team. 32
- 33 (b) Any appropriations made to the authority for carrying out the 34 powers, functions, and duties transferred shall, on the effective date 35 of this section, be transferred and credited to the action team.

- 1 (c) Whenever any question arises as to the transfer of any 2 personnel, funds, books, documents, records, papers, files, equipment, 3 or other tangible property used or held in the exercise of the powers 4 and the performance of the duties and functions transferred, the 5 director of financial management shall make a determination as to the 6 proper allocation and certify the same to the state agencies concerned.
- 7 (3) All rules and all pending business before the authority 8 pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall be 9 continued and acted upon by the action team. All existing contracts 10 and obligations shall remain in full force and shall be performed by 11 the action team.
- 12 (4) The transfer of the powers, duties, functions, and personnel of 13 the authority shall not affect the validity of any act performed before 14 the effective date of this section.
- (5) If apportionments of budgeted funds are required because of the transfers directed by this section, the director of financial management shall certify the apportionments to the agencies affected, the state auditor, and the state treasurer. Each of these shall make the appropriate transfer and adjustments in funds and appropriation accounts and equipment records in accordance with the certification.
- 21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 12.** The following acts or parts of acts are 22 each repealed:
- 23 (1) RCW 90.70.065 and 1995 c 269 s 3501, 1994 c 264 s 98, & 1990 c 24 115 s 9;
- 25 (2) RCW 90.70.075 and 1990 c 115 s 10;
- 26 (3) RCW 90.70.090 and 1990 c 115 s 8; and
- 27 (4) RCW 90.70.100 and 1991 c 200 s 502.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 13. RCW 90.70.027 and 90.70.902 are each recodified as new sections in the new chapter created in section 16 of this act.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 14. CAPTIONS NOT LAW. Captions used in this chapter do not constitute any part of the law.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 15. This act may be known and cited as the Juget Sound water quality protection act.

- NEW SECTION. Sec. 16. Sections 1 through 10, 14, and 15 of this 2 act shall constitute a new chapter in Title 90 RCW.
- 3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 17.** The sum of one million dollars, or as much 4 thereof as may be necessary is appropriated for the biennium ending June 30, 1997, from the water quality account to the department of 5 ecology. The amount appropriated in this section is provided solely 6 7 for grants to local governments for on-site sewage system projects or programs identified in local watershed action plans. 8 9 grants, the department shall give priority to areas that have formed shellfish protection districts under chapter 90.72 RCW, to areas that 10 have created operation and maintenance programs, and to areas where 11 12 failing on-site systems have contaminated or threaten to contaminate highly productive shellfish growing areas or recreational harvest 13 14 areas. The department of ecology shall develop criteria for assistance 15 that establishes higher priority for areas with substantial numbers of low-income households for which on-site system upgrades are proposed. 16
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 18.** Section 11 of this act shall take effect 18 June 30, 1996.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 19. Section 5 of this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take effect immediately."
