AN ACT Relating to technical clarifying changes to developmentally disabled children's out-of-home placement; and amending RCW 74.13.350, 3 13.34.270, and 74.13.021.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 74.13.350 and 1997 c 386 s 16 are each amended to read 6 as follows:

7 It is the intent of the legislature that parents are responsible 8 for the care and support of children with developmental disabilities. 9 The legislature recognizes that, because of the intense support 10 required to care for a child with developmental disabilities, the help of an out-of-home placement may be needed. 11 It is the intent of the 12 legislature that, when the sole reason for the out-of-home placement is 13 the child's developmental disability, such services be offered by the 14 department to these children and their families through a voluntary 15 placement agreement. In these cases, the parents shall retain legal 16 custody of the child.

As used in this section, "voluntary placement agreement" means a written agreement between the department and a child's parent or legal guardian authorizing the department to place the child in a licensed

facility. Under the terms of this agreement, the parent or legal 1 guardian shall retain legal custody and the department shall be 2 responsible for the child's placement and care. The agreement shall at 3 4 a minimum specify the legal status of the child and the rights and obligations of the parent or legal guardian, the child, and the 5 department while the child is in placement. The agreement must be 6 7 signed by the child's parent or legal guardian and the department to be 8 in effect, except that an agreement regarding an Indian child shall not 9 be valid unless executed in writing before the court and filed with the court as provided in RCW 13.34.245. Any party to a voluntary placement 10 agreement may terminate the agreement at any time. Upon termination of 11 the agreement, the child shall be returned to the care of the child's 12 13 parent or legal guardian unless the child has been taken into custody pursuant to RCW 13.34.050 or 26.44.050, placed in shelter care pursuant 14 15 to RCW 13.34.060, or placed in foster care pursuant to RCW 13.34.130. 16 As used in this section, "out-of-home placement" and "out-of-home 17 care" mean the placement of a child in a foster family home or group care facility licensed under chapter 74.15 RCW. 18

19 Whenever the department places a child in out-of-home care under a 20 voluntary placement pursuant to this section, the department shall have the responsibility for the child's placement and care. The department 21 shall develop a permanency plan of care for the child no later than 22 23 sixty days from the date that the department assumes responsibility for 24 the child's placement and care. Within the first one hundred eighty 25 days of the placement, the department shall obtain a judicial 26 determination pursuant to RCW 13.04.030(1)(j) and 13.34.270 that the placement is in the best interests of the child. If the child's out-27 of-home placement ends before one hundred eighty days have elapsed, no 28 29 judicial determination under RCW 13.04.030(1)(b) is required. The 30 permanency planning hearings shall review whether the child's best 31 interests are served by continued out-of-home placement and determine the future legal status of the child. 32

The department shall provide for periodic administrative reviews as required by federal law. A review may be called at any time by either the department, the parent, or the legal guardian.

Nothing in this section shall prevent the department from filing a dependency petition if there is reason to believe that the child is a dependent child as defined in RCW 13.34.030.

1 The department shall adopt rules providing for the implementation 2 of chapter 386, Laws of 1997 and the transfer of responsibility for 3 out-of-home placements from the dependency process under chapter 13.34 4 RCW to the process under this chapter.

It is the intent of the legislature that the department undertake 5 voluntary out-of-home placement in cases where the child's 6 developmental disability is such that the parent, guardian, or legal 7 8 custodian is unable to provide the necessary care for the child, and 9 the parent, guardian, or legal custodian has determined that the child would benefit from placement outside of the home. If the department 10 does not accept a voluntary placement agreement signed by the parent, 11 a petition may be filed and an action pursued under chapter 13.34 RCW. 12 The department shall inform the parent, guardian, or legal custodian in 13 writing of their right to civil action under chapter 13.34 RCW. 14

15 Sec. 2. RCW 13.34.270 and 1997 c 386 s 19 are each amended to read 16 as follows:

17 (1) Whenever the department of social and health services places a 18 developmentally disabled child in out-of-home care pursuant to RCW 19 74.13.350, the department shall obtain a judicial determination within 20 one hundred eighty days of the placement that continued placement is in 21 the best interests of the child. <u>If the child's out-of-home placement</u> 22 <u>ends before one hundred eighty days have elapsed, no judicial</u> 23 <u>determination is required.</u>

24 (2) To obtain the judicial determination, the department shall file 25 a petition alleging that there is located or residing within the county a child who has a developmental disability, as defined in RCW 26 27 71A.10.020, and that the child has been placed in out-of-home care pursuant to RCW 74.13.350. The petition shall request that the court 28 29 review the child's placement, make a determination that continued placement is in the best interests of the child, and take other 30 necessary action as provided in this section. The petition shall 31 contain the name, date of birth, and residence of the child and the 32 33 names and residences of the child's parent or legal guardian who has 34 agreed to the child's placement in out-of-home care. Reasonable attempts shall be made by the department to ascertain and set forth in 35 36 the petition the identity, location, and custodial status of any parent 37 who is not a party to the placement agreement and why that parent 38 cannot assume custody of the child.

(3) Upon filing of the petition, the clerk of the court shall 1 schedule the petition for a hearing to be held no later than fourteen 2 3 calendar days after the petition has been filed. The department shall 4 provide notification of the time, date, and purpose of the hearing to 5 the parent or legal guardian who has agreed to the child's placement in out-of-home care. The department shall also make reasonable attempts 6 to notify any parent who is not a party to the placement agreement, if 7 8 the parent's identity and location is known. Notification under this 9 section may be given by the most expedient means, including but not 10 limited to, mail, personal service, telephone, and telegraph.

(4) The court shall appoint a guardian ad litem for the child as provided in RCW 13.34.100, unless the court for good cause finds the appointment unnecessary.

(5) Permanency planning hearings shall be held as provided in this
subsection. At the hearing, the court shall review whether the child's
best interests are served by continued out-of-home placement and
determine the future legal status of the child.

(a) For children age ten and under, a permanency planning hearing shall be held in all cases where the child has remained in out-of-home care for at least nine months and an adoption decree or guardianship order has not previously been entered. The hearing shall take place no later than twelve months following commencement of the child's current placement episode.

(b) For children over age ten, a permanency planning hearing shall be held in all cases where the child has remained in out-of-home care for at least fifteen months and an adoption decree or guardianship order has not previously been entered. The hearing shall take place no later than eighteen months following commencement of the current placement episode.

30 (c) No later than ten working days before the permanency planning hearing, the department shall submit a written permanency plan to the 31 court and shall mail a copy of the plan to all parties. The plan shall 32 be directed toward securing a safe, stable, and permanent home for the 33 34 child as soon as possible. The plan shall identify one of the 35 following outcomes as the primary goal and may also identify additional outcomes as alternative goals: Return of the child to the home of the 36 37 child's parent or legal guardian; adoption; guardianship; or long-term out-of-home care, until the child is age eighteen, with a written 38 39 agreement between the parties and the child's care provider.

(d) If a goal of long-term out-of-home care has been achieved 1 2 before the permanency planning hearing, the court shall review the 3 child's status to determine whether the placement and the plan for the 4 child's care remains appropriate. In cases where the primary 5 permanency planning goal has not ((be [been])) been achieved, the court shall inquire regarding the reasons why the primary goal has not been 6 7 achieved and determine what needs to be done to make it possible to 8 achieve the primary goal.

9 (e) Following the first permanency planning hearing, the court 10 shall hold a further permanency planning hearing in accordance with 11 this section at least once every twelve months until a permanency 12 planning goal is achieved or the voluntary placement agreement is 13 terminated.

(6) Any party to the voluntary placement agreement may terminate 14 15 the agreement at any time. Upon termination of the agreement, the 16 child shall be returned to the care of the child's parent or legal 17 guardian, unless the child has been taken into custody pursuant to RCW 13.34.050 or 26.44.050, placed in shelter care pursuant to RCW 18 19 13.34.060, or placed in foster care pursuant to RCW 13.34.130. The 20 department shall notify the court upon termination of the voluntary placement agreement and return of the child to the care of the child's 21 parent or legal guardian. Whenever a voluntary placement agreement is 22 terminated, an action under this section shall be dismissed. 23

(7) This section does not prevent the department from filing a dependency petition if there is reason to believe that the child is a dependent child as defined in RCW 13.34.030. An action filed under this section shall be dismissed upon the filing of a dependency petition regarding a child who is the subject of the action under this section.

30 **Sec. 3.** RCW 74.13.021 and 1997 c 386 s 15 are each amended to read 31 as follows:

As used in this chapter, "developmentally disabled ((dependent)) child" is a child who has a developmental disability as defined in RCW 71A.10.020 and whose parent, guardian, or legal custodian and with the department mutually agree that services appropriate to the child's needs can not be provided in the home.
