- 1 AN ACT Relating to additional state ferry vessels; adding new
- 2 sections to chapter 47.60 RCW; and creating a new section.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW
- 5 to read as follows:
- 6 The legislature finds and declares that there is a compelling need
- 7 for the construction of additional state ferry vessels and
- 8 corresponding terminal improvements in order to provide more capacity
- 9 and frequent service to meet the forecasted travel demands of citizens
- 10 traveling on Puget Sound ferry routes. The vessel technology required
- 11 must provide additional travel options for high growth ferry routes
- 12 through increased passenger-only ferry service.
- The 1989 west corridor study evaluated cross-sound travel through
- 14 the year 2020 and identified the Southworth to Seattle and the Kingston
- 15 to Seattle passenger-only ferry routes as promising based on criteria
- 16 evaluating cost effectiveness, time savings, physical constraints to
- 17 operation, nonduplication of current service, and ability to relieve
- 18 congestion.

- Furthermore, as a result of legislative direction provided in the 1 2 1991-93 transportation budget to the state transportation commission to evaluate and determine the location of new passenger-only ferry routes, 3 the commission reviewed several service alternatives, determined that 4 the Southworth to Seattle and Kingston to Seattle routes ranked 5 highest, and directed the Washington state ferries to proceed with the 6 design and permitting processes for passenger-only terminals at both 7 Southworth and Kingston. 8
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 10 to read as follows:
- 11 The department is authorized to proceed with the acquisition, procurement, and construction of a maximum of four passenger-only 12 vessels that respond to the service demands of state ferry service on 13 14 the Southworth to Seattle and Kingston to Seattle ferry routes, including the terminal and docking facilities necessary to accommodate 15 The acquisition, procurement, and construction of such service. 16 vessels and terminals authorized herein shall be undertaken in 17 18 accordance with the authority provided in RCW 47.56.030.
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 20 to read as follows:
- 21 The department's authority to proceed with the acquisition, 22 procurement, and construction of vessels and terminals authorized under 23 section 2 of this act is contingent on a legislative appropriation 24 approving that authority: PROVIDED, That the appropriation does not 25 reduce the current level of funding for the maintenance and repair of 26 vessels and terminals in service as of the effective date of this act.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. If this act is not referred to by bill or chapter number in a transportation budget, or an omnibus appropriations act, that, by December 31, 1998, either becomes law under Article III, section 12 of the state Constitution or is approved by the people of this state, this act is null and void on December 31, 1998.
