- 1 AN ACT Relating to prevention and control of nonindigenous aquatic
- 2 species; adding new sections to chapter 75.24 RCW; creating new
- 3 sections; providing an expiration date; and declaring an emergency.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The unauthorized introduction of the zebra
- 6 mussel and the European green crab into Washington state waters would
 - pose a serious economic and environmental threat. The zebra mussel and
- 8 European green crab have adverse impacts on fisheries, waterways,
- 9 public and private facilities, and the functioning of natural
- 10 ecosystems. The threat of zebra mussels and European green crabs
- 11 requires a coordinated response. It is the intent of the legislature
- 12 to prevent adverse economic and environmental impacts caused by zebra
- 13 mussels and European green crabs in cooperation and coordination with
- 14 local governments, the public, other states, and federal agencies.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 75.24 RCW
- 16 to read as follows:
- 17 To complement programs authorized by the federal aquatic nuisance
- 18 species task force, the department of fish and wildlife is directed to

- l develop draft rules for legislative consideration to prevent the
- 2 introduction and dispersal of zebra mussels and European green crabs
- 3 and to allow eradication of infestations that may occur. The
- 4 department is authorized to display and distribute material and
- 5 literature informing boaters and owners of airplanes that land on water
- 6 of the problem and to publicize and maintain a telephone number
- 7 available to the public to express concerns and report infestations.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 75.24 RCW 9 to read as follows:
- 10 The department of fish and wildlife shall prepare, maintain, and
- 11 publish a list of all lakes, ponds, or other waters of the state and
- 12 other states infested with zebra mussels or European green crabs. The
- 13 department may participate in regional or national groups addressing
- 14 these species.
- 15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The state shall develop a plan for
- 16 controlling the introduction of zebra mussels and European green crabs.
- 17 A zebra mussel and European green crab task force is created. The
- 18 task force is chaired by the department of fish and wildlife.
- 19 The task force shall:
- 20 (1) Develop recommendations for legislative consideration
- 21 including: (a) Control methods; (b) inspection procedures; (c)
- 22 penalties; (d) notification procedures; and (e) eradication and control
- 23 techniques.
- 24 (2) For each threat, identify the primary pathways of introduction,
- 25 options for regulating each pathway, and if possible a recommended
- 26 method of pathway control. These methods of control shall include
- 27 details on what entity would be responsible for its implementation.
- 28 (3) For each recommended mechanism of pathway control, identify the
- 29 estimated costs of implementing a state program, including ideas of
- 30 funding sources.
- 31 (4) Provide recommendations for how to structure and fund a state
- 32 program that monitors the detection and spread of these species.
- 33 When making recommendations, the task force shall emphasize working
- 34 in a coordinated fashion with existing state, federal, and
- 35 international programs.
- 36 The task force shall invite participation from all groups affected
- 37 by the proposed pathway control measures, including representatives of

- 1 aquaculture, recreational boating, seaplane operators, maritime cargo
- 2 vessels, retail and wholesale aquariums, shellfish growers, marinas,
- 3 and small boat harbors.
- 4 The department of fish and wildlife shall also seek the
- 5 participation of the University of Washington, the department of
- 6 ecology, the department of agriculture, the department of
- 7 transportation, the department of natural resources, and the Washington
- 8 state patrol. Appropriate federal interests shall also be invited to
- 9 participate, including the United States coast guard, the United States
- 10 department of agriculture and the United States fish and wildlife
- 11 service.
- 12 The task force's final recommendations shall be provided to the
- 13 legislature by December 1, 1998.
- 14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** Section 4 of this act expires January 1,
- 15 1999.
- 16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** This act is necessary for the immediate
- 17 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
- 18 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
- 19 immediately.
- 20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** If specific funding for the purposes of this
- 21 act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not provided by
- 22 June 30, 1998, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act is null and
- 23 void.
