## SENATE BILL 5057

State of Washington56th Legislature1999 Regular SessionBy Senators Jacobsen and Rasmussen

Read first time 01/11/1999. Referred to Committee on Higher Education.

1 AN ACT Relating to financial aid; adding a new section to chapter 2 28B.10 RCW; and adding a new chapter to Title 28B RCW.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. It is the intent of the legislature to 5 restructure and fully fund the state's system of financial aid, 6 however, funding levels for the state's system of financial aid are 7 subject to available funds. The restructured financial aid system 8 shall be known as college promise.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. (1) The higher education coordinating board restructure the state's financial aid programs 10 shall into a comprehensive and coordinated system of assistance known as college 11 12 promise. College promise shall expand and modify three existing 13 programs for needy students: The state need grant program under RCW 14 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824; the state work-study program under chapter 28B.12 RCW; and the educational opportunity grant program under 15 16 chapter 28B.101 RCW. In addition, college promise may include a demonstration project to assist needy students whose parents did not 17 18 complete a degree or certificate from an institution of higher

education. College promise shall be implemented beginning in the 2000 01 academic year.

3 (2) By January 1, 2000, the higher education coordinating board, in 4 consultation with the house of representatives and senate higher 5 education and fiscal committees, and the institutions of higher 6 education, shall develop a detailed implementation plan for college 7 promise. In preparing the plan, the board shall follow the goals and 8 priorities set forth in sections 3 and 4 of this act. The plan shall 9 include, but not be limited to:

(a) Specific program eligibility measures and application
procedures for the new populations of state financial aid recipients
identified in section 3 of this act;

13 (b) Specific need analysis criteria and asset protection 14 allowances;

15 (c) Estimates of how many state residents, both those who are 16 currently enrolled in a college or university, and those not currently 17 enrolled, would be eligible and would apply for aid under the expanded eligibility criteria identified in section 3 of this act. 18 The 19 estimates, developed in consultation with the office of financial management, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, and 20 other agencies as appropriate, shall take into account state economic 21 22 and demographic factors and other appropriate information;

(d) Estimates of where the new aid applicants identified under (c)
of this subsection would choose to enroll by type of institution and
level of program; and

26 (e) Estimates of the costs for each state financial aid program, 27 including the state need grant program under RCW 28B.10.790 through 28 28B.10.824; the state work-study program under chapter 28B.12 RCW; and 29 the educational opportunity grant program under chapter 28B.101 RCW to 30 accommodate any new aid applicants estimated under (c) of this 31 subsection, as offset by nonstate sources of aid. Separate cost estimates shall be made for each of the new aid populations identified 32 under section 3 of this act. 33

(3) It is the intent of the legislature that the cost estimates
 completed under subsection (2) of this section shall be the basis for
 recommending funding levels for state financial aid programs for the
 2000-01 academic year and each biennium thereafter.

1 (4) The methodologies used to estimate costs under subsection (2) 2 of this section shall be used for the annual cost estimates required 3 under section 5 of this act.

4 (5) The plan completed under subsection (2) of this section shall 5 be deemed approved on June 30, 2000, unless legislation is enacted to 6 alter the policies set forth in the plan. The board shall also propose 7 to the legislature any changes to the laws governing state financial 8 aid programs that it deems necessary to accomplish the purposes of 9 college promise.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. In restructuring the state's financial aid 11 programs, the higher education coordinating board shall follow these 12 goals:

(1) For all need-based financial aid programs under RCW 28B.10.790through 28B.10.824 and chapters 28B.12 and 28B.101 RCW:

15 (a) Through a mix of federal, state, and other resources:

16 (i) Limit the debt of an undergraduate student to no more than one-17 half of a student's cost of attendance; and

(ii) Provide more self-help opportunities than grant aid to middleincome students, and approximately equal amounts of self-help opportunities and grant aid to low-income and lower middle-income students. Self-help opportunities include work-study and loans;

(b) In determining eligibility for state financial aid programs, shelter home equity on a family's principal place of residence, and shelter a reasonable portion of savings and farm or business net worth, each insofar as is permissible under state and federal law;

26 (c) Consistent with federal law, simplify the financial aid 27 application process;

(d) Strive to preserve a range of educational options for needystudents, including choice of institutions and programs;

30 (e) Recognize otherwise unfunded equipment and assistance needed to31 reasonably accommodate students with disabilities; and

32 (f) Deliver clear and timely information to current and future 33 postsecondary students about the costs of attending college and 34 available financial aid.

(2) For the state need grant program under RCW 28B.10.790 through
 28B.10.824: As funds are available, expand the program to include new
 populations of resident students in the following priority order,
 ensuring that undergraduate students with the most demonstrated

1 financial need receive full grants before less needy students receive
2 any grant:

3 (a) Low-income undergraduates;

4 (b) Lower middle-income undergraduates;

5 (c) Middle-income undergraduates; and

6 (d) Resident graduate and professional students, following the 7 income priorities established for undergraduate students.

8 (3) For the state work-study program under chapter 28B.12 RCW: 9 Increase employment opportunities including off-campus job 10 opportunities with off-campus community service employers.

(4) For students whose parents did not complete a higher education degree or certificate: Determine the feasibility of providing grants to needy first generation scholars.

14 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. In implementing the goals for expanding financial aid to needy undergraduate students, the board shall be 15 guided by the following matrix. The matrix defines income levels, and 16 for each level, the funding priority, and the assistance mix goal. 17 18 Income levels shall be adjusted annually for family size and changes in the state's median income. It is the intent of the legislature these 19 goals not impair the ability of financial aid officers to adjust aid 20 packages to meet the needs of students. However, it is the further 21 intent of the legislature that financial aid officers, insofar as 22 23 possible attempt to implement these goals.

Sec. 5. By September 30th of each even-numbered NEW SECTION. 1 2 year, the higher education coordinating board shall adopt an estimate of the amount of funding, annualized for each fiscal year, that will be 3 4 needed during the ensuing biennium to fully fund each of the state's 5 student financial aid programs including but not limited to: RCW 28B.10.210 through 28B.10.220, 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824, chapters 6 7 28B.12, 28B.101, and 28B.102 RCW, and, if funded, the first generation 8 scholars demonstration project. The board shall report its findings to 9 the governor, and the house of representatives and senate fiscal and 10 higher education committees.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 28B.10 RCW 12 to read as follows:

In administering the state student financial aid program, also known as the state need grant program, under RCW 28B.10.790 through 28B.10.824, the higher education coordinating board shall proceed substantially as follows unless it determines that a modification is required in order to conform with federal law or to improve the administration of the program, consistent with the purposes of this chapter. The higher education coordinating board shall:

(1) Define and assist additional populations of needy students as funding becomes available, in the priorities described in section 3 of this act, and using income level classification definitions as described in section 4 of this act;

(2) In calculating eligibility for aid, where not otherwise inconsistent with federal or state law, shelter home equity on a family's principal place of residence and shelter a reasonable amount of savings and a reasonable portion of farm or business net worth, in order to equitably evaluate family ability to pay; and

(3) To the extent feasible, adjust the student budget of a needy student with disabilities to reflect otherwise unfunded equipment or assistance needed to reasonably accommodate the student in a postsecondary education or training program.

33 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 7.** (1) With the exception of institutions of 34 higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016, any institution of 35 postsecondary education that enrolls students receiving state-funded 36 financial aid shall:

1 (a) For Washington residents, match the total amount of the state 2 financial aid grant funds received by all enrolled students at that 3 institution from the state need grant and equal opportunity grant 4 programs, with an equal amount of institutionally raised grant funds 5 from nongovernmental sources; and

6 (b) Enter into new or honor existing transfer agreements with 7 institutions of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016.

8 (2) The higher education coordinating board shall adopt rules to 9 implement these requirements. The rules shall ensure that all institutional matching grant funds go to students who are needy as 10 defined in RCW 28B.10.802(3) and who are residents of the state of 11 Washington. As used in this subsection, "residents of the state of 12 Washington" means that the students would be eligible to pay resident 13 14 tuition rates under RCW 28B.15.011 through 28B.15.013 if they were 15 enrolled at a state institution of higher education as defined in RCW 16 28B.10.016.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. The higher education coordinating board may 17 18 design a demonstration project to assist needy first generation college 19 students to obtain either a community or technical college degree or certificate, or a baccalaureate degree. Through the project, a needy 20 student, as defined in RCW 28B.10.802(3), who attends a Washington 21 institution of higher education that is accredited by an accrediting 22 23 association recognized by the board by rule, and whose parents did not 24 complete a degree or certificate from an institution of higher 25 education, may receive a grant of up to fifteen hundred dollars per year, not to exceed the student's documented need. The grant may be 26 27 renewable each year, if the student makes satisfactory academic progress. Grants awarded to any one student shall not exceed a 28 29 cumulative total of nine thousand dollars for an individual pursuing a baccalaureate degree or five thousand dollars for a student pursuing a 30 community or technical college degree or certificate. Before seeking 31 funding for the program, the board shall submit to the governor and the 32 33 legislature a plan for implementing the project. The plan shall include a provision for verification of student eligibility to 34 participate in the demonstration project. 35
