SENATE BILL 5308

State of Washington 56th Legislature 1999 Regular Session

By Senators Jacobsen, Hargrove, Gardner, Swecker, Fraser and Oke; by request of Commissioner of Public Lands

Read first time 01/19/1999. Referred to Committee on Natural Resources, Parks & Recreation.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to a study of sand, gravel, and rock resource
- 2 mining and its impact on salmon habitat and urban development; creating
- 3 new sections; making appropriations; and providing an expiration date.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** Over the next twenty years the state's
- 6 population is expected to increase by two million people. As the urban
- 7 and suburban development related to this growth spreads into the rural
- 8 and resource lands, more mineral resources such as sand, gravel, and
- 9 rock will be needed for the construction of homes, shopping centers,
- 10 commercial and industrial facilities, and roads. At the same time,
- 11 this growth will utilize the land base that may contain these deposits.
- 12 Current evaluations indicate that existing mines will not be able to
- 13 meet the future demand for sand, gravel, or rock. Current development
- 14 patterns and land use regulations limit the opportunity to open new
- 15 mines or to expand existing mines. Therefore, the legislature finds
- 16 that it is in the best interest of the citizens of the state to
- 17 identify known sand, gravel, and rock deposits that are environmentally
- 18 acceptable for resource production and assure that efforts are

- 1 undertaken to protect these resources from uses incompatible with 2 mineral extraction so there will be a future supply of these resources.
- 3 In recent years, there have been increasing efforts to mine sand
- 4 and gravel resources from rivers and their floodplains. Current and
- 5 past practices of mining from rivers and their floodplains may impact
- 6 the state's effort to recover threatened and endangered anadromous and
- 7 freshwater fish. Therefore, the legislature finds that it is in the
- 8 best interest of the citizens of the state to study the impacts of
- 9 sand, gravel, and rock resource extraction methods on the habitat needs
- 10 of anadromous and freshwater fish.
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** The department of natural resources is
- 12 directed to prepare a report to the legislature identifying the status
- 13 of sand, gravel, and rock deposits, and recommending zoning and
- 14 extraction practices. In preparing the report, the department shall
- 15 evaluate existing information.
- 16 The report shall include the following:
- 17 (1) An evaluation of the impacts of sand and gravel excavation in
- 18 floodplains on the spawning and rearing habitat of salmonid and
- 19 freshwater species;
- 20 (2) A recommendation on whether additional controls are needed for
- 21 sand and gravel extraction in floodplains to protect fish resources;
- 22 (3) An evaluation of the expected life of known and designated sand
- 23 and gravel deposits within an economically viable transport distance
- 24 from major urban areas;
- 25 (4) An evaluation of current sand, gravel, and rock consumption and
- 26 projected sand, gravel, and rock consumption trends for the next fifty
- 27 years;
- 28 (5) An evaluation of alternative sources of aggregate supply
- 29 including recycling, reuse, conservation opportunities, and quarried
- 30 rock; and
- 31 (6) A recommendation to local governments on mineral resource
- 32 designation standards to protect known deposits of sand, rock, and
- 33 gravel to meet projected supply needs.
- This section expires June 30, 2000.
- 35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** (1) The sum of fifty thousand dollars, or as
- 36 much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the fiscal year

- 1 ending June 30, 2000, from the general fund to the department of 2 natural resources for the purposes of this act.
- 3 (2) The sum of fifty thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be 4 necessary, is appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2001,
- $\,\,$ from the general fund to the department of natural resources for the
- 6 purposes of this act.
- 7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** If specific funding for the purposes of this
- 8 act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not provided by
- 9 June 30, 2000, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act is null and
- 10 void.
