## ENGROSSED SECOND SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5421

AN ACT Relating to the supervision of offenders in the community; amending RCW 9.94A.010, 9.94A.030, 9.94A.110, 9.94A.120, 9.94A.170, 9.94A.205, 9.94A.207, 9.94A.383, and 9.94A.440; reenacting and amending RCW 9.94A.040 and 9.94A.145; adding new sections to chapter 72.09 RCW; creating new sections; prescribing penalties; providing an effective date; and providing an expiration date.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

8 Sec. 1. RCW 9.94A.010 and 1981 c 137 s 1 are each amended to read 9 as follows:

10 The purpose of this chapter is to make the criminal justice system 11 accountable to the public by developing a system for the sentencing of 12 felony offenders which structures, but does not eliminate, 13 discretionary decisions affecting sentences, and to ((add a new chapter to Title 9 RCW designed to)): 14

15 (1) Ensure that the punishment for a criminal offense is 16 proportionate to the seriousness of the offense and the offender's 17 criminal history;

18 (2) Promote respect for the law by providing punishment which is19 just;

(3) Be commensurate with the punishment imposed on others
 committing similar offenses;

3 (4) Protect the public;

4 (5) Offer the offender an opportunity to improve him or herself; 5 ((and))

6 (6) Make frugal use of the state's <u>and local governments'</u> 7 resources<u>; and</u>

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## (7) Reduce the risk of reoffending by offenders in the community.

9 Sec. 2. RCW 9.94A.030 and 1998 c 290 s 3 are each amended to read 10 as follows:

11 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 12 this section apply throughout this chapter.

(1) "Collect," or any derivative thereof, "collect and remit," or 13 14 "collect and deliver," when used with reference to the department of corrections, means that the department, either directly or through a 15 collection agreement authorized by RCW 9.94A.145, is responsible for 16 monitoring and enforcing the offender's sentence with regard to the 17 18 legal financial obligation, receiving payment thereof from the 19 offender, and, consistent with current law, delivering daily the entire payment to the superior court clerk without depositing it in a 20 21 departmental account.

22 (2) "Commission" means the sentencing guidelines commission.

(3) "Community corrections officer" means an employee of the department who is responsible for carrying out specific duties in supervision of sentenced offenders and monitoring of sentence conditions.

(4) "Community custody" means that portion of an ((inmate's)) 27 offender's sentence of confinement in lieu of earned ((early)) release 28 29 time or imposed pursuant to RCW 9.94A.120 (5), (6), (7), (8), ((or)) (10), or (11), or RCW 9.94A.383, served in the community subject to 30 controls placed on the ((inmate's)) offender's movement and activities 31 by the department of corrections. For offenders placed on community 32 custody for crimes committed on or after July 1, 2000, the department 33 34 shall assess the offender's risk of reoffense and may establish and modify conditions of community custody, in addition to those imposed by 35 36 the court, based upon the risk to community safety.

37 (5) <u>"Community custody range" means the minimum and maximum period</u>
 38 of community custody included as part of a sentence under RCW 9.94A.120

1 (11), as established by the sentencing guidelines commission or the 2 legislature under RCW 9.94A.040, for crimes committed on or after July 3 1, 2000.

4 (6) "Community placement" means that period during which the 5 offender is subject to the conditions of community custody and/or postrelease supervision, which begins either upon completion of the 6 term of confinement (postrelease supervision) or at such time as the 7 8 offender is transferred to community custody in lieu of earned 9 ((early)) release. Community placement may consist of entirely 10 community custody, entirely postrelease supervision, or a combination 11 of the two.

12 (((6))) (7) "Community service" means compulsory service, without 13 compensation, performed for the benefit of the community by the 14 offender.

15 (((7))) (8) "Community supervision" means a period of time during 16 which a convicted offender is subject to crime-related prohibitions and 17 other sentence conditions imposed by a court pursuant to this chapter or RCW 16.52.200(6) or 46.61.524. For first-time offenders, the 18 19 supervision may include crime-related prohibitions and other conditions 20 imposed pursuant to RCW 9.94A.120(5). For purposes of the interstate compact for out-of-state supervision of parolees and probationers, RCW 21 22 9.95.270, community supervision is the functional equivalent of 23 probation and should be considered the same as probation by other 24 states.

25 (((+8))) (9) "Confinement" means total or partial confinement as 26 defined in this section.

(((9))) (10) "Conviction" means an adjudication of guilt pursuant to Titles 10 or 13 RCW and includes a verdict of guilty, a finding of guilty, and acceptance of a plea of guilty.

30 ((((10))) (11) "Court-ordered legal financial obligation" means a 31 sum of money that is ordered by a superior court of the state of Washington for legal financial obligations which may include 32 33 restitution to the victim, statutorily imposed crime victims' 34 compensation fees as assessed pursuant to RCW 7.68.035, court costs, 35 county or interlocal drug funds, court-appointed attorneys' fees, and costs of defense, fines, and any other financial obligation that is 36 37 assessed to the offender as a result of a felony conviction. Upon conviction for vehicular assault while under the influence of 38 39 intoxicating liquor or any drug, RCW 46.61.522(1)(b), or vehicular

1 homicide while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or any drug, 2 RCW 46.61.520(1)(a), legal financial obligations may also include 3 payment to a public agency of the expense of an emergency response to 4 the incident resulting in the conviction, subject to the provisions in 5 RCW 38.52.430.

((<del>(11)</del>)) <u>(12)</u> "Crime-related prohibition" means an order of a court 6 7 prohibiting conduct that directly relates to the circumstances of the 8 crime for which the offender has been convicted, and shall not be 9 construed to mean orders directing an offender affirmatively to 10 participate in rehabilitative programs or to otherwise perform affirmative conduct. However, affirmative acts necessary to monitor 11 compliance with the order of a court may be required by the department. 12 13 (((12))) (13) "Criminal history" means the list of a defendant's prior convictions and juvenile adjudications, whether in this state, in 14 15 federal court, or elsewhere. The history shall include, where known, for each conviction (a) whether the defendant has been placed on 16 17 probation and the length and terms thereof; and (b) whether the defendant has been incarcerated and the length of incarceration. 18

19 (((13))) (14) "Day fine" means a fine imposed by the sentencing 20 judge that equals the difference between the offender's net daily 21 income and the reasonable obligations that the offender has for the 22 support of the offender and any dependents.

(((14))) (15) "Day reporting" means a program of enhanced supervision designed to monitor the defendant's daily activities and compliance with sentence conditions, and in which the defendant is required to report daily to a specific location designated by the department or the sentencing judge.

28 ((<del>(15)</del>)) <u>(16)</u> "Department" means the department of corrections.

 $((\frac{16}{10}))$  (17) "Determinate sentence" means a sentence that states 29 30 with exactitude the number of actual years, months, or days of total 31 confinement, of partial confinement, of community supervision, the number of actual hours or days of community service work, or dollars or 32 33 terms of a legal financial obligation. The fact that an offender 34 through "earned ((early)) release" can reduce the actual period of 35 confinement shall not affect the classification of the sentence as a determinate sentence. 36

37 (((17))) (18) "Disposable earnings" means that part of the earnings 38 of an individual remaining after the deduction from those earnings of 39 any amount required by law to be withheld. For the purposes of this

definition, "earnings" means compensation paid or payable for personal 1 2 services, whether denominated as wages, salary, commission, bonuses, or otherwise, and, notwithstanding any other provision of law making the 3 4 payments exempt from garnishment, attachment, or other process to 5 satisfy a court-ordered legal financial obligation, specifically includes periodic payments pursuant to pension or retirement programs, 6 or insurance policies of any type, but does not include payments made 7 8 under Title 50 RCW, except as provided in RCW 50.40.020 and 50.40.050, 9 or Title 74 RCW.

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((<del>(18)</del>)) <u>(19)</u> "Drug offense" means:

(a) Any felony violation of chapter 69.50 RCW except possession of a controlled substance (RCW 69.50.401(d)) or forged prescription for a controlled substance (RCW 69.50.403);

(b) Any offense defined as a felony under federal law that relates
to the possession, manufacture, distribution, or transportation of a
controlled substance; or

(c) Any out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws
of this state would be a felony classified as a drug offense under (a)
of this subsection.

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## ((<del>(19)</del>)) <u>(20)</u> "Escape" means:

(a) Escape in the first degree (RCW 9A.76.110), escape in the second degree (RCW 9A.76.120), willful failure to return from furlough (RCW 72.66.060), willful failure to return from work release (RCW 72.65.070), or willful failure to be available for supervision by the department while in community custody (RCW 72.09.310); or

(b) Any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws of this state would be a felony classified as an escape under (a) of this subsection.

29 (((<del>20)</del>)) <u>(21)</u> "Felony traffic offense" means:

30 (a) Vehicular homicide (RCW 46.61.520), vehicular assault (RCW
 31 46.61.522), eluding a police officer (RCW 46.61.024), or felony hit 32 and-run injury-accident (RCW 46.52.020(4)); or

33 (b) Any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that 34 under the laws of this state would be a felony classified as a felony 35 traffic offense under (a) of this subsection.

36 (((21))) (22) "Fines" means the requirement that the offender pay
 37 a specific sum of money over a specific period of time to the court.

38 (((22))) (23) "First-time offender" means any person who is 39 convicted of a felony (a) not classified as a violent offense or a sex

offense under this chapter, or (b) that is not the manufacture, 1 delivery, or possession with intent to manufacture or deliver a 2 controlled substance classified in Schedule I or II that is a narcotic 3 4 drug or flunitrazepam classified in Schedule IV, nor the manufacture, delivery, or possession with intent to deliver methamphetamine, its 5 salts, isomers, and salts of its isomers as defined in RCW б 7 69.50.206(d)(2), nor the selling for profit of any controlled substance 8 or counterfeit substance classified in Schedule I, RCW 69.50.204, 9 except leaves and flowering tops of marihuana, who previously has never 10 been convicted of a felony in this state, federal court, or another state, and who has never participated in a program of deferred 11 prosecution for a felony offense. 12

13 (((23))) (24) "Home detention" means a program of partial 14 confinement available to offenders wherein the offender is confined in 15 a private residence subject to electronic surveillance.

16 (25) "Most serious offense" means any of the following felonies or 17 a felony attempt to commit any of the following felonies, as now 18 existing or hereafter amended:

(a) Any felony defined under any law as a class A felony or
criminal solicitation of or criminal conspiracy to commit a class A
felony;

22 (b) Assault in the second degree;

23 (c) Assault of a child in the second degree;

24 (d) Child molestation in the second degree;

25 (e) Controlled substance homicide;

- 26 (f) Extortion in the first degree;
- 27 (g) Incest when committed against a child under age fourteen;

28 (h) Indecent liberties;

- 29 (i) Kidnapping in the second degree;
- 30 (j) Leading organized crime;
- 31 (k) Manslaughter in the first degree;
- 32 (1) Manslaughter in the second degree;
- 33 (m) Promoting prostitution in the first degree;
- 34 (n) Rape in the third degree;
- 35 (o) Robbery in the second degree;
- 36 (p) Sexual exploitation;
- 37 (q) Vehicular assault;

38 (r) Vehicular homicide, when proximately caused by the driving of39 any vehicle by any person while under the influence of intoxicating

1 liquor or any drug as defined by RCW 46.61.502, or by the operation of 2 any vehicle in a reckless manner;

3 (s) Any other class B felony offense with a finding of sexual
4 motivation, as "sexual motivation" is defined under this section;

5 (t) Any other felony with a deadly weapon verdict under RCW 6 9.94A.125;

7 (u) Any felony offense in effect at any time prior to December 2, 8 1993, that is comparable to a most serious offense under this 9 subsection, or any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense 10 that under the laws of this state would be a felony classified as a 11 most serious offense under this subsection;

(v)(i) A prior conviction for indecent liberties under RCW 12 13 9A.88.100(1) (a), (b), and (c), chapter 260, Laws of 1975 1st ex. sess. as it existed until July 1, 1979, RCW 9A.44.100(1) (a), (b), and (c) as 14 it existed from July 1, 1979, until June 11, 1986, and RCW 9A.44.100(1) 15 (a), (b), and (d) as it existed from June 11, 1986, until July 1, 1988; 16 17 A prior conviction for indecent liberties under RCW (ii) 9A.44.100(1)(c) as it existed from June 11, 1986, until July 1, 1988, 18 19 if: (A) The crime was committed against a child under the age of 20 fourteen; or (B) the relationship between the victim and perpetrator is included in the definition of indecent liberties 21 under RCW 9A.44.100(1)(c) as it existed from July 1, 1988, through July 27, 1997, 22 23 or RCW 9A.44.100(1) (d) or (e) as it existed from July 25, 1993, 24 through July 27, 1997.

25 (((24))) (26) "Nonviolent offense" means an offense which is not a 26 violent offense.

27 (((25))) (27) "Offender" means a person who has committed a felony established by state law and is eighteen years of age or older or is 28 less than eighteen years of age but whose case is under superior court 29 30 jurisdiction under RCW 13.04.030 or has been transferred by the 31 appropriate juvenile court to a criminal court pursuant to RCW Throughout this chapter, the terms 32 13.40.110. "offender" and "defendant" are used interchangeably. 33

34 (((26))) (28) "Partial confinement" means confinement for no more 35 than one year in a facility or institution operated or utilized under 36 contract by the state or any other unit of government, or, if home 37 detention or work crew has been ordered by the court, in an approved 38 residence, for a substantial portion of each day with the balance of 39 the day spent in the community. Partial confinement includes work

release, home detention, work crew, and a combination of work crew and
 home detention as defined in this section.

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(((27))) (29) "Persistent offender" is an offender who:

4 (a)(i) Has been convicted in this state of any felony considered a 5 most serious offense; and

(ii) Has, before the commission of the offense under (a) of this б 7 subsection, been convicted as an offender on at least two separate 8 occasions, whether in this state or elsewhere, of felonies that under 9 the laws of this state would be considered most serious offenses and 10 would be included in the offender score under RCW 9.94A.360; provided that of the two or more previous convictions, at least one conviction 11 must have occurred before the commission of any of the other most 12 serious offenses for which the offender was previously convicted; or 13 (b)(i) Has been convicted of: (A) Rape in the first degree, rape 14 15 of a child in the first degree, child molestation in the first degree, 16 rape in the second degree, rape of a child in the second degree, or 17 indecent liberties by forcible compulsion; (B) murder in the first degree, murder in the second degree, homicide by abuse, kidnapping in 18 19 the first degree, kidnapping in the second degree, assault in the first 20 degree, assault in the second degree, assault of a child in the first degree, or burglary in the first degree, with a finding of sexual 21 motivation; or (C) an attempt to commit any crime listed in this 22 subsection  $((\frac{27}{27}))$  <u>(29)</u>(b)(i); and 23

24 (ii) Has, before the commission of the offense under (b)(i) of this 25 subsection, been convicted as an offender on at least one occasion, 26 whether in this state or elsewhere, of an offense listed in (b)(i) of this subsection. A conviction for rape of a child in the first degree 27 constitutes a conviction under subsection  $\left(\frac{27}{27}\right)$  (29)(b)(i) only when 28 29 the offender was sixteen years of age or older when the offender 30 committed the offense. A conviction for rape of a child in the second 31 degree constitutes a conviction under subsection  $\left(\left(\frac{27}{27}\right)\right)$  (29)(b)(i) only when the offender was eighteen years of age or older when the 32 offender committed the offense. 33

(((28))) (30) "Postrelease supervision" is that portion of an offender's community placement that is not community custody.

36 (((29))) (31) "Restitution" means the requirement that the offender 37 pay a specific sum of money over a specific period of time to the court 38 as payment of damages. The sum may include both public and private costs. The imposition of a restitution order does not preclude civil
 redress.

((((30))) (32) "Risk assessment" means the application of an 3 4 objective instrument supported by research and adopted by the department for the purpose of assessing an offender's risk of 5 reoffense, taking into consideration the nature of the harm done by the 6 offender, place and circumstances of the offender related to risk, the 7 8 offender's relationship to any victim, and any information provided to the department by victims. The results of a risk assessment shall not 9 be based on unconfirmed or unconfirmable allegations. 10

11 <u>(33)</u> "Serious traffic offense" means:

(a) Driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or any drug (RCW 46.61.502), actual physical control while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or any drug (RCW 46.61.504), reckless driving (RCW 46.61.500), or hit-and-run an attended vehicle (RCW 46.52.020(5)); or

(b) Any federal, out-of-state, county, or municipal conviction for an offense that under the laws of this state would be classified as a serious traffic offense under (a) of this subsection.

20 (((31))) (34) "Serious violent offense" is a subcategory of violent 21 offense and means:

(a) Murder in the first degree, homicide by abuse, murder in the second degree, manslaughter in the first degree, assault in the first degree, kidnapping in the first degree, or rape in the first degree, assault of a child in the first degree, or an attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to commit one of these felonies; or

(b) Any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that
under the laws of this state would be a felony classified as a serious
violent offense under (a) of this subsection.

31 (((32))) (35) "Sentence range" means the sentencing court's 32 discretionary range in imposing a nonappealable sentence.

33 ((<del>(33)</del>)) <u>(36)</u> "Sex offense" means:

(a) A felony that is a violation of chapter 9A.44 RCW or RCW
9A.64.020 or 9.68A.090 or a felony that is, under chapter 9A.28 RCW, a
criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to
commit such crimes;

38 (b) A felony with a finding of sexual motivation under RCW 39 9.94A.127 or 13.40.135; or

(c) Any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that
 under the laws of this state would be a felony classified as a sex
 offense under (a) of this subsection.

4 (((34))) (37) "Sexual motivation" means that one of the purposes
5 for which the defendant committed the crime was for the purpose of his
6 or her sexual gratification.

7 ((<del>(35)</del>)) <u>(38)</u> "Total confinement" means confinement inside the 8 physical boundaries of a facility or institution operated or utilized 9 under contract by the state or any other unit of government for twenty-10 four hours a day, or pursuant to RCW 72.64.050 and 72.64.060.

(((36))) (39) "Transition training" means written and verbal instructions and assistance provided by the department to the offender during the two weeks prior to the offender's successful completion of the work ethic camp program. The transition training shall include instructions in the offender's requirements and obligations during the offender's period of community custody.

17 (((37))) (40) "Victim" means any person who has sustained 18 emotional, psychological, physical, or financial injury to person or 19 property as a direct result of the crime charged.

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((<del>(38)</del>)) <u>(41)</u> "Violent offense" means:

(a) Any of the following felonies, as now existing or hereafter 21 22 amended: Any felony defined under any law as a class A felony or an attempt to commit a class A felony, criminal solicitation of or 23 24 criminal conspiracy to commit a class A felony, manslaughter in the 25 first degree, manslaughter in the second degree, indecent liberties if 26 committed by forcible compulsion, kidnapping in the second degree, 27 arson in the second degree, assault in the second degree, assault of a child in the second degree, extortion in the first degree, robbery in 28 the second degree, drive-by shooting, vehicular assault, and vehicular 29 30 homicide, when proximately caused by the driving of any vehicle by any person while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or any drug as 31 defined by RCW 46.61.502, or by the operation of any vehicle in a 32 33 reckless manner;

(b) Any conviction for a felony offense in effect at any time prior
to July 1, 1976, that is comparable to a felony classified as a violent
offense in (a) of this subsection; and

(c) Any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that
 under the laws of this state would be a felony classified as a violent
 offense under (a) or (b) of this subsection.

((((39))) (42) "Work crew" means a program of partial confinement 1 consisting of civic improvement tasks for the benefit of the community 2 of not less than thirty-five hours per week that complies with RCW 3 4 9.94A.135. The civic improvement tasks shall have minimal negative impact on existing private industries or the labor force in the county 5 where the service or labor is performed. The civic improvement tasks 6 7 shall not affect employment opportunities for people with developmental 8 disabilities contracted through sheltered workshops as defined in RCW 9 82.04.385. Only those offenders sentenced to a facility operated or 10 utilized under contract by a county or the state, or sanctioned under <u>RCW 9.94A.205</u>, are eligible to participate on a work crew. Offenders 11 sentenced for a sex offense as defined in subsection  $\left(\left(\frac{33}{3}\right)\right)$  (36) of 12 this section are not eligible for the work crew program. 13

14 (((40))) (43) "Work ethic camp" means an alternative incarceration 15 program designed to reduce recidivism and lower the cost of corrections 16 by requiring offenders to complete a comprehensive array of real-world 17 job and vocational experiences, character-building work ethics skills development, 18 training, life management substance abuse 19 rehabilitation, counseling, literacy training, and basic adult 20 education.

(((41))) (44) "Work release" means a program of partial confinement available to offenders who are employed or engaged as a student in a regular course of study at school. Participation in work release shall be conditioned upon the offender attending work or school at regularly defined hours and abiding by the rules of the work release facility.

26 (((42) "Home detention" means a program of partial confinement 27 available to offenders wherein the offender is confined in a private 28 residence subject to electronic surveillance.))

Sec. 3. RCW 9.94A.040 and 1997 c 365 s 2 and 1997 c 338 s 3 are ach reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(1) A sentencing guidelines commission is established as an agencyof state government.

(2) The legislature finds that the commission, having accomplished
 its original statutory directive to implement this chapter, and having
 expertise in sentencing practice and policies, shall:

36 (a) Evaluate state sentencing policy, to include whether the37 sentencing ranges and standards are consistent with and further:

38 (i) The purposes of this chapter as defined in RCW 9.94A.010; and

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(ii) The intent of the legislature to emphasize confinement for the
 violent offender and alternatives to confinement for the nonviolent
 offender.

The commission shall provide the governor and the legislature with its evaluation and recommendations under this subsection not later than December 1, 1996, and every two years thereafter;

7 (b) Recommend to the legislature revisions or modifications to the 8 standard sentence ranges, state sentencing policy, prosecuting 9 standards, and other standards. If implementation of the revisions or 10 modifications would result in exceeding the capacity of correctional 11 facilities, then the commission shall accompany its recommendation with 12 an additional list of standard sentence ranges which are consistent 13 with correction capacity;

14 (c) Study the existing criminal code and from time to time make15 recommendations to the legislature for modification;

16 (d)(i) Serve as a clearinghouse and information center for the 17 collection, preparation, analysis, and dissemination of information on state and local adult and juvenile sentencing practices; (ii) develop 18 19 and maintain a computerized adult and juvenile sentencing information 20 system by individual superior court judge consisting of offender, offense, history, and sentence information entered from judgment and 21 sentence forms for all adult felons; and (iii) conduct ongoing research 22 regarding adult and juvenile sentencing guidelines, use of total 23 24 confinement and alternatives to total confinement, plea bargaining, and 25 other matters relating to the improvement of the adult criminal justice 26 system and the juvenile justice system;

(e) Assume the powers and duties of the juvenile dispositionstandards commission after June 30, 1996;

(f) Evaluate the effectiveness of existing disposition standards and related statutes in implementing policies set forth in RCW 13.40.010 generally, specifically review the guidelines relating to the confinement of minor and first offenders as well as the use of diversion, and review the application of current and proposed juvenile sentencing standards and guidelines for potential adverse impacts on the sentencing outcomes of racial and ethnic minority youth;

(g) Solicit the comments and suggestions of the juvenile justice community concerning disposition standards, and make recommendations to the legislature regarding revisions or modifications of the standards. The evaluations shall be submitted to the legislature on December 1 of

each odd-numbered year. The department of social and health services 1 shall provide the commission with available data concerning the 2 implementation of the disposition standards and related statutes and 3 4 their effect on the performance of the department's responsibilities juvenile offenders, and with recommendations 5 relating to for modification of the disposition standards. The office of б the 7 administrator for the courts shall provide the commission with 8 available data on diversion and dispositions of juvenile offenders 9 under chapter 13.40 RCW; and

(h) Not later than December 1, 1997, and at least every two years thereafter, based on available information, report to the governor and the legislature on:

13 (i) Racial disproportionality in juvenile and adult sentencing;

14 (ii) The capacity of state and local juvenile and adult facilities 15 and resources; and

(3) Each of the commission's recommended standard sentence ranges
shall include one or more of the following: Total confinement, partial
confinement, community supervision, community service, and a fine.

(4) The standard sentence ranges of total and partial confinementunder this chapter are subject to the following limitations:

(a) If the maximum term in the range is one year or less, the minimum term in the range shall be no less than one-third of the maximum term in the range, except that if the maximum term in the range is ninety days or less, the minimum term may be less than one-third of the maximum;

(b) If the maximum term in the range is greater than one year, the minimum term in the range shall be no less than seventy-five percent of the maximum term in the range, except that for murder in the second degree in seriousness category XIII under RCW 9.94A.310, the minimum term in the range shall be no less than fifty percent of the maximum term in the range; and

33 (c) The maximum term of confinement in a range may not exceed the34 statutory maximum for the crime as provided in RCW 9A.20.021.

(5)(a) Not later than December 31, 1999, the commission shall propose to the legislature the initial community custody ranges to be included in sentences under RCW 9.94A.120(11) for crimes committed on or after July 1, 2000. Not later than December 31 of each year, the commission may propose modifications to the ranges. The ranges shall

be based on the principles in RCW 9.94A.010, and shall take into account the funds available to the department for community custody. The minimum term in each range shall not be less than one-half of the maximum term.

5 (b) The legislature may, by enactment of a legislative bill, adopt 6 or modify the community custody ranges proposed by the commission. 11 When the sentencing guidelines commission proposes modifications to 12 ranges pursuant to this subsection, the legislature may, by enactment 13 of a bill, adopt or modify the ranges proposed by the commission for 14 crimes committed on or after July 1 of the year after they were 15 proposed. Unless the legislature adopts or modifies the commission's 16 proposal in its next regular session, the proposed ranges shall not 17 take effect.

18 (6) The commission shall exercise its duties under this section in 19 conformity with chapter 34.05 RCW.

Before imposing a sentence upon a defendant, the court shall conduct a sentencing hearing. The sentencing hearing shall be held within forty court days following conviction. Upon the motion of either party for good cause shown, or on its own motion, the court may extend the time period for conducting the sentencing hearing.

Except in cases where the defendant shall be sentenced to a term of total confinement for life without the possibility of release or, when authorized by RCW 10.95.030 for the crime of aggravated murder in the first degree, sentenced to death, the court may order the department to complete a risk assessment report. If available before sentencing, the report shall be provided to the court.

When a person is convicted of a felony, the court shall impose punishment as provided in this section.

(1) Except as authorized in subsections (2), (4), (5), (6), and (8)
of this section, the court shall impose a sentence within the sentence
range for the offense.

30 (2) The court may impose a sentence outside the standard sentence 31 range for that offense if it finds, considering the purpose of this 32 chapter, that there are substantial and compelling reasons justifying 33 an exceptional sentence.

(3) Whenever a sentence outside the standard range is imposed, the
court shall set forth the reasons for its decision in written findings
of fact and conclusions of law. A sentence outside the standard range
shall be a determinate sentence.

Any period of community 14 15 custody actually served shall be credited against the community placement portion of the sentence. 16

13 (10)(a) When a court sentences a person to the custody of the department of corrections for an offense categorized as a sex offense 14 15 committed on or after June 6, 1996, but before July 1, 2000, the court 16 shall, in addition to other terms of the sentence, sentence the 17 offender to community custody for three years or up to the period of earned ((early)) release awarded pursuant to RCW 9.94A.150 (1) and (2), 18 19 whichever is longer. The community custody shall begin either upon 20 completion of the term of confinement or at such time as the offender is transferred to community custody in lieu of earned ((early)) release 21 in accordance with RCW 9.94A.150 (1) and (2). 22

(b) Unless a condition is waived by the court, the terms of 23 24 community custody shall be the same as those provided for in subsection 25 (9)(b) of this section and may include those provided for in subsection (9)(c) of this section. As part of any sentence that includes a term 26 27 of community custody imposed under this subsection, the court shall also require the offender to comply with any conditions imposed by the 28 29 department of corrections under subsection (((14))) (15) of this 30 section.

31 (c) At any time prior to the completion of a sex offender's term of community custody, if the court finds that public safety would be 32 enhanced, the court may impose and enforce an order extending any or 33 34 all of the conditions imposed pursuant to this section for a period up to the maximum allowable sentence for the crime as it is classified in 35 chapter 9A.20 RCW, regardless of the expiration of the offender's term 36 37 of community custody. If a violation of a condition extended under this subsection occurs after the expiration of the offender's term of 38 39 community custody, it shall be deemed a violation of the sentence for

1 the purposes of RCW 9.94A.195 and may be punishable as contempt of 2 court as provided for in RCW 7.21.040.

3 (11)(a) When a court sentences a person to the custody of the department of corrections for a sex offense, a violent offense, any 4 crime against a person under RCW 9.94A.440(2), or a felony offense 5 under chapter 69.50 or 69.52 RCW not sentenced under subsection (6) of 6 this section, committed on or after July 1, 2000, the court shall in 7 8 addition to the other terms of the sentence, sentence the offender to 9 community custody for the community custody range or up to the period of earned release awarded pursuant to RCW 9.94A.150 (1) and (2), 10 whichever is longer. The community custody shall begin either upon 11 12 completion of the term of confinement or at such time as the offender is transferred to community custody in lieu of earned release in 13 14 accordance with RCW 9.94A.150 (1) and (2).

(b) Unless a condition is waived by the court, the conditions of 15 community custody shall include those provided for in subsection 16 (9)(b)(i) through (vi) of this section. The court may also order the offender to participate in 19 rehabilitative programs or otherwise perform affirmative conduct 20 reasonably related to the circumstances of the offense, the offender's 21 risk of reoffending, or the safety of the community, and the department 22 23 shall enforce such conditions pursuant to (f) of this subsection. As 24 part of any sentence that includes a term of community custody imposed under this subsection, the court shall also require the offender to 25 26 comply with any conditions imposed by the department of corrections under subsection (15) of this section. In 33 34 setting, modifying, and enforcing conditions of community custody, the department shall be deemed to be performing a quasi-judicial function. 35 36 (c) If an offender violates conditions imposed by the court or the 37 department pursuant to this subsection during community custody, the department may transfer the offender to a more restrictive confinement 38

1 status and impose other available sanctions as provided in RCW
2 9.94A.205 and 9.94A.207.

3 (d) Except for terms of community custody under subsection (8) of 4 this section, the department shall discharge the offender from 5 community custody on a date determined by the department, which the 6 department may modify, based on risk and performance of the offender, 7 within the range or at the end of the period of earned release, 8 whichever is later.

9 (e) At any time prior to the completion or termination of a sex offender's term of community custody, if the court finds that public 10 safety would be enhanced, the court may impose and enforce an order 11 extending any or all of the conditions imposed pursuant to this section 12 13 for a period up to the maximum allowable sentence for the crime as it 14 is classified in chapter 9A.20 RCW, regardless of the expiration of the offender's term of community custody. If a violation of a condition 15 extended under this subsection occurs after the expiration of the 16 offender's term of community custody, it shall be deemed a violation of 17 the sentence for the purposes of RCW 9.94A.195 and may be punishable as 18 19 contempt of court as provided for in RCW 7.21.040. (g) By the close of the next business day after receiving notice of a condition imposed or modified by the department, an offender may request an administrative review under rules adopted by the department. The condition shall remain in effect unless the reviewing officer finds that it is not reasonably related to any of the following: (i) The crime of conviction; (ii) the offender's risk of reoffending; or (iii) the safety of the community.

36 (12) If the court imposes a sentence requiring confinement of 37 thirty days or less, the court may, in its discretion, specify that the 38 sentence be served on consecutive or intermittent days. A sentence 39 requiring more than thirty days of confinement shall be served on consecutive days. Local jail administrators may schedule court-ordered

33 (((13))) (14) Except as provided under RCW 9.94A.140(1) and 34 9.94A.142(1), a court may not impose a sentence providing for a term of 35 confinement or community supervision ((or)), community placement, or 36 <u>community custody</u> which exceeds the statutory maximum for the crime as 37 provided in chapter 9A.20 RCW.

38 (((14))) (15) All offenders sentenced to terms involving community 39 supervision, community service, community placement, <u>community custody</u>,

1 or legal financial obligation shall be under the supervision of the 2 department of corrections and shall follow explicitly the instructions 3 and conditions of the department of corrections. The department may 4 require an offender to perform affirmative acts it deems appropriate to 5 monitor compliance with the conditions of the sentence imposed.

Offenders who own, use, or are found to be in actual or constructive possession of 5 firearms or ammunition shall be subject to the appropriate violation 6 7 process and sanctions. "Constructive possession" as used in this 8 subsection means the power and intent to control the firearm or 9 ammunition. "Firearm" as used in this subsection means a weapon or 10 device from which a projectile may be fired by an explosive such as 11 gunpowder.

12 ((<del>(16)</del>)) <u>(17)</u> The sentencing court shall give the offender credit 13 for all confinement time served before the sentencing if that 14 confinement was solely in regard to the offense for which the offender 15 is being sentenced.

16 (((17))) (18) A departure from the standards in RCW 9.94A.400 (1) 17 and (2) governing whether sentences are to be served consecutively or 18 concurrently is an exceptional sentence subject to the limitations in 19 subsections (2) and (3) of this section, and may be appealed by the 20 defendant or the state as set forth in RCW 9.94A.210 (2) through (6).

(((18))) (19) The court shall order restitution whenever the offender is convicted of a felony that results in injury to any person or damage to or loss of property, whether the offender is sentenced to confinement or placed under community supervision, unless extraordinary circumstances exist that make restitution inappropriate in the court's judgment. The court shall set forth the extraordinary circumstances in the record if it does not order restitution.

(((19))) (20) As a part of any sentence, the court may impose and enforce an order that relates directly to the circumstances of the crime for which the offender has been convicted, prohibiting the offender from having any contact with other specified individuals or a specific class of individuals for a period not to exceed the maximum allowable sentence for the crime, regardless of the expiration of the offender's term of community supervision or community placement.

35 (((20))) (21) The court may order an offender whose sentence 36 includes community placement or community supervision to undergo a 37 mental status evaluation and to participate in available outpatient 38 mental health treatment, if the court finds that reasonable grounds 39 exist to believe that the offender is a mentally ill person as defined

1 in RCW 71.24.025, and that this condition is likely to have influenced 2 the offense. An order requiring mental status evaluation or treatment 3 must be based on a presentence report and, if applicable, mental status 4 evaluations that have been filed with the court to determine the 5 offender's competency or eligibility for a defense of insanity. The 6 court may order additional evaluations at a later date if deemed 7 appropriate.

8 ((<del>(21)</del>)) <u>(22)</u> In any sentence of partial confinement, the court may 9 require the defendant to serve the partial confinement in work release, 10 in a program of home detention, on work crew, or in a combined program 11 of work crew and home detention.

12 (((22))) (23) All court-ordered legal financial obligations 13 collected by the department and remitted to the county clerk shall be 14 credited and paid where restitution is ordered. Restitution shall be 15 paid prior to any other payments of monetary obligations.

(24)(a) Sex offender examinations and treatment ordered as a 16 special condition of community placement or community custody under 17 this section shall be conducted only by sex offender treatment 18 19 providers certified by the department of health under chapter 18.155 RCW unless the court finds that: (i) The offender has already moved to 20 another state or plans to move to another state for reasons other than 21 circumventing the certification requirements; (ii) no certified 22 23 providers are available for treatment within a reasonable geographic 24 distance of the offender's home, as determined in rules adopted by the secretary; or (iii) the evaluation and treatment plan comply with the 25 rules adopted by the department of health. A treatment provider 26 selected by an offender who is not certified by the department of 27 health shall consult with a certified provider during the offender's 28 29 period of treatment to ensure compliance with the rules adopted by the 30 department of health. The frequency and content of the consultation shall be based on the recommendation of the certified provider. 31

32 (b) A sex offender's failure to participate in treatment required 33 as a condition of community placement or community custody is a 34 violation that will not be excused on the basis that no treatment 35 provider was located within a reasonable geographic distance of the 36 offender's home.

(1) Whenever a person is convicted of a felony, the court may order 1 2 the payment of a legal financial obligation as part of the sentence. 3 The court must on either the judgment and sentence or on a subsequent 4 order to pay, designate the total amount of a legal financial 5 obligation and segregate this amount among the separate assessments made for restitution, costs, fines, and other assessments required by 6 7 On the same order, the court is also to set a sum that the law. 8 offender is required to pay on a monthly basis towards satisfying the 9 legal financial obligation. If the court fails to set the offender 10 monthly payment amount, the department shall set the amount. 3 (4) All legal financial obligations that are ordered as a result of 4 a conviction for a felony, may also be enforced in the same manner as 5 a judgment in a civil action by the party or entity to whom the legal financial obligation is owed. Restitution collected through civil 6 7 enforcement must be paid through the registry of the court and must be 8 distributed proportionately according to each victim's loss when there 9 is more than one victim. The judgment and sentence shall identify the 10 party or entity to whom restitution is owed so that the state, party, or entity may enforce the judgment. (5) In order to assist the court in setting a monthly sum that the 31 offender must pay during the period of supervision, the offender is 32 33 required to report to the department for purposes of preparing a 34 recommendation to the court. When reporting, the offender is required, 35 under oath, to truthfully and honestly respond to all questions concerning present, past, and future earning capabilities and the 36 37 location and nature of all property or financial assets. The offender is further required to bring any and all documents as requested by the 38 39 department.

1 (6) After completing the investigation, the department shall make 2 a report to the court on the amount of the monthly payment that the 3 offender should be required to make towards a satisfied legal financial 4 obligation.

(7) During the period of supervision, the department may make a 5 recommendation to the court that the offender's monthly payment 6 7 schedule be modified so as to reflect a change in financial 8 circumstances. If the department sets the monthly payment amount, the 9 department may modify the monthly payment amount without the matter being returned to the court. Also, during the period of supervision, 10 the offender may be required at the request of the department to report 11 to the department for the purposes of reviewing the appropriateness of 12 the collection schedule for the legal financial obligation. During 13 this reporting, the offender is required under oath to truthfully and 14 15 honestly respond to all questions concerning earning capabilities and 16 the location and nature of all property or financial assets. 19 (8) After the judgment and sentence or payment order is entered, 20 the department shall for any period of supervision be authorized to collect the legal financial obligation from the offender. Any amount 21 collected by the department shall be remitted daily to the county clerk 22 23 for the purposes of disbursements. The department is authorized to 24 accept credit cards as payment for a legal financial obligation, and 25 any costs incurred related to accepting credit card payments shall be 26 the responsibility of the offender.

(9) The department or any obligee of the legal financial obligation
may seek a mandatory wage assignment for the purposes of obtaining

(10) The requirement that the offender pay a monthly sum towards a legal financial obligation constitutes a condition or requirement of a sentence and the offender is subject to the penalties as provided in RCW 9.94A.200 for noncompliance.

35 (11) The county clerk shall provide the department with 36 individualized monthly billings for each offender with an unsatisfied 37 legal financial obligation and shall provide the department with notice 38 of payments by such offenders no less frequently than weekly.

1 (12) The department may arrange for the collection of unpaid legal 2 financial obligations through the county clerk, or through another 3 entity if the clerk does not assume responsibility for collection. The 4 costs for collection services shall be paid by the offender.

Within seven days after the hearing officer's decision, the 32 offender may appeal the decision to a panel of three reviewing officers 33 34 designated by the secretary or the secretary's designee. The sanction shall be reversed or modified if a majority of the panel finds that the 35 36 sanction was not reasonably related to any of the following: (i) The 37 crime of conviction; (ii) the violation committed; (iii) the offender's risk of reoffending; or (iv) the safety of the community. 38

1 (5) For purposes of this section, no finding of a violation of 2 conditions may be based on unconfirmed or unconfirmable allegations.

An offender shall be on community ((supervision)) custody as of the date of sentencing. However, during the time for which the offender is in total or partial confinement pursuant to the sentence or a violation of the sentence, the period of community ((supervision))
 <u>custody</u> shall toll.

3 Sec. 11. RCW 9.94A.440 and 1996 c 93 s 2 are each amended to read 4 as follows:

(1) Decision not to prosecute.

6 STANDARD: A prosecuting attorney may decline to prosecute, even 7 though technically sufficient evidence to prosecute exists, in 8 situations where prosecution would serve no public purpose, would 9 defeat the underlying purpose of the law in question or would result in 10 decreased respect for the law.

11 GUIDELINE/COMMENTARY:

12 Examples

13 The following are examples of reasons not to prosecute which could 14 satisfy the standard.

(a) Contrary to Legislative Intent - It may be proper to decline to
 charge where the application of criminal sanctions would be clearly
 contrary to the intent of the legislature in enacting the particular
 statute.

(b) Antiquated Statute - It may be proper to decline to chargewhere the statute in question is antiquated in that:

21 (i) It has not been enforced for many years; and

22 (ii) Most members of society act as if it were no longer in 23 existence; and

24 (iii) It serves no deterrent or protective purpose in today's 25 society; and

26 (iv) The statute has not been recently reconsidered by the 27 legislature.

This reason is not to be construed as the basis for declining cases because the law in question is unpopular or because it is difficult to enforce.

31 (c) De Minimus Violation - It may be proper to decline to charge 32 where the violation of law is only technical or insubstantial and where 33 no public interest or deterrent purpose would be served by prosecution.

(d) Confinement on Other Charges - It may be proper to decline to
 charge because the accused has been sentenced on another charge to a
 lengthy period of confinement; and

(i) Conviction of the new offense would not merit any additionaldirect or collateral punishment;

(ii) The new offense is either a misdemeanor or a felony which is
 not particularly aggravated; and

3 (iii) Conviction of the new offense would not serve any significant4 deterrent purpose.

5 (e) Pending Conviction on Another Charge - It may be proper to 6 decline to charge because the accused is facing a pending prosecution 7 in the same or another county; and

8 (i) Conviction of the new offense would not merit any additional9 direct or collateral punishment;

10 (ii) Conviction in the pending prosecution is imminent;

11 (iii) The new offense is either a misdemeanor or a felony which is 12 not particularly aggravated; and

(iv) Conviction of the new offense would not serve any significantdeterrent purpose.

(f) High Disproportionate Cost of Prosecution - It may be proper to decline to charge where the cost of locating or transporting, or the burden on, prosecution witnesses is highly disproportionate to the importance of prosecuting the offense in question. This reason should be limited to minor cases and should not be relied upon in serious cases.

(g) Improper Motives of Complainant - It may be proper to decline charges because the motives of the complainant are improper and prosecution would serve no public purpose, would defeat the underlying purpose of the law in question or would result in decreased respect for the law.

(h) Immunity - It may be proper to decline to charge where immunity is to be given to an accused in order to prosecute another where the accused's information or testimony will reasonably lead to the conviction of others who are responsible for more serious criminal conduct or who represent a greater danger to the public interest.

(i) Victim Request - It may be proper to decline to charge because the victim requests that no criminal charges be filed and the case involves the following crimes or situations:

34 (i) Assault cases where the victim has suffered little or no 35 injury;

36 (ii) Crimes against property, not involving violence, where no 37 major loss was suffered;

38 (iii) Where doing so would not jeopardize the safety of society.

1 Care should be taken to insure that the victim's request is freely 2 made and is not the product of threats or pressure by the accused.

3 The presence of these factors may also justify the decision to 4 dismiss a prosecution which has been commenced.

5 Notification

6 The prosecutor is encouraged to notify the victim, when practical, 7 and the law enforcement personnel, of the decision not to prosecute.

- 8 (2) Decision to prosecute.
- 9 <u>(a)</u> STANDARD:

Crimes against persons will be filed if sufficient admissible 10 evidence exists, which, when considered with the most plausible, 11 reasonably foreseeable defense that could be raised under the evidence, 12 would justify conviction by a reasonable and objective fact-finder. 13 14 With regard to offenses prohibited by RCW 9A.44.040, 9A.44.050, 9A.44.073, 9A.44.076, 9A.44.079, 9A.44.083, 9A.44.086, 9A.44.089, and 15 9A.64.020 the prosecutor should avoid prefiling agreements or 16 diversions intended to place the accused in a program of treatment or 17 counseling, so that treatment, if determined to be beneficial, can be 18 19 provided pursuant to RCW 9.94A.120(8).

20 Crimes against property/other crimes will be filed if the 21 admissible evidence is of such convincing force as to make it probable 22 that a reasonable and objective fact-finder would convict after hearing 23 all the admissible evidence and the most plausible defense that could 24 be raised.

8 This standard is intended to direct prosecutors to charge those 9 crimes which demonstrate the nature and seriousness of a defendant's 10 criminal conduct, but to decline to charge crimes which are not 11 necessary to such an indication. Crimes which do not merge as a matter 12 of law, but which arise from the same course of conduct, do not all 13 have to be charged.

14 (b) GUIDELINES/COMMENTARY:

15 <u>(i)</u> Police Investigation

A prosecuting attorney is dependent upon law enforcement agencies to conduct the necessary factual investigation which must precede the decision to prosecute. The prosecuting attorney shall ensure that a thorough factual investigation has been conducted before a decision to prosecute is made. In ordinary circumstances the investigation should include the following:

22 (((+))) (A) The interviewing of all material witnesses, together 23 with the obtaining of written statements whenever possible;

24 (((+2))) (B) The completion of necessary laboratory tests; and

25 (((3))) <u>(C)</u> The obtaining, in accordance with constitutional 26 requirements, of the suspect's version of the events.

If the initial investigation is incomplete, a prosecuting attorney should insist upon further investigation before a decision to prosecute is made, and specify what the investigation needs to include.

30 <u>(ii)</u> Exceptions

In certain situations, a prosecuting attorney may authorize filing of a criminal complaint before the investigation is complete if:

33 (((<del>(1)</del>)) <u>(A)</u> Probable cause exists to believe the suspect is guilty; 34 and

35 (((2))) (B) The suspect presents a danger to the community or is 36 likely to flee if not apprehended; or

37 (((3))) <u>(C)</u> The arrest of the suspect is necessary to complete the 38 investigation of the crime.

In the event that the exception to the standard is applied, the 1 prosecuting attorney shall obtain a commitment from the law enforcement 2 agency involved to complete the investigation in a timely manner. If 3 4 the subsequent investigation does not produce sufficient evidence to meet the normal charging standard, the complaint should be dismissed. 5

(iii) Investigation Techniques 6

7 The prosecutor should be fully advised of the investigatory 8 techniques that were used in the case investigation including:

9 (((1))) (A) Polygraph testing;

((<del>(3)</del>)) <u>(C)</u> Electronic surveillance; 11

(((++))) (D) Use of informants. 12

13 (iv) Pre-Filing Discussions with Defendant

14 Discussions with the defendant or his/her representative regarding 15 the selection or disposition of charges may occur prior to the filing 16 of charges, and potential agreements can be reached.

17

(v) Pre-Filing Discussions with Victim(s)

Discussions with the victim(s) or victims' representatives 18 19 regarding the selection or disposition of charges may occur before the 20 filing of charges. The discussions may be considered by the prosecutor in charging and disposition decisions, and should be considered before 21 22 reaching any agreement with the defendant regarding these decisions.

23 NEW SECTION. Sec. 12. A new section is added to chapter 72.09 RCW 24 to read as follows:

25 Except as specifically prohibited by other law, and for purposes of 26 determining, modifying, or monitoring compliance with conditions of 27 community custody, community placement, or community supervision as authorized under RCW 9.94A.120 and 9.94A.383, the department: 28

3 To the extent practicable, the department shall deploy community 4 corrections staff on the basis of geographic areas in which offenders 5 under the department's jurisdiction are located, and shall establish a 6 systematic means of assessing risk to the safety of those communities.

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 14. The secretary of corrections may adopt 8 rules to implement sections 1 through 13 of this act.

(1) The Washington state institute for public policy shall conduct a study of the effect of the use of community custody under this act. The study shall include the effect of this act on recidivism and other outcomes. In its study the institute shall consider:

(a) Recidivism, according to the definition adopted by theinstitute pursuant to section 59, chapter 338, Laws of 1997;

17 (b) The number and seriousness level of violations of conditions;

(2) By January 1, 2000, the institute shall report to the legislature on the design for the study. By January 1st of each year thereafter, the institute shall report to the legislature on the progress and findings of the study and make recommendations based on its findings. By January 1, 2010, the institute shall provide to the legislature a final report on the findings of the study.

34 (3) This section expires December 31, 2010.

35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 16.** This act may be known and cited as the 36 offender accountability act.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 17. Section 10 of this act takes effect July 1,
 2000, and applies only to offenses committed on or after July 1, 2000.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 18. If any provision of this act or its 4 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 5 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 6 persons or circumstances is not affected.

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
