AN ACT Relating to tuition setting in higher education; amending RCW 28B.15.031, 28B.15.066, 28B.15.067, 28B.15.069, 28B.15.100, 28B.20.130, 28B.30.150, 28B.35.120, 28B.40.120, and 28B.50.090; creating a new section; and repealing RCW 28B.15.110.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. It is the intent of the legislature that 7 Washington residents have access to colleges and universities in this state that provide a high-quality education, preparing students to 8 become partners in improving their communities and this state. 9 То 10 sustain excellence in higher education, adequate resources must be committed to ensure quality in instruction, research, and public 11 12 service. The legislature is responsible for providing adequate funding 13 to sustain excellence and develop strategies to make improvements as 14 necessary. To provide a reliable measure to judge the adequacy of 15 state funding, goals shall be established to achieve funding levels of public institutions of higher education at or above the average of 16 public, per-student funding of peer institutions in other states. 17 In concert with state funding, part of the responsibility for quality 18 19 higher education is borne by student contributions in the form of

1 tuition. The legislature further intends that financial aid for needy 2 students increases in relation to increasing tuition. This act 3 establishes a permanent tuition policy for the state's public higher 4 education system and establishes average peer tuition levels as the 5 goal for the University of Washington.

6 Sec. 2. RCW 28B.15.031 and 1996 c 142 s 2 are each amended to read 7 as follows:

8 The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall include the 9 fees, other than building fees, charged all students registering at the state's colleges and universities but shall not include fees for short 10 courses, self-supporting degree credit programs and courses, marine 11 12 station work, experimental station work, correspondence or extension courses, and individual instruction and student deposits or rentals, 13 14 disciplinary and library fines, which colleges and universities shall 15 have the right to impose, laboratory, gymnasium, health, technology and student activity fees, or fees, charges, rentals, and other income 16 derived from any or all revenue producing lands, buildings and 17 18 facilities of the colleges or universities heretofore or hereafter 19 acquired, constructed or installed, including but not limited to income from rooms, dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing 20 or student activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or 21 22 the appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be 23 established by any college or university board of trustees or regents 24 from time to time. All moneys received as operating fees at any 25 institution of higher education shall be deposited in a local account containing only operating fees revenue and related interest: PROVIDED, 26 27 That a minimum of three and one-half percent of operating fees shall be retained by the institutions((, except the technical colleges,)) for 28 29 the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820. Local operating fee accounts shall not 30 be subject to appropriation by the legislature or allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW. 31

32 Sec. 3. RCW 28B.15.066 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 9 s 3 are each amended 33 to read as follows:

34 It is the intent of the legislature that:

In making appropriations from the state's general fund to institutions of higher education, each appropriation shall conform to the following:

1 (1) The appropriation shall not be reduced by the amount of 2 operating fees revenue estimated to be collected from students enrolled 3 at the state-funded enrollment level specified in the omnibus biennial 4 operating appropriations act;

26 (((4))) (3) For the ((1997-98 and)) 1998-99 academic year((s)), the 27 University of Washington shall use at least ten percent of the revenue 28 received from the difference between a four percent increase in tuition 29 fees and the actual increase charged to law students to assist needy 30 low and middle-income resident law students. (4) For the 1999-2000 academic year and each academic year 1 thereafter, the governing boards of the state universities, regional 2 3 universities, The Evergreen State College, and the state board for 4 community and technical colleges may reduce full-time operating fees from the levels for academic year 1998-99 or from levels for any year 5 thereafter, may increase full-time operating fees no more than five 6 7 percent per year for resident undergraduate students, and may increase 8 full-time operating fees no more than twenty percent per academic year 9 for all other students during the academic year and all categories of students during the summer term. However, with respect to full-time 10 resident undergraduate students, in order to provide the means to 11 progress significantly toward the goal of tuition rates approximating 12 that of peer institutions, the governing board of the University of 13 14 Washington may instead increase the previous quarter's operating fees 15 for full-time, resident undergraduate students up to fifty dollars per guarter for each guarter of academic years 1999-2000 and 2000-01. 16

(2) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, as used in this

6 (3) The building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage 7 of ((total tuition fees)) the operating fee for each tuition category. 8 This percentage shall be ((calculated by the higher education 9 coordinating board and be based on)) the actual percentage the building 10 fee ((is)) was of ((total tuition)) the operating fee for each tuition 11 category in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded ((up)) to the nearest 12 half percent.

13 (4) The governing boards of each institution of higher education, except for the technical colleges, shall charge to and collect from 14 15 each student a services and activities fee. A governing board may 16 increase the existing fee annually, consistent with budgeting procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not to exceed 17 18 the annual percentage increase in student tuition fees for the 19 applicable tuition category: PROVIDED, That such percentage increase 20 shall not apply to that portion of the services and activities fee previously committed to the repayment of bonded debt. The services and 21 22 activities fee committee provided for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a 23 request to the governing board for a fee increase.

(5) Tuition and services and activities fees consistent with subsection (4) of this section shall be set by the state board for community and technical colleges for community college summer school students unless the community college charges fees in accordance with RCW 28B.15.515.

(6) Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, each governing board of a community college may charge such fees for ungraded courses, noncredit courses, community services courses, and self-supporting courses as it, in its discretion, may determine, consistent with the rules of the state board for community and technical colleges.

32 General powers and duties of the board of regents are as follows: 33 (1) To have full control of the university and its property of 34 various kinds, except as otherwise provided by law.

35 (2) To employ the president of the university, his or her 36 assistants, members of the faculty, and employees of the institution, 37 who except as otherwise provided by law, shall hold their positions 38 during the pleasure of said board of regents.

(7) Accept such gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises, 21 whether real or personal property, or both, in trust or otherwise, for 22 23 the use or benefit of the university, its colleges, schools, 24 departments, or agencies; and sell, lease or exchange, invest or expend 25 the same or the proceeds, rents, profits, and income thereof except as 26 limited by the terms of said gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and 27 devises. The board shall adopt proper rules to govern and protect the receipt and expenditure of the proceeds of all fees, and the proceeds, 28 rents, profits, and income of all gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, 29 30 and devises ((above-mentioned)) in this subsection.

(8) Except as otherwise provided by law, to enter into suchcontracts as the regents deem essential to university purposes.

(9) To submit upon request such reports as will be helpful to thegovernor and to the legislature in providing for the institution.

6 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28B.30.150 and 1998 c 245 s 19 are each amended to 7 read as follows:

8 The regents of Washington State University, in addition to other 9 duties prescribed by law, shall:

(1) Have full control of the university and its property of variouskinds, except as otherwise provided by law.

(2) Employ the president of the university, his or her assistants,
members of the faculty, and employees of the university, who, except as
otherwise provided by law, shall hold their positions during the
pleasure of said board of regents.

(3) Establish entrance requirements for students seeking admission to the university which meet or exceed the standards specified under RCW 28B.80.350(2). Completion of examinations satisfactory to the university may be a prerequisite for entrance by any applicant, at the university's discretion. Evidence of completion of public high schools and other educational institutions whose courses of study meet the approval of the university may be acceptable for entrance.

(4) Establish such colleges, schools, or departments necessary to
 carry out the purpose of the university and not otherwise proscribed by
 law.

(5) Subject to the approval of the higher education coordinating board pursuant to RCW 28B.80.340, offer new degree programs, offer offcampus programs, participate in consortia or centers, contract for offcampus educational programs, and purchase or lease major off-campus facilities.

(6) With the assistance of the faculty of the university, prescribe the courses of instruction in the various colleges, schools, and departments of the institution and publish the necessary catalogues thereof.

(7) Collect such information as the board deems desirable as to the
 schemes of technical instruction adopted in other parts of the United
 States and foreign countries.

(8) Provide for holding agricultural institutes including farm
 marketing forums.

3 (9) Provide that instruction given in the university, as far as 4 practicable, be conveyed by means of laboratory work and provide in 5 connection with the university one or more physical, chemical, and 6 biological laboratories, and suitably furnish and equip the same.

7 (10) Provide training in military tactics for those students8 electing to participate therein.

9 (11) Establish a department of elementary science and in connection 10 therewith provide instruction in elementary mathematics, including 11 elementary trigonometry, elementary mechanics, elementary and 12 mechanical drawing, and land surveying.

13 (12) Establish a department of agriculture and in connection 14 therewith provide instruction in physics with special application of 15 its principles to agriculture, chemistry with special application of 16 its principles to agriculture, morphology and physiology of plants with 17 special reference to common grown crops and fungus enemies, morphology and physiology of the lower forms of animal life, with special 18 19 reference to insect pests, morphology and physiology of the higher 20 forms of animal life and in particular of the horse, cow, sheep, and swine, agriculture with special reference to the breeding and feeding 21 of livestock and the best mode of cultivation of farm produce, and 22 mining and metallurgy, appointing demonstrators in each of these 23 24 subjects to superintend the equipment of a laboratory and to give 25 practical instruction therein.

(13) Establish agricultural experiment stations in connection with the department of agriculture, including at least one in the western portion of the state, and appoint the officers and prescribe regulations for their management.

30 (14) Grant to students such certificates or degrees, as recommended31 for such students by the faculty.

(15) Confer honorary degrees upon persons other than graduates of the university in recognition of their learning or devotion to literature, art, or science when recommended thereto by the faculty: PROVIDED, That no degree shall ever be conferred in consideration of the payment of money or the giving of property of whatsoever kind.

(16) Adopt plans and specifications for university buildings and
 facilities or improvements thereto and employ skilled architects and
 engineers to prepare such plans and specifications and supervise the

construction of buildings or facilities which the board is authorized 1 2 to erect, and fix the compensation for such services. The board shall enter into contracts with one or more contractors for such suitable 3 4 buildings, facilities, or improvements as the available funds will warrant, upon the most advantageous terms offered at a public 5 competitive letting, pursuant to public notice under rules established б 7 The board shall require of all persons with whom they by the board. contract for construction and improvements a good and sufficient bond 8 9 for the faithful performance of the work and full protection against 10 all liens.

11 (17) Except as otherwise provided by law, direct the disposition of 12 all money appropriated to or belonging to the state university.

13 (18) Receive and expend the money appropriated under the act of congress approved May 8, 1914, entitled "An Act to provide for 14 15 cooperative agricultural extension work between the agricultural 16 colleges in the several States receiving the benefits of the Act of Congress approved July 2, 1862, and Acts supplemental thereto and the 17 United States Department of Agriculture" and organize and conduct 18 19 agricultural extension work in connection with the state university in 20 accordance with the terms and conditions expressed in the acts of 21 congress.

(19) Except as otherwise provided by law, to enter into suchcontracts as the regents deem essential to university purposes.

(20) Acquire by lease, gift, or otherwise, lands necessary to
 further the work of the university or for experimental or
 demonstrational purposes.

(21) Establish and maintain at least one agricultural experiment 27 station in an irrigation district to conduct investigational work upon 28 29 the principles and practices of irrigational agriculture including the 30 utilization of water and its relation to soil types, crops, climatic 31 conditions, ditch and drain construction, fertility investigations, plant disease, insect pests, marketing, farm management, utilization of 32 33 fruit byproducts, and general development of agriculture under irrigation conditions. 34

35 (22) Supervise and control the agricultural experiment station at36 Puyallup.

(23) Establish and maintain at Wenatchee an agricultural experiment
 substation for the purpose of conducting investigational work upon the
 principles and practices of orchard culture, spraying, fertilization,

pollenization, new fruit varieties, fruit diseases and pests, 1 2 byproducts, marketing, management, and general horticultural problems. (24) Accept such gifts, grants, conveyances, devises, and bequests, 3 4 whether real or personal property, in trust or otherwise, for the use 5 or benefit of the university, its colleges, schools, or departments; and sell, lease or exchange, invest or expend the same or the proceeds, 6 7 rents, profits, and income thereof except as limited by the terms of 8 said gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises; and adopt 9 proper rules to govern and protect the receipt and expenditure of the 10 proceeds of all fees, and the proceeds, rents, profits, and income of 11 all gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises.

12 (25) Construct when the board so determines a new foundry and a 13 mining, physical, technological building, and fabrication shop at the university, or add to the present foundry and other buildings, in order 14 15 that both instruction and research be expanded to include permanent molding and die casting with a section for new fabricating techniques, 16 17 especially for light metals, including magnesium and aluminum; purchase equipment for the shops and laboratories in mechanical, electrical, and 18 19 civil engineering; establish a pilot plant for the extraction of 20 alumina from native clays and other possible light metal research; purchase equipment for a research laboratory for technological research 21 22 generally; and purchase equipment for research in electronics, 23 instrumentation, energy sources, plastics, food technology, mechanics 24 of materials, hydraulics, and similar fields.

(26) Make and transmit to the governor and members of the legislature upon request such reports as will be helpful in providing for the institution.

28 (27) Establish operating fees tuition rates according to RCW

30 (28) Establish salary and wage compensation levels for all 31 employees of the university except as otherwise provided by state law 32 or collective bargaining agreements.

33 **Sec. 9.** RCW 28B.35.120 and 1985 c 370 s 94 are each amended to 34 read as follows:

In addition to any other powers and duties prescribed by law, each board of trustees of the respective regional universities:

(1) Shall have full control of the regional university and itsproperty of various kinds, except as otherwise provided by law.

1 (2) Shall employ the president of the regional university, his 2 assistants, members of the faculty, and other employees of the 3 institution, who, except as otherwise provided by law, shall hold their 4 positions, until discharged therefrom by the board for good and lawful 5 reason.

6 (3) With the assistance of the faculty of the regional university, 7 shall prescribe the course of study in the various schools and 8 departments thereof and publish such catalogues thereof as the board 9 deems necessary: PROVIDED, That the state board of education shall 10 determine the requisites for and give program approval of all courses 11 leading to teacher certification by such board.

(4) Establish such divisions, schools or departments necessary to
 carry out the purposes of the regional university and not otherwise
 proscribed by law.

(5) Except as otherwise provided by law, may establish and erect such new facilities as determined by the board to be necessary for the regional university.

18 (6) May acquire real and other property as provided in RCW19 28B.10.020, as now or hereafter amended.

(7) Except as otherwise provided by law, may purchase all supplies
and purchase or lease equipment and other personal property needed for
the operation or maintenance of the regional university.

(8) May establish, lease, operate, equip and maintain self supporting facilities in the manner provided in RCW 28B.10.300 through
 28B.10.330, as now or hereafter amended.

The college board shall have general supervision and control over the state system of community and technical colleges. In addition to the other powers and duties imposed upon the college board by this chapter, the college board shall be charged with the following powers, duties and responsibilities:

1 (1) Review the budgets prepared by the boards of trustees, prepare 2 a single budget for the support of the state system of community and 3 technical colleges and adult education, and submit this budget to the 4 governor as provided in RCW 43.88.090;

5 (2) Establish guidelines for the disbursement of funds; and receive 6 and disburse such funds for adult education and maintenance and 7 operation and capital support of the college districts in conformance 8 with the state and district budgets, and in conformance with chapter 9 43.88 RCW;

For as long as a need exists, 21 22 technical colleges may continue those programs, activities, and 23 services they offered during the twelve-month period preceding May 17, 24 1991;
