## SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5922

State of Washington 56th Legislature 1999 Regular Session

**By** Senate Committee on Commerce, Trade, Housing & Financial Institutions (originally sponsored by Senators Prentice, Winsley, Rasmussen and Oke)

1 AN ACT Relating to creating a program for compulsive gambling 2 education and awareness; creating a new section; and providing an 3 expiration date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. (1) A joint select committee on problem 6 gambling is established. The joint select committee shall consist of 7 eight members, as follows:

8 (a) Two members from each of the two largest caucuses of the 9 senate, appointed by the president of the senate, who are members of 10 the senate commerce, trade, housing and financial institutions 11 committee;

(b) Two members from each of the two largest caucuses of the house of representatives, appointed by the co-speakers of the house of representatives, who are members of the house commerce and labor committee;

16 (c) In addition, the following agencies shall cooperate with the 17 joint select committee and maintain a liaison with the committee: The 18 Washington state gambling commission, the Washington state lottery 19 commission, the Washington state horse racing commission, the

department of social and health services, and the department of health.
The committee shall choose its co-chairs from among its legislative
membership.

(2) The committee shall review the following issues:

5 (a) The need to develop policies and programs to address problem 6 and pathological gambling and the response of the gambling industry to 7 the demonstrated need;

8 (b) The need for public awareness programs about problem and 9 pathological gambling, including programs targeting youth, and the 10 effectiveness of current programs;

(c) The level of service provided to gamblers and their families through the help line and the best method of providing help line services;

(d) The availability of instate treatment services for problem andpathological gamblers and their families; and

(e) The appropriate level of public involvement in treatmentservices including public funding.

18 (3) The committee may consult with individuals from the gambling 19 industry, nonprofit organizations with expertise in problem gambling 20 issues, community mental health organizations, tribal governments 21 involved in gaming, and law enforcement agencies.

(4) The committee shall use legislative facilities and staff from senate committee services and the office of program research, but may hire additional staff with specific technical expertise if such expertise is necessary to carry out the mandates of this study. All expenses of the committee, including travel, shall be paid jointly by the senate and the house of representatives.

(5) The committee shall report its findings and recommendations tothe legislature by December 1, 1999.

30 (6) This section expires July 1, 2000.
