- 1 AN ACT Relating to the promotion of electronic commerce through
- 2 digital signatures; amending RCW 19.34.010, 19.34.020, 19.34.030,
- 3 19.34.100, 19.34.110, 19.34.111, 19.34.120, 19.34.130, 19.34.200,
- 4 19.34.210, 19.34.231, 19.34.250, 19.34.280, 19.34.330, 19.34.340,
- 5 19.34.400, 19.34.410, and 43.105.320; adding a new section to chapter
- 6 19.34 RCW; creating a new section; providing an expiration date; and
- 7 declaring an emergency.
- 8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 9 **Sec. 1.** RCW 19.34.010 and 1996 c 250 s 102 are each amended to 10 read as follows:
- 11 This chapter shall be construed consistently with what is
- 12 commercially reasonable under the circumstances and to effectuate the
- 13 following purposes:
- 14 (1) To facilitate commerce by means of reliable electronic
- 15 messages;
- 16 (2) To ensure that electronic signatures are not denied legal
- 17 recognition solely because they are in electronic form;
- 18 (3) To provide a voluntary licensing mechanism for digital
- 19 signature certification authorities by which businesses, consumers,

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- 1 courts, government agencies, and other entities can reasonably be
- 2 assured as to the integrity, authenticity, and nonrepudiation of a
- 3 <u>digitally signed electronic communication;</u>
- 4 (4) To establish procedures governing the use of digital signatures
- 5 for official public business to provide reasonable assurance of the
- 6 <u>integrity</u>, <u>authenticity</u>, <u>and nonrepudiation of an electronic</u>
- 7 communication;
- 8 (5) To minimize the incidence of forged digital signatures and
- 9 fraud in electronic commerce;
- 10 $((\frac{3}{3}))$ (6) To implement legally the general import of relevant
- 11 standards((, such as X.509 of the international telecommunication
- 12 union, formerly known as the international telegraph and telephone
- 13 consultative committee)); and
- 14 $((\frac{4}{1}))$ To establish, in coordination with $(\frac{\text{multiple}}{\text{multiple}})$ states
- 15 and other jurisdictions, uniform rules regarding the authentication and
- 16 reliability of electronic messages.
- 17 **Sec. 2.** RCW 19.34.020 and 1997 c 27 s 30 are each amended to read
- 18 as follows:
- 19 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in
- 20 this section apply throughout this chapter:
- 21 (1) "Accept a certificate" means ((either:
- (a))) to manifest approval of a certificate, while knowing or
- 23 having notice of its contents((; or
- 24 (b) To apply to a licensed certification authority for a
- 25 certificate, without canceling or revoking the application by
- 26 delivering notice of the cancellation or revocation to the
- 27 certification authority and obtaining a signed, written receipt from
- 28 the certification authority, if the certification authority
- 29 subsequently issues a certificate based on the application)). Such
- 30 approval may be manifested by the use of the certificate.
- 31 (2) "Accept a digital signature" means to verify a digital
- 32 signature or take an action in reliance on a digital signature.
- 33 (3) "Asymmetric cryptosystem" means an algorithm or series of
- 34 algorithms that provide a secure key pair.
- 35 (4) "Certificate" means a computer-based record that:
- 36 (a) Identifies the certification authority issuing it;
- 37 (b) Names or identifies its subscriber;
- 38 (c) Contains the subscriber's public key; and

- 1 (d) Is digitally signed by the certification authority issuing it.
- 2 (5) "Certification authority" means a person who issues a 3 certificate.
- 4 (6) "Certification authority disclosure record" means an on-line, 5 publicly accessible record that concerns a licensed certification 6 authority and is kept by the secretary. ((A certification authority 7 disclosure record has the contents specified by rule by the secretary 8 under RCW 19.34.030.))
- 9 (7) "Certification practice statement" means a declaration of the 10 practices that a certification authority employs in issuing 11 certificates ((generally, or employed in issuing a material 12 certificate)).
- 13 (8) "Certify" means to declare with reference to a certificate, 14 with ample opportunity to reflect, and with a duty to apprise oneself 15 of all material facts.
- 16 (9) "Confirm" means to ascertain through appropriate inquiry and 17 investigation.
- 18 (10) "Correspond," with reference to keys, means to belong to the 19 same key pair.
- (11) "Digital signature" means <u>an electronic signature that is</u> a transformation of a message using an asymmetric cryptosystem such that a person having the initial message and the signer's public key can accurately determine:
- (a) Whether the transformation was created using the private key that corresponds to the signer's public key; and
- 26 (b) Whether the initial message has been altered since the 27 transformation was made.
- 28 (12) <u>"Electronic" means electrical, digital, magnetic, optical,</u>
 29 <u>electromagnetic, or any other form of technology that entails</u>
 30 <u>capabilities similar to these technologies.</u>
- 31 (13) "Electronic record" means a record generated, communicated, 32 received, or stored by electronic means for use in an information 33 system or for transmission from one information system to another.
- 34 <u>(14) "Electronic signature" means a signature in electronic form</u>
 35 <u>attached to or logically associated with an electronic record,</u>
 36 <u>including but not limited to a digital signature.</u>
- 37 <u>(15)</u> "Financial institution" means a national or state-chartered 38 commercial bank or trust company, savings bank, savings association, or

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- 1 credit union authorized to do business in the state of Washington and 2 the deposits of which are federally insured.
- (((13))) (16) "Forge a digital signature" means either:
- 4 (a) To create a digital signature without the authorization of the 5 rightful holder of the private key; or
- 6 (b) To create a digital signature verifiable by a certificate 7 listing as subscriber a person who either:
- 8 (i) Does not exist; or
- 9 (ii) Does not hold the private key corresponding to the public key 10 listed in the certificate.
- 11 $((\frac{14}{14}))$ "Hold a private key" means to be authorized to 12 utilize a private key.
- (((15))) <u>(18)</u> "Incorporate by reference" means to make one message a part of another message by identifying the message to be incorporated and expressing the intention that it be incorporated.
- $((\frac{(16)}{(16)}))$ <u>(19)</u> "Issue a certificate" means the acts of a certification authority in creating a certificate and notifying the subscriber listed in the certificate of the contents of the certificate.
- (((17))) (20) "Key pair" means a private key and its corresponding public key in an asymmetric cryptosystem, keys which have the property that the public key can verify a digital signature that the private key creates.
- $((\frac{18}{18}))$ (21) "Licensed certification authority" means a certification authority to whom a license has been issued by the secretary and whose license is in effect.
- 27 $((\frac{(19)}{(19)}))$ <u>(22)</u> "Message" means a digital representation of 28 information.
- (((20))) (23) "Notify" means to communicate a fact to another person in a manner reasonably likely under the circumstances to impart knowledge of the information to the other person.
- (((21))) (24) "Official public business" means any legally authorized transaction or communication among state agencies, tribes, and local governments, or between a state agency, tribe, or local
- 35 government and a private person or entity.
- 36 (25) "Operative personnel" means one or more natural persons acting 37 as a certification authority or its agent, or in the employment of, or 38 under contract with, a certification authority, and who have:

- 1 (a) ((Managerial or policymaking responsibilities for the 2 certification authority; or
- 3 (b) Duties directly involving the issuance of certificates,
 4 creation of private keys, or administration of a certification
 5 authority's computing facilities)) Direct responsibility for the secure
 6 operation of the trustworthy system used by the certification authority
 7 or any recognized repository;
- 8 <u>(b) Direct responsibility, beyond general supervisory authority,</u>
 9 <u>for establishing or adopting policies regarding the operation and</u>
 10 <u>security of the certification authority; or</u>
- 11 <u>(c) Such other responsibilities or duties as the secretary may</u> 12 establish by rule.
- $((\frac{(22)}{2}))$ (26) "Person" means a human being or an organization 14 capable of signing a document, either legally or as a matter of fact.
- 15 $((\frac{(23)}{(23)}))$ "Private key" means the key of a key pair used to 16 create a digital signature.
- 17 $((\frac{(24)}{)})$ (28) "Public key" means the key of a key pair used to 18 verify a digital signature.
- 19 ((25))) <u>(29)</u> "Publish" means to ((record or file in a repository)) 20 make information publicly available.
- $((\frac{(26)}{)})$ (30) "Qualified right to payment" means an award of damages against a licensed certification authority by a court having jurisdiction over the certification authority in a civil action for violation of this chapter.
- $((\frac{(27)}{(27)}))$ (31) "Recipient" means a person who has received a certificate and a digital signature verifiable with reference to a public key listed in the certificate and is in a position to rely on it.
- 29 $((\frac{(28)}{)})$ "Recognized repository" means a repository recognized 30 by the secretary under RCW 19.34.400.
- $((\frac{(29)}{)})$ (33) "Recommended reliance limit" means the monetary amount recommended for reliance on a certificate under RCW 19.34.280(1).
- (((30))) (34) "Repository" means a system for storing and retrieving certificates and other information relevant to digital signatures.
- $((\frac{31}{31}))$ $\underline{(35)}$ "Revoke a certificate" means to make a certificate ineffective permanently from a specified time forward. Revocation is effected by notation or inclusion in a set of revoked certificates, and

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- 1 does not imply that a revoked certificate is destroyed or made 2 illegible.
- 3 (((32))) (36) "Rightfully hold a private key" means the authority 4 to utilize a private key:
- 5 (a) That the holder or the holder's agents have not disclosed to a 6 person in violation of RCW 19.34.240(1); and
- 7 (b) That the holder has not obtained through theft, deceit, 8 eavesdropping, or other unlawful means.
- 9 (((33))) "Secretary" means the secretary of state.
- 10 (((34))) (38) "Subscriber" means a person who:
- (a) Is the subject listed in a certificate;
- 12 (b) Applies for or accepts the certificate; and
- 13 (c) Holds a private key that corresponds to a public key listed in 14 that certificate.
- 15 $((\frac{35}{1}))$ "Suitable guaranty" means either a surety bond
- 16 executed by a surety authorized by the insurance commissioner to do
- 17 business in this state, or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a
- 18 financial institution authorized to do business in this state, which,
- 19 in either event, satisfies all of the following requirements:
- 20 (a) It is issued payable to the secretary for the benefit of
- 21 persons holding qualified rights of payment against the licensed
- 22 certification authority named as the principal of the bond or customer
- 23 of the letter of credit;
- 24 (b) It is in an amount specified by rule by the secretary under RCW
- 25 19.34.030;
- 26 (c) It states that it is issued for filing under this chapter;
- 27 (d) It specifies a term of effectiveness extending at least as long
- 28 as the term of the license to be issued to the certification authority;
- 29 and
- 30 (e) It is in a form prescribed or approved by rule by the
- 31 secretary.
- 32 A suitable guaranty may also provide that the total annual
- 33 liability on the guaranty to all persons making claims based on it may
- 34 not exceed the face amount of the guaranty.
- $((\frac{36}{1}))$ (40) "Suspend a certificate" means to make a certificate
- 36 ineffective temporarily for a specified time forward.
- 37 $((\frac{37}{1}))$ <u>(41)</u> "Time stamp" means either:
- 38 (a) To append or attach ((to a message, digital signature, or
- 39 certificate)) a digitally signed notation indicating at least the date,

- 1 time, and identity of the person appending or attaching the notation to
 2 a message, digital signature, or certificate; or
- 3 (b) The notation thus appended or attached.
- 4 $((\frac{38}{}))$ "Transactional certificate" means a $(\frac{\text{valid}}{})$
- 5 certificate ((incorporating by reference one or more digital
- 6 signatures)) designated for use in a specific transaction identified in
- 7 the certificate or identified by reference in the certificate.
- 8 (((39))) (43) "Trustworthy system" means computer hardware and 9 software that:
- 10 (a) Are reasonably secure from intrusion and misuse; and
- 11 (b) ((Provide a reasonable level of availability, reliability, and 12 correct operation; and
- 13 (c) Are reasonably suited to performing their intended functions))
- 14 Conform with the requirements established by the secretary by rule.
- 15 (((40))) (44) "Valid certificate" means a certificate that:
- 16 (a) A licensed certification authority has issued;
- 17 (b) The subscriber listed in it has accepted;
- 18 (c) Has not been revoked or suspended; and
- 19 (d) Has not expired.
- 20 ((However, a transactional certificate is a valid certificate only
- 21 in relation to the digital signature incorporated in it by reference.
- (41))) (45) "Verify a digital signature" means, in relation to a
- 23 given digital signature, message, and public key, to determine
- 24 accurately that:
- 25 (a) The digital signature was created by the private key
- 26 corresponding to the public key; and
- 27 (b) The message has not been altered since its digital signature
- 28 was created.
- 29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 19.34 RCW
- 30 to read as follows:
- Information, records, and signatures shall not be denied legal
- 32 effect, validity, or enforceability solely on the grounds that they are
- 33 in electronic form. However, the presumptions of validity and
- 34 reasonableness of conduct, and the limitations on liability in this
- 35 chapter do not apply to electronic records or electronic signatures
- 36 except for digital signatures created in conformance with all of the
- 37 requirements of this chapter and rules adopted under this chapter.

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- 1 **Sec. 4.** RCW 19.34.030 and 1997 c 27 s 1 are each amended to read 2 as follows:
- (1) The secretary must ((maintain a publicly accessible data base containing)) publish a certification authority disclosure record for each licensed certification authority, and a list of all judgments filed with the secretary, within the previous five years, under RCW 19.34.290. ((The secretary must publish the contents of the data base in at least one recognized repository.))
- 9 (2) The secretary may adopt rules consistent with this chapter and 10 in furtherance of its purposes:
- 11 (a) To ((govern licensed)) <u>license</u> certification authorities
 12 ((and)), ((recognized)) recognize repositories,((their practice, and
 13 the termination of a licensed certification authority's or recognized
 14 repository's practice)) certify operative personnel, and govern the
 15 practices of each;
- (b) To determine ((an)) the form and amount reasonably appropriate for a suitable guaranty, in light of the burden a suitable guaranty places upon licensed certification authorities and the assurance of quality and financial responsibility it provides to persons who rely on certificates issued by licensed certification authorities;
- (c) To specify reasonable requirements for <u>information to be</u> contained in or the form of certificates, <u>including transactional</u> certificates, issued by licensed certification authorities, in accordance with generally accepted standards for digital signature certificates;
- 26 (d) To specify reasonable requirements for recordkeeping by 27 licensed certification authorities;
- (e) To specify reasonable requirements for the content, form, and sources of information in certification authority disclosure records, the updating and timeliness of the information, and other practices and policies relating to certification authority disclosure records;
- 32 (f) To specify the form of <u>and information required in</u> 33 <u>certification practice statements</u>, <u>as well as requirements regarding</u> 34 <u>the publication of certification practice statements</u>;
- 35 (g) To specify the procedure and manner in which a certificate may 36 be suspended or revoked, as consistent with this chapter; ((and))
- 37 (h) To specify the procedure and manner by which the laws of other 38 jurisdictions may be recognized, in order to further uniform rules

- 1 regarding the authentication and reliability of electronic messages;
- 2 and
- 3 (i) Otherwise to give effect to and implement this chapter.
- 4 (3) The secretary may act as a certification authority, and the
- 5 <u>certificates issued by the secretary shall be treated as having been</u>
- 6 <u>issued</u> by a licensed certification authority.
- 7 **Sec. 5.** RCW 19.34.100 and 1998 c 33 s 1 are each amended to read 8 as follows:
- 9 (1) To obtain or retain a license, a certification authority must:
- 10 (a) ((Be the subscriber of a certificate published in a recognized 11 repository, which may include any repository maintained by the
- 12 secretary;
- (b) Knowingly employ as operative personnel only persons who have
- 14 not been convicted within the past seven years of a felony and have
- 15 never been convicted of a crime involving fraud, false statement, or
- 16 deception. The secretary may provide by rule for the manner in which
- 17 criminal background information is provided as part of the licensing
- 18 process. For purposes of this provision, a certification authority
- 19 knowingly employs such a person if the certification authority knew of
- 20 a conviction, or should have known based upon the background
- 21 information required by rule of the secretary;
- 22 (c) Employ as operative personnel only persons who have
- 23 demonstrated knowledge and proficiency in following the requirements of
- 24 this chapter;
- 25 (d))) Provide proof of identity to the secretary;
- 26 (b) Employ only certified operative personnel in appropriate
- 27 positions;
- 28 (c) File with the secretary ((a)) an appropriate, suitable
- 29 guaranty, unless the certification authority is a city or county that
- 30 is self-insured or the department of information services;
- 31 $((\frac{e}))$ Use a trustworthy system((\frac{e})) use a trustworthy system((\frac{e}))
- 32 for limiting access to its private key));
- $((\frac{f}{f}))$ (e) Maintain an office in this state or have established a
- 34 registered agent for service of process in this state; and
- $((\frac{g}{g}))$ (f) Comply with all further licensing and practice
- 36 requirements established by rule by the secretary.
- 37 (2) ((The secretary must issue a license to a certification
- 38 authority that:

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- 1 (a) Is qualified under subsection (1) of this section;
- 2 (b) Applies in writing to the secretary for a license; and
- 3 (c) Pays a filing fee adopted by rule by the secretary.
- 4 (3))) The secretary may by rule ((classify licenses)) create 5 license classifications according to specified limitations, ((such as a maximum number of outstanding certificates, cumulative maximum of 6 7 recommended reliance limits in certificates issued by the certification 8 authority, or issuance only within a single firm or organization,)) and 9 the secretary may issue licenses restricted according to the limits of 10 each classification. ((The liability limits of RCW 19.34.280 do not apply to a certificate issued by a certification authority that exceeds 11 12 the restrictions of the certification authority's license.))
- (3) The secretary may impose license restrictions specific to the practices of an individual certification authority. The secretary shall set forth in writing and maintain as part of the certification authority's license application file the basis for such license restrictions.
- (4) The secretary may revoke or suspend a certification authority's 18 19 license, in accordance with the administrative procedure act, chapter 20 34.05 RCW, for failure to comply with this chapter or for failure to remain qualified under subsection (1) of this section. 21 The secretary may order the summary suspension of a license pending proceedings for 22 revocation or other action, which must be promptly instituted and 23 24 determined, if the secretary includes within a written order a finding 25 that the certification authority has either:
 - (a) Utilized its license in the commission of a violation of a state or federal criminal statute or of chapter 19.86 RCW; or
 - (b) Engaged in conduct giving rise to a serious risk of loss to public or private parties if the license is not immediately suspended.
- 30 (5) The secretary may recognize by rule the licensing or 31 authorization of certification authorities by other governmental 32 entities, in whole or in part, provided that those licensing or 33 authorization requirements are substantially similar to those of this 34 state. If licensing by another government is so recognized:
- 35 (a) RCW 19.34.300 through 19.34.350 apply to certificates issued by 36 the certification authorities licensed or authorized by that government 37 in the same manner as it applies to licensed certification authorities 38 of this state; and

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- 1 (b) The liability limits of RCW 19.34.280 apply to the 2 certification authorities licensed or authorized by that government in 3 the same manner as they apply to licensed certification authorities of 4 this state.
- 5 (6) ((Unless the parties provide otherwise by contract between 6 themselves, the licensing requirements in this section do not affect 7 the effectiveness, enforceability, or validity of any digital 8 signature, except that RCW 19.34.300 through 19.34.350 do not apply to 9 a certificate, and associated digital signature, issued by an 10 unlicensed certification authority.
- 11 (7)) A certification authority that has not obtained a license is 12 not subject to the provisions of this chapter, except as specifically 13 provided.
- 14 **Sec. 6.** RCW 19.34.110 and 1997 c 27 s 5 are each amended to read 15 as follows:
- 16 (1) A licensed certification authority shall obtain a compliance audit((, as may be more fully defined by rule of the secretary, at 17 18 least once every year. The auditor shall issue an opinion evaluating 19 the degree to which the certification authority conforms to the requirements of this chapter and the administrative rules adopted by)) 20 at such times and in such manner as directed by rule of the secretary. 21 22 If the certification authority is also a recognized repository, the 23 audit must include the repository.
- (2) The certification authority shall file a copy of the audit report with the secretary. The secretary may provide by rule for filing of the report in an electronic format((. The secretary shall)) and may publish the report in the certification authority disclosure record it maintains for the certification authority.
- 29 **Sec. 7.** RCW 19.34.111 and 1997 c 27 s 6 are each amended to read 30 as follows:
- 31 $(1)((\frac{a}{a}))$ An auditor signing a report of opinion as to a 32 compliance audit required by RCW 19.34.110 must:
- 33 $((\frac{(i)}{(i)}))$ (a) Be a certified public accountant, licensed under 34 chapter 18.04 RCW or equivalent licensing statute of another 35 jurisdiction; $((\frac{or}{(or)}))$ and
- $((\frac{(ii)}{(ii)}))$ Meet such other qualifications as the secretary may stablish by rule.

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- (((b) Auditors must either possess such computer security
 qualifications as are necessary to conduct the audit or employ,
 contract, or associate with firms or individuals who do. The secretary
 may adopt rules establishing qualifications as to expertise or
 experience in computer security.))
- 6 (2) The compliance audits of state agencies and local governments 7 who are licensed certification authorities, and the secretary, must be 8 performed under the authority of the state auditor. The state auditor 9 may contract with private entities as needed to comply with this 10 chapter.
- 11 **Sec. 8.** RCW 19.34.120 and 1997 c 27 s 7 are each amended to read 12 as follows:
- 13 (1) The secretary may investigate the activities of a licensed 14 certification authority material to its compliance with this chapter 15 and issue orders to a certification authority to further its 16 investigation and secure compliance with this chapter.
- 17 (2) The secretary may suspend or revoke the license of a 18 certification authority for its failure to comply with an order of the 19 secretary.
- (3) The secretary may by order impose and collect a civil 20 ((monetary)) penalty against a licensed certification authority for a 21 violation of this chapter ((in an amount)). The penalty shall not 22 23 ((to)) exceed ten thousand dollars per incident, or ninety percent of 24 the recommended reliance limit of a material certificate, whichever is 25 In case of a violation continuing for more than one day, each day is considered a separate incident. The secretary may adopt rules 26 setting forth the standards governing the exercise of the secretary's 27 discretion as to penalty amounts. In the case of a state agency 28 29 authorized by law to be a licensed certification authority, the sole penalty imposed under this subsection shall consist of specific 30 findings of noncompliance and an order requiring compliance with this 31 chapter and the rules of the secretary. Any penalty imposed under this 32 33 chapter and chapter 34.05 RCW shall be enforceable in any court of 34 competent jurisdiction.
- 35 (4) The secretary may order a certification authority, which it has 36 found to be in violation of this chapter, to pay the costs incurred by 37 the secretary in prosecuting and adjudicating proceedings relative to 38 the order, and enforcing it.

- 1 (5) The secretary must exercise authority under this section in 2 accordance with the administrative procedure act, chapter 34.05 RCW, 3 and a licensed certification authority may obtain judicial review of 4 the secretary's actions as prescribed by chapter 34.05 RCW. The 5 secretary may also seek injunctive relief to compel compliance with an 6 order.
- 7 **Sec. 9.** RCW 19.34.130 and 1996 c 250 s 204 are each amended to 8 read as follows:
- 9 (1) No certification authority, whether licensed or not, may 10 conduct its business in a manner that creates an unreasonable risk of 11 loss to subscribers of the certification authority, to persons relying 12 on certificates issued by the certification authority, or to a 13 repository.
- 14 (2) The secretary may publish ((in the repository it provides, or 15 elsewhere,)) brief statements advising subscribers, persons relying on digital signatures, or other repositories about activities of a 16 certification authority, whether licensed or not, that create a risk 17 18 prohibited by subsection (1) of this section. The certification authority named in a statement as creating or causing such a risk may 19 protest the publication of the statement by filing a written defense of 20 ten thousand bytes or less. Upon receipt of such a protest, the 21 secretary must publish the protest along with the secretary's 22 23 statement, and must promptly give the protesting certification 24 authority notice and an opportunity to be heard. Following the 25 hearing, the secretary must rescind the advisory statement if its publication was unwarranted under this section, cancel it if its 26 publication is no longer warranted, continue or amend it if it remains 27 warranted, or take further legal action to eliminate or reduce a risk 28 29 prohibited by subsection (1) of this section. The secretary must publish its decision in the repository it provides. 30
