The task force shall provide these recommendations to 18 19 the appropriate fiscal committees of the legislature by November 15, 20 2000.

(5) From funds appropriated in this section, the health and long-21 term care committee of the senate shall study the state's health care 22 system to determine the extent to which it meets the needs of rural 23 24 residents. In awarding grants under chapter 18 19 86.26 RCW, the department of ecology shall give strong preference to 20 local governments that have: (1) Implemented, or are in the process of implementing, an ordinance that establishes a flood plain policy that 21 22 is substantially more stringent than minimum federal requirements; (2) 23 completed a comprehensive flood control plan meeting the requirements 24 of RCW 86.12.200; or (3) constructed, or are in the process of 25 constructing, a system of overtopping dikes or levees that allow public 26 access.

During the 1999-01 fiscal biennium, moneys in the public works assistance account may be appropriated to the rural arterial trust account and may be used for construction and improvement of county major and minor collectors in rural areas, construction of replacement bridges funded by the federal bridge replacement program on access roads in rural areas, and for expenses of the board associated with the administration of the rural arterial program.

1 2 contracts are reasonably necessary for the expansion project.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1045. 1999 c 379 ss 603, 610, and 611 4 (uncodified) are each repealed.

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1046. If any provision of this act or its 6 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 7 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 8 persons or circumstances is not affected.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1047. This act is necessary for the immediate 10 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 11 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect 12 immediately.
