Therefore, the department shall 2 provide a report to the ways and means committee of the senate and the 3 4 appropriations committee of the house of representatives by December 1, 2000, containing options and recommendations for secure treatment 5 programs. The report shall identify various treatment models that 6 7 could be implemented and various types and locations of secure 8 facilities, both state-owned and leased, in which programs could be 9 sited, together with the department's recommendations. The report 10 shall evaluate the potential for siting such programs on the grounds of existing state residential habilitation centers. The report shall also 11 include analysis of advantages and disadvantages associated with 12 contracting for some or all of the new program options identified. The 13 report shall evaluate the options based on short-term and long-term 14 costs, client and community security, efficiency of coordination with 15 other service delivery systems, and how they address specific legal 16 issues. In developing this report, the department shall invite 17 participation by representatives of the Washington protection and 18 19 advocacy system (WPAS), and shall include in the report WPAS' position on options and recommendations submitted by the department and any 20 additional recommendations made by WPAS. The legislature recognizes a 21 need to improve long-term services provided to individuals with 22 developmental disabilities who are undergoing involuntary treatment 23 24 under chapter 71.05 RCW. The legislature is committed to providing 25 resources necessary to address issues in the U.S. District Court case 26 of Allen v. Western State Hospital.

(e) \$513,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2000, \$1,421,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2001, and \$2,033,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided to develop and operate secure residential and day program placements for persons who seem likely to pose a significant risk to the public safety if their current residential arrangement were to continue.

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(f) \$209,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2000, \$664,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2001, and \$939,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided to increase wages as required by Initiative No. 688 (state minimum wage) for contracted adult family homes, adult residential care

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- 1 facilities, hourly and daily family support providers, and hourly 2 attendant care providers.
- (g) \$1,978,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 3 4 year 2000, \$4,475,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2001, and \$6,989,000 of the general fund--federal 5 appropriation are provided solely to increase compensation for 6 7 individual and agency home care workers. Payments to individual providers are to be increased from \$6.18 per hour to \$6.68 per hour on 8 9 July 1, 1999, and to \$7.18 per hour on July 1, 2000. Payments to 10 agency providers are to be increased to \$11.97 per hour on July 1, 1999, and to \$12.62 per hour on July 1, 2000. All but 14 cents per 11 hour of the July 1, 1999, increase to agency providers, and all but 15 12 cents per hour of the additional July 1, 2000, increase is to be used 13 to increase wages for direct care workers. The appropriations in this 14 15 subsection also include the funds needed for the employer share of unemployment and social security taxes on the amount of the increase. 16
- 17 Within amounts appropriated in this subsection, developmental disabilities program shall contract for a pilot program 18 19 to test an alternative service delivery model for persons with autism. 20 The department must use a competitive process to determine the site of the pilot. The pilot program must be time-limited and subject to an 21 evaluation of client outcomes to determine the effectiveness and 22 23 efficiency of the pilot program compared to the standard service model for persons with autism. 24

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1 (j) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Columbia Basin 2 Community College in the amount of \$1,000,000 plus financing expenses 3 and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW for a 10,000 gross 4 square foot student services auditorium.

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- (k) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Yakima Valley Community College in the amount of \$375,000 plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW for a 2,700 gross square foot addition and remodeling to the existing student union building costing \$1,400,000. Prior to commencing, the college shall prepare and present a business plan describing the financing of the complete project to the state board for community and technical colleges, the office of financial management, and the legislative fiscal committees.
- (1) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Peninsula Community College in the amount of \$2,500,000 plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW for a 10,000 gross square foot addition to the student union building.
- (m) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Whatcom Community 18 19 College in the amount of \$2,500,000 plus financing expenses and 20 required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW for a 20,000 gross square foot addition and remodeling to the existing extended 21 learning/work force facility costing \$4,388,000. Prior to commencing, 22 23 the college shall prepare and present a business plan describing the 24 financing of the complete project to the state board for community and 25 technical colleges, the office of financial management, and the 26 legislative fiscal committees.
- (n) Enter into a financial contract on behalf of Green River Community College in the amount of \$350,000 plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW to purchase Lea Hill park from King county.
- (0) Enter into a financial contract on behalf of Bellevue Community
 College in the amount of \$4,000,000 plus financing expenses and
 required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW for replacement of the
 Robinswood school. This authority is provided in addition to the
 appropriation in section 761 of this act.
- (p) Enter into a financial contract on behalf of Wenatchee Valley
 College in the amount of \$500,000 plus financing expenses and required
 reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW to purchase two buildings and
 property contiguous to the college campus.

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- 1 (q) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Whatcom Community 2 College in the amount of \$1,918,483 plus financing expenses and 3 required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW for the purchase of 4 10.71 acres of property for the completion of the Whatcom Community 5 College campus.
 - (r) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Edmonds Community College in the amount of \$3,700,000 plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW to develop a music building on the college campus.
- (5) Central Washington University: Enter into a financing contract on behalf of Central Washington University in the amount of \$5,700,000 plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW for the Central Washington University/Edmonds Community College center.
 - (6) University of Washington:

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- (a) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of the University of Washington in the amount of \$7,500,000 plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW to finance real property improvements to the Sand Point building.
 - (b) Enter into a financing contract on behalf of the University of Washington in the amount of \$7,500,000 plus financing expenses and required reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW to finance primate center tenant improvements.
- 24 (7) Washington state convention and trade center: Enter into one 25 or more financing contracts not exceeding an aggregate total amount of 26 \$27,500,000 plus financing expenses and reserves pursuant to chapter 27 39.94 RCW, for funding unanticipated costs in excess \$111,700,000 principal amount of the financing contract authorized in 28 29 section 802(10)(b), chapter 16, Laws of 1995 2nd sp. sess., for the 30 construction of the expansion of the Washington state convention and 31 trade center as authorized under chapter 386, Laws of 1995. balance of the expansion project funds shall be provided from interest 32 earnings and public or private funds. The financing contract or 33 34 contracts representing all or part of the amount authorized by this 35 section shall not be executed without prior written approval of the office of financial management based upon its determination that such 36 37 financing contract or contracts are reasonably necessary for the expansion project. 38
