## SENATE BILL 6668

State of Washington 56th Legislature 2000 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to standards for educator quality; amending RCW
- 2 28A.410.020, 28A.410.040, 28A.410.050, 28A.410.060, 28A.410.100,
- 3 28A.410.120, and 28A.305.130; reenacting and amending RCW 28A.410.010;
- 4 adding new sections to chapter 28A.410 RCW; creating new sections;
- 5 repealing RCW 28A.410.020; and declaring an emergency.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 7 PART 1
- 8 PROFESSIONAL EDUCATOR STANDARDS BOARD
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 101.** INTENT. (1) The legislature finds and 10 declares:
- 11 (a) Public school educators and administrators should be afforded 12 greater decision-making authority over licensing and standards of 13 practice, responsibilities long held by members of other professions 14 including law, medicine, nursing, engineering, and real estate;
- (b) Creation of a public, rule-making body whose sole focus is deducator preparation, licensure, assessment, and standards of practice would be likely to bring greater focus and attention to the profession;

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- 1 (c) Professional educator standards boards are consumer protection 2 boards, establishing policies to ensure the public that its 3 practitioners are competent;
  - (d) The highest possible standards for all educators are essential in ensuring attainment of high academic standards by all students; and
- 6 (e) Granting educators the authority to determine standards for 7 entry to or continuation in the profession of education could become an 8 important form of acknowledgment of the value of teachers and 9 administrators and would represent the high level of trust, as 10 professionals, that teachers and administrators have earned and to 11 which they are entitled.
- 12 (2) The legislature further finds and declares:

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- 13 (a) Teacher assessment for certification can guard against 14 admission to the teaching profession of persons who have not 15 demonstrated that they are knowledgeable in the subjects they will be 16 assigned to teach; and
- (b) Teacher assessment for certification should be implemented as an additional element to the system of teacher preparation and certification and add value to the candidate's professional growth journey.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 102. A new section is added to chapter 28A.410 22 RCW to read as follows:
- WASHINGTON PROFESSIONAL EDUCATOR STANDARDS BOARD. (1) The Washington professional educator standards board is created, consisting of sixteen members to be appointed by the governor to four-year terms. No person may serve as a member of the board for more than two consecutive full terms. The governor shall annually appoint the chair of the board from among the teachers and principals on the board. No board member may serve as chair for more than two consecutive years.
- (2) Seven of the members shall be public school teachers, one shall be a private school teacher, two shall represent higher education educator preparation programs, three shall be public school administrators, one shall be a parent, and one shall be a member of the public. The superintendent of public instruction shall be an ex officio, nonvoting member.
- 36 (3) Public school teachers appointed to the board must:
- 37 (a) Have at least three years of teaching experience in a 38 Washington public school;

- 1 (b) Be currently certificated and actively employed in a teaching 2 position; and
- 3 (c) Include one teacher currently teaching at the elementary school 4 level, one at the middle school level, and one at the high school 5 level.
- (4) Appointees from higher education educator preparation programs must include one representative from an institution of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016 and one representative from a Washington private institution of higher education.
  - (5) School administrators appointed to the board must:
- 11 (a) Have at least three years of administrative experience in a 12 Washington public school district;
- 13 (b) Be currently certificated and actively employed in a school 14 administrator position; and
- 15 (c) Include at least two school principals.

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- 16 (6) The governor shall appoint the members of the board from a list
  17 of qualified nominees submitted to the governor by organizations
  18 representative of the constituencies of the board, from applications
  19 from other qualified individuals, or from both nominees and applicants,
  20 and in accordance with the following:
- (a) The Washington education association shall nominate a list of qualified teachers to the board that shall include the pool of teachers who have been regional finalists for the Washington teacher of the year award within the previous five years or who hold at the time of appointment certification from the national board for professional teaching standards. In filling all five positions, the governor shall give priority to these excellent teachers; and
- (b) The association of Washington school principals and the Washington association of school administrators shall nominate school administrators. The Washington state school directors association shall nominate school directors. The Washington association of colleges of teacher education shall nominate representatives from teacher preparation institutions.
- 34 (7) All appointments to the board made by the governor shall be 35 subject to confirmation by the senate.
- 36 (8) The governor shall appoint the members of the initial board no 37 later than June 1, 2000.
- 38 (9) Board members shall represent the racial, geographic, and 39 gender diversity of the state.

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- 1 (10) Each member of the board shall be compensated in accordance 2 with RCW 43.03.240 and shall be reimbursed for travel expenses incurred 3 in carrying out the duties of the board in accordance with RCW 4 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
- (11) The governor may remove a member of the board for neglect of 5 duty, misconduct, malfeasance or misfeasance in office, or for 6 7 incompetency or unprofessional conduct as defined in chapter 18.130 8 In such a case, the governor shall file with the secretary of 9 state a statement of the causes for and the order of removal from 10 office, and the secretary of state shall send a certified copy of the statement of causes and order of removal to the last known post office 11 address of the member. 12
- 13 (12) If a vacancy occurs on the board, the governor shall appoint 14 a replacement member from the nominees as specified in subsection (6) 15 of this section to fill the remainder of the unexpired term.
- 16 (13) Members of the board shall hire an executive director and an 17 administrative assistant to reside in the office of the superintendent 18 of public instruction for administrative purposes only.
- 19 (14) Members of the board are immune from suit in an action, civil 20 or criminal, based on its disciplinary proceedings or other official 21 acts performed in good faith as members of the board.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 103. A new section is added to chapter 28A.410 RCW to read as follows:
- POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD. In addition to any other powers and duties as provided by law, the Washington professional educator standards board shall:
- (1) Approve or disapprove the program of courses leading to 28 teacher, school administrator, and school specialized personnel 29 certification offered by all institutions of higher education in 30 Washington state that may be accredited and whose graduates may become 31 entitled to receive such certification;
- (2) Every five years beginning in 2004, conduct a review of the program approval standards, including the minimum standards for teachers, administrators, and educational staff associates, to reflect research findings and assure continued improvement of preparation programs for teachers, administrators, and educational staff associates;

(3) Investigate the character of the work required to be performed as a condition of entrance to and graduation from any institution of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016 relative to such certification as provided for in subsection (1) of this section, and prepare a list of accredited institutions of higher education of this and other states whose graduates may be awarded such certificates;

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- (4)(a) Adopt rules to allow a teacher certification candidate to fulfill, in part, teacher preparation program requirements through work experience as a classified teacher's aide in a public school or private school meeting the requirements of RCW 28A.195.010. The rules shall include, but are not limited to, limitations based upon the recency of the teacher preparation candidate's teacher aide work experience, and limitations based on the amount of work experience that may apply toward teacher preparation program requirements under this chapter;
- (b) Require that at the time of the individual's enrollment in a teacher preparation program, the supervising teacher and the building principal shall jointly provide to the teacher preparation program of the institution of higher education at which the teacher candidate is enrolled, a written assessment of the performance of the teacher candidate. The assessment shall contain such information as determined by the Washington professional educator standards board and shall include: Evidence that at least fifty percent of the candidate's work as a classified teacher's aide was involved in instructional activities with children under the supervision of a certificated teacher and that the candidate worked a minimum of six hundred thirty hours for one school year; the type of work performed by the candidate; and a recommendation of whether the candidate's work experience as a classified teacher's aide should be substituted for teacher preparation program requirements. In compliance with such rules as may be established under this section, the teacher preparation programs of the institution of higher education where the candidate is enrolled shall make the final determination as to what teacher preparation program requirements may be fulfilled by teacher aide work experience;
- (5) Supervise the issuance of such certificates as provided for in subsection (1) of this section and specify the types and kinds of certificates necessary for the several departments of the common schools by rule in accordance with RCW 28A.410.010.
  - (6) Adopt rules for nontraditional educator preparation programs;
  - (7) Issue and renew teaching certificates;

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- 1 (8) Adopt a professional code of ethics;
- 2 (9) Select and evaluate the executive director and administrative 3 assistant to the board;
- 4 (10) Establish criteria and enter into agreements with other states 5 to acquire reciprocal approval of teacher preparation programs and 6 certification, including certification from the national board for 7 professional teaching standards;
- 8 (11) Apply for and receive federal or other funds on behalf of the 9 state for purposes related to the duties of the board;
- 10 (12) Adopt any rules necessary to implement this chapter. Any rules adopted by the board pertaining directly to the preparation, 12 assessment, certification, and standards of practice of administrators 13 shall require the approval of the majority of administrators on the board;
- 15 (13) Maintain data and submit annual reports to the governor, the 16 legislature, and the superintendent of public instruction concerning 17 employment trends, teacher supply and demand data by certificate, the 18 quality of the professional preparation programs, and other data deemed 19 relevant by the board; and
- 20 (14) Submit to the governor, the legislature, and the superintendent of public instruction each year a report detailing the findings and activities of the board and including any recommendations developed by the board.

## 24 NEW SECTION. Sec. 104. Effective June 1, 2000:

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- (1) All powers, duties, and functions of the state board of education pertaining to establishing and maintaining standards and processes for approving college, university, and school district programs for the preparation of educators and administrators, and educator and administrator assessment, certification, and standards of practice are transferred to the Washington professional educator standards board. All references to the state board of education in the Revised Code of Washington shall be construed to mean the Washington professional educator standards board when referring to the functions transferred in this section.
- 35 (2)(a) All reports, documents, surveys, books, records, files, 36 papers, or written material in the possession of the state board of 37 education pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred

shall be delivered to the custody of the Washington professional 1 2 educator standards board.

- 3 (b) Whenever any question arises as to the transfer of any funds, 4 books, documents, records, papers, files, equipment, or other tangible 5 property used or held in the exercise of the powers and the performance of the duties and functions transferred, the director of financial 6 7 management shall make a determination as to the proper allocation and 8 certify the same to the state agencies concerned.
- 9 (3) All rules and all pending business before the state board of 10 education pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall be continued and acted upon by the Washington professional 11 educator standards board. All existing contracts and obligations shall 12 13 remain in full force and shall be performed by the Washington professional educator standards board. 14
- 15 (4) The transfer of the powers, duties, and functions of the state 16 board of education shall not affect the validity of any act performed 17 before the effective date of this section.
- 18 NEW SECTION. Sec. 105. In the 2000 supplemental budget for the 1999-2001 biennium, the budget for the state board of education shall 19 be adjusted by an appropriate amount that reflects the reduction in its 20 duties as a result of sections 103 and 104 of this act. 21
- Sec. 106. RCW 28A.410.010 and 1992 c 159 s 3 and 1992 c 60 s 2 are 22 23 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

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The ((state board of education)) Washington professional educator standards board shall establish, publish, and enforce rules ((and regulations)) determining eligibility for and certification of personnel employed in the common schools of this state, including certification for emergency or temporary, substitute or provisional duty and under such certificates or permits as the board shall deem proper or as otherwise prescribed by law. The rules shall require that the initial application for certification shall require a record check of the applicant through the Washington state patrol criminal identification system and through the federal bureau of investigation at the applicant's expense. The record check shall include a fingerprint check using a complete Washington state criminal 36 identification fingerprint card. The superintendent of public

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- 1 instruction may waive the record check for any applicant who has had a 2 record check within the two years before application.
- In establishing rules pertaining to the qualifications of instructors of American sign language the ((state)) board shall consult with the national association of the deaf, "sign instructors guidance network" (s.i.g.n.), and the Washington state association of the deaf for evaluation and certification of sign language instructors.
- 8 The superintendent of public instruction shall act as the 9 administrator of any such rules ((and regulations)) and have the power 10 to issue any certificates or permits and revoke the same in accordance 11 with board rules ((and regulations)).
- 12 **Sec. 107.** RCW 28A.410.020 and 1996 c 309 s 1 are each amended to 13 read as follows:
- (1) No person may be admitted to a professional teacher preparation program within Washington state without first demonstrating by one of the following options that he or she is competent in the basic skills required for oral and written communication, reading, and computation:
- 18 (a) Successful completion of an examination in the basic skills 19 required for oral and written communication, reading, and computation; 20 or
  - (b) Completion of a baccalaureate degree program; or
- (c) Completion of a graduate degree program; or

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- (d) Completion of two or more years of college level course work and demonstrated basic skills competency through college level course work and a written essay; or
- (e) Earning a combined score of more than the state-wide median score for the prior school year scored by all persons taking tests of general achievement selected by the ((state board of education))

  Washington professional educator standards board.
- 30 (2) The ((state board of education)) Washington professional 31 educator standards board shall adopt rules to implement this section.
- 32 **Sec. 108.** RCW 28A.410.040 and 1992 c 141 s 101 are each amended to 33 read as follows:
- The ((state board of education)) Washington professional educator standards board shall adopt rules providing that, except as provided in this section, all individuals qualifying for an initial-level teaching certificate ((after August 31, 1992,)) shall possess a baccalaureate

- degree in the arts, sciences, and/or humanities and have fulfilled the 1 2 requirements for teacher certification pursuant to RCW 28A.305.130 (1) However, candidates for grades preschool through eight 3 4 certificates shall have fulfilled the requirements for a major as part of their baccalaureate degree. If the major is in early childhood 5 education, elementary education, or special education, the candidate 6 7 must have at least thirty quarter hours or twenty semester hours in one 8 academic field.
- 9 **Sec. 109.** RCW 28A.410.050 and 1992 c 141 s 102 are each amended to 10 read as follows:
- The ((state board of education)) Washington professional educator 11 12 standards board shall develop adopt rules and establishing baccalaureate and masters degree equivalency standards for vocational 13 14 instructors performing instructional duties and acquiring certification 15 ((after August 31, 1992)).
- 16 **Sec. 110.** RCW 28A.410.060 and 1990 c 33 s 407 are each amended to 17 read as follows:
- 18 The fee for any certificate, or any renewal thereof, issued by the authority of the state of Washington, and authorizing the holder to 19 20 teach or perform other professional duties in the public schools of the 21 state shall be not less than one dollar or such reasonable fee therefor 22 as the ((state board of education)) Washington professional educator 23 <u>standards board</u> by rule ((<del>or regulation</del>)) shall deem necessary 24 therefor. The fee must accompany the application and cannot be refunded unless the application is withdrawn before it is finally 25 considered. - 6 Any teacher whose certificate to teach has been questioned under
- 7 RCW 28A.410.090 shall have a right to be heard by the issuing authority
- 8 before his or her certificate is revoked. Any teacher whose
- 9 certificate to teach has been revoked shall have a right of appeal to
- 10 the ((state board of education)) Washington professional educator
- 11 standards board if notice of appeal is given by written affidavit to
- 12 the board within thirty days after the certificate is revoked.

- 7 (6))) Accredit, subject to such accreditation standards and 8 procedures as may be established by the state board of education, all 9 schools that apply for accreditation, and approve, subject to the 10 provisions of RCW 28A.195.010, private schools carrying out a program for any or all of the grades kindergarten through twelve: 11 12 That no private school may be approved that operates a kindergarten program only: PROVIDED FURTHER, That no public or private schools 13 shall be placed upon the list of accredited schools so long as secret 14 15 societies are knowingly allowed to exist among its students by school officials: PROVIDED FURTHER, That the state board may elect to require 16 17 all or certain classifications of the public schools to conduct and participate in such preaccreditation examination and evaluation 18 19 processes as may now or hereafter be established by the board.
- 20 ((<del>(7)</del>)) (2) Make rules ((and regulations)) governing the 21 establishment in any existing nonhigh school district of any secondary 22 program or any new grades in grades nine through twelve. Before any 23 such program or any new grades are established the district must obtain 24 prior approval of the state board.
  - ((+8))) (3) Prepare such outline of study for the common schools as the board shall deem necessary, and prescribe such rules for the general government of the common schools, as shall seek to secure regularity of attendance, prevent truancy, secure efficiency, and promote the true interest of the common schools.
- $((\frac{(9)}{)})$  (4) Continuously reevaluate courses and adopt and enforce  $(\frac{(regulations)}{)}$  rules within the common schools so as to meet the educational needs of students and articulate with the institutions of higher education and unify the work of the public school system.
- (((10))) (5) Carry out board powers and duties relating to the organization and reorganization of school districts under RCW 28A.315.010 through 28A.315.680 and 28A.315.900.
- ((<del>(11)</del>)) <u>(6)</u> By rule ((<del>or regulation promulgated</del>)) <u>adopted</u> upon the advice of the chief of the Washington state patrol, through the director of fire protection, provide for instruction of pupils in the

public and private schools carrying out a K through 12 program, or any part thereof, so that in case of sudden emergency they shall be able to leave their particular school building in the shortest possible time or take such other steps as the particular emergency demands, and without confusion or panic; such rules ((and regulations)) shall be published and distributed to certificated personnel throughout the state whose duties shall include a familiarization therewith as well as the means of implementation thereof at their particular school.

9 ((\(\frac{(12)}{12}\))) (7) Hear and decide appeals as otherwise provided by law.
10 The state board of education is given the authority to promulgate
11 information and rules dealing with the prevention of child abuse for
12 purposes of curriculum use in the common schools.

## TEACHER ASSESSMENT

NEW SECTION. Sec. 201. A new section is added to chapter 28A.410 RCW to read as follows:

- (1)(a) Beginning not later than September 1, 2001, the Washington professional educator standards board shall make available a means of assessing an applicant's knowledge in the basic skills. For the purposes of this section, "basic skills" means the subjects of at least reading, writing, and mathematics. Beginning August 1, 2002, passing this assessment shall be required for admission to Washington professional educator standards board-approved teacher preparation programs and for persons from out-of-state applying for a Washington state residency teaching certificate.
- (b) On an individual student basis, Washington professional educator standards board-approved teacher preparation programs may admit into their programs a candidate who has not achieved the minimum basic skills assessment score established by the Washington professional educator standards board. Individuals so admitted may not receive residency certification without passing the basic skills assessment under this section.
- (c) The Washington professional educator standards board by rule shall establish criteria to ensure that persons from out-of-state who are applying for residency certification can demonstrate to the board's satisfaction that they have the requisite basic skills based upon having completed another basic skills assessment acceptable to the

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- 1 Washington professional educator standards board or by some other 2 alternative approved by the Washington professional educator standards 3 board.
- 4 (2) Beginning not later than September 1, 2002, the Washington 5 professional educator standards board shall provide for the initial implementation of a means of assessing an applicant's knowledge in the 6 7 subjects for which the applicant has applied for an endorsement to his 8 or her residency or professional certificate. The assessment of 9 subject knowledge shall not include instructional methodology. 10 Beginning May 1, 2003, passing this assessment for the applicable endorsements shall be required to receive a residency certificate and 11 for candidates desiring to add an endorsement to their residency or 12 13 professional teaching certificate.
- 14 (3) On each of the assessments under subsections (1) and (2) of 15 this section, an applicant must achieve a minimum assessment score or 16 scores established by the Washington professional educator standards 17 board.
- (4) The Washington professional educator standards board and superintendent of public instruction, as determined by the Washington professional educator standards board, may contract with one or more third parties for:
- 22 (a) The development, purchase, administration, scoring, and 23 reporting of scores of the assessments established by the Washington 24 professional educator standards board under subsections (1) and (2) of 25 this section;
  - (b) Related clerical and administrative activities; or
- 27 (c) Any combination of the purposes in this subsection.
- (5) Unless funds are appropriated for the costs associated with any 28 of the assessments under this section, applicants for admission to a 29 30 Washington teacher preparation program and applicants for residency 31 teaching certificates shall pay fees established by the Washington professional educator standards board for initial assessments, 32 33 reassessments, scoring of assessments, reporting of assessment scores, 34 and clerical and administrative activities related thereto. Such fees 35 shall be reasonably related to the direct and indirect costs of the Washington professional educator standards board and superintendent of 36 37 public instruction in implementing subsections (1) and (2) of this section, including contractual costs. 38

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- (6) Fee revenues received by the superintendent of public 1 instruction under this section shall be deposited in the teacher 2 3 assessment account hereby created in the custody of the state 4 treasurer. Moneys deposited in the account shall be expended exclusively for the direct and indirect costs of implementing this 5 Only the superintendent of public instruction or the 6 section. 7 superintendent's designee may authorize expenditures from the account. 8 The account is subject to the allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 9 RCW, but no appropriation is required for disbursement.
- 10 (7) The superintendent of public instruction is responsible for 11 supervision and providing support services to administer this section.
- (8) The Washington professional educator standards board shall 12 13 collaboratively select or develop and implement the assessments and 14 minimum assessment scores required under this section with the 15 superintendent of public instruction and shall provide opportunities for representatives of other interested educational organizations to 16 17 participate in the selection or development and implementation of such assessments in a manner deemed appropriate by the Washington 18 19 professional educator standards board.
- 20 (9) The Washington professional educator standards board shall adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW that it determines are reasonably necessary for the effective and efficient implementation of this section. The board may adopt rules allowing exceptions from taking any of the assessments under this section on a case-by-case basis. Appropriate accommodations shall be made for individuals who have learning or other disabilities.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 202. A new section is added to chapter 28A.410 RCW to read as follows:
- The Washington professional educator standards board shall report the proposed assessments to the legislative education committees for review and comment prior to implementing the assessments by contractual agreement with the selected vendor or vendors.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 203. A new section is added to chapter 28A.410 RCW to read as follows:
- 35 (1) By December 1, 2003, and annually thereafter, the Washington 36 professional educator standards board shall prepare a report that 37 includes the following information:

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- 1 (a) The range of scores on the basic skills assessment under 2 section 201(1) of this act for persons who passed the assessment and 3 were admitted to a Washington preparation program; and
  - (b) The range of scores on the subject assessments under section 201(2) of this act for persons who passed the assessments and earned an endorsement.
- 7 (2) The information under subsection (1) of this section shall be individual public and private colleges 8 reported for the 9 universities in Washington, as well as reported on an aggregate basis. 10 The report shall also include results disaggregated demographically. The report shall include information on the number and percentage of 11 candidates exempted from assessments, demographic information on 12 13 candidates exempted, institutions attended and endorsements sought by exempted candidates, and reasons for exclusion from the required 14 15 assessments. The report shall be made available through the state

library, on the website of the office of superintendent of public

- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 302.** This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect immediately.
