
SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 6690

1 AN ACT Relating to independent commissions to set salaries for city
2 and town mayors and councilmembers, and county commissioners and
3 councilmembers; amending RCW 35.22.200 and 36.17.020; adding a new
4 section to chapter 35.21 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 36.17
5 RCW; and creating a new section.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature hereby finds and declares
8 that:

9 (1) Article XXX, section 1 of the state Constitution permits
10 midterm salary increases for municipal officers who do not fix their
11 own compensation;

12 (2) The Washington citizens' commission on salaries for elected
13 officials established pursuant to Article XXVIII, section 1 of the
14 state Constitution with voter approval has assured that the
15 compensation for state and county elected officials will be fair and
16 certain, while minimizing the dangers of midterm salary increases being
17 used to influence those officers in the performance of their duties;

1 (3) The same public benefits of independent salary commissions
2 should be extended to the setting of compensation of municipal elected
3 officers; and

4 (4) This act is intended to clarify the intent of the legislature
5 that existing state law authorizes:

6 (a) The establishment of independent salary commissions to set the
7 salaries of mayors, county commissioners, city councilmembers, and
8 county councilmembers; and

9 (b) The authority of the voters of such cities, towns, and counties
10 to review commission decisions to increase or decrease such salaries by
11 means of referendum.

12 **Sec. 2.** RCW 35.22.200 and 1965 ex.s. c 47 s 13 are each amended to
13 read as follows:

14 The legislative powers of a charter city shall be vested in a mayor
15 and a city council, to consist of such number of members and to have
16 such powers as may be provided for in its charter. The charter may
17 provide for direct legislation by the people through the initiative and
18 referendum upon any matter within the scope of the powers, functions,
19 or duties of the city. The mayor and council and such other elective
20 officers as may be provided for in such charter shall be elected at
21 such times and in such manner as provided in Title 29 RCW, and for such
22 terms and shall perform such duties (~~and receive such compensation~~)
23 as may be prescribed in the charter, and shall receive compensation in
24 accordance with the process or standards of a charter provision or
25 ordinance which conforms with section 4 of this act.

26 **Sec. 3.** RCW 36.17.020 and 1994 sp.s. c 4 s 1 are each amended to
27 read as follows:

28 The county legislative authority of each county or a county
29 commissioner or councilmember salary commission which conforms with
30 section 5 of this act is authorized to establish the salaries of the
31 elected officials of the county. One-half of the salary of each
32 prosecuting attorney shall be paid by the state. The annual salary of
33 a county elected official shall not be less than the following:

34 (1) In each county with a population of one million or more:
35 Auditor, clerk, treasurer, sheriff, members of the county legislative
36 authority, and coroner, eighteen thousand dollars; assessor, nineteen

1 thousand dollars; and prosecuting attorney, thirty thousand three
2 hundred dollars;

3 (2) In each county with a population of from two hundred ten
4 thousand to less than one million: Auditor, seventeen thousand six
5 hundred dollars; clerk, seventeen thousand six hundred dollars;
6 treasurer, seventeen thousand six hundred dollars; sheriff, nineteen
7 thousand five hundred dollars; assessor, seventeen thousand six hundred
8 dollars; prosecuting attorney, twenty-four thousand eight hundred
9 dollars; members of the county legislative authority, nineteen thousand
10 five hundred dollars; and coroner, seventeen thousand six hundred
11 dollars;

12 (3) In each county with a population of from one hundred twenty-
13 five thousand to less than two hundred ten thousand: Auditor, sixteen
14 thousand dollars; clerk, sixteen thousand dollars; treasurer, sixteen
15 thousand dollars; sheriff, seventeen thousand six hundred dollars;
16 assessor, sixteen thousand dollars; prosecuting attorney, twenty-four
17 thousand eight hundred dollars; members of the county legislative
18 authority, seventeen thousand six hundred dollars; and coroner, sixteen
19 thousand dollars;

20 (4) In each county with a population of from seventy thousand to
21 less than one hundred twenty-five thousand: Auditor, fourteen thousand
22 nine hundred dollars; clerk, fourteen thousand nine hundred dollars;
23 treasurer, fourteen thousand nine hundred dollars; assessor, fourteen
24 thousand nine hundred dollars; sheriff, fourteen thousand nine hundred
25 dollars; prosecuting attorney, twenty-three thousand seven hundred
26 dollars; members of the county legislative authority, fourteen thousand
27 nine hundred dollars; and coroner, fourteen thousand nine hundred
28 dollars;

29 (5) In each county with a population of from forty thousand to less
30 than seventy thousand: Auditor, thirteen thousand eight hundred
31 dollars; clerk, thirteen thousand eight hundred dollars; treasurer,
32 thirteen thousand eight hundred dollars; assessor, thirteen thousand
33 eight hundred dollars; sheriff, thirteen thousand eight hundred
34 dollars; prosecuting attorney, twenty-three thousand seven hundred
35 dollars; members of the county legislative authority, thirteen thousand
36 eight hundred dollars; and coroner, thirteen thousand eight hundred
37 dollars;

38 (6) In each county with a population of from eighteen thousand to
39 less than forty thousand: Auditor, twelve thousand one hundred

1 dollars; clerk, twelve thousand one hundred dollars; treasurer, twelve
2 thousand one hundred dollars; sheriff, twelve thousand one hundred
3 dollars; assessor, twelve thousand one hundred dollars; prosecuting
4 attorney in such a county in which there is no state university or
5 college, fourteen thousand three hundred dollars; in such a county in
6 which there is a state university or college, sixteen thousand five
7 hundred dollars; and members of the county legislative authority,
8 eleven thousand dollars;

9 (7) In each county with a population of from twelve thousand to
10 less than eighteen thousand: Auditor, ten thousand one hundred
11 dollars; clerk, ten thousand one hundred dollars; treasurer, ten
12 thousand one hundred dollars; assessor, ten thousand one hundred
13 dollars; sheriff, eleven thousand two hundred dollars; prosecuting
14 attorney, thirteen thousand two hundred dollars; and members of the
15 county legislative authority, nine thousand four hundred dollars;

16 (8) In each county with a population of from eight thousand to less
17 than twelve thousand: Auditor, ten thousand one hundred dollars;
18 clerk, ten thousand one hundred dollars; treasurer, ten thousand one
19 hundred dollars; assessor, ten thousand one hundred dollars; sheriff,
20 eleven thousand two hundred dollars; prosecuting attorney, nine
21 thousand nine hundred dollars; and members of the county legislative
22 authority, seven thousand dollars;

23 (9) In each county with a population of from five thousand to less
24 than eight thousand: Auditor, nine thousand one hundred dollars;
25 clerk, nine thousand one hundred dollars; treasurer, nine thousand one
26 hundred dollars; assessor, nine thousand one hundred dollars; sheriff,
27 ten thousand five hundred dollars; prosecuting attorney, nine thousand
28 nine hundred dollars; and members of the county legislative authority,
29 six thousand five hundred dollars;

30 (10) In each other county: Auditor, nine thousand one hundred
31 dollars; clerk, nine thousand one hundred dollars; treasurer, nine
32 thousand one hundred dollars; sheriff, ten thousand five hundred
33 dollars; assessor, nine thousand one hundred dollars; prosecuting
34 attorney, nine thousand nine hundred dollars; and members of the county
35 legislative authority, six thousand five hundred dollars.

36 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 35.21 RCW
37 to read as follows:

1 (1) Salaries for mayors and councilmembers of towns and cities may
2 be set by mayor and council salary commissions established in
3 accordance with city charter or by ordinance and in conformity with
4 this section.

5 (2) The members of such commissions:

6 (a) Shall be appointed by the mayor with approval of the city
7 council;

8 (b) May not be appointed to more than two terms;

9 (c) May only be removed during their terms of office for cause of
10 incapacity, incompetence, neglect of duty, or malfeasance in office or
11 for a disqualifying change of residence; and

12 (d) May not include any officer, official, or employee of the city
13 or town or any of their immediate family members. "Immediate family
14 member" as used in this subsection means the parents, spouse, siblings,
15 children, or dependent relatives of the officer, official, or employee,
16 whether or not living in the household of the officer, official, or
17 employee.

18 (3) Any change in salary shall be filed by the commission with the
19 city clerk and shall become effective and incorporated into the city or
20 town budget without further action of the city council or salary
21 commission.

22 (4) Salary increases established by the commission shall be
23 effective as to the mayor and all members of the city council,
24 regardless of their terms of office.

25 (5) Salary decreases established by the commission shall become
26 effective as to incumbent mayors and councilmembers at the commencement
27 of their next subsequent terms of office.

28 (6) Salary increases and decreases shall be subject to referendum
29 petition by the people of the town or city in the same manner as a city
30 ordinance upon filing of such petition with the city clerk within
31 thirty days after filing of the salary schedule. In the event of the
32 filing of a valid referendum petition, the salary increase or decrease
33 shall not go into effect until approved by vote of the people.

34 (7) Referendum measures under this section shall be submitted to
35 the voters of the city or town at the next following general or
36 municipal election occurring thirty days or more after the petition is
37 filed, and shall be otherwise governed by the provisions of the state
38 Constitution, city charter, and laws generally applicable to referendum
39 measures.

1 (8) The action fixing the salary of a city or town mayor or
2 councilmember by a commission established in conformity with this
3 section shall supersede any other provision of state statute or city or
4 town ordinance related to municipal budgets or to the fixing of
5 salaries of mayors and councilmembers.

6 (9) Salaries for mayors and councilmembers established under an
7 ordinance or charter provision in existence on the effective date of
8 this act that substantially complies with this section shall remain in
9 effect unless and until changed in accordance with such charter
10 provision or ordinance.

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** A new section is added to chapter 36.17 RCW
12 to read as follows:

13 (1) Salaries for county commissioners and councilmembers may be set
14 by county commissioner and councilmember salary commissions established
15 by ordinance or resolution of the county legislative authority and in
16 conformity with this section.

17 (2) There is created in each county a commission to be known as the
18 (**Insert name of county**) county citizens' commission on salaries for
19 elected officials. Each commission shall consist of ten members
20 appointed by the county commissioner or executive with the approval of
21 the county legislative authority, or by a majority vote of the county
22 legislative authority if there is no single county commissioner or
23 executive, as provided in this section.

24 (a) Six of the ten commission members shall be selected by lot by
25 the county auditor from among those registered voters eligible to vote
26 at the time persons are selected for appointment to full terms on the
27 commission under (c) of this subsection. In noncharter counties, the
28 county auditor shall select two commission members living in each
29 commissioner's district. The county auditor shall establish policies
30 and procedures for conducting the selection by lot. The policies and
31 procedures shall include, but not be limited to, those for notifying
32 persons selected and for providing a new selection from a
33 commissioner's district if a person selected from the district declines
34 appointment to the commission or if, following the person's
35 appointment, the person's position on the commission becomes vacant
36 before the end of the person's term of office.

37 (b) The remaining four of the ten commission members must be
38 residents of the county and shall be appointed by the county

1 commissioner or executive with approval of the county legislative
2 authority, or by a majority vote of the county legislative authority if
3 there is no single county commissioner or executive. The persons
4 selected under this subsection shall have had experience in the field
5 of personnel management. Of these four members, one shall be selected
6 from each of the following four sectors in the county: Business,
7 professional personnel management, legal profession, and organized
8 labor.

9 (c) If there is a single county commissioner or executive, the
10 county auditor shall forward the names of persons selected under (a) of
11 this subsection to the county commissioner or executive who shall
12 appoint these persons to the commission.

13 (d) No person may be appointed to more than two terms. No member
14 of the commission may be removed by the county commissioner or
15 executive, or county legislative authority if there is no single county
16 commissioner or executive, during his or her term of office unless for
17 cause of incapacity, incompetence, neglect of duty, or malfeasance in
18 office, or for a disqualifying change of residence.

19 (e) The members of the commission may not include any officer,
20 official, or employee of the county or any of their immediate family
21 members. "Immediate family member" as used in this subsection means
22 the parents, spouse, siblings, children, or dependent relatives of the
23 officer, official, or employee, whether or not living in the household
24 of the officer, official, or employee.

25 (f) Upon a vacancy in any position on the commission, a successor
26 shall be selected and appointed to fill the unexpired term. The
27 selection and appointment shall be concluded within thirty days of the
28 date the position becomes vacant and shall be conducted in the same
29 manner as for the original appointment.

30 (3) Any change in salary shall be filed by the commission with the
31 county auditor and shall become effective and incorporated into the
32 county budget without further action of the county legislative
33 authority or salary commission.

34 (4) Salary increases established by the commission shall be
35 effective as to county commissioners and all members of the county
36 legislative authority, regardless of their terms of office.

37 (5) Salary decreases established by the commission shall become
38 effective as to incumbent county commissioners and councilmembers at
39 the commencement of their next subsequent terms of office.

1 (6) Salary increases and decreases shall be subject to referendum
2 petition by the people of the county in the same manner as a county
3 ordinance upon filing of such petition with the county auditor within
4 thirty days after filing of the salary schedule. In the event of the
5 filing of a valid referendum petition, the salary increase or decrease
6 shall not go into effect until approved by vote of the people.

7 (7) Referendum measures under this section shall be submitted to
8 the voters of the county at the next following general or municipal
9 election occurring thirty days or more after the petition is filed, and
10 shall be otherwise governed by the provisions of the state Constitution
11 and laws generally applicable to referendum measures.

12 (8) The action fixing the salary of a county commissioner or
13 councilmember by a commission established in conformity with this
14 section shall supersede any other provision of state statute or county
15 ordinance related to municipal budgets or to the fixing of salaries of
16 county commissioners and councilmembers.

17 (9) Salaries for county commissioners and councilmembers
18 established under an ordinance or resolution of the county legislative
19 authority in existence on the effective date of this act that
20 substantially complies with this section shall remain in effect unless
21 and until changed in accordance with such charter provision or
22 ordinance.

23 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 6.** If any provision of this act or its
24 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
25 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
26 persons or circumstances is not affected.

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
