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## SENATE BILL 6746

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State of Washington 56th Legislature 2000 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to immunizations at long-term care facilities;
- 2 adding a new chapter to Title 70 RCW; and providing an effective date.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** It is the intent of the legislature to 5 ensure that long-term care facilities are safe.
- 6 (1) The long-term care resident and employee immunization act is 7 intended to:
- 8 (a) Prevent and reduce the occurrence and severity of the influenza 9 virus and pneumococcal disease by increasing the use of immunizations 10 licensed by the food and drug administration;
- 11 (b) Avoid pain, suffering, and deaths that may result from the 12 influenza virus and pneumococcal disease;
- 13 (c) Improve the well-being and quality of life of residents and 14 employees of long-term care facilities; and
- 15 (d) Reduce avoidable costs associated with treating the influenza 16 virus and pneumococcal disease.
- 17 (2) The legislature finds that:
- 18 (a) Recent studies show that it is important to immunize older 19 citizens against the influenza virus and pneumococcal disease;

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- 1 (b) The centers for disease control and prevention recommend 2 individuals over age sixty-five receive immunizations against the 3 influenza virus and pneumococcal disease;
- 4 (c) The influenza virus and pneumococcal disease have been 5 identified as leading causes of death for citizens over age sixty-five;
- (d) Immunizations licensed by the food and drug administration are readily available and effective in reducing and preventing the severity of the influenza virus and pneumococcal disease in people over age sixty-five;
- 10 (e) All types of long-term care facilities operating in the state 11 are appropriate locations to improve immunization rates among residents 12 over age sixty-five; and
- (f) Employees of long-term care facilities should be immunized against influenza and pneumococcal disease to prevent the spread of these diseases to the frail and elderly residents of long-term care facilities.
- 17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** The definitions in this section apply 18 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
- 19 (1) "Documentation" means evidence from a person's physician or 20 health care provider in written format indicating the date and place 21 when the individual received the influenza virus immunization and the 22 pneumococcal pneumonia immunization.
  - (2) "Long-term care facility" includes nursing homes licensed under chapter 18.51 RCW, boarding homes license under chapter 18.20 RCW, and adult family homes licensed under chapter 70.128 RCW.
- 26 (3) "Medically contraindicated" means either that the influenza or 27 pneumococcal immunizations should not be administered to an individual 28 because of a condition that individual has that will be detrimental to 29 the individual's health if the individual receives either of the 30 immunizations.
- 31 <u>NEW SECTION</u>. **Sec. 3.** Long-term care facilities shall:
- 32 (1) Require that all employees and residents, unless otherwise 33 exempted, have current documentation of influenza virus and 34 pneumococcal disease immunization. If an individual is unable to 35 provide current documentation of immunization, the long-term care 36 facility must provide access to the immunization within thirty days;

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- 1 (2) Require that each resident, or the resident's legal guardian, 2 upon admission to a long-term care facility, provide informed consent 3 for annual influenza virus and pneumococcal disease immunization; and 4 (3) Require that all residents and employees of long-term care 5 facilities update their immunizations by November 30th of each year.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. All residents and employees of long-term care facilities must be immunized as required by this chapter unless:

  (1) The immunization is medically contraindicated, as described in
- 9 the product labeling approved by the food and drug administration; or
- 10 (2) Receiving an immunization is against the individual's religious 11 beliefs.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** Long-term care facilities that fail to comply with the terms of this chapter are subject to the provisions of RCW 18.20.060, 18.51.060, or 70.128.100.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. This act shall be known and may be cited as the long-term care resident and employee immunization act of 2000.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. Sections 1 through 6 of this act constitute a new chapter in Title 70 RCW.
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** This act takes effect July 1, 2000.

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
