- 1 AN ACT Relating to safety and health standards; and adding a new
- 2 section to chapter 49.17 RCW.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 49.17 RCW 5 to read as follows:
- 6 (1) The director may adopt rules pursuant to RCW 49.17.040 to
- 7 provide safety and health standards for musculoskeletal disorders
- 8 caused by awkward postures, high hand force, repetitive motion,
- 9 repeated impacts, awkward lifting, vibration, or similar physical
- 10 tasks. However, the rules adopted by the department under this section
- 11 only apply to the following state agencies:
- 12 (a) Department of labor and industries;
- (b) Department of general administration;
- 14 (c) Department of ecology;
- 15 (d) Department of transportation;
- 16 (e) Employment security department;
- 17 (f) Department of corrections; and
- 18 (g) Department of revenue.

- 1 (2) By December 31, 2003, the directors of each of the state 2 agencies listed in subsection (1) of this section shall report to the 3 legislature regarding:
 - (a) Ease of understanding and compliance with rules;

- 5 (b) Identification of ambiguities and difficulties encountered 6 during implementation of rules;
- 7 (c) Injury reduction, including comparison to injury rates for 8 years prior to the adoption of rules;
- 9 (d) Costs of compliance with rules, including direct and indirect 10 costs.
- 11 (3) In order to more accurately reflect private sector 12 circumstances, agencies shall use current appropriations to implement 13 rules.
- 14 (4) This section expires three years from the date of final 15 adoption of a rule.
