- 1 AN ACT Relating to the practice of occupational therapy; and
- 2 amending RCW 18.59.020, 18.59.031, and 18.59.100.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 18.59.020 and 1991 c 3 s 153 are each amended to read 5 as follows:
- 6 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 7 this section apply throughout this chapter.
- 8 (1) "Board" means the board of occupational therapy practice.
- 9 (2) "Occupational therapy" is the scientifically based use of
- 10 purposeful activity with individuals who are limited by physical injury
- 11 or illness, psychosocial dysfunction, developmental or learning
- 12 disabilities, or the aging process in order to maximize independence,
- 13 prevent disability, and maintain health. The practice encompasses
- 14 evaluation, treatment, and consultation. Specific occupational therapy
- 15 services include but are not limited to: Using specifically designed
- 16 activities and exercises to enhance neurodevelopmental, cognitive,
- 17 perceptual motor, sensory integrative, and psychomotor functioning;
- 18 administering and interpreting tests such as manual muscle and sensory
- 19 integration; teaching daily living skills; developing prevocational

- 1 skills and play and avocational capabilities; designing, fabricating,
- 2 or applying selected orthotic and prosthetic devices or selected
- 3 adaptive equipment; and adapting environments for the handicapped.
- 4 These services are provided individually, in groups, or through social
- 5 systems.
- 6 (3) "Occupational therapist" means a person licensed to practice 7 occupational therapy under this chapter.
- 8 (4) "Occupational therapy assistant" means a person licensed to
- 9 assist in the practice of occupational therapy under the supervision or
- 10 with the regular consultation of an occupational therapist.
- 11 (5) "Occupational therapy aide" means a person who is trained to
- 12 perform specific occupational therapy techniques under professional
- 13 supervision as defined by the board but who does not perform activities
- 14 that require advanced training in the sciences or practices involved in
- 15 the profession of occupational therapy.
- 16 (6) "Occupational therapy practitioner" means a person who is
- 17 <u>credentialed as an occupational therapist or occupational therapy</u>
- 18 <u>assistant</u>.
- 19 <u>(7)</u> "Person" means any individual, partnership, unincorporated
- 20 organization, or corporate body, except that only an individual may be
- 21 licensed under this chapter.
- ( $(\frac{7}{})$ ) (8) "Department" means the department of health.
- 23 (((8))) "Secretary" means the secretary of health.
- 24 Sec. 2. RCW 18.59.031 and 1987 c 150 s 44 are each amended to read
- 25 as follows:
- No person may practice or represent himself or herself as an
- 27 occupational ((therapist)) therapy practitioner without first having a
- 28 valid license to do so.
- 29 **Sec. 3.** RCW 18.59.100 and 1986 c 259 s 101 are each amended to
- 30 read as follows:
- 31 An occupational therapist shall, after evaluating a patient and if
- 32 the case is a medical one, refer the case to a physician for
- 33 appropriate medical direction if such direction is lacking. Treatment
- 34 by an occupational therapist of such a medical case may take place only
- 35 upon the referral of a physician ((or podiatrist)), osteopathic
- 36 physician, podiatric physician and surgeon, naturopath, chiropractor,

- 1 physician assistant, psychologist, or advanced registered nurse
- 2 <u>practitioner</u> licensed to practice ((medicine)) in this state.
