- AN ACT Relating to supported employment; amending RCW 41.04.750,
- 2 41.04.760, and 41.04.770; and amending 1997 c 287 s 1 (uncodified).
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 1997 c 287 s 1 (uncodified) is amended to read as follows: The legislature finds that the rate of unemployment among 5 6 ((persons)) <u>individuals</u> with developmental <u>disabilities or other</u> significant disabilities is high due to the limited employment opportunities available to ((disabled persons)) <u>them</u>. Given that 8 ((persons)) individuals with developmental disabilities or other 9 10 significant disabilities are capable of filling employment positions in the general work force population, supported employment is an effective 11 12 way of integrating such individuals into the general work force 13 population. The creation of supported employment programs can increase 14 the types and availability of employment positions for ((persons)) 15 individuals with developmental disabilities or other significant
- 17 **Sec. 2.** RCW 41.04.750 and 1997 c 287 s 2 are each amended to read 18 as follows:

- Unless the context clearly requires otherwise the definitions in this section apply throughout RCW 41.04.760 through 41.04.780.
- 3 (1) "Developmental disability" means a disability as defined in RCW 4 71A.10.020.
- 5 (2) "Significant disability" means a disability as defined in 29 6 U.S.C. Sec. 705.
- 7 (3) "Supported employment" means employment for individuals with 8 developmental disabilities or other significant disabilities who 9 ((may)) require on-the-job training and long-term support in order to 10 fulfill their job duties successfully. Supported employment offers the 11 same wages and benefits as similar nonsupported employment positions.
- $((\frac{3}{3}))$ (4) "State agency" means any office, department, division, bureau, board, commission, community college or institution of higher education, or agency of the state of Washington.
- 15 **Sec. 3.** RCW 41.04.760 and 1997 c 287 s 3 are each amended to read 16 as follows:
- State agencies are encouraged to participate in supported 17 18 employment activities. The department of social and health services, in conjunction with the department of personnel and the office of 19 financial management, shall identify agencies that have positions and 20 funding conducive to implementing supported employment. An agency may 21 22 only participate in supported employment activities pursuant to this 23 section if the agency is able to operate the program within its 24 existing budget. These agencies shall:
- (1) Designate a coordinator who will be responsible for information and resource referral regarding the agency's supported employment program. The coordinator shall serve as a liaison between the agency and the department of personnel regarding supported employment;
- 29 (2) Submit an annual update to the department of social and health 30 services, the department of personnel, and the office of financial management. The annual update shall include: A description of the 31 agency's supported employment efforts, the number of ((persons)) 32 33 <u>individuals</u> placed in supported employment positions, ((recommendations 34 concerning expanding the supported employment program to include people with mental disabilities or other disabilities,)) and an overall 35 evaluation of the effectiveness of supported employment for the agency. 36

- *Sec. 4. RCW 41.04.770 and 1997 c 287 s 4 are each amended to read as follows:
- The department of social and health services and the department of personnel shall, after consultation with supported employment provider associations and other interested parties, encourage, educate, and
- 6 assist state agencies in implementing supported employment programs.
- 7 The department of social and health services shall maintain information
- 8 regarding the number of supported employment placements by type of
- 9 <u>disability and report this information to the department of personnel.</u>
- 10 The department of personnel shall provide human resources technical
- 11 assistance to agencies implementing supported employment programs. The
- 12 department of personnel shall make available, upon request of the
- 13 legislature, an annual report that evaluates the overall progress of
- 14 supported employment in state government.

- 1 Note: Governor's explanation of partial veto is as follows:
- "I am returning herewith, without my approval as to section 4, 3 Substitute House Bill No. 1811 entitled:
- 4 "AN ACT Relating to supported employment;"
- This bill would expand the state's supported employment program to include individuals with more significant disabilities than are currently included. The supported employment program offers on-the-job training and long-term support to disabled people at the same wages and benefits received by people in similar positions who are not disabled.
- Section 4 of the bill would require the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) to maintain certain information, and to report
- 12 that information to the Department of Personnel, and for the Department
- 13 of Personnel to in turn report the information to the legislature on
- 14 request. Such a provision is inefficient and unnecessary in statute.
- 15 DSHS currently maintains the information and will continue to do so.
- 16 If the legislature wants information on supported employment, it may
- 17 request it at any time.
- 18 For these reasons, I have vetoed section 4 of Substitute House Bill
- 19 No. 1811.
- With the exception of section 4, Substitute House Bill No. 1811 is
- 21 approved."

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
