- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 9.35 RCW 5 to read as follows:
- 6 (1) It is unlawful for any person to knowingly use a means of
- 7 identification of another person to solicit undesired mail with the
- 8 intent to annoy, harass, intimidate, torment, or embarrass that person.
- 9 (2) For purposes of this section, "means of identification" has the
- 10 meaning provided in RCW 9.35.020.
- 11 (3) Violation of this section is a misdemeanor.
- 12 (4) Additionally, a person who violates this section is liable for
- 13 civil damages of five hundred dollars or actual damages, including
- 14 costs to repair the person's credit record, whichever is greater, and
- 15 reasonable attorneys' fees as determined by the court.
