1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the  
2 following:

3 "Sec. 1. RCW 18.79.040 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 18 s 50 are each  
4 amended to read as follows:

5 (1) "Registered nursing practice" means the performance of acts  
6 requiring substantial specialized knowledge, judgment, and skill based  
7 on the principles of the biological, physiological, behavioral, and  
8 sociological sciences in either:

9 (a) The observation, assessment, diagnosis, care or counsel, and  
10 health teaching of (~~the ill, injured, or infirm~~) individuals with  
11 illnesses, injuries, or disabilities, or in the maintenance of health  
12 or prevention of illness of others;

13 (b) The performance of such additional acts requiring education and  
14 training and that are recognized by the medical and nursing professions  
15 as proper and recognized by the commission to be performed by  
16 registered nurses licensed under this chapter and that are authorized  
17 by the commission through its rules;

18 (c) The administration, supervision, delegation, and evaluation of  
19 nursing practice. However, nothing in this subsection affects the  
20 authority of a hospital, hospital district, in-home service agency,  
21 community-based care setting, medical clinic, or office, concerning its  
22 administration and supervision;

23 (d) The teaching of nursing;

24 (e) The executing of medical regimen as prescribed by a licensed  
25 physician and surgeon, dentist, osteopathic physician and surgeon,  
26 podiatric physician and surgeon, physician assistant, osteopathic  
27 physician assistant, or advanced registered nurse practitioner.

28 (2) Nothing in this section prohibits a person from practicing a  
29 profession for which a license has been issued under the laws of this

1 state or specifically authorized by any other law of the state of  
2 Washington.

3 (3) This section does not prohibit (a) the nursing care of the  
4 sick, without compensation, by an unlicensed person who does not hold  
5 himself or herself out to be a registered nurse, (b) the practice of  
6 licensed practical nursing by a licensed practical nurse, or (c) the  
7 practice of a nursing assistant, providing delegated nursing tasks  
8 under chapter 18.88A RCW.

9 **Sec. 2.** RCW 18.79.260 and 2000 c 95 s 3 are each amended to read  
10 as follows:

11 (1) A registered nurse under his or her license may perform for  
12 compensation nursing care, as that term is usually understood, (~~of the~~  
13 ~~ill, injured, or infirm~~) to individuals with illnesses, injuries, or  
14 disabilities.

15 (2) A registered nurse may, at or under the general direction of a  
16 licensed physician and surgeon, dentist, osteopathic physician and  
17 surgeon, naturopathic physician, podiatric physician and surgeon,  
18 physician assistant, osteopathic physician assistant, or advanced  
19 registered nurse practitioner acting within the scope of his or her  
20 license, administer medications, treatments, tests, and inoculations,  
21 whether or not the severing or penetrating of tissues is involved and  
22 whether or not a degree of independent judgment and skill is required.  
23 Such direction must be for acts which are within the scope of  
24 registered nursing practice.

25 (3) A registered nurse may delegate tasks of nursing care to other  
26 individuals where the registered nurse determines that it is in the  
27 best interest of the patient.

- 28 (a) The delegating nurse shall:
- 29 (i) Determine the competency of the individual to perform the
  - 30 tasks;
  - 31 (ii) Evaluate the appropriateness of the delegation;
  - 32 (iii) Supervise the actions of the person performing the delegated
  - 33 task; and
  - 34 (iv) Delegate only those tasks that are within the registered
  - 35 nurse's scope of practice.

1       **(b) A registered nurse, working for a home health or hospice agency**  
2 **regulated under chapter 70.127 RCW, may delegate the application,**  
3 **instillation, or insertion of medications to a registered or certified**  
4 **nursing assistant under a plan of care.**

5       **(c) Except as authorized in (b) or (e) of this subsection, a**  
6 **registered nurse may not delegate the administration of medications.**  
7 **Except as authorized in (e) of this subsection, a registered nurse may**  
8 **not delegate** acts requiring substantial skill, ~~((the administration of~~  
9 ~~medications, or))~~ **and may not delegate** piercing or severing of tissues  
10 ~~((except to registered or certified nursing assistants who provide care~~  
11 ~~to individuals in community based care settings as authorized under (d)~~  
12 ~~of this subsection)).~~ Acts that require nursing judgment shall not be  
13 delegated.

14       ~~((e))~~ **(d)** No person may coerce a nurse into compromising patient  
15 safety by requiring the nurse to delegate if the nurse determines that  
16 it is inappropriate to do so. Nurses shall not be subject to any  
17 employer reprisal or disciplinary action by the nursing care quality  
18 assurance commission for refusing to delegate tasks or refusing to  
19 provide the required training for delegation if the nurse determines  
20 delegation may compromise patient safety.

21       ~~((d))~~ **(e)** For delegation in community-based care settings or in-  
22 **home care settings,** a registered nurse may delegate nursing care tasks  
23 only to registered or certified nursing assistants. Simple care tasks  
24 such as blood pressure monitoring, personal care service, or other  
25 tasks as defined by the nursing care quality assurance commission are  
26 exempted from this requirement.

27       **(i)** "Community-based care settings" includes: Community  
28 residential programs for the developmentally disabled, certified by the  
29 department of social and health services under chapter 71A.12 RCW;  
30 adult family homes licensed under chapter 70.128 RCW; and boarding  
31 homes licensed under chapter 18.20 RCW. Community-based care settings  
32 do not include acute care or skilled nursing facilities.

33       ~~((i))~~ **(ii)** **"In-home care settings" include an individual's place**  
34 **of temporary or permanent residence, but does not include acute care or**  
35 **skilled nursing facilities, and does not include community-based care**  
36 **settings as defined in (e)(i) of this subsection.**

1        (iii) Delegation of nursing care tasks in community-based care  
2 settings and in-home care settings is only allowed for individuals who  
3 have a stable and predictable condition. "Stable and predictable  
4 condition" means a situation in which the individual's clinical and  
5 behavioral status is known and does not require the frequent presence  
6 and evaluation of a registered nurse.

7        ~~((+ii))~~ (iv) The determination of the appropriateness of  
8 delegation of a nursing task is at the discretion of the registered  
9 nurse. However, the administration of medications by injection,  
10 sterile procedures, and central line maintenance may never be  
11 delegated.

12        ~~((+iii))~~ (v) The registered nurse shall verify that the nursing  
13 assistant has completed the required core nurse delegation training  
14 required in chapter 18.88A RCW prior to authorizing delegation.

15        ~~((+iv))~~ (vi) The nurse is accountable for his or her own  
16 individual actions in the delegation process. Nurses acting within the  
17 protocols of their delegation authority are immune from liability for  
18 any action performed in the course of their delegation duties.

19        ~~((+v) On or before June 30, 2001, the nursing care quality  
20 assurance commission, in conjunction with the professional nursing  
21 organizations and the department of social and health services, shall  
22 make any needed revisions or additions to nurse delegation protocols by  
23 rule, including standards for nurses to obtain informed consent prior  
24 to the delegation of nursing care tasks.))~~

25        (vii) Nursing task delegation protocols are not intended to  
26 regulate the settings in which delegation may occur, but are intended  
27 to ensure that nursing care services have a consistent standard of  
28 practice upon which the public and the profession may rely, and to  
29 safeguard the authority of the nurse to make independent professional  
30 decisions regarding the delegation of a task.

31        ~~((+e))~~ (f) The nursing care quality assurance commission may adopt  
32 rules to implement this section.

33        (4) Only a person licensed as a registered nurse may instruct  
34 nurses in technical subjects pertaining to nursing.

35        (5) Only a person licensed as a registered nurse may hold herself  
36 or himself out to the public or designate herself or himself as a  
37 registered nurse.

1       **Sec. 3.** RCW 18.88A.140 and 2000 c 171 s 25 are each amended to  
2 read as follows:

3       Nothing in this chapter may be construed to prohibit or restrict:

4       (1) The practice by an individual licensed, certified, or  
5 registered under the laws of this state and performing services within  
6 their authorized scope of practice;

7       (2) The practice by an individual employed by the government of the  
8 United States while engaged in the performance of duties prescribed by  
9 the laws of the United States;

10       (3) The practice by a person who is a regular student in an  
11 educational program approved by the secretary, and whose performance of  
12 services is pursuant to a regular course of instruction or assignments  
13 from an instructor and under the general supervision of the instructor;

14       (4) A nursing assistant, while employed as a personal aide as  
15 defined in RCW 74.39.007, from accepting direction from an individual  
16 who is self-directing their care.

17       **Sec. 4.** RCW 18.88A.200 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 18 s 45 are each  
18 amended to read as follows:

19       The legislature recognizes that nurses have been successfully  
20 delegating nursing care tasks to family members and auxiliary staff for  
21 many years. The opportunity for a nurse to delegate to nursing  
22 assistants qualifying under RCW 18.88A.210 may enhance the viability  
23 and quality of health care services in (~~community health~~) community-  
24 based care settings (~~for long term care services~~) and in-home care  
25 settings to allow (~~citizens~~) individuals to live as independently as  
26 possible with maximum safeguards.

27       **Sec. 5.** RCW 18.88A.210 and 2000 c 95 s 1 are each amended to read  
28 as follows:

29       (1) A nursing assistant meeting the requirements of this section  
30 who provides care to individuals in community-based care settings or  
31 in-home care settings, as defined in RCW 18.79.260(3), may accept  
32 delegation of nursing care tasks by a registered nurse as provided in  
33 RCW 18.79.260(3).

34       (2) For the purposes of this section, "nursing assistant" means a  
35 nursing assistant-registered or a nursing assistant-certified. Nothing

1 in this section may be construed to affect the authority of nurses to  
2 delegate nursing tasks to other persons, including licensed practical  
3 nurses, as authorized by law.

4 (3) Before commencing any specific nursing care tasks authorized  
5 under this chapter, the nursing assistant must (a) provide to the  
6 delegating nurse a certificate of completion issued by the department  
7 of social and health services indicating the completion of basic core  
8 nurse delegation training, (b) be regulated by the department of health  
9 pursuant to this chapter, subject to the uniform disciplinary act under  
10 chapter 18.130 RCW, and (c) meet any additional training requirements  
11 identified by the nursing care quality assurance commission.  
12 Exceptions to these training requirements must adhere to RCW  
13 18.79.260(3)((~~d~~)(~~iii~~)) (e)(v).

14 **Sec. 6.** RCW 18.88A.230 and 2000 c 95 s 2 are each amended to read  
15 as follows:

16 (1) The nursing assistant shall be accountable for their own  
17 individual actions in the delegation process. Nursing assistants  
18 following written delegation instructions from registered nurses  
19 performed in the course of their accurately written, delegated duties  
20 shall be immune from liability.

21 (2) Nursing assistants shall not be subject to any employer  
22 reprisal or disciplinary action by the secretary for refusing to accept  
23 delegation of a nursing task based on patient safety issues. No  
24 community-based care setting as defined in RCW 18.79.260(3)((~~d~~)) (e),  
25 or in-home services agency as defined in RCW 70.127.010, may  
26 discriminate or retaliate in any manner against a person because the  
27 person made a complaint or cooperated in the investigation of a  
28 complaint.

29 **Sec. 7.** RCW 70.127.010 and 2000 c 175 s 1 are each amended to read  
30 as follows:

31 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in  
32 this section apply throughout this chapter.

33 (1) "Administrator" means an individual responsible for managing  
34 the operation of an agency.

35 (2) "Department" means the department of health.

1 (3) "Director of clinical services" means an individual responsible  
2 for nursing, therapy, nutritional, social, and related services that  
3 support the plan of care provided by in-home health and hospice  
4 agencies.

5 (4) "Family" means individuals who are important to, and designated  
6 by, the patient or client and who need not be relatives.

7 (5) "Home care agency" means a person administering or providing  
8 home care services directly or through a contract arrangement to  
9 individuals in places of temporary or permanent residence. A home care  
10 agency that provides delegated tasks of nursing under RCW  
11 18.79.260(3)(e) is not considered a home health agency for the purposes  
12 of this chapter.

13 (6) "Home care services" means nonmedical services and assistance  
14 provided to ill, disabled, (~~infirm~~) or vulnerable individuals that  
15 enable them to remain in their residences. Home care services include,  
16 but are not limited to: Personal care such as assistance with  
17 dressing, feeding, and personal hygiene to facilitate self-care;  
18 homemaker assistance with household tasks, such as housekeeping,  
19 shopping, meal planning and preparation, and transportation; respite  
20 care assistance and support provided to the family; or other nonmedical  
21 services or delegated tasks of nursing under RCW 18.79.260(3)(e).

22 (7) "Home health agency" means a person administering or providing  
23 two or more home health services directly or through a contract  
24 arrangement to individuals in places of temporary or permanent  
25 residence. A person administering or providing nursing services only  
26 may elect to be designated a home health agency for purposes of  
27 licensure.

28 (8) "Home health services" means services provided to ill,  
29 disabled, (~~infirm~~) or vulnerable individuals. These services  
30 include but are not limited to nursing services, home health aide  
31 services, physical therapy services, occupational therapy services,  
32 speech therapy services, respiratory therapy services, nutritional  
33 services, medical social services, and home medical supplies or  
34 equipment services.

35 (9) "Home health aide services" means services provided by a home  
36 health agency or a hospice agency under the supervision of a registered  
37 nurse, physical therapist, occupational therapist, or speech therapist

1 who is employed by or under contract to a home health or hospice  
2 agency. Such care includes ambulation and exercise, assistance with  
3 self-administered medications, reporting changes in patients'  
4 conditions and needs, completing appropriate records, and personal care  
5 or homemaker services.

6 (10) "Home medical supplies" or "equipment services" means  
7 diagnostic, treatment, and monitoring equipment and supplies provided  
8 for the direct care of individuals within a plan of care.

9 (11) "Hospice agency" means a person administering or providing  
10 hospice services directly or through a contract arrangement to  
11 individuals in places of temporary or permanent residence under the  
12 direction of an interdisciplinary team composed of at least a nurse,  
13 social worker, physician, spiritual counselor, and a volunteer.

14 (12) "Hospice care center" means a homelike, noninstitutional  
15 facility where hospice services are provided, and that meets the  
16 requirements for operation under RCW 70.127.280.

17 (13) "Hospice services" means symptom and pain management provided  
18 to a terminally ill individual, and emotional, spiritual, and  
19 bereavement support for the individual and family in a place of  
20 temporary or permanent residence, and may include the provision of home  
21 health and home care services for the terminally ill individual.

22 (14) "In-home services agency" means a person licensed to  
23 administer or provide home health, home care, hospice services, or  
24 hospice care center services directly or through a contract arrangement  
25 to individuals in a place of temporary or permanent residence.

26 (15) "Person" means any individual, business, firm, partnership,  
27 corporation, company, association, joint stock association, public or  
28 private agency or organization, or the legal successor thereof that  
29 employs or contracts with two or more individuals.

30 (16) "Plan of care" means a written document based on assessment of  
31 individual needs that identifies services to meet these needs.

32 (17) "Quality improvement" means reviewing and evaluating  
33 appropriateness and effectiveness of services provided under this  
34 chapter.

35 (18) "Service area" means the geographic area in which the  
36 department has given prior approval to a licensee to provide home  
37 health, hospice, or home care services.



1 (19) "Survey" means an inspection conducted by the department to  
2 evaluate and monitor an agency's compliance with this chapter.

3 **Sec. 8.** RCW 70.127.040 and 2000 c 175 s 4 are each amended to read  
4 as follows:

5 The following are not subject to regulation for the purposes of  
6 this chapter:

7 (1) A family member providing home health, hospice, or home care  
8 services;

9 (2) A person who provides only meal services in an individual's  
10 permanent or temporary residence;

11 (3) An individual providing home care through a direct agreement  
12 with a recipient of care in an individual's permanent or temporary  
13 residence;

14 (4) A person furnishing or delivering home medical supplies or  
15 equipment that does not involve the provision of services beyond those  
16 necessary to deliver, set up, and monitor the proper functioning of the  
17 equipment and educate the user on its proper use;

18 (5) A person who provides services through a contract with a  
19 licensed agency;

20 (6) An employee or volunteer of a licensed agency who provides  
21 services only as an employee or volunteer;

22 (7) Facilities and institutions, including but not limited to  
23 nursing homes under chapter 18.51 RCW, hospitals under chapter 70.41  
24 RCW, adult family homes under chapter 70.128 RCW, boarding homes under  
25 chapter 18.20 RCW, developmental disability residential programs under  
26 chapter (~~71.12~~) 71A.12 RCW, other entities licensed under chapter  
27 71.12 RCW, or other licensed facilities and institutions, only when  
28 providing services to persons residing within the facility or  
29 institution;

30 (8) Local and combined city-county health departments providing  
31 services under chapters 70.05 and 70.08 RCW;

32 (9) An individual providing care to ill, disabled, (~~infirm~~) or  
33 vulnerable individuals through a contract with the department of social  
34 and health services;

35 (10) Nursing homes, hospitals, or other institutions, agencies,

1 organizations, or persons that contract with licensed home health,  
2 hospice, or home care agencies for the delivery of services;

3 (11) In-home assessments of an ill, disabled, or vulnerable(~~(or~~  
4 ~~infirm~~)) individual that does not result in regular ongoing care at  
5 home;

6 (12) Services conducted by and for the adherents of a church or  
7 religious denomination that rely upon spiritual means alone through  
8 prayer for healing in accordance with the tenets and practices of such  
9 church or religious denomination and the bona fide religious beliefs  
10 genuinely held by such adherents;

11 (13) A medicare-approved dialysis center operating a medicare-  
12 approved home dialysis program;

13 (14) A person providing case management services. For the purposes  
14 of this subsection, "case management" means the assessment,  
15 coordination, authorization, planning, training, and monitoring of home  
16 health, hospice, and home care, and does not include the direct  
17 provision of care to an individual;

18 (15) Pharmacies licensed under RCW 18.64.043 that deliver  
19 prescription drugs and durable medical equipment that does not involve  
20 the use of professional services beyond those authorized to be  
21 performed by licensed pharmacists pursuant to chapter 18.64 RCW and  
22 those necessary to set up and monitor the proper functioning of the  
23 equipment and educate the person on its proper use;

24 (16) A volunteer hospice complying with the requirements of RCW  
25 70.127.050; and

26 (17) A person who provides home care services without compensation.

27 **Sec. 9.** RCW 70.127.120 and 2000 c 175 s 10 are each amended to  
28 read as follows:

29 The department shall adopt rules consistent with RCW 70.127.005  
30 necessary to implement this chapter under chapter 34.05 RCW. In order  
31 to ensure safe and adequate care, the rules shall address at a minimum  
32 the following:

33 (1) Maintenance and preservation of all records relating directly  
34 to the care and treatment of individuals by licensees;

35 (2) Establishment and implementation of a procedure for the

1 receipt, investigation, and disposition of complaints regarding  
2 services provided;

3 (3) Establishment and implementation of a plan for ongoing care of  
4 individuals and preservation of records if the licensee ceases  
5 operations;

6 (4) Supervision of services;

7 (5) Establishment and implementation of written policies regarding  
8 response to referrals and access to services;

9 (6) Establishment and implementation of written personnel policies,  
10 procedures and personnel records for paid staff that provide for  
11 prehire screening, minimum qualifications, regular performance  
12 evaluations, including observation in the home, participation in  
13 orientation and in-service training, and involvement in quality  
14 improvement activities. The department may not establish experience or  
15 other qualifications for agency personnel or contractors beyond that  
16 required by state law;

17 (7) Establishment and implementation of written policies and  
18 procedures for volunteers who have direct patient/client contact and  
19 that provide for background and health screening, orientation, and  
20 supervision;

21 (8) Establishment and implementation of written policies for  
22 obtaining regular reports on patient satisfaction;

23 (9) Establishment and implementation of a quality improvement  
24 process; ((and))

25 (10) Establishment and implementation of policies related to the  
26 delivery of care including:

27 (a) Plan of care for each individual served;

28 (b) Periodic review of the plan of care;

29 (c) Supervision of care and clinical consultation as necessary;

30 (d) Care consistent with the plan;

31 (e) Admission, transfer, and discharge from care; and

32 (f) For hospice services:

33 (i) Availability of twenty-four hour seven days a week hospice  
34 registered nurse consultation and in-home services as appropriate;

35 (ii) Interdisciplinary team communication as appropriate and  
36 necessary; and

1 (iii) The use and availability of volunteers to provide family  
2 support and respite care; and

3 (11) Establishment and implementation of policies related to agency  
4 implementation and oversight of nurse delegation as defined in RCW  
5 18.79.260(3)(e).

6 **Sec. 10.** RCW 70.127.170 and 2000 c 175 s 14 are each amended to  
7 read as follows:

8 Pursuant to chapter 34.05 RCW and RCW 70.127.180(3), the department  
9 may deny, restrict, condition, modify, suspend, or revoke a license  
10 under this chapter or, in lieu thereof or in addition thereto, assess  
11 monetary penalties of a civil nature not to exceed one thousand dollars  
12 per violation, or require a refund of any amounts billed to, and  
13 collected from, the consumer or third-party payor in any case in which  
14 it finds that the licensee, or any applicant, officer, director,  
15 partner, managing employee, or owner of ten percent or more of the  
16 applicant's or licensee's assets:

17 (1) Failed or refused to comply with the requirements of this  
18 chapter or the standards or rules adopted under this chapter;

19 (2) Was the holder of a license issued pursuant to this chapter  
20 that was revoked for cause and never reissued by the department, or  
21 that was suspended for cause and the terms of the suspension have not  
22 been fulfilled and the licensee has continued to operate;

23 (3) Has knowingly or with reason to know made a misrepresentation  
24 of, false statement of, or failed to disclose, a material fact to the  
25 department in an application for the license or any data attached  
26 thereto or in any record required by this chapter or matter under  
27 investigation by the department, or during a survey, or concerning  
28 information requested by the department;

29 (4) Refused to allow representatives of the department to inspect  
30 any book, record, or file required by this chapter to be maintained or  
31 any portion of the licensee's premises;

32 (5) Willfully prevented, interfered with, or attempted to impede in  
33 any way the work of any representative of the department and the lawful  
34 enforcement of any provision of this chapter. This includes but is not  
35 limited to: Willful misrepresentation of facts during a survey,  
36 investigation, or administrative proceeding or any other legal action;

1 or use of threats or harassment against any patient, client, or  
2 witness, or use of financial inducements to any patient, client, or  
3 witness to prevent or attempt to prevent him or her from providing  
4 evidence during a survey or investigation, in an administrative  
5 proceeding, or any other legal action involving the department;

6 (6) Willfully prevented or interfered with any representative of  
7 the department in the preservation of evidence of any violation of this  
8 chapter or the rules adopted under this chapter;

9 (7) Failed to pay any civil monetary penalty assessed by the  
10 department pursuant to this chapter within ten days after the  
11 assessment becomes final;

12 (8) Used advertising that is false, fraudulent, or misleading;

13 (9) Has repeated incidents of personnel performing services beyond  
14 their authorized scope of practice;

15 (10) Misrepresented or was fraudulent in any aspect of the conduct  
16 of the licensee's business;

17 (11) Within the last five years, has been found in a civil or  
18 criminal proceeding to have committed any act that reasonably relates  
19 to the person's fitness to establish, maintain, or administer an agency  
20 or to provide care in the home of another;

21 (12) Was the holder of a license to provide care or treatment to  
22 ill, disabled, (~~infirm~~) or vulnerable individuals that was denied,  
23 restricted, not renewed, surrendered, suspended, or revoked by a  
24 competent authority in any state, federal, or foreign jurisdiction. A  
25 certified copy of the order, stipulation, or agreement is conclusive  
26 evidence of the denial, restriction, nonrenewal, surrender, suspension,  
27 or revocation;

28 (13) Violated any state or federal statute, or administrative rule  
29 regulating the operation of the agency;

30 (14) Failed to comply with an order issued by the secretary or  
31 designee;

32 (15) Aided or abetted the unlicensed operation of an in-home  
33 services agency;

34 (16) Operated beyond the scope of the in-home services agency  
35 license;

36 (17) Failed to adequately supervise staff to the extent that the  
37 health or safety of a patient or client was at risk;

1 (18) Compromised the health or safety of a patient or client,  
2 including, but not limited to, the individual performing services  
3 beyond their authorized scope of practice;

4 (19) Continued to operate after license revocation, suspension, or  
5 expiration, or operating outside the parameters of a modified,  
6 conditioned, or restricted license;

7 (20) Failed or refused to comply with chapter 70.02 RCW;

8 (21) Abused, neglected, abandoned, or financially exploited a  
9 patient or client as these terms are defined in RCW 74.34.020;

10 (22) Misappropriated the property of an individual;
