<u>ESHB 2076</u> - S COMM AMD By Committee on Higher Education

## NOT ADOPTED 04/15/2003

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that:

4 (a) At the time the higher education coordinating board was created
5 in 1985, the legislature wanted a board with a comprehensive mission
6 that included planning, budget and program review authority, and
7 program administration;

8 (b) Since its creation, the board has achieved numerous 9 accomplishments, including proposals leading to creation of the branch 10 campus system, and has made access and affordability of higher 11 education a consistent priority;

12 (c) However, higher education in Washington state is currently at 13 a crossroads. Demographic, economic, and technological changes present 14 new and daunting challenges for the state and its institutions of 15 higher education. As the state looks forward to the future, the 16 legislature, the governor, and institutions need a common strategic 17 vision to guide planning and decision making.

18 (2) Therefore, it is the legislature's intent to reaffirm and 19 strengthen the strategic planning role of the higher education 20 coordinating board. It is also the legislature's intent to examine 21 options for reassigning or altering other roles and responsibilities to 22 enable the board to place priority and focus on planning and 23 coordination.

24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28B.80 RCW 25 to read as follows:

(1) The board shall develop a statewide strategic master plan for
 higher education that proposes a vision and identifies goals and
 priorities for the system of higher education in Washington state. The

1 board shall also specify strategies for maintaining and expanding 2 access, affordability, quality, efficiency, and accountability among 3 the various institutions of higher education.

(2) In developing the statewide strategic master plan for higher 4 5 education, the board shall collaborate with the four-year institutions of higher education including the council of presidents, the community б 7 and technical college system, and, when appropriate, the work force training and education coordinating board, the superintendent of public 8 instruction, and the independent higher education institutions. 9 The 10 board shall also seek input from students, faculty organizations, community and business leaders in the state, 11 members of the legislature, and the governor. 12

13 (3) As a foundation for the statewide strategic master plan for higher education, the board shall develop and establish role and 14 mission statements for each of the four-year institutions of higher 15 education and the community and technical college system. 16 The board 17 shall determine whether certain major lines of study or types of degrees, including applied degrees or research-oriented degrees, shall 18 be assigned uniquely to some institutions or institutional sectors in 19 order to create centers of excellence that focus resources and 20 21 expertise.

(4) In assessing needs of the state's higher education system, theboard may consider and analyze the following information:

(a) Demographic, social, economic, and technological trends andtheir impact on service delivery;

26 (b) The changing ethnic composition of the population and the 27 special needs arising from those trends;

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(c) Business and industrial needs for a skilled work force;

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(d) College attendance, retention, transfer, and dropout rates;

30 (e) Needs and demands for basic and continuing education and 31 opportunities for lifelong learning by individuals of all age groups; 32 and

33 (f) Needs and demands for access to higher education by placebound 34 students and individuals in heavily populated areas underserved by 35 public institutions.

36 (5) The statewide strategic master plan for higher education shall37 include, but not be limited to, the following:

(a) Recommendations based on enrollment forecasts and analysis of
 data about demand for higher education, and policies and actions to
 meet those needs;

4 (b) State or regional priorities for new or expanded degree
5 programs or off-campus programs, including what models of service
6 delivery may be most cost-effective;

7 (c) Recommended policies or actions to improve the efficiency of8 student transfer and graduation or completion;

9 (d) State or regional priorities for addressing needs in high-10 demand fields where enrollment access is limited and employers are 11 experiencing difficulty finding enough qualified graduates to fill job 12 openings;

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(e) Recommended tuition and fees policies and levels; and

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(f) Priorities and recommendations on financial aid.

(6) The board shall present the vision, goals, priorities, and 15 strategies in the statewide strategic master plan for higher education 16 17 in a way that provides guidance for institutions, the governor, and the legislature to make further decisions regarding institution-level 18 plans, policies, legislation, and operating and capital funding for 19 higher education. In the statewide strategic master plan for higher 20 21 education, the board shall recommend specific actions to be taken and 22 identify measurable performance indicators and benchmarks for gauging progress toward achieving the goals and priorities. 23

24 (7) Every four years by December 15th, the board shall submit the 25 statewide strategic master plan for higher education to the governor and the legislature. The legislature shall, by concurrent resolution, 26 27 approve or recommend changes to the plan, following public hearings. The plan shall then become state higher education policy unless 28 legislation is enacted to alter the policies set forth in the plan. 29 Any legislative changes shall be incorporated into the final plan and 30 31 published by June.

32 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28B.80.330 and 1997 c 369 s 10 are each amended to 33 read as follows:

The board shall perform the following planning duties in consultation with the four-year institutions <u>including the council of</u> <u>presidents</u>, the community and technical college system, and when

appropriate the work force training and education coordinating board,
 the superintendent of public instruction, and the independent higher
 educational institutions:

4 (1) ((Develop and establish role and mission statements for each of
5 the four-year institutions and for the community and technical college
6 system;

7 (2) Identify the state's higher education goals, objectives, and 8 priorities;

9 (3) Prepare a comprehensive master plan which includes but is not 10 limited to:

11 (a) Assessments of the state's higher education needs. These assessments may include, but are not limited to: The basic and 12 13 continuing needs of various age groups; business and industrial needs for a skilled work force; analyses of demographic, social, and economic 14 trends; consideration of the changing ethnic composition of the 15 population and the special needs arising from such trends; college 16 17 attendance, retention, and dropout rates, and the needs of recent high school graduates and placebound adults. The board should consider the 18 needs of residents of all geographic regions, but its initial 19 priorities should be applied to heavily populated areas underserved by 20 21 public institutions;

22 (b) Recommendations on enrollment and other policies and actions to
23 meet those needs;

24 (c) Guidelines for continuing education, adult education, public
25 service, and other higher education programs;

26 (d) Mechanisms through which the state's higher education system
27 can meet the needs of employers hiring for industrial projects of
28 statewide significance.

The initial plan shall be submitted to the governor and the legislature by December 1, 1987. Comments on the plan from the board's advisory committees and the institutions shall be submitted with the plan.

The plan shall be updated every four years, and presented to the governor and the appropriate legislative policy committees. Following public hearings, the legislature shall, by concurrent resolution, approve or recommend changes to the initial plan, and the updates. The plan shall then become state higher education policy unless legislation
 is enacted to alter the policies set forth in the plan;

3 (4))) Review, evaluate, and make recommendations on operating and 4 capital budget requests from four-year institutions and the community 5 and technical college system, based on ((the elements outlined in 6 subsections (1), (2), and (3) of this section, and on)) how the budget 7 requests align with and implement the statewide strategic master plan 8 for higher education under section 2 of this act.

(a) By December of each odd-numbered year, the board shall 9 distribute guidelines which outline the board's fiscal priorities((-10 These guidelines shall be distributed)) to the institutions and the 11 12 state board for community and technical colleges ((board by December of 13 each odd-numbered year)). The institutions and the state board for community and technical colleges ((board)) shall submit an outline of 14 their proposed budgets, identifying major components, to the board no 15 later than August 1<u>st</u> of each even-numbered year. 16 The board shall 17 submit recommendations on the proposed budgets and on the board's budget priorities to the office of financial management before November 18 1st of each even-numbered year, and to the legislature by January 1st 19 of each odd-numbered year; 20

(((5))) (b) Institutions and the state board for community and technical colleges shall submit any supplemental budget requests and revisions to the board at the same time they are submitted to the office of financial management. The board shall submit recommendations on the proposed supplemental budget requests to the office of financial management by November 1st and to the legislature by January 1st;

((<del>(6)</del>)) <u>(2)</u> Recommend legislation affecting higher education;

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28 ((<del>(7)</del> Recommend tuition and fees policies and levels based on 29 comparisons with peer institutions;

30 (8) Establish priorities and develop recommendations on financial 31 aid based on comparisons with peer institutions;

32 (9))) (3) Prepare recommendations on merging or closing 33 institutions; and

34 ((<del>(10)</del>)) <u>(4)</u> Develop criteria for identifying the need for new 35 baccalaureate institutions.

1 Sec. 4. RCW 28B.80.340 and 1985 c 370 s 5 are each amended to read 2 as follows:

3 (1) The board shall perform the following program responsibilities,
4 in consultation with the institutions and with other interested
5 agencies and individuals:

6 (((<del>1)</del>)) (<u>a</u>) Approve the creation of any new degree programs at the 7 four-year institutions and prepare fiscal notes on any such programs;

8 ((<del>(2)</del>)) <u>(b)</u> Review, evaluate, and make recommendations for the 9 modification, consolidation, initiation, or elimination of on-campus 10 programs, at the four-year institutions;

11 ((<del>(3)</del>)) <u>(c)</u> Review and evaluate and approve, modify, consolidate, 12 initiate, or eliminate off-campus programs at the four-year 13 institutions;

14 ((<del>(4)</del>)) <u>(d)</u> Approve, and adopt guidelines for, higher education 15 centers and consortia;

16 (((<del>(5)</del>)) <u>(e)</u> Approve purchase or lease of major off-campus 17 facilities for the four-year institutions and the community colleges;

18 ((<del>(6)</del>)) <u>(f)</u> Establish campus service areas and define on-campus and 19 off-campus activities and major facilities; and

20 ((<del>(7)</del>)) <u>(g)</u> Approve contracts for off-campus educational programs 21 initiated by the state's four-year institutions individually, in 22 concert with other public institutions, or with independent 23 institutions.

(2) In performing its responsibilities under this section, the board shall consider, and require institutions to demonstrate, how the proposals align with or implement the statewide strategic master plan for higher education under section 2 of this act. The board shall also develop clear guidelines and objective decision-making criteria regarding approval of proposals under this section.

30 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.80.610 and 1993 c 363 s 2 are each amended to read 31 as follows:

32 (1) At the local level, the higher education institutional 33 responsibilities include but are not limited to:

34 (a) Development and provision of strategic plans ((under the
 35 guidelines established by the higher education coordinating board))
 36 that implement the vision, goals, priorities, and strategies within the

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statewide strategic master plan for higher education under section 2 of this act based on the institution's role and mission. Institutional strategic plans shall also contain measurable performance indicators and benchmarks for gauging progress toward achieving the goals and priorities. In developing their strategic plans, the research universities shall consider the feasibility of significantly increasing the number of evening graduate classes;

8 (b) For the four-year institutions of higher education, timely 9 provision of information required by the higher education coordinating 10 board to report to the governor, the legislature, and the citizens;

(c) Provision of local student financial aid delivery systems to achieve both statewide goals and institutional objectives in concert with statewide policy; and

14 (d) Operating as efficiently as feasible within institutional 15 missions and goals.

16 (2) At the state level, the higher education coordinating board 17 shall be responsible for:

(a) ((Delineation and coordination of)) Ensuring that strategic plans to be prepared by the institutions are aligned with and implement the statewide strategic master plan for higher education under section 21 <u>2 of this act and periodically monitoring institutions' progress toward</u> achieving the goals and priorities within their plans;

(b) Preparation of reports to the governor, the legislature, and the citizens on program accomplishments and use of resources by the institutions;

26 (c) Administration and policy implementation for statewide student 27 financial aid programs; and

(d) Assistance to institutions in improving operational efficiencythrough measures that include periodic review of program efficiencies.

30 (3) At the state level, on behalf of community colleges and 31 technical colleges, the state board for community and technical 32 colleges shall coordinate and report on the system's strategic plans, 33 <u>including reporting on the system's progress toward achieving the</u> 34 <u>statewide goals and priorities within its plan</u>, and shall provide any 35 information required of its colleges by the higher education 36 coordinating board.

1 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.50.090 and 1991 c 238 s 33 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

The college board shall have general supervision and control over the state system of community and technical colleges. In addition to the other powers and duties imposed upon the college board by this chapter, the college board shall be charged with the following powers, duties and responsibilities:

8 (1) Review the budgets prepared by the boards of trustees, prepare 9 a single budget for the support of the state system of community and 10 technical colleges and adult education, and submit this budget to the 11 governor as provided in RCW 43.88.090;

12 (2) Establish guidelines for the disbursement of funds; and receive 13 and disburse such funds for adult education and maintenance and 14 operation and capital support of the college districts in conformance 15 with the state and district budgets, and in conformance with chapter 16 43.88 RCW;

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(3) Ensure, through the full use of its authority:

(a) That each college district shall offer thoroughly comprehensive 18 educational, training and service programs to meet the needs of both 19 the communities and students served by combining high standards of 20 21 excellence in academic transfer courses; realistic and practical 22 courses in occupational education, both graded and ungraded; and community services of an educational, cultural, and recreational 23 24 nature; and adult education, including basic skills and general, 25 family, and work force literacy programs and services. However, technical colleges, and college districts containing only technical 26 27 colleges, shall maintain programs solely for occupational education, basic skills, and literacy purposes. For as long as a need exists, 28 technical colleges may continue those programs, activities, and 29 services they offered during the twelve-month period preceding May 17, 30 31 1991;

32 (b) That each college district shall maintain an open-door policy, 33 to the end that no student will be denied admission because of the 34 location of the student's residence or because of the student's 35 educational background or ability; that, insofar as is practical in the 36 judgment of the college board, curriculum offerings will be provided to 37 meet the educational and training needs of the community generally and

the students thereof; and that all students, regardless of their 1 2 differing courses of study, will be considered, known and recognized equally as members of the student body: PROVIDED, That the 3 administrative officers of a community or technical college may deny 4 admission to a prospective student or attendance to an enrolled student 5 if, in their judgment, the student would not be competent to profit 6 7 from the curriculum offerings of the college, or would, by his or her presence or conduct, create a disruptive atmosphere within the college 8 not consistent with the purposes of the institution. This subsection 9 (3)(b) shall not apply to competency, conduct, or presence associated 10 with a disability in a person twenty-one years of age or younger 11 attending a technical college; 12

13 (4) Prepare a comprehensive master plan for the development of 14 community and technical college education and training in the state; and assist the office of financial management in the preparation of 15 16 enrollment projections to support plans for providing adequate college 17 facilities in all areas of the state. The master plan shall include implementation of the vision, goals, priorities, and strategies in the 18 statewide strategic master plan for higher education under section 2 of 19 this act based on the community and technical college system's role and 20 21 mission. The master plan shall also contain measurable performance indicators and benchmarks for gauging progress toward achieving the 22 qoals and priorities; 23

24 (5) Define and administer criteria and guidelines for the 25 establishment of new community and technical colleges or campuses 26 within the existing districts;

(6) Establish criteria and procedures for modifying district boundary lines consistent with the purposes set forth in RCW 28B.50.020 as now or hereafter amended and in accordance therewith make such changes as it deems advisable;

31 (7) Establish minimum standards to govern the operation of the 32 community and technical colleges with respect to:

33 (a) Qualifications and credentials of instructional and key
 34 administrative personnel, except as otherwise provided in the state
 35 plan for vocational education,

36 (b) Internal budgeting, accounting, auditing, and financial

procedures as necessary to supplement the general requirements
 prescribed pursuant to chapter 43.88 RCW,

3 (c) The content of the curriculums and other educational and 4 training programs, and the requirement for degrees and certificates 5 awarded by the colleges,

6 7 (d) Standard admission policies,

(e) Eligibility of courses to receive state fund support;

8 (8) Establish and administer criteria and procedures for all 9 capital construction including the establishment, installation, and 10 expansion of facilities within the various college districts;

(9) Encourage innovation in the development of new educational and training programs and instructional methods; coordinate research efforts to this end; and disseminate the findings thereof;

14 (10) Exercise any other powers, duties and responsibilities15 necessary to carry out the purposes of this chapter;

16 (11) Authorize the various community and technical colleges to 17 offer programs and courses in other districts when it determines that 18 such action is consistent with the purposes set forth in RCW 28B.50.020 19 as now or hereafter amended;

(12) Notwithstanding any other law or statute regarding the sale of state property, sell or exchange and convey any or all interest in any community and technical college real and personal property, except such property as is received by a college district in accordance with RCW 28B.50.140(8), when it determines that such property is surplus or that such a sale or exchange is in the best interests of the community and technical college system;

27 (13) In order that the treasurer for the state board for community and technical colleges appointed in accordance with RCW 28B.50.085 may 28 make vendor payments, the state treasurer will honor warrants drawn by 29 the state board providing for an initial advance on July 1, 1982, of 30 the current biennium and on July 1 of each succeeding biennium from the 31 32 state general fund in an amount equal to twenty-four percent of the average monthly allotment for such budgeted biennium expenditures for 33 the state board for community and technical colleges as certified by 34 the office of financial management; and at the conclusion of such 35 36 initial month and for each succeeding month of any biennium, the state 37 treasurer will reimburse expenditures incurred and reported monthly by

1 the state board treasurer in accordance with chapter 43.88 RCW: 2 PROVIDED, That the reimbursement to the state board for actual 3 expenditures incurred in the final month of each biennium shall be less 4 the initial advance made in such biennium;

(14) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (12) of this 5 section, may receive such gifts, grants, conveyances, devises, and 6 7 bequests of real or personal property from private sources as may be made from time to time, in trust or otherwise, whenever the terms and 8 conditions thereof will aid in carrying out the community and technical 9 10 college programs and may sell, lease or exchange, invest or expend the same or the proceeds, rents, profits and income thereof according to 11 12 the terms and conditions thereof; and adopt regulations to govern the 13 receipt and expenditure of the proceeds, rents, profits and income 14 thereof;

15 (15) The college board shall have the power of eminent domain;

(16) Provide general supervision over the state's technical 16 The president of each technical college shall report 17 colleges. directly to the director of the state board for community and technical 18 colleges, or the director's designee, until local control is assumed by 19 a new or existing board of trustees as appropriate, except that a 20 21 college president shall have authority over program decisions of his or 22 her college until the establishment of a board of trustees for that college. The directors of the vocational-technical institutes on March 23 24 1, 1991, shall be designated as the presidents of the new technical 25 colleges.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. (1) A legislative work group is established 27 to provide guidance for the statewide strategic master plan for higher education and review options pertaining to the higher education 28 coordinating board. The legislative work group shall consist of the 29 members of the house of representatives and senate higher education and 30 31 fiscal committees. Cochairs shall be the chair of the senate higher education committee and the chair of the house of representatives 32 higher education committee. 33

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- (2) The legislative work group shall:

35 (a) Define legislative expectations and provide policy direction

1 for the statewide strategic master plan for higher education under 2 section 2 of this act;

3 (b) Make recommendations for ensuring the coordination of higher 4 education capital and operating budgets with the goals and priorities 5 in the statewide strategic master plan for higher education; and

6 (c) Examine opportunities to update the roles and responsibilities 7 of the higher education coordinating board, including alternatives for 8 administration of financial aid and other programs; review of 9 institution budget requests; approval of off-campus programs, centers, 10 and consortia; and collection and analysis of data.

(3) The legislative work group shall use legislative facilities and staff from senate committee services and the office of program research.

14 (4) The legislative work group shall consider advancing the 15 timeline for publication of the final 2004 strategic master plan for 16 higher education from December 2003 to June 2004, with a preliminary 17 report available by December 15, 2003, to ensure that it provides a 18 timely and relevant framework for development of future budgets and 19 policy proposals.

20 (5) This section expires September 1, 2004."
