Brief Summary of Bill

 Prohibits a law enforcement officer from possessing a firearm or other weapon in court when the officer is a party to a court proceeding involving harassment or domestic violence.

Background:

Weapons, including firearms, are generally prohibited in courtrooms and other court facilities. However, exceptions are provided for military and security personnel while they are engaged in official duties and for law enforcement personnel.

House Bill Report - 1 - HB 2473

Summary of Bill:

A law enforcement officer is prohibited from possessing a weapon in a court facility if the officer is present at the facility as a party to an action involving harassment or domestic violence.

Appropriation: None.

Fiscal Note: Not requested.

Effective Date: The bill takes effect 90 days after adjournment of session in which bill

is passed.

Testimony For: Victims of abuse are already fearful of going to court. Seeing an abuser with a weapon in the courtroom only increases the fear and the chances of violent retaliation. With this bill, victims' advocates can alert court security personnel to check law enforcement officers who are parties to a legal proceeding that a victim is attending.
