## SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2360

State of Washington 58th Legislature 2004 Regular Session

on Children By House Committee & Family Services (originally sponsored by Representatives Kaqi, Kenney, Wood, Santos, Hunt, Dickerson, Schual-Berke, Haigh, McDermott, Morrell, Darneille, Flannigan and Hudgins)

1 AN ACT Relating to child care workers; adding new sections to 2 chapter 74.13 RCW; and making an appropriation.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 5 to read as follows:

The legislature finds that as of 2000, child care workers in the 6 7 state earned an average hourly wage of eight dollars and twenty-two 8 cents, only fifty-eight percent received medical insurance through employers, only sixty-six percent received paid sick leave, and only 9 10 seventy-three percent received paid vacation. The legislature further finds that low wages for child care workers create a barrier for 11 individuals entering the profession, result in child care workers 12 leaving the profession in order to earn a living wage in another 13 profession, and make it difficult for child care workers to afford 14 15 professional education and training. As a result, the availability of quality child care in the state suffers. 16

17 The legislature intends to increase wages to child care workers 18 through establishing a child care career and wage ladder that provides 19 increased wages for child care workers based on their work experience,

level of responsibility, and education. This child care career and 1 2 wage ladder shall mirror the successful child care career and wage ladder pilot project operated by the state between 2000 and 2003. 3 While it is the intent of the legislature to establish the vision of a 4 5 statewide child care career and wage ladder that will enhance employment quality and stability for child care workers, 6 the 7 legislature also recognizes that funding allocations will determine the extent of statewide implementation of a child care career and wage 8 9 ladder.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 11 to read as follows:

12 (1) The division of child care and early learning in the department of social and health services shall establish a child care career and 13 wage ladder in licensed child care centers that meet the following 14 criteria: (a) At least ten percent of child care slots are dedicated 15 16 to children whose care is subsidized by the state or any political 17 subdivision thereof or any local government; (b) agree to adopt the child care career and wage ladder, which, at a minimum, shall be at the 18 same pay schedule as existed in the previous child care career and wage 19 20 ladder pilot project; and (c) meet further program standards as 21 established by rule pursuant to section 4 of this act.

The child care career and wage ladder shall include wage increments for levels of education, years of relevant experience, levels of work responsibility, relevant early childhood education credits, and relevant requirements in the state training and registry system.

(2) The division shall establish procedures for the allocation of
funds to implement the child care career and wage ladder among child
care centers meeting the criteria identified in subsection (1) of this
section. In developing these procedures, the division shall:

30 (a) Review past efforts or administration of the child care career 31 and wage ladder pilot project in order to take advantage of any 32 findings, recommendations, or administrative practices that contributed 33 to that pilot project's success;

(b) Consult with stakeholders, including organizations representing
 child care teachers and providers, in developing an allocation formula
 that incorporates consideration of geographic and demographic

1 distribution of child care centers adopting the child care career and 2 wage ladder; and

3 (c) Develop a system for prioritizing child care centers interested 4 in adopting the child care career and wage ladder that is based on the 5 criteria identified in subsection (1) of this section.

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 7 to read as follows:

8 Child care centers adopting the child care career and wage ladder established pursuant to section 2 of this act shall increase wages for 9 child care workers who have earned a high school diploma or GED 10 11 certificate, gain additional years of experience, or accept increasing levels of responsibility in providing child care, in accordance with 12 the child care career and wage ladder. The department of social and 13 health services shall pay wage increments for child care workers 14 15 employed by child care centers adopting the child care career and wage 16 ladder established pursuant to section 2 of this act who earn early 17 childhood education credits or meet relevant requirements in the state training and registry system, in accordance with the child care career 18 19 and wage ladder.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 21 to read as follows:

The division of child care and early learning in the department of social and health services shall establish further program standards by rule. The division of child care and early learning shall also study the impact of the child care career and wage ladder on the quality of child care and the child care work force, and report its findings to the governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature by December 1, 2005.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. The sum of two million dollars, or as much 30 thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated from the general fund to 31 the department of social and health services for the fiscal year ending 32 June 30, 2005, to carry out the purposes of this act.
