11 reserves pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW to construct the medical
12 technology and science education addition to the T-Building renovation
13 and establish the Washington institute of science education (WISE).

14 NEW SECTION. Sec. 905. (1) The department of natural resources
15 shall conduct an inventory on state lands of old growth forest stands
16 as defined by a panel of scientists. The panel of scientists shall
17 include three scientific scholars with well documented expertise in
18 Pacific Northwest forest ecology, one of whom will serve as chair by
19 consensus of the panel, one representative from the department of
20 natural resources, and one representative from the Washington
21 department of fish and wildlife. The panel shall review the best
22 available scientific information and develop a definition for old
23 growth forest stands in Washington state. The inventory shall include
24 maps illustrating the distribution of old growth forest stands on state
25 lands, and tables describing the number of acres of such stands in each
26 county, the department's administrative unit, and forest type. The
27 maps and tables shall identify both structurally uniform and
28 structurally complex stands. The department of natural resources shall
29 make a report of the inventory to the appropriate committees of the
30 legislature.

31 (2) For the duration of the study, cutting or removal of the trees
32 and stands 160 years or older is subject to the department publishing
33 notification of proposed cutting or removal of old growth timber.

34 (3) This section expires June 30, 2005.

35 **Sec. 906.** RCW 43.82.010 and 1997 c 117 s 1 are each amended to
36 read as follows:

1 (1) The director of general administration, on behalf of the agency
2 involved, shall purchase, lease, lease purchase, rent, or otherwise
3 acquire all real estate, improved or unimproved, as may be required by
4 elected state officials, institutions, departments, commissions,
5 boards, and other state agencies, or federal agencies where joint state
6 and federal activities are undertaken and may grant easements and
7 transfer, exchange, sell, lease, or sublease all or part of any surplus
8 real estate for those state agencies which do not otherwise have the
9 specific authority to dispose of real estate. This section does not
10 transfer financial liability for the acquired property to the
11 department of general administration.

12 (2) Except for real estate occupied by federal agencies, the
13 director shall determine the location, size, and design of any real
14 estate or improvements thereon acquired or held pursuant to subsection
15 (1) of this section. Facilities acquired or held pursuant to this
16 chapter, and any improvements thereon, shall conform to standards
17 adopted by the director and approved by the office of financial
18 management governing facility efficiency unless a specific exemption
19 from such standards is provided by the director of general
20 administration. The director of general administration shall report to
21 the office of financial management annually on any exemptions granted
22 pursuant to this subsection.

23 (3) The director of general administration may fix the terms and
24 conditions of each lease entered into under this chapter, except that
25 no lease shall extend greater than twenty years in duration. The
26 director of general administration may enter into a long-term lease
27 greater than ten years in duration upon a determination by the director
28 of the office of financial management that the long-term lease provides
29 a more favorable rate than would otherwise be available, it appears to
30 a substantial certainty that the facility is necessary for use by the
31 state for the full length of the lease term, and the facility meets the
32 standards adopted pursuant to subsection (2) of this section. The
33 director of general administration may enter into a long-term lease
34 greater than ten years in duration if an analysis shows that the life-
35 cycle cost of leasing the facility is less than the life-cycle cost of
36 purchasing or constructing a facility in lieu of leasing the facility.
37 For the 2003-05 biennium, any lease entered into after the effective

1 date of this section with a term of ten years or less shall not contain
2 a nonappropriation clause.

3 (4) Except as permitted under chapter 39.94 RCW, no lease for or on
4 behalf of any state agency may be used or referred to as collateral or
5 security for the payment of securities offered for sale through a
6 public offering. Except as permitted under chapter 39.94 RCW, no lease
7 for or on behalf of any state agency may be used or referred to as
8 collateral or security for the payment of securities offered for sale
9 through a private placement without the prior written approval of the
10 state treasurer. However, this limitation shall not prevent a lessor
11 from assigning or encumbering its interest in a lease as security for
12 the repayment of a promissory note provided that the transaction would
13 otherwise be an exempt transaction under RCW 21.20.320. The state
14 treasurer shall adopt rules that establish the criteria under which any
15 such approval may be granted. In establishing such criteria the state
16 treasurer shall give primary consideration to the protection of the
17 state's credit rating and the integrity of the state's debt management
18 program. If it appears to the state treasurer that any lease has been
19 used or referred to in violation of this subsection or rules adopted
20 under this subsection, then he or she may recommend that the governor
21 cause such lease to be terminated. The department of general
22 administration shall promptly notify the state treasurer whenever it
23 may appear to the department that any lease has been used or referred
24 to in violation of this subsection or rules adopted under this
25 subsection.

26 (5) It is the policy of the state to encourage the colocation and
27 consolidation of state services into single or adjacent facilities,
28 whenever appropriate, to improve public service delivery, minimize
29 duplication of facilities, increase efficiency of operations, and
30 promote sound growth management planning.

31 (6) The director of general administration shall provide
32 coordinated long-range planning services to identify and evaluate
33 opportunities for collocating and consolidating state facilities. Upon
34 the renewal of any lease, the inception of a new lease, or the purchase
35 of a facility, the director of general administration shall determine
36 whether an opportunity exists for collocating the agency or agencies in
37 a single facility with other agencies located in the same geographic
38 area. If a colocation opportunity exists, the director of general

1 administration shall consult with the affected state agencies and the
2 office of financial management to evaluate the impact colocation would
3 have on the cost and delivery of agency programs, including whether
4 program delivery would be enhanced due to the centralization of
5 services. The director of general administration, in consultation with
6 the office of financial management, shall develop procedures for
7 implementing colocation and consolidation of state facilities.

8 (7) The director of general administration is authorized to
9 purchase, lease, rent, or otherwise acquire improved or unimproved real
10 estate as owner or lessee and to lease or sublet all or a part of such
11 real estate to state or federal agencies. The director of general
12 administration shall charge each using agency its proportionate rental
13 which shall include an amount sufficient to pay all costs, including,
14 but not limited to, those for utilities, janitorial and accounting
15 services, and sufficient to provide for contingencies; which shall not
16 exceed five percent of the average annual rental, to meet unforeseen
17 expenses incident to management of the real estate.

18 (8) If the director of general administration determines that it is
19 necessary or advisable to undertake any work, construction, alteration,

22 and specifications thereof and an estimate of the cost of such work to
23 be made and filed in his or her office and the state agency benefiting
24 thereby is hereby authorized to pay for such work out of any available
25 funds: PROVIDED, That the cost of executing such work shall not exceed
26 the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars. Work, construction,
27 alteration, repair, or improvement in excess of twenty-five thousand
28 dollars, other than that done by the owner of the property if other
29 than the state, shall be performed in accordance with the public works
30 law of this state.

31 (9) In order to obtain maximum utilization of space, the director
32 of general administration shall make space utilization studies, and
33 shall establish standards for use of space by state agencies. Such
34 studies shall include the identification of opportunities for
35 colocation and consolidation of state agency office and support
36 facilities.

37 (10) The director of general administration may construct new
38 buildings on, or improve existing facilities, and furnish and equip,

1 all real estate under his or her management. Prior to the construction
2 of new buildings or major improvements to existing facilities or
3 acquisition of facilities using a lease purchase contract, the director
4 of general administration shall conduct an evaluation of the facility
5 design and budget using life-cycle cost analysis, value-engineering,
6 and other techniques to maximize the long-term effectiveness and
7 efficiency of the facility or improvement.

8 (11) All conveyances and contracts to purchase, lease, rent,
9 transfer, exchange, or sell real estate and to grant and accept
10 easements shall be approved as to form by the attorney general, signed
11 by the director of general administration or the director's designee,
12 and recorded with the county auditor of the county in which the
13 property is located.

14 (12) The director of general administration may delegate any or all
15 of the functions specified in this section to any agency upon such
16 terms and conditions as the director deems advisable.

17 (13) This section does not apply to the acquisition of real estate
18 by:

19 (a) The state college and universities for research or experimental
20 purposes;

21 (b) The state liquor control board for liquor stores and
22 warehouses; and

23 (c) The department of natural resources, the department of fish and
24 wildlife, the department of transportation, and the state parks and
25 recreation commission for purposes other than the leasing of offices,
26 warehouses, and real estate for similar purposes.

27 (14) Notwithstanding any provision in this chapter to the contrary,
28 the department of general administration may negotiate ground leases
29 for public lands on which property is to be acquired under a financing
30 contract pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW under terms approved by the
31 state finance committee.

32 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 907.** (1)(a) The legislature acknowledges the
33 recommendation of the house of representatives capital budget committee
34 2002 interim workgroup on higher education facilities regarding
35 encouragement of partnerships that attract federal and private funding
36 for certain types of capital facilities, particularly research
37 facilities and facilities providing unique or targeted skills. One

1 incentive to attracting nonstate funding of facilities might be the
2 state sharing in the ongoing operating and maintenance costs through
3 the operating budget and sharing future capital maintenance costs. The
4 workgroup recommended that a process be developed to enable an
5 institution to request such assistance up-front at the time the
6 facility being funded with nonstate resources is planned, rather than
7 after the facility is built. While the legislature will not commit in
8 a present budget to providing operating and maintenance or capital

11 assistance was not requested up-front when the facility was being

15 that traditionally do not receive any state budget support, such as
16 student dining, recreation, and housing facilities.

17 (b) While the legislature assumes facilities funded using
18 alternative financing contracts approved in the capital budget will not
19 be receiving state budget support, exceptions to this should be
20 requested of the governor and legislature up-front, as provided for in
21 this section for nonstate funded facilities.

22 (2)(a) The following project, funded primarily by nonstate budget
23 sources, is expected to be included in the institution's operating
24 budget request once the facility is completed: Washington State
25 University's agricultural research facility, constructed using federal
26 funds.

27 (b) The legislature is not committing to providing funds for
28 operating and maintenance or capital maintenance on the facility
29 described in (a) of this subsection at this time, but will consider
30 that decision when the project nears completion. Considerations will
31 include the appropriate amount of such assistance, particularly given
32 the research nature of the facility and the potential for indirect cost
33 recovery associated with the research grants coming to the institution
34 as a result of the facility.

35 **Sec. 908.** 2003 1st sp.s. c 26 s 915 (uncodified) is amended to
36 read as follows:

37 (1) The governor, through the office of financial management, may

1 authorize a transfer of appropriation authority provided for a capital
2 project that is in excess of the amount required for the completion of
3 such project to another capital project for which the appropriation is
4 insufficient. No such transfer may be used to expand the capacity of
5 any facility beyond that intended by the legislature in making the
6 appropriation. Such transfers may be effected only between capital
7 appropriations to a specific department, commission, agency, or
8 institution of higher education and only between capital projects that
9 are funded from the same fund or account. No transfers may occur
10 between projects to local government agencies except where the grants
11 are provided within a single omnibus appropriation and where such
12 transfers are specifically authorized by the implementing statutes that
13 govern the grants.

14 (2) For purposes of this section, the governor may find that an
15 amount is in excess of the amount required for the completion of a
16 project only if: (a) The project as defined in the notes to the budget
17 document is substantially complete and there are funds remaining; or

22 (3) For the purposes of this section, the legislature intends that
23 each project be defined as proposed to the legislature in the

25 legislative history that the legislature intended to define the scope
26 of a project in a different way.

27 (4) Transfers of funds to an agency's infrastructure savings
28 appropriation are subject to review and approval by the office of
29 financial management. Expenditures from an infrastructure savings
30 appropriation are limited to projects that have a primary purpose to
31 correct infrastructure deficiencies or conditions that: (a) Adversely
32 affect the ability to utilize the infrastructure for its current
33 programmatic use; (b) reduce the life expectancy of the infrastructure;

8 days before the date the transfer is effected. The office of financial
9 management shall report all emergency or smaller transfers within
10 thirty days from the date of transfer.

11 (6) This section does not apply to sections 506 through 508,
12 chapter 26, Laws of 2003 1st sp. sess.

13 **Sec. 909.** RCW 70.146.030 and 2003 1st sp.s. c 25 s 934 are each
14 amended to read as follows:

15 (1) The water quality account is hereby created in the state
16 treasury. Moneys in the account may be used only in a manner
17 consistent with this chapter. Moneys deposited in the account shall be
18 administered by the department of ecology and shall be subject to
19 legislative appropriation. Moneys placed in the account shall include
20 tax receipts as provided in RCW 82.24.027, 82.26.025, and 82.32.390,
21 principal and interest from the repayment of any loans granted pursuant
22 to this chapter, and any other moneys appropriated to the account by
23 the legislature.

24 (2) The department may use or permit the use of any moneys in the
25 account to make grants or loans to public bodies, including grants to

2 deposited in the account may be used by the department to pay for the
3 administration of the grant and loan program authorized by this

5 (3) Beginning with the biennium ending June 30, 1997, the
6 department shall present a biennial progress report on the use of
7 moneys from the account to the chairs of the senate committee on ways
8 and means and the house of representatives committee on appropriations.
9 The first report is due June 30, 1996, and the report for each
10 succeeding biennium is due December 31 of the odd-numbered year. The
11 report shall consist of a list of each recipient, project description,
12 and amount of the grant, loan, or both.

6 reconstruction, erection, equipping, maintenance, demolition and major
7 alteration of buildings and other capital assets owned by the state
8 board for community and technical colleges in the name of the state of
9 Washington, and the acquisition of sites, rights-of-way, easements,
10 improvements or appurtenances in relation thereto, and, during the
11 2003-05 biennium, engineering and architectural services provided by
12 the department of general administration, and for the payment of
13 principal of and interest on any bonds issued for such purposes.

17 NEW SECTION. Sec. 911. During the 2003-05 biennium, the state
18 parks and recreation commission shall study the various options
19 regarding the future of Old Man House state park. These alternatives
20 include retention as a state park, roles of volunteer community groups,
21 transfer to the Suquamish tribe, sale as surplus property, or other
22 alternatives. The commission may, if it deems it appropriate after
23 studying the various options, transfer the park to the Suquamish tribe.
24 Any action shall provide for continued public access and use of the
25 site for public recreation, and include a limited waiver of sovereignty
26 by the tribe restricted to the enforceability of the reversion clause
27 pursuant to RCW 79A.05.170.

28 NEW SECTION. Sec. 912. A new section is added to chapter 39.33
29 RCW to read as follows:

30 (1) During the 2003-05 biennium, notwithstanding any other
31 provision of law, the department of general administration is
32 authorized to sell the property and attendant parking lot located at
33 1058 Capitol Way, Olympia, for fair market value to a nonprofit
34 organization whose function is to produce television coverage of state
35 government deliberations and other events of statewide significance.

36 (2) This section expires June 30, 2005.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 913.** A new section is added to chapter 79.19
2 RCW to read as follows:

3 (1) All transaction costs associated with the exchange required
4 under chapter . . . (House Bill No. 3045), Laws of 2004, shall be
5 included in the valuation of the lands exchanged.

6 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the department of
7 natural resources is authorized to use moneys derived from the sale of
8 lands acquired by the common school trust through the exchange required
9 under chapter . . . (House Bill No. 3045), Laws of 2004, to acquire
10 commercial or industrial properties for the common school trust.

11 (3) If chapter . . . (House Bill No. 3045), Laws of 2004, is not
12 enacted by April 15, 2004, this section expires April 16, 2004; if it
13 is enacted by April 15, 2004, this section expires June 30, 2005.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 914.** (1) The legislature finds that it is in
15 the public interest to encourage development of a BioGas facility at
16 the Monroe honor farm to convert dairy waste, fish processing waste,
17 and other waste products into energy. Such a facility will: Help
18 improve water quality in area streams; help restore salmon habitat;
19 create jobs; generate green energy; improve the economic sustainability
20 of area dairy farms; help stem sprawl; serve as a demonstration project
21 for environmental education; reduce on-going costs associated with
22 maintaining state ownership of this facility; encourage greater
23 cooperation between area tribes and agricultural interests; and be a
24 model for other such efforts in the state.

25 (2) In consideration of the multiple public benefits set forth in
26 this section and notwithstanding any other provision of law, within one

30 Snohomish county for construction and operation of a BioGas facility,

32 promote salmon restoration and sustainability of area dairy farms. The
33 secretary of corrections shall enter into an agreement with the
34 department of general administration to work with the federally
35 recognized tribe to draft appropriate deed restrictions or conservation
36 easements for the property to ensure that the property is used for the
37 legislative purposes set forth in this section.

1 (3) The department of general administration shall transfer the
2 property only if the federally recognized tribe has completed a
3 feasibility study for a BioGas facility at the site, only if the tribe
4 has concluded that development of such a facility is feasible, only
5 after the necessary development permits are approved, and only after a
6 public hearing is conducted by the department of general
7 administration. Further, if the property is not used for one or more
8 of the purposes set forth in this section within two years from the
9 date of transfer or if at any time the property is used for activities
10 inconsistent with the legislative purposes set forth in this section,
11 then the ownership of the property shall automatically revert to the
12 state of Washington and be processed as surplus property. The tribe
13 shall be liable or responsible for any environmental contamination
14 occurring during the period the tribe owns the property.

15 (4) The legislature finds that the value of the public benefits set
16 forth in this section exceeds the fair market value of Monroe honor
17 farm. Accordingly, the state shall transfer the property to a
18 federally recognized tribe within Snohomish county at no cost beyond
19 the consideration set forth in this section. Nothing in this section
20 shall be deemed to affect or modify liability or responsibility for any
21 existing environmental contamination related to the Monroe honor farm.

22 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 915.** By October 1, 2004, the department of
23 general administration shall report to the legislature the priority
24 order of the state buildings the department would map subject to
25 implementation of RCW 36.28A.060.

26 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 916.** (1) In order to enhance salmon recovery
27 efforts funded in the 2003-05 biennium in eastern Washington, a
28 management board for regional fish recovery is established for Asotin,
29 Columbia, Garfield, Walla Walla, and Whitman counties. The board shall
30 consist of representatives of local and regional interests, and the
31 board shall invite state agencies and tribal governments with treaty
32 fishing rights to participate as voting members on the board.

33 (2) The number of members, qualifications, terms, and
34 responsibilities of the board shall be specified in an interlocal
35 agreement under chapter 39.34 RCW or resolution of a local government.

1 (3) The board shall, at a minimum, have the following powers and
2 duties:

3 (a) The board is responsible for the development and the adoption
4 of a salmon and steelhead recovery plan.

5 (b) The habitat sections of the plan must be consistent with local
6 watershed plans developed under chapter 90.82 RCW, the Northwest power
7 and conservation council's subbasin plans, and be based on critical
8 pathway methodology under RCW 77.85.060. The board may not exercise
9 authority over land or water within the individual counties or
10 otherwise preempt the authority of other units of local government.

11 (c) The harvest and hatchery sections of the plan must be
12 consistent with the policies developed jointly by the comanagers, the
13 department, and treaty Indian tribes.

14 (d) The hydropower sections of the plan must be consistent with
15 policies developed by the federal agencies that operate or market power
16 from the federal Columbia and Snake river power system.

17 (e) The board has authority to: Hire and fire staff, including an
18 executive director; enter into contracts; accept grants and other
19 moneys; and disburse funds.

20 (f) The board shall appoint and consult with a technical advisory
21 committee. The board shall invite at least four representatives from
22 state government and the treaty Indian tribes to participate on the
23 technical advisory committee. The board may appoint additional members
24 to the technical advisory committee.

25 (4) No action may be brought or maintained against any board
26 member, the board, or any of its agents, officers, or employees for any
27 noncontractual acts or omissions in carrying out the purposes of this
28 chapter.

29 (5) Nothing in this section shall be construed to affect or modify
30 any treaty or other federal rights of an Indian tribe, nor as affecting
31 or modifying any existing right of a federally recognized Indian tribe
32 as determined under *United States v. Washington*, 384 F. Supp. 312 (W.D.
33 Wash. 1974), or *Sohappy v. Smith*, 302 F. Supp. 899 (D. Oregon 1969),
34 and any applicable posttrial orders of those courts.

35 (6) This section expires June 30, 2005.

36 ***NEW SECTION. Sec. 917. Washington State University shall retain**

1 *ownership of 22 acres of the lower pasture area south of the WSU*
2 *Puyallup research campus and continue its existing use for agricultural*
3 *research.*

**Sec. 917 was vetoed. See message at end of chapter.*

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 918.** Part headings in this act are not any part
5 of the law.

6 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 919.** If any provision of this act or its
7 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
8 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
9 persons or circumstances is not affected.

10 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 920.** This act is necessary for the immediate
11 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
12 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
13 immediately, except for sections 117 and 202 of this act, which take
14 effect April 16, 2004.

Note: Governor's explanation of partial veto is as follows:

"I am returning herewith, without my approval as to the following appropriation items and sections: 114(8); 117; 118; 122(5); 136; 137; 203; 216(2); 245; and 917, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2573 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to the capital budget;

Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2573 is the state supplemental capital budget for the 2003-2005 Biennium. I have vetoed several provisions as described below:

Section 114(8), Page 9, Department of Ecology

This subsection would have provided \$1 million from the Water Quality Account to assist the City of Enumclaw with upgrades to their wastewater treatment plant to address phosphorus loading in the White River. Although, I support funding assistance to upgrade wastewater treatment plants to address specific water quality problems, this project did not go through the competitive grant and loan process. Nor did the City of Enumclaw apply for "hardship" funding. A specific grant for this project would be unfair to other communities that applied for assistance and are waiting in line for hardship funding from the Water Quality Account. The City of Enumclaw may apply for additional assistance during the next competitive grant and loan funding cycle beginning in September 2004.

Section 117, Page 12, Department of Ecology

This section for water rights purchase and lease is tied to section 118 which states that if Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1317 is not enacted by April 15, 2004, section 117 is null and void. Since Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1317 did not pass, I have vetoed this section to ensure that section 309, Chapter 26, Laws of 2003, First Special Session remains operative.

Section 118, Page 12, Department of Ecology

This section ties section 117 to Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1317 and states that if the bill is not enacted by April 15, 2004, section 117 is null and void. Since the bill did not pass, I have vetoed this section to ensure that section 309, Chapter 26, Laws of 2003, First Special Session remains operative.

Section 122(5), Page 15, Interagency Committee for Outdoor Recreation

Subsection 122(5) would have required the Interagency Committee for Outdoor Recreation to develop or revise project evaluation criteria for the Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program based on the provisions of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2275 or Second Substitute Senate Bill No 6082. Since neither bill passed, this subsection is unnecessary.

Section 136, Page 22, Community and Technical College System

This section would have placed overly restrictive conditions on the replacement of the North Plaza Building at Seattle Central Community College. Subsection 136(1) would have mandated construction limits that should, in part, be determined as part of the design phase of the project. Sections 136(2) and (3) would have required submission of major project reports and final budget reconciliation in excess of normal requirements, requirements that can be handled administratively. Although I have vetoed this section, I am directing the Office of Financial Management to consider this project a major capital project for purposes of review and oversight.

Section 137, Page 23, Community and Technical College System

This section would have placed overly restrictive conditions on the renovation of Building 7 at Tacoma Community College. Subsection 137 (1) would have mandated construction limits that should, in part, be determined as part of the design phase of the project. Sections 137 (2) and (3) would have required submission of major project reports and final budget reconciliation in excess of normal requirements, requirements that can be handled administratively. Although I have vetoed this section, I am directing the Office of Financial Management to consider this project a major capital project for the purposes of review and oversight.

Section 203, Page 27, Department of Community, Trade, and Economic Development

This section provided that if Second Substitute House Bill No. 1840 is not enacted by April 15, 2004, section 202 is null and void. Section 202 authorizes up to \$1,000,000 to help capitalize a self-insurance risk pool for non-profit corporations in Washington that develop housing units for the low-income. Since the bill did not pass, I have vetoed this section. However, I am retaining section 202 since the companion measure, Senate Bill No. 5869, did pass.

Section 216(2), Page 34, Department of Ecology

This subsection would have appropriated \$1.8 million of Local Toxics Control Account grants to Klickitat County for removal, disposal or recycling of vehicle tires. This effort is not an eligible project under the Local Toxics Control Account, Remedial Action Cleanup Program. To be eligible for such funding, a site must be under an agreed-upon order or consent decree, have completed a site assessment and cleanup plan, and be a declared toxic waste site.

Section 245, Page 51, Washington State University

The section would have appropriated \$3,400,000 for the start of a wastewater reclamation project at Washington State University and the City of Pullman. The proviso required a study that summarizes a strategy for completion of future phases of this project, identifies all funding sources, and identifies water conservation measures to be enacted. I originally recommended a proviso limiting the amount of state funding for this project until these serious questions have been answered; that proviso has been removed. It is inappropriate to commit funding without knowing the sources of future funding, phasing, costs, and conservation efforts. The university should explore and attempt to secure alternative funding that is consistent with a completed comprehensive project plan.

Section 917, Page 90, Washington State University

This section would have required Washington State University to retain ownership of 22 acres of the Puyallup research campus, and maintain its use for agricultural research. This section duplicates section 310(2) of the bill and is unnecessary.

In addition to vetoes above, I am directing the Department of General Administration to work with stakeholders to develop cancellation language for operating and capital leases. This language will provide the state flexibility to respond to funding changes that necessitate termination of leases. This will properly protect the Legislature and state agencies and is a complement section 906, which amends RCW 43.82.010, requiring all leases with a term of ten years or less not to contain a nonappropriation clause.

For these reasons, I have vetoed appropriation items and sections 114 (8); 117; 118; 122(5); 136; 137; 203; 216(2); 245; and 917, of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2573.

With the exception of appropriation items and sections 114(8); 117; 118; 122(5); 136; 137; 203; 216(2); 245; and 917, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2573 is approved."
