4 RCW to read as follows:

5 In order to vote at any election or primary, whether at a polling 6 place or by absentee or mail ballot, a person must have registered to 7 vote at least thirty days before the election or primary, regardless of 8 the person's status as an absentee, mail ballot, out-of-state, 9 overseas, or service voter.

10 **Sec. 2.** RCW 29A.04.103 and 2003 c 111 s 118 are each amended to 11 read as follows:

12 "Out-of-state voter" means any ((elector)) registered voter of the 13 state of Washington outside the state but not outside the territorial 14 limits of the United States or the District of Columbia.

15 Sec. 3. RCW 29A.04.109 and 2003 c 111 s 119 are each amended to 16 read as follows:

17 "Overseas voter" means any ((elector)) registered voter of the 18 state of Washington outside the territorial limits of the United States 19 or the District of Columbia.

20 Sec. 4. RCW 29A.04.163 and 2003 c 111 s 127 are each amended to 21 read as follows:

"Service voter" means any ((elector)) registered voter of the state of Washington who is a member of the armed forces under 42 U.S.C. Sec. 1973 ff-6 while in active service, is a student or member of the faculty at a United States military academy, is a member of the merchant marine of the United States, is a program participant as

1 defined in RCW 40.24.020, or is a member of a religious group or 2 welfare agency officially attached to and serving with the armed forces 3 of the United States.

4 Sec. 5. RCW 29A.08.010 and 2003 c 111 s 201 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 As used in this chapter: "Information required for voter registration" or "required information" means the minimum information 7 provided on a voter registration application that is required by the 8 9 county auditor in order to place a voter registration applicant on the voter registration rolls. This information includes proof that the 10 11 applicant is a United States citizen, the applicant's name, ((complete 12 residence)) residential address, date of birth, and a signature attesting to the truth of the information provided on the application. 13 Proof of citizenship is not required if an applicant is transferring 14 his or her voter registration within a county or between counties in 15 16 this state. All other information supplied is ancillary and not to be 17 used as grounds for not registering an applicant to vote.

18 Sec. 6. RCW 29A.08.010 and 2004 c 267 s 102 are each amended to 19 read as follows:

20 As used in this chapter: "Information required for voter registration" or "required information" means the minimum information 21 22 provided on a voter registration application that is required by the 23 county auditor in order to place a voter registration applicant on the 24 voter registration rolls. This information includes proof that the 25 applicant is a United States citizen, the applicant's name, ((complete residence)) residential address, date of birth, Washington state 26 driver's license number, Washington state identification card, or the 27 last four digits of the applicant's social security number, and a 28 signature attesting to the truth of the information provided on the 29 30 application((, and a check or indication in the box confirming the individual is a United States citizen)). If the individual does not 31 have a driver's license, state identification card, or Social Security 32 number the registrant must be issued a unique voter registration number 33 34 ((and)) in order to be placed on the voter registration rolls. All 35 other information supplied is ancillary and not to be used as grounds 36 for not registering an applicant to vote. Modification of the language

of the official Washington state voter registration form by the voter will not be accepted and will cause the rejection of the registrant's application. <u>Proof of citizenship is not required if an applicant is</u> transferring his or her voter registration within a county or between counties in this state.

6 **Sec. 7.** RCW 29A.08.030 and 2004 c 267 s 104 are each amended to 7 read as follows:

8 The definitions set forth in this section apply throughout this 9 chapter, unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

10 (1) "Verification notice" means a notice sent by the county auditor 11 or secretary of state to a voter registration applicant and is used to 12 verify or collect information about the applicant in order to complete 13 the registration.

14 (2) "Acknowledgement notice" means a notice sent by nonforwardable 15 mail by the county auditor or secretary of state to a registered voter 16 to acknowledge a voter registration transaction, which can include 17 initial registration, transfer, or reactivation of an inactive 18 registration. An acknowledgement notice may be a voter registration 19 card.

20 (3) "Confirmation notice" means a notice sent to a registered voter 21 by first class forwardable mail at the address indicated on the voter's permanent registration record and to any other address at which the 22 23 county auditor or secretary of state could reasonably expect mail to be 24 received by the voter in order to confirm the voter's residence address. The confirmation notice must be designed ((so that the voter 25 26 may update his or her current residence address)) to include a postage prepaid, preaddressed return form by which the registrant may verify 27 the address information. 28

29 Sec. 8. RCW 29A.08.107 and 2004 c 267 s 106 are each amended to 30 read as follows:

(1) The secretary of state must review the information provided by each voter registration applicant to ensure that ((either)) the driver's license number, state identification card number, or the last four digits of the social security number match the information maintained by the Washington department of licensing or the social security administration. If a match cannot be made, the secretary of

state <u>or county auditor</u> must correspond with the applicant to ((resolve the discrepancy)) obtain from the applicant a copy of a current photo identification, utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, or government check or another government document that shows the applicant's name and address.

6 (2) If the applicant fails to respond to any correspondence 7 required in this section to confirm information provided on a voter 8 registration application((-)) within ((thirty)) forty-five days, the 9 ((secretary of state shall forward the application to the appropriate 10 county auditor for document storage)) applicant will not be registered 11 to vote.

12 (3) Only after the secretary of state has confirmed ((that an 13 applicant's driver's license number or the last four digits of the 14 applicant's social security number match existing records with the Washington department of licensing or the social security 15 administration or determined that the applicant does not have either a 16 17 driver's license number or social security number)) the applicant's identity, as required by subsection (1) of this section, may the 18 19 applicant be placed on the official list of registered voters.

20 **Sec. 9.** RCW 29A.08.110 and 2003 c 111 s 206 are each amended to 21 read as follows:

(1) On receipt of an application for voter registration under this 22 23 chapter, the county auditor shall review the application to determine whether the information supplied is complete. An application that 24 25 contains proof that the applicant is a United States citizen, the 26 applicant's name, complete valid residence address, date of birth, and signature attesting to the truth of the information provided on the 27 application is complete. Proof of citizenship is not required if an 28 applicant is transferring his or her voter registration within a county 29 or between counties in this state. If it is not complete, the auditor 30 shall promptly mail a verification notice of the deficiency to the 31 32 applicant. This verification notice shall require the applicant to provide the missing information. If the verification notice is not 33 34 returned by the applicant or is returned as undeliverable ((the auditor 35 shall not place)), the name of the applicant may not be placed on the 36 county voter list. If the applicant provides the required information,

the applicant shall be registered to vote as of the date of mailing of
 the original voter registration application.

(2) If the information is complete, the applicant is considered to 3 be registered to vote as of the original date of mailing or date of 4 <u>delivery</u>, <u>whichever</u> is <u>applicable</u>. The auditor shall record the 5 appropriate precinct identification, taxing district identification, 6 and date of registration on the voter's record. Within forty-five days 7 after the receipt of an application but no later than seven days before 8 the next primary, special election, or general election, the auditor 9 10 shall send to the applicant, by first class mail, an acknowledgement notice identifying the registrant's precinct and containing such other 11 12 information as may be required by the secretary of state. The postal 13 service shall be instructed not to forward a voter registration card to any other address and to return to the auditor any card which is not 14 deliverable. If the applicant has indicated that he or she is 15 registered to vote in another county in Washington but has also 16 provided an address within the auditor's county that is for voter 17 registration purposes, the auditor shall send, on behalf of the 18 registrant, a registration cancellation notice to the auditor of that 19 other county and the auditor receiving the notice shall cancel the 20 21 registrant's voter registration in that other county. If the 22 registrant has indicated on the form that he or she is registered to vote within the county but has provided a new address within the county 23 24 that is for voter registration purposes, the auditor shall transfer the 25 voter's registration.

(3) If an acknowledgement notice card is properly mailed as 26 27 required by this section to the address listed by the voter as being the voter's mailing address and the notice is subsequently returned to 28 the auditor by the postal service as being undeliverable to the voter 29 at that address, the auditor shall promptly send the voter a 30 confirmation notice. The auditor shall place the voter's registration 31 32 on inactive status pending a response from the voter to the confirmation notice. 33

34 **Sec. 10.** RCW 29A.08.110 and 2004 c 267 s 107 are each amended to 35 read as follows:

36 (1) On receipt of an application for voter registration, the county37 auditor shall review the application to determine whether the

information supplied is complete. An application is considered 1 complete only if it contains proof that the applicant is a United 2 States citizen, the applicant's name, complete valid residence address, 3 date of birth, and signature attesting to the truth of the information 4 provided and an indication the license information or social security 5 number has been confirmed by the secretary of state. Proof of 6 citizenship is not required if an applicant is transferring his or her 7 voter registration within a county or between counties in this state. 8 If it is not complete, the auditor shall promptly mail a verification 9 notice of the deficiency to the applicant. This verification notice 10 shall require the applicant to provide the missing information. If the 11 verification notice is not returned by the applicant or is returned as 12 13 undeliverable ((the auditor shall not place)), the name of the 14 applicant may not be placed on the county voter list. If the applicant provides the required verified information, the applicant shall be 15 registered to vote as of the date of mailing of the original voter 16 17 registration application.

In order to prevent duplicate registration records, all 18 (2) complete voter registration applications must be screened against 19 existing voter registration records in the official statewide voter 20 21 registration list. If a match of an existing record is found in the 22 official list the record must be updated with the new information provided on the application. If the new information indicates that the 23 24 voter has changed his or her county of residence, the application must be forwarded to the voter's new county of residence for processing. If 25 26 the new information indicates that the voter remains in the same county 27 of residence or if the applicant is a new voter the application must be processed by the county of residence. 28

(3) If the information required in subsection (1) of this section 29 is complete, the applicant is considered to be registered to vote as of 30 the <u>original</u> date of mailing <u>or date of delivery</u>, whichever is 31 The auditor shall record the appropriate precinct 32 applicable. identification, taxing district identification, date 33 and of registration on the voter's record in the state voter registration 34 35 list. Within forty-five days after the receipt of an application but no later than seven days before the next primary, special election, or 36 37 general election, the auditor shall send to the applicant, by first 38 class mail, an acknowledgement notice identifying the registrant's

precinct and containing such other information as may be required by 1 the secretary of state. The postal service shall be instructed not to 2 forward a voter registration card to any other address and to return to 3 the auditor any card which is not deliverable. If the registrant has 4 5 indicated on the form that he or she is registered to vote within the county but has provided a new address within the county that is for б 7 voter registration purposes, the auditor shall transfer the voter's 8 registration.

9 (4) If an acknowledgement notice card is properly mailed as required by this section to the address listed by the voter as being 10 the voter's mailing address and the notice is subsequently returned to 11 the auditor by the postal service as being undeliverable to the voter 12 at that address, the auditor shall promptly send the voter a 13 14 confirmation notice. The auditor shall place the voter's registration inactive status pending a response from the voter to the 15 on confirmation notice. 16

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. A new section is added to chapter 29A.08 18 RCW to read as follows:

No person registering to vote, who meets all the qualifications of 19 20 a registered voter in the state of Washington, may be disqualified 21 because of a nontraditional address being used as a residence address. Voters using such an address will be registered and assigned to a 22 23 precinct based on the location provided. Voters without a traditional 24 address will be registered at the county courthouse, city hall, or other public building near the area that the voter considers his or her 25 26 residence. Registering at a nontraditional address will not disqualify a voter from requesting ongoing absentee voter status if the voter 27 designates a valid mailing address. 28

For the purposes of this section, "nontraditional address" includes shelters, parks, or other identifiable locations that the voter deems to be his or her residence.

32 **Sec. 12.** RCW 29A.08.115 and 2004 c 267 s 108 are each amended to 33 read as follows:

A person or organization collecting voter registration application forms must transmit the forms to the secretary of state or a

1 ((designee)) county auditor at least once weekly. The registration
2 date on such forms will be the date they are received by the secretary

4 Sec. 13. RCW 29A.08.140 and 2003 c 111 s 212 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 The registration files of all precincts shall be closed against 7 original registration or transfers for thirty days immediately 8 preceding every primary, special election, and general election to be 9 held in such precincts.

23 **Sec. 14.** RCW 29A.08.140 and 2004 c 267 s 112 are each amended to 24 read as follows:

The registration files of all precincts shall be closed against original registration or transfers for thirty days immediately preceding every primary, special election, and general election to be held in such precincts.

The county auditor shall give notice of the closing of the precinct files for original registration and transfer ((and notice of the special registration and voting procedure provided by RCW 29A.08.145)) by one publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the county at least five days before the closing of the precinct files.

No person may vote at any primary, special election, or general election in a precinct polling place unless he or she has registered to vote at least thirty days before that primary or election and appears

on the official statewide voter registration list. ((If a person, otherwise qualified to vote in the state, county, and precinct in which he or she applies for registration, does not register at least thirty days before any primary, special election, or general election, he or she may register and vote by absentee ballot for that primary or election under RCW 29A.08.145.))

7 Sec. 15. RCW 29A.08.145 and 2004 c 267 s 113 are each amended to 8 read as follows:

9 This section establishes a special procedure which an elector may use to register to vote or transfer a voter registration by changing 10 11 his or her address during the period beginning after the closing of registration for voting at the polls under RCW 29A.08.140 and ending on 12 the fifteenth day before a primary, special election, or general 13 election. A qualified elector in the state may register to vote or 14 change his or her registration address in person in the office of the 15 16 county auditor of the county in which the applicant resides, or at a 17 voter registration location specifically designated for this purpose by the ((county auditor of the county in which the applicant resides)) 18 secretary of state, and apply for an absentee ballot for that primary 19 20 or election. (1) The secretary of state shall specify by rule the format of all 3 voter registration applications. These applications 4 shall be 5 compatible with existing voter registration records. An applicant for voter registration shall be required to complete only one application 6 7 and to provide the required information other than his or her signature no more than one time. 10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 21. A new section is added to chapter 29A.08
11 RCW to read as follows:

12 A person may prove that he or she is a United States citizen with 13 an original or copy of any one of the following:

(1) A United States passport;

15 (2) A certified birth certificate issued by the city, county, or 16 state. A certified birth certificate has a registrar's raised, 17 embossed, impressed, or multicolored seal, registrar's signature, and 18 the date the certificate was filed with the registrar's office, which 19 must be within one year of birth;

20 (3) A consular report of birth abroad or certification of birth;

21 (4) A naturalization certificate; or

22 (5) A certificate of citizenship.

23 **Sec. 22.** RCW 29A.08.651 and 2004 c 267 s 101 are each amended to 24 read as follows:

(1) The office of the secretary of state shall create and maintain a statewide voter registration data base. This data base must be a single, uniform, official, centralized, interactive computerized statewide voter registration list defined, maintained, and administered at the state level that contains the name and registration information of every legally registered voter in the state and assigns a unique identifier to each legally registered voter in the state.

32 (2) The computerized list must serve as the single system for 33 storing and maintaining the official list of registered voters 34 throughout the state.

35 (3) The computerized list must contain the name and registration 36 information of every legally registered voter in the state.

(4) Under the computerized list, a unique identifier is assigned to
 each legally registered voter in the state.

15 (8) The chief state election officer shall provide support, as may 16 be required, so that local election officers are able to enter 17 information as described in subsection (3) of this section.

(9) The computerized list serves as the official voter registrationlist for the conduct of all elections.

20 (10) The secretary of state has data authority on all voter 21 registration data.

(11) The voter registration data base must be designed toaccomplish at a minimum, the following:

24 (a) Comply with the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (P.L. 107-252);

25 26 (b) Identify duplicate voter registrations;(c) Identify suspected duplicate voters;

27 (d) Screen against the department of corrections, the Washington
 28 state patrol, and other appropriate state agency data bases to aid in
 29 the cancellation of voter registration of felons;

30 (e) Provide up-to-date signatures of voters for the purposes of 31 initiative signature checking;

32 (f) Provide for a comparison between the voter registration data33 base and the department of licensing change of address data base;

(g) Provide online access for county auditors with the goal of realtime duplicate checking and update capabilities; and

36 (h) Provide for the cancellation of voter registration for persons 37 who have moved to other states and surrendered their Washington state 38 drivers' licenses.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 23. A new section is added to chapter 29A.08
 RCW to read as follows:

In addition to any legal obligations of local election officers, 3 the secretary of state in conjunction with the department of health 4 5 shall arrange for a monthly comparison of any lists of known deaths maintained by the department of health with the statewide voter 6 7 registration list. If a person is found on the department of health death list and the statewide voter registration list, the secretary of 8 9 state or county auditor shall immediately cancel the voter registration from the official state voter registration list. 10
