AN ACT Relating to allowing student scores in mathematics on certain national tests as one of multiple measures for state standards for mathematics; and amending RCW 28A.655.061.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.655.061 and 2004 c 19 s 101 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

(1) The high school assessment system shall include but need not be 7 8 limited to the Washington assessment of student learning, opportunities for a student to retake the content areas of the assessment in which 9 10 the student was not successful, and if approved by the legislature pursuant to subsection (11) of this section, one or more objective 11 alternative assessments for a student to demonstrate achievement of 12 state academic standards. The objective alternative assessments for 13 14 each content area shall be comparable in rigor to the skills and knowledge that the student must demonstrate on 15 the Washington assessment of student learning for each content area. 16

17 (2) Subject to the conditions in this section, a certificate of 18 academic achievement shall be obtained by most students at about the 19 age of sixteen, and is evidence that the students have successfully met the state standard in the content areas included in the certificate.
With the exception of students satisfying the provisions of RCW
28A.155.045, acquisition of the certificate is required for graduation
from a public high school but is not the only requirement for
graduation.

(3) Beginning with the graduating class of 2008, with the exception 6 7 of students satisfying the provisions of RCW 28A.155.045, a student who meets the state standards on the reading, writing, and mathematics 8 content areas of the high school Washington assessment of student 9 learning shall earn a certificate of academic achievement. 10 If a student does not successfully meet the state standards in one or more 11 content areas required for the certificate of academic achievement, 12 then the student may retake the assessment in the content area up to 13 four times at no cost to the student. If the student successfully 14 meets the state standards on a retake of the assessment then the 15 student shall earn a certificate of academic achievement. 16 Once 17 objective alternative assessments are authorized pursuant to subsection (11) of this section, a student may use the objective alternative 18 assessments to demonstrate that the student successfully meets the 19 state standards for that content area if the student has retaken the 20 21 Washington assessment of student learning at least once. If the student successfully meets the state standards on the objective 22 alternative assessments then the student shall earn a certificate of 23 academic achievement. The student's transcript shall note whether the 24 25 certificate of academic achievement was acquired by means of the Washington assessment of student learning or by an alternative 26 27 assessment.

(4) Beginning with the graduating class of 2010, a student must meet the state standards in science in addition to the other content areas required under subsection (3) of this section on the Washington assessment of student learning or the objective alternative assessments in order to earn a certificate of academic achievement.

(5) The state board of education may not require the acquisition of the certificate of academic achievement for students in home-based instruction under chapter 28A.200 RCW, for students enrolled in private schools under chapter 28A.195 RCW, or for students satisfying the provisions of RCW 28A.155.045.

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(6) A student may retain and use the highest result from each
 successfully completed content area of the high school assessment.

(7) Beginning with the graduating class of 2006, the highest scale 3 score and level achieved in each content area on the high school 4 5 Washington assessment of student learning shall be displayed on a student's transcript. In addition, beginning with the graduating class 6 7 of 2008, each student shall receive a scholar's designation on his or her transcript for each content area in which the student achieves 8 level four the first time the student takes that content area 9 10 assessment.

11 (8) Beginning in 2006, school districts must make available to 12 students the following options:

(a) To retake the Washington assessment of student learning up to
four times in the content areas in which the student did not meet the
state standards if the student is enrolled in a public school; or

(b) To retake the Washington assessment of student learning up to four times in the content areas in which the student did not meet the state standards if the student is enrolled in a high school completion program at a community or technical college. The superintendent of public instruction and the state board for community and technical colleges shall jointly identify means by which students in these programs can be assessed.

(9) Students who achieve the standard in a content area of the high school assessment but who wish to improve their results shall pay for retaking the assessment, using a uniform cost determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

(10) Subject to available funding, the superintendent shall pilot opportunities for retaking the high school assessment beginning in the 2004-05 school year. Beginning no later than September 2006, opportunities to retake the assessment at least twice a year shall be available to each school district.

(11)(a) The office of the superintendent of public instruction 32 options for implementing objective 33 shall develop alternative assessments, which may include an appeals process, for students to 34 demonstrate achievement of the state academic standards. The objective 35 alternative assessments shall be comparable in rigor to the skills and 36 37 knowledge that the student must demonstrate on the Washington assessment of student learning and be objective in its determination of 38

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1 student achievement of the state standards. Before any objective 2 alternative assessments <u>in addition to those authorized in (b) of this</u> 3 <u>subsection</u> are used by a student to demonstrate that the student has 4 met the state standards in a content area required to obtain a 5 certificate, the legislature shall formally approve the use of any 6 objective alternative assessments through the omnibus appropriations 7 act or by statute or concurrent resolution.

(b) A student's score on the mathematics portion of the preliminary 8 scholastic aptitude test (PSAT), the scholastic aptitude test (SAT), or 9 the American college test (ACT) may be used as an objective alternative 10 assessment under this section for demonstrating that a student has met 11 12 the mathematics standards for the certificate of academic achievement. 13 The state board of education shall identify the scores students must achieve on the mathematics portion of the PSAT, SAT, and ACT to meet 14 15 the state standard for mathematics.

16 (12) By December 15, 2004, the house of representatives and senate 17 education committees shall obtain information and conclusions from 18 recognized, independent, national assessment experts regarding the 19 validity and reliability of the high school Washington assessment of 20 student learning for making individual student high school graduation 21 determinations.

(13) To help assure continued progress in academic achievement as a foundation for high school graduation and to assure that students are on track for high school graduation, each school district shall prepare plans for students as provided in this subsection (13).

(a) Student learning plans are required for eighth through twelfth 26 27 grade students who were not successful on any or all of the content areas of the Washington assessment for student learning during the 28 include the courses, school year. The plan shall 29 previous competencies, and other steps needed to be taken by the student to meet 30 state academic standards and stay on track for graduation. 31 This requirement shall be phased in as follows: 32

(i) Beginning no later than the 2004-05 school year ninth grade
 students as described in this subsection (13)(a) shall have a plan.

35 (ii) Beginning no later than the 2005-06 school year and every year 36 thereafter eighth grade students as described in this subsection 37 (13)(a) shall have a plan.

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1 (iii) The parent or guardian shall be notified, preferably through 2 a parent conference, of the student's results on the Washington 3 assessment of student learning, actions the school intends to take to 4 improve the student's skills in any content area in which the student 5 was unsuccessful, strategies to help them improve their student's 6 skills, and the content of the student's plan.

7 (iv) Progress made on the student plan shall be reported to the 8 student's parents or guardian at least annually and adjustments to the 9 plan made as necessary.

10 (b) Beginning with the 2005-06 school year and every year 11 thereafter, all fifth grade students who were not successful in one or 12 more of the content areas of the fourth grade Washington assessment of 13 student learning shall have a student learning plan.

(i) The parent or guardian of a student described in this subsection (13)(b) shall be notified, preferably through a parent conference, of the student's results on the Washington assessment of student learning, actions the school intends to take to improve the student's skills in any content area in which the student was unsuccessful, and provide strategies to help them improve their student's skills.

(ii) Progress made on the student plan shall be reported to the student's parents or guardian at least annually and adjustments to the plan made as necessary.

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
