SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5470

1 AN ACT Relating to importation of prescription drugs from Canadian, 2 United Kingdom, Irish, and other nondomestic wholesalers; amending RCW 3 18.64.046; adding a new section to chapter 18.64 RCW; and creating new 4 sections.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. The legislature finds that as consumers' NEW SECTION. 7 prescription drug costs continue to rise, people across the state of 8 seeking opportunities to purchase Washington are lower cost prescription drugs from Canada, the United Kingdom, Ireland, and other 9 10 countries for their personal use. The state has a strong interest in promoting the safe use of prescription drugs by consumers in Washington 11 To address this interest, the legislature intends to seek 12 state. authorization from the federal government to license Canadian, United 13 Kingdom, Irish, and other nondomestic prescription drug wholesalers, 14 15 thereby providing licensed retail pharmacies the opportunity to purchase prescription drugs from approved wholesalers and pass those 16 savings on to consumers, and providing consumers the opportunity to 17 18 purchase prescription drugs from a trusted community pharmacist who is 19 aware of all of their prescription drug needs.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 18.64 RCW
to read as follows:

(1) By September 1, 2005, the board shall, in consultation with the 3 department and the health care authority, submit a waiver request to 4 the federal food and drug administration that will authorize the state 5 of Washington to license Canadian, United Kingdom, Irish, and other 6 7 nondomestic prescription drug wholesalers under RCW 18.64.046, thereby pharmacies licensed in Washington state 8 providing retail the 9 opportunity to purchase prescription drugs from approved wholesalers and pass those savings on to consumers. The waiver shall provide that: 10

(a) Canadian, United Kingdom, Irish, and other nondomestic prescription drug wholesalers meet the requirements of RCW 18.64.046 and any rules adopted by the board to implement those requirements;

14 (b) The board must ensure the integrity of the prescription drug 15 products being distributed by:

(i) Requiring that prescription drugs purchased from Canadian,
United Kingdom, Irish, and other nondomestic wholesalers originate only
from approved manufacturing locations;

(ii) Routinely testing prescription drugs purchased from Canadian,United Kingdom, Irish, and other nondomestic wholesalers for safety;

(iii) Establishing safe labeling, tracking, and shipping procedures
for prescription drugs purchased from Canadian, United Kingdom, Irish,
and other nondomestic wholesalers; and

24 (iv) Closely monitoring compliance with RCW 18.64.046 and any rules 25 adopted to implement the waiver;

(c) The prescription drugs purchased from Canadian, United Kingdom, Irish, and other nondomestic wholesalers must be limited to those for which potential savings to consumers can be demonstrated and those available through purchase by individuals only at licensed retail pharmacies;

(d) To ensure that the program benefits those consumers without insurance coverage for prescription drugs who are most in need of price relief, prescription drug purchases from pharmacies under the waiver will be limited to those not eligible for reimbursement by third party insurance coverage, whether public or private; and

36 (e) Savings associated with purchasing prescription drugs from
37 Canadian, United Kingdom, Irish, and other nondomestic wholesalers will
38 be passed on to consumers.

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1 (2) By December 1, 2005, the board, in consultation with the 2 department and the health care authority, shall submit a detailed 3 implementation plan to the governor and appropriate committees of the 4 legislature that details the mechanisms that the board will use to 5 implement each component of the waiver under subsection (1) of this 6 section.

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(3) The board shall adopt rules as necessary to implement this act.

8 Sec. 3. RCW 18.64.046 and 2004 c 52 s 3 are each amended to read 9 as follows:

10 (1) The owner of each place of business which sells legend drugs 11 and nonprescription drugs, or nonprescription drugs at wholesale shall 12 pay a license fee to be determined by the secretary, and thereafter, on 13 or before a date to be determined by the secretary as provided in RCW 43.70.250 and 43.70.280, a like fee to be determined by the secretary, 14 for which the owner shall receive a license of location from the 15 16 department, which shall entitle such owner to either sell legend drugs and nonprescription drugs or nonprescription drugs at wholesale at the 17 location specified for the period ending on a date to be determined by 18 19 the secretary, and each such owner shall at the time of payment of such 20 fee file with the department, on a blank therefor provided, a 21 declaration of ownership and location, which declaration of ownership and location so filed as aforesaid shall be deemed presumptive evidence 22 23 of the ownership of such place of business mentioned therein. It shall 24 be the duty of the owner to notify immediately the department of any 25 change of location and ownership and to keep the license of location or the renewal thereof properly exhibited in such place of business. 26

(2) Failure to conform with this section is a misdemeanor, and eachday that the failure continues is a separate offense.

(3) In event the license fee remains unpaid on the date due, no renewal or new license shall be issued except upon compliance with administrative procedures, administrative requirements, and fees determined as provided in RCW 43.70.250 and 43.70.280.

(4) No wholesaler may sell any quantity of drug products containing ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, phenylpropanolamine, or their salts, isomers, or salts of isomers, if the total monthly sales of these products to persons within the state of Washington exceed five percent of the wholesaler's total prior monthly sales of nonprescription drugs

to persons within the state in March through October. In November 1 2 through February, no wholesaler may sell any quantity of drug products containing ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, or phenylpropanolamine, or their 3 salts, isomers, or salts of isomers if the total monthly sales of these 4 5 products to persons within the state of Washington exceed ten percent of the wholesaler's total prior monthly sales of nonprescription drugs б 7 to persons within the state. For purposes of this section, monthly sales means total dollars paid by buyers. The board may suspend or 8 revoke the license of any wholesaler that violates this section. 9

10 (5) The board may exempt a wholesaler from the limitations of 11 subsection (4) of this section if it finds that the wholesaler 12 distributes nonprescription drugs only through transactions between 13 divisions, subsidiaries, or related companies when the wholesaler and 14 the retailer are related by common ownership, and that neither the 15 wholesaler nor the retailer has a history of suspicious transactions in 16 precursor drugs as defined in RCW 69.43.035.

17 (6) The requirements for a license apply to all persons, in 18 Washington and outside of Washington, <u>including those in Canadian</u> 19 <u>provinces, the United Kingdom, Ireland, and other countries</u>, who sell 20 both legend drugs and nonprescription drugs and to those who sell only 21 nonprescription drugs, at wholesale to pharmacies, practitioners, and 22 shopkeepers in Washington.

23 (7)No wholesaler may sell any quantity of ephedrine, 24 pseudoephedrine, phenylpropanolamine, or their salts, isomers, or salts 25 of isomers, to any person in Washington other than a pharmacy licensed under this chapter, a shopkeeper or itinerant vendor registered under 26 27 this chapter, or a practitioner as defined in RCW 18.64.011. Α violation of this subsection is punishable as a class C felony 28 according to chapter 9A.20 RCW, and each sale in violation of this 29 subsection constitutes a separate offense. 30

31 (8) If the board is unable to develop a reciprocal licensing 32 agreement with Health Canada or an applicable Canadian province, the 33 United Kingdom, Ireland, and other countries, the board shall develop 34 a process to license participating Canadian, United Kingdom, Irish, and 35 other nondomestic wholesalers through on-site inspection and 36 certification.

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. If any part of this act is found to be in 1 2 conflict with federal requirements that are a prescribed condition to the allocation of federal funds to the state, the conflicting part of 3 this act is inoperative solely to the extent of the conflict and with 4 respect to the agencies directly affected, and this finding does not 5 affect the operation of the remainder of this act in its application to 6 7 the agencies concerned. Rules adopted under this act must meet federal 8 requirements that are a necessary condition to the receipt of federal 9 funds by the state.

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
